This is her answer to the German demand that the conference not be moved, and the declaration of the central powers that the peace proposals of December 25, insofar as they affected Russia's allies had been withdrawn. The decision of the Bolsheviki Government to continue the negotiations with the central powers was announced by Leon Trotzky, the foreign minister, when he replied on Friday to the German declaration, after he had obtained an adjournment to consult with his colleagues. It was Trotzky who demanded that the conferences be transferred to neutral soil to get away from the German environment at Brest-Litovsk.

Ensign Kreylinko, the Bolsheviki commander-in-chief, has begun a campaign to raise a volunteer army. The new force, he says, will be used not only against the bourgeoisie of Russia and against the Germans, if negotiations fall, but also to liberate the proletariat of other continental European countries. 



HIS CHILD KILLED BY GERMAN AIRMEN, BRITISH OFFICER SLAYS EIGHT BOCHES WITH STICK

WITH THE BRITISH ARMIES IN FRANCE Jan. 7.—The full story of the heroism of a British captain who was so moved with hatred of the Germans for crippling his child with a bomb that he attacked and killed eight of them with a club and withstood a sudden German onslaught by his inspiring leadership has just been received. The tale has made the captain's name a byword of gallantry and bravery in the British camp. Here are the facts:

When the Germans delivered their tremendous assault against Masnieres and Marcoing during their general offensive on November 30 those two towns and the territory about them were being held by a division of English troops. On the staff of the commanding general there was a dashing captain, who may be designated as Capt. Black in this narrative.


Black charged this machine gun with one orderly. Four other brave orderlies had been shot down beside him previously, and this one also was caught as the machine gun was reached. Black then attacked the Germans with a revolver in each hand and shot down the last man of eight. This cleared Rues Vertes of the enemy, and outposts were established about the place. NEW YORK, Jan. 11.- General Post," produced at the Galety Theatre by Charles Dillingham, is the sort of play those who like to take their entertainments seriously and find in them all manner of subtle and reflective meanings wil seize upon to prove that Enga land is awakening to a new order of things. For "General Post" comes to us from London and is most unmisa takably English. And equally unmistakably the new play does make fun of English snobbery.

The title of the play is derived from the old game that we on this side of the water call "stage coach"-in Engfand it is called "general post." You remember the game, don't you? Every one has a place and then at a given signal there's a mad scurry for new places. The social shake-up now going on in England, even before the war & ended, is the reason for the choice of this symbolic title.

JUSTICE DUFF IS **ALLOWING FARMERS** LEAVE UNTIL JUNE

Two Must Report in May Their Future Plans.

DECIDES TWO TEST CASES

If Effectiveness Is Proven, Further Period of Exemption May Come.

OTTAWA, Jan. 11.-The position of the farmer under the military service act is again considered by the central appeal judge in a series of rulings, the appeal judge in a series of rulings, the text of which is now available. The application of G. B. Park of Hamiota, Man., is a case in point. He is a farmer, 22 years of age, living near Hamiota with his father. There is a family of four sons. The applicant and one of his brothers lives at home with his father, one brother lives on a farm a mile and a half south, and another lives on a farm one mile east, and is married. The two unmarried brothers are exempt. Each of the farms is a half-section.

As already announced Hon. Justice Duff granted exemption until June 1. In his formal judgment he states:

"The conclusion of the learned appeal judge that the applicant's work is not strictly necessary to enable cultivation to be carried on in the manner heretofore pursued seems probably correct, but the applicant is a competent farmer, and is, and has been, actually and habitually engaged with his father and brothers in cultivating his father's property. The family should have an opportunity of showing their willingness to make an effort to apply their energies more effectively in production.

Must Report His Plans.
"Exemption should be granted until June 1: 1918. The applicant will report in writing before May 1, as to his plans for the summer, with such particulars as may be required by the central appeal judge or registrar. Before the expiration of the exemption period he may apply for an extension of the period, when the actual preparations made for the work of the season of 1918 can be considered and the period extended, if it be thought just, until the end of the season.

"It may be observed that if a further investigation of the facts during the spring of 1918 indicate the desirability of it, the exemptions already granted to the unmarried brothers may be reviewed."

Exempt Tin June 1.

Another appeal allowed is that of a farm laborer, Donald Mathleson, of Buelah, Man. Application was made by the man's employer. The employer owns a section of land, 277 acres of which were under cultivation and 250 acres in crop during 1917. He harvested his crop in 1917 with the assistance of Mathleson and a foreigner for two weeks at harvest.

Exemption was granted until June 1. As in the previous case, the applicant will report his plans before May 1, and may apply for extension of the period of exemption.

FORT TEMISKAMINGUE, DATING BEYOND 1812, IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

HAILEYBURY, Jan. 11.—Fort Temiskamingue, about fifteen miles south from Haileybury, and on the shore of Lake Temiskaming, has been destroyed by fire. The building was built of pine logs and had withstood the ravages of the elements for more than 100 years, with it goes the oldest white man's habitation of this district. With it is connected many of the thrilling northland tales of pioneer days in the great trek from Montreal to Hudson Bay away back in 1812.

NICE UNIFORMS MILITIA OFFICERS BOUGHT MUST BE KEPT OFF STREETS

OTFAWA, Jan. 11.—An order-incouncil has been passed forbidding the wearing of military and naval uniforms, decorations and medals by persons not authorized or entitled to wear them. The order-in-council states that this step has been made necessary because "during the period of the present war there has grown up a practice which tends to bring the military and naval service into disrepute and to discourage recruiting, to weaken military and naval discipline and to facilitate the commission of frauds."

It is provided that no officer or man of the militar shall wear his uniform when not actually on duty without special permission. special permission.

Any person guilty of a violation of the new regulation will be liable on summary conviction to a fine of \$100, or three months' imprisonment.


