## HAIG'S GRIP ON POZIERES UNSHAKEN BY ASSAULTS OF FOE IN GREAT FORCE

Powerful Infantry Attack Delivered Last Night by Germans On Somme Front North of Pozieres, But Was Repulsed by British With Heavy Loss.

(Canadian Press.)

London, Aug. 12 .- A strong infantry attack was delivered last night by the Germans on the Somme front north of Pozieres. According to an announcement from the war office today this attack was repulsed with heavy loss to the Germans. The announcement follows:

'The enemy renewed his efforts to recapture trenches we lately wrested from him on the high ground north of Pozieres by delivering a strong infantry attack yesterday evening, supported by heavy artillery fire. Seven Thousand Refugees Were Found Amongst Ruins of Stronghold.

Tragic Scenes in Wake of Austrian Retreat From Gorizia.

Rome, Aug. 12.—Today's official statement says the Italians have occupied the town of Oppacchiasella on the Carso Plateau.

The town of Oppacchiasella is about one mile east of the Vallone line, which the Austrians were reported by the Italians yesterday to have taken up after the capture of Doberdo Plateau by the Italians This indicates that the Italians have succeeded in pushing back the Austrians a substantial distance further after clearing the Doberdo Plateau. Oppacchiasella is six miles south west of Gorizia.

London, Aug. 12.-A Daily Mail patch from Milan says: A battle is now proceeding east of Go rizia, and the news which is coming in from the front gives hope of further su cesses. The entrance of the Italians into Gorizia was accompanied by stirring events. Gen. Zeiller, who commanded this part of the Austrian front, had tolen out of town with all his staff, aving his troops to sacrifice themselves the last fruitless resistance.

By Debenture Notes Securities for this loan, it is reported, would include deposits of about \$300,000,000 of Canadian, Argentine and Swiss Government bonds and stocks and bonds of American railroad and industrial corporations, and principal and interest would be payable in gold in New York. English Expert Present When Crops Are Judged.

EARLIER PULLING ADVISED

Season Has Not Been Favor able-David Hayter Has Best Alvinston Field.

In order to improve flax-growing in he Alvinston district and in Lambton County in general, T. A. G. Gordon, manager of the Lambton Flax Company generously donated \$200, to be given as prizes in a field competition, the fields to be judged by a representative of the department of agriculture.

F. K. Jackson, director of the Flax Experiment Station, England, was present during the second judging of the fields. Mr. Jackson spoke encourag-ingly of the prospects of flax-growing Lambton County. He considered anditions similar to the best flax growing districts in Great Britain. He ensidered this season's crop compared favorably with the best flax areas he had looked over this season. Should Pull Earlier.

The quality of the fibre was the best, but he advised flax being pulled a little earlier, but owing to weather conditions and the labor problem this year, both n Great Britain and Canada, the best hat could be expected was being done. The wet, backward spring was no doubt somewhat discouraging to the flax-growers of the county. Suitable weather for planting was irregular, con sequently some late flax was sown. The idea was to plant the flax in such a way that the fields for pulling would come in succession, but the intense heat of the past month hastened the
