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# REPORT OF MORTUARY STATISTICS

OF THE PRINCIPAL CITIES AND TOWNS OF CANADA, FOR  
THE YEAR 1889.

## INTRODUCTION.

These statistics are collected and compiled under authority of the "Statistics Act," and in accordance with the regulations prescribed in the Order in Council, assented to by His Excellency the Governor General, on the 26th December, 1882.

There are actually twenty-nine cities and towns coming under the regulations above mentioned, including the Town of Brockville, which has been added to the list during the year 1889, too late, however, to appear in the present report.

It will be seen that some changes have been made in the classification of diseases, since the publication of the last yearly report. Three new classes of diseases have been added to the old classification, "Parasitic," "Dietic," "Ill-defined and not specified causes," making in all eight classes instead of five as before.

The present system of classification is based upon that established by the Registrar General of England, which followed the lines laid down by the College of Physicians (London), as nearly as might be, considering that neither the things to be classified nor the objects of the classification were precisely the same.

In order to facilitate the making of comparisons with the previous reports of Mortuary Statistics, it is necessary to give a word of explanation regarding the changes made in this one.

In the first place, "Parasitic" and "Dietic" diseases have been excised from "Zymotic" diseases, and now form two independent classes. Quinsy, carbuncle, rheumatism and purpura have also been taken out of "Zymotic" diseases to be transferred: the first two, to "Local Diseases," and the other two, to "Constitutional Diseases." Moreover, whooping cough has been taken out of "Throat Affections" (old classification) to be put in the "Zymotic" class.

Dropsy, abscess and hemorrhage, formerly classed in "Constitutional Diseases," have been transferred to the new class called "Ill-Defined and not specified causes"; the same with "atrophy and debility" which was formerly classed in "Developmental Diseases." Teething has also been taken out of "Developmental" to be put with "Local Diseases."

The annexed report is composed of eight tables, as follow:—

TABLE I gives, for each city or town, the causes of death, arranged by classes as above mentioned, together with the sexes, civil conditions and ages of the deceased; also the number of still-born.

## INTRODUCTION.

Cette statistique est recueillie et compilée sous l'autorité de "l'Acte des statistiques," et en conformité des règlements prescrits par l'arrêté du conseil, sanctionné par Son Excellence le Gouverneur Général, le 26 décembre 1882.

Il y a actuellement vingt-neuf cités et villes sous l'effet des règlements plus haut mentionnés, en comptant la ville de Brockville, qui a été ajoutée à la liste durant l'année 1889, trop tard, cependant, pour être comprise dans le présent rapport.

On remarquera que des changements ont été faits dans la classification des maladies ou causes de décès, depuis la publication du dernier rapport annuel. Trois nouvelles classes de maladies ont été ajoutées à l'ancienne classification: "Parasitiques," "Diétiques" et "Causes non spécifiées et indéfinies," formant en tout huit classes au lieu de cinq comme avant.

Le système actuel de classification est basé sur celui qui a été établi par le Régistrateur général en Angleterre, et qui correspond autant que possible, aux règles posées par le "*Royal College of Physicians*," (London) eu égard au fait que ni les choses à classer ni le but de la classification ne sont absolument les mêmes.

Afin de pouvoir, au besoin, comparer plus facilement les rapports déjà publiés de la statistique mortuaire, il est bon de donner un mot d'explication sur les changements qui ont été faits dans celui-ci.

En premier lieu, les deux nouvelles classes de maladies appelées: "Parasitiques" et "Diétiques", ont été extraites de la classe des "Zymotiques" et forment maintenant deux classes indépendantes. Les maladies suivantes: angines, anthrax, rhumatisme et purpura ont aussi été retranchées de la classe des maladies "Zymotiques," pour être mises: les deux premières dans la classe des "Maladies Locales," et les deux autres dans celle des "Maladies Constitutionnelles." De plus "coqueluche" qui se trouvait comprise dans les "Affections de la gorge," (ancienne classification) a été ajoutée à la classe des maladies "Zymotiques." Les maladies suivantes: hydropisie, abcès, hémorrhagie, antérieurement classées dans les "Maladies Constitutionnelles," ont été transférées dans la nouvelle classe des "Causes indéfinies et non spécifiées." Dans cette dernière classe a aussi été transférée "atrophie et débilité," cause de décès antérieurement classée dans les "Maladies d'âges." Enfin "dentition" a été retranchée des "Maladies d'âges" pour être classée dans les "Maladies Locales."

