The London Electric claim that as taxpayers their own money should not be used in an endeavor to put them out of business. If that were done, litigation would follow, and the whole proposition would be tied up.



Lay Claim For Bond Guarantee Before the Finance Committee.

SEEK AN ENTRANCE

Would Be Willing to Accept That In. stead of the Guarantees-Matter Laid Over.

At a special meeting of the finance committee of the city council held yesterday afternoon, Mr. D. A. Stewart and Mr. A. E. Weich, on behalf of the London and Northwestern Railway and the North Midland Railway, respectively, laid their case before the committee, and asked that the council submit a bylaw to the ratepayers in January to guarantee a certain portion of their bonds. As there was no quorum the matter will stand over for a day or two, when another meeting will be held to finally dispose of the matter. It is quite likely that the bylaw will be submitted.

Mr. D. A. Stewart, speaking for the London and Northwestern, said desired the city to guarantee \$150,000 worth of bonds. The total cost of construction would be \$18,000 a mile. or \$1,224,000 for the 68 miles of road. This included equipment. It was his guarantee \$250,000 of this issue, and London had been apportioned \$150,000. The city would be placed on a level with other bond holders. Mr. Stewart thought his request reasonable. presented plans of his road, and a detailed statement of the probable cost. Some discussion took place as to the



Here comes an expert who has nothing to do with laundries who says that acids, instead of removing grease and dirt, make them stick all the faster.

Are you skeptical? He says to try this and be convinced: Pour a little sulphuric acid on a bar of soap and then attempt to wash your hands with the soap. In a moment your hands will be all gummed up with grease

He goes on to say that nothing but alkalies, such as potash, soda and ammonia, will remove grease and dirt, as they unite with the grease acids, steric, marganic and olic, liberating the base, glycerin, and forming a soluble compound in the water, which carries out the dirt.

Black and red are the only two colors that will not fade in cotton or linen goods. The more delicate colors are probably set with acids and as the alkalies in soap or soap powders destroy it, the color also goes. Silks and many woolen goods are set with acids and if boiled with any alkali they will discharge their colors in a short time. The blue colors in fine baby flannels which become faded after a few washings with soap can be instantly restored by rinsing in a weak solution of citric acid, the sour principle of the lemon. The excessive use of salsoda will destroy most

DREXEL CLIMBED

Armstrong Drexel broke all aeroplane altitude records this afternoon when he climbed above this city until his Bleriot monoplane was unable to make further progress in the rarefied atmosphere. The ink in the needle of his barograph ran out at 9,970 feet, which was accepted as a new world's record by Clifford B. Harmon, chairman of the National Council Associated Aero Clubs of America, and James King Duffy, the secretary of that body.

The instrument is the same one which the late Ralph Johnstone carried when he made the former record of 9,714 feet at Belmont Park, Oct. 31. It was brought to this city under seal Quck Flight.
