



VACANT THRONE POSSIBLE

Leol old of Belgium's Natural Heir Does Not Want to Reign.

Brussels, May 16. - All Belgium is discussing the change in the succession to the throne. The Count of Flanders, the heir-apparent, owing to ill-health, wants to abandon his succession in favor of his son, Prince Albert of Flanders. The prince has been for many years

considered the legal heir-presumptive but his father never has legally renounced the succession, and the heirship would be declared vacant if the count died during the lifetime of King Leopold without renunciation. This the King is desirous of preventng, and there have been numerous family councils held within the past month. As a result of these conferences the Count of Flanders has agreed to renounce formally the succession, and now only the agreement and approval of Parliament is needed to nake the renunciation legal. But the Socialists declare that they will oppose the change, and will fur-ther oppose the transfer to Prince Al-

bert of the present annual grant of \$40,000 paid the Count of Flanders as heir-apparent, so that a deadlock succession is possible.

For years the Socialists have nounced the count for accepting this dole, because the count is enormously rich, and has no need of it. Albert, however, will need the money, as he is now dependent upon the generosity of the King. The Princess Elizabeth, his wife, and the future Queen of the Belgians is also poor. King Leopold, who is said to be the richest sovereign in the world with the exception of the Czar receives a grant of \$600,000 a year from the public treasury: The Socialists declare this ought to be sufficient to support the King and the heir-apparent. They also assert that as Leopold has a private fortune of at least \$30,000,000, he

ought to provide for the future of the dynasty out of his own purse.





Mr. Alex. Fraser, of the firm of Fraser & McMillan, who has just returned from an extended business trip through the Northwest, was questioned this morning as to the attitude of the people of newer Canada towards the autonomy bill.

"I heard not a single grumble concerning the terms of the bill west of Port Arthur," said Mr. Fraser. "The people are much surprised that there is so much talk about the matter in Ontario. In Winnipeg, of course, there is a little agitation over the boundary question. The people of the two new provinces have practically nothing to say about the school question at all. They are perfectly satisfied with their present school system, which they consider the finest in the world, as Mr. want. They cannot understand why Ontario should be so concerned about