Le rapport ci-joint contient les huit tableaux suivants:—

Le tableau I donne pour chaque cité ou ville, les causes de décès, groupées par classes, tel que plus haut mentionné; ainsi que sexes, états civils et âges des décédés; de plus le nombre de cas de mort-nés.

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TABLE II gives the diseases arranged in the order of fatality, as well as the religions, nationalities and classes of occupation to which the deceased belonged.

TABLE III shows the number of deaths of illegitimate children. In this table the figures given for Montreal, Quebec, Ottawa and Halifax are excessively out of proportion when compared with those of other cities. This is explained, however, through the existence, in these four cities, of foundling hospitals wherein infants belonging to other places, are found in large numbers.

TABLES IV, V, VI, VII and VIII show the ratios of mortality, according to ages and occupations, as well as by months; also the comparative mortality from fifteen principal causes of death.

The population figures used in the tables of ratios of this report, have been taken from the Municipal Census returns, as received from the several cities and towns.



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Le tableau II donne les maladies disposées dans l'ordre de la fatalité, ainsi que les religions, les nationalités et les classes d'occupations auxquelles appartenaient les décédés.

Le tableau III montre le nombre de décès d'enfants illégitimes. Dans ce tableau les chiffres donnés pour Montréal, Québec, Ottawa et Halifax sont excessivement hors de proportion lorsqu'on les compare à ceux des autres villes; mais ceci s'explique par le fait que dans ces quatre villes il existe des hospices d'enfants trouvés, habités en grande partie par des enfants appartenant à des places étrangères.

Les tableaux IV, V, VI, VII et VIII donnent les proportions de la mortalité selon les âges et les classes d'occupation, de même que par mois; ainsi que l'état comparatif de la mortalité due à quinze causes principales de décès.

Les chiffres de la population sur lesquels sont basées les proportions établies dans ce rapport, ont été pris des recensements municipaux, tels que reçus des différentes cités et villes.

## CHAPTER 17.

(Revised Statutes of Canada.)

An Act respecting the Civil Service of Canada.

A.D. 1886.

(As amended by 51 V., c. 12 and 52 V., c. 12.)

**H**ER Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

## SHORT TITLE.

**1.** This Act may be cited as "*The Civil Service Act.*" Short title. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 1.

## INTERPRETATION.

**2.** In this Act unless the context otherwise requires,— Interpretation.

(a.) The expression "Head of a Department" means the Minister of the Crown for the time being presiding over such department; "Head of a Department."

(b.) The expression "Deputy," "Deputy Head," or "Deputy Head of the Department," means the Deputy of the Minister of the Crown presiding over such department, and also includes the "Auditor General," in all cases in which such meaning is not inconsistent with his powers and duties under "*The Consolidated Revenue and Audit Act.*" 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 2. "Deputy Head."

## CONSTITUTION OF THE CIVIL SERVICE.

**3.** The Civil Service, for the purposes of this Act, includes and consists of all classes of employees, elsewhere than in the North-West Territories, in or under the several departments of the executive government of Canada and in the office of the Auditor General, included in the schedules A and B to this Act, appointed by the Governor in Council or other competent authority before the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, or thereafter appointed in the manner provided by the Civil Service Act for the time being in force, and such officers and employees in the North-West Territories holding positions, which, if held in other parts of Canada, would bring them under the provisions of this Act, as the Governor in Council brings under the provisions hereof. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 3. Of whom the Civil Service shall consist. As to North-West Territories.

Two divisions.

Inside division

Outside division.

**4.** The service shall be divided into two divisions:—

The first or inside departmental division shall comprise employees of those classes mentioned in schedule A, employed on the several departmental staffs at Ottawa, and in the office of the Auditor General:

The second or outside departmental division shall comprise employees of those classes mentioned in schedule B, and who are employed otherwise than on the departmental staffs at Ottawa. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 4.

**5.** The Governor in Council may, from time to time, make general rules and regulations, not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, respecting the appointments and promotions of the officers in the Civil Service and all other matters pertaining thereto. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 5.

**6.** The Governor in Council shall, from time to time, determine the number of officers, chief clerks, clerks, messengers and other employees that are required for the working of the several departments in each division of the Civil Service, but the collective amount of the salaries of each department shall, in no case, exceed that provided for by vote of Parliament for that purpose:

2. If the number of employees then attached to any department in either division thereof is greater than the number allowed to the department, as herein provided, the Governor in Council shall name the persons to fill the several offices; and the remainder shall be supernumerary clerks, without being eligible for increase of salary, of that class respectively in which they rank, and shall so remain until promoted in the manner herein provided or until severed from the service 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 6.

**7.** *Repealed* by 51 V., c. 12, s. 1.

#### BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

**8.** A board of examiners shall, from time to time, be appointed by the Governor in Council, who, for the purposes of this Act, shall be known and are hereinafter referred to as "The Board," consisting of three members; and they shall examine all candidates for admission to the Civil Service, and give certificates of qualification to such persons as are found qualified, according to such regulations as are authorized by the Governor in Council for the guidance of the board: 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 8.

2. The Governor in Council may appoint a person who shall be clerk to the board, at a salary not exceeding seven hundred dollars per annum:

3. Each member of the board shall receive such salary, not exceeding four hundred dollars per annum, as is fixed by the Governor in Council. 52 V., c. 12, s. 1.

4. The members of the board, while engaged in their work, shall be paid such travelling expenses as are determined by the Governor in Council: Travelling expenses.

5. Such persons as are selected by the board to assist them in the conduct of examinations shall receive such sum, not exceeding five dollars a day, as is fixed by the Governor in Council: Assistants.

6. The meetings of the board shall be held at such times, and the proceedings thereof shall be governed by such rules and regulations as the Governor in Council, from time to time, determines: Meetings.

7. The board shall be supervised by the Secretary of State. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 8. Supervision of board.

9. The board may obtain the assistance of persons who have had experience in the education of the youth of Canada, and with such assistance shall hold, or cause to be held, periodical examinations for admission to the Civil Service, in the cities of Halifax, St. John, N.B., Charlottetown, Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, Hamilton, London, Winnipeg, Victoria and such other places as are determined by the Governor in Council; it shall not be necessary to hold such examinations in all the said places, but the times and places at which the examinations shall be held shall be determined, from time to time, by the Governor in Council; examinations shall, as far as possible, be in writing, and the cost thereof shall be defrayed out of moneys previously voted by Parliament for that purpose. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 9. Who may be appointed as assistants.

Places and times of examinations.

Expenses, how paid.

2. Whenever the Board are satisfied that any irregularity or fraudulent practice has obtained at any examination held by them or by any person deputed by them to hold the same, they may summon before them by an instrument signed by the chairman or acting chairman of the Board, and may examine under oath or affirmation, any person who, in their opinion, is in a position to give evidence in relation to any such irregularity or fraudulent practice; and if the person so summoned neglects or refuses to appear, or having appeared, refuses to be examined upon oath or affirmation concerning the premises, or refuses to take an oath or affirmation, or having taken the oath or affirmation, refuses to answer such questions concerning the premises as are then put to him, without offering any just and lawful excuse for his refusal, the chairman or acting chairman of the Board shall be vested with all the powers conferred, in like cases, upon a justice of the peace by section thirty-two of "*The Summary Convictions Act*": Inquiry as to irregularities at examinations.

Penalty for refusing to appear, &c.

3. Every oath or affirmation required for the purposes of such examination may be administered by any member of the Board: Administration of oath.

Name of person implicated to be removed from list.

4. If any person is proved by such inquiry to have been concerned in any fraudulent practice or to have been guilty of any breach of the regulations made in virtue of section thirty-one of this Act, the Board shall report the same to the Secretary of State, who may thereupon cause such person's name to be removed from the list of persons who are found qualified :

Penalty for personation.

5. Every person who, at any examination held under this Act, personates any candidate or employs, induces or allows any person to personate him, is guilty of an offence against this Act, and is liable, on summary conviction, to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, or to a fine not exceeding two hundred dollars, and, if he is employed in the Civil Service, to be dismissed therefrom :

Penalty for wrongfully receiving or furnishing examination papers.

6. Every person who surreptitiously procures from any printer or other person, and every person who, without authority, furnishes to any other person any examination question paper or any other paper relating to any such examination as aforesaid, is guilty of an offence against this Act, and liable, on summary conviction, to imprisonment, with or without hard labor, for a term not exceeding six months, or to a fine not exceeding two hundred dollars, and if he is employed in the Civil Service, to be dismissed therefrom ; and no such person shall be allowed to present himself at any subsequent examination. 51 V., c. 12, s. 2.

#### APPOINTMENTS AND SALARIES IN THE SERVICE.

Conditions of appointment. During pleasure and after examination.

**10.** Except as herein otherwise provided,—

(a.) All appointments to the Civil Service shall be during pleasure, and no person shall be appointed or promoted to any place below that of a Deputy Head, unless he has passed the requisite examination and served the probationary term hereinafter mentioned ;

Limits as to age.

(b.) No person shall be appointed to any place in the first or inside departmental division of the Civil Service other than that of a Deputy Head, on probation or otherwise, whose age exceeds thirty-five years, or who has not attained, in case the appointment is to a lower grade than that of a third class clerk, the full age of fifteen years, or in other cases, the full age of eighteen years. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 10.

Appointment of Deputy Heads to be during pleasure.

**11.** The Deputy Heads of departments shall be appointed by the Governor in Council, and shall hold office during pleasure ; but whenever such pleasure is exercised in the direction of removing a Deputy Head from his office, a statement of the reasons for so doing shall be laid on the table of both Houses of Parliament within the first fifteen days of the next following session. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 11.

Deputyheads.

2. There shall be a Deputy Head for each department ; and no officer shall hereafter be raised to the rank of Deputy

Head except in the case of a vacancy occurring, or when a new department is created by Act of Parliament; but nothing herein shall affect persons who have been heretofore promoted to the rank of Deputy Head. 51 V., c. 12, s. 3

**12.** The salaries of the Deputy Heads shall be determined by the Governor in Council, according to the duties and responsibilities of their respective departments. The minimum salary of a Deputy Head shall be three thousand two hundred dollars, and the maximum salary shall be four thousand dollars. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 12.

**13.** The Deputy Head of each department shall, subject to the directions of the Head of the department, oversee and direct the officers, clerks and employees in the department, and shall have general control of the business thereof, and shall perform such other duties as are assigned to him by the Governor in Council. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 13.

Duties and powers of a Deputy Head.

**14.** In the absence of any Deputy Head, a chief clerk named by the Head of the department shall perform the duties of such Deputy Head, unless the performance of such duties is otherwise provided for by the Governor in Council; and there shall be in the office of the Auditor General a chief clerk who shall, at all times, act for the Auditor General in his absence. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 14.

By whom performed in his absence.

**15.** A Chief clerkship in any department shall only be created by Order in Council, passed after—

(a.) The Deputy Head has reported that such an officer is necessary for the proper performance of the public business in the department, stating the reasons on which he has arrived at that conclusion;

(b.) The concurrence of the Head of the department in such report; and—

(c.) The salary has been voted by Parliament. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 15.

**16.** The minimum salary paid to a chief clerk shall be one thousand eight hundred dollars, with an annual increase of fifty dollars up to a maximum of two thousand four hundred dollars. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 16.

**17.** A first-class clerkship shall only be created by Order in Council, passed on the report of the Deputy Head, concurred in by the Head of the department, setting forth the reasons for creating the office, and after the salary has been voted by Parliament 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 17

First-class clerkship; condition of creation.

**18.** The minimum salary of a first-class clerk shall be one thousand four hundred dollars per annum, with an annual increase of fifty dollars up to a maximum of one thousand eight hundred dollars. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 18.

Salary.

Second-class clerkship, &c., condition of creation.

**19.** A second-class clerkship shall only be created by Order in Council passed on the report of the Deputy Head, concurred in by the Head of the department, setting forth the reasons for creating the office, and after the salary has been voted by Parliament. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 19.

Salary.

**20.** The minimum salary of a second-class clerk shall be one thousand one hundred dollars per annum, with an annual increase of fifty dollars up to a maximum of one thousand four hundred dollars. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 20.

Third-class clerkship, &c., condition of creation.

**21.** A third-class clerkship, or the office of a messenger, a packer or a sorter, shall only be created by Order in Council passed on the report of the Deputy Head, concurred in by the Head of the department, setting forth the reasons for creating the office, and after the salary has been voted by Parliament. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 21.

Salaries of third-class clerks.

**22.** The minimum salary of a third-class clerk shall be four hundred dollars per annum, with an annual increase of fifty dollars up to a maximum of one thousand dollars. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 22.

Of messengers, &c.

**23.** The minimum salary of a messenger, packer or sorter shall be three hundred dollars per annum, with an annual increase of thirty dollars up to a maximum of five hundred dollars. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 23.

Scale of salaries.

**24.** The salary of a clerk on appointment or promotion to any class shall begin at the minimum of such class, except in the case of third-class clerks, who may receive, in addition, fifty dollars for each optional subject (not to exceed four) in which they have passed before their appointment, and except in the case of lower grade permanent employees who, upon passing the qualifying examination, may be appointed third-class clerks, at the salary they were receiving at the time of such appointment, when such salary exceeds four hundred dollars :

Optional subjects.

2. The optional subjects in the next preceding sub-section mentioned shall be book-keeping, short-hand, translation and type-writing, composition in French by English candidates, composition in English by French candidates, and précis-writing. 51 V., c. 12, s. 4.

Salaries to be regulated as per schedule B.

**25.** The officers, clerks and employees mentioned in schedule B to this Act shall be paid according to the scale thereby established, and the salaries of officers, clerks and employees in the second or outside division of departments other than the Customs, Inland Revenue and Post Office Departments

shall, subject to the provisions of any Act relating thereto, be fixed in each case by the Governor in Council. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 25.

**26.** No officer, clerk or employee shall receive any increase of salary except by Order in Council passed on the report of the Deputy Head, concurred in by the Head of the department, stating that such officer, clerk or employee is deserving of such increase : Conditions of increase.

2. The increase of salary of any officer, clerk or employee authorized under this Act for the then current year may be suspended by the Head of the department for neglect of duty or misconduct, and may be subsequently restored by such Head, but without arrears. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 26. May be suspended for neglect.

**27.** The increase of salary shall be payable from the first day of the official quarter next succeeding the date on which, from his length of service, any clerk or employee for whom such increase is recommended is eligible for such increase : From what time payable.

2. In case of promotion, the increase of salary shall become payable from the day on which such promotion takes place. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 27. In case of promotion.

**28.** No salary shall be paid to any member of the Civil Service whose appointment or promotion, or whose increase of salary after the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, has not been made in the manner provided by the Civil Service Act in force at the time of such appointment, promotion or increase. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 28. Appointment must have been according to law.

#### EXAMINATIONS.

**29.** Except as herein otherwise provided, no appointment shall be made to either division of the Civil Service unless the person appointed has passed an examination, which shall be of two kinds— No appointment without examination.

The first or "preliminary" examination to qualify for the following appointments :— Preliminary, for what appointments.

Messengers in either division.

Porters,

Sorters,

Packers,

Letter Carriers,

Mail Transfer Agents,

Box Collectors,

Tide Waiters,

Assistant Inspectors of Weights and Measures,

Temporary copyists, and—

For such other officers in the lower grades as are determined by the Governor in Council :

Qualifying examination. That he is free from any physical defect or disease which would be likely to interfere with the proper discharge of his duties; (c.) Holding of examination.	<b>31.</b> The preliminary and qualifying examinations shall be held only once a year and during the month of November, under such regulations, not inconsistent with this Act, as are, from time to time, made by the Governor in Council and published in the English and French languages in the <i>Canada Gazette</i> :

**34.** Immediately after each examination a list of the persons who are found qualified shall be made out, and published in the *Canada Gazette*. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 34.

#### NEW APPOINTMENTS.

**35.** Whenever it becomes necessary to make any appointment to any of the classes to which it is herein provided that first appointments shall only be made after qualifying examination, such necessity shall be reported to the Head of the department by his Deputy; and upon such report being approved by the Head of the department, and after the salary to be paid has been voted by Parliament, the Head of the department shall select and submit to the Governor in Council for probation, from the lists of qualified candidates made by the board, a person fitted for the vacant place:

Proceedings when new appointments are required.

Selection of candidates.

2. The person so selected shall not receive a permanent appointment until he has served a probationary term of at least six months:

Probation.

3. The Head of the department or the Deputy Head may, at any time during the period of probation, reject any clerk or employee appointed to his department. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 35.

Rejection during probation.

**36.** No probationary clerk shall remain in any department more than one year, unless, at or before the end of that time the Deputy Head signifies to the Head of the department in writing that the clerk is considered by him competent for the duties of the department:

Report of Deputy Head as to competency.

2. If he is rejected, the Head of the Department shall report to the Governor in Council the reasons for rejecting him, and another clerk shall thereupon be selected in like manner in his stead; and the Head of the department shall decide whether the name of the person rejected shall be struck off the list as unfit for the service generally, or whether he shall be allowed another trial. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 36.

Provision in case of rejection.

**37.** When the Deputy Head of a department in which a vacancy occurs reports, for reasons set forth in such report,—

As to offices requiring special qualifications.

(a.) That the qualifications requisite for such office or employment are wholly or in part professional or technical;

(b.) That the requisite qualifications are not possessed by any person then in the service of that department; and—

(c.) That it would be for the public interest that the examination herein provided for should, as regards such vacancy, be wholly or partially dispensed with;

The Governor in Council may, without reference to the age of the person, if the Head of the department concurs in

Selection and appointment.

such report, select and appoint such person as is deemed best fitted to fill the vacancy, subject to such examination as is suggested in the report; and such appointment shall be made from the Civil Service, if any person employed therein is found available: 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 37.

From the service if available.

Appointment without examination in certain cases.

2. City Postmasters and Post Office Inspectors; Inspectors, Collectors and Preventive Officers in the Customs Department; Inspectors of Weights and Measures; and Deputy Collectors and Preventive Officers in the Inland Revenue department, may be appointed without examination and without reference to the rules for promotion herein prescribed: 52 V., c. 12, s. 2

In what cases qualifying examination may be dispensed with.

3. The qualifying examination may be dispensed with in the case of any person actually and continuously employed on and since the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, if the Deputy Head of the department, with the concurrence of the Head of the department, reports that the said employee has the requisite qualifications for the place to be filled by him; and such person may receive an appointment in the Civil Service for which he is otherwise eligible, if at the date of such temporary employment his age did not exceed thirty-five years. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 37.

Vacancy in Auditor General's office.

38. If a vacancy occurs in the office of the Auditor General, the report required as to such vacancy shall be made to the Minister of Finance and Receiver General. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 38.

PROMOTIONS.

Promotion to be by examination under regulations.

39. No promotion in either division of the Civil Service shall take place without special examination, under regulations made by the Governor in Council: 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 39.

Subjects for examination.

2. Except as herein otherwise provided, such examination shall be held only once a year in the month of May, and in such subjects as are determined from time to time for each department by the Governor in Council, and in such subjects as, by report of the Deputy Head of the department in which the promotion is to be made, concurred in by the Head of the department, are submitted to the board as best adapted to test the fitness of the candidates for the vacant office. 51 V., c. 12, s. 8.

In inside division.

3. When the vacancy to be filled by promotion exists in the inside division, the examination shall not be open to persons employed in the outside division who, at the date of their first appointment, were of a greater age than thirty-five years: 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 39.

Examination may be dispensed with in certain cases.

4. In the case of barristers, attorneys, military or civil engineers, officers of the artillery in the Militia Department, and architects, draughtsmen and land surveyors, when employed or when seeking promotion in the line of their pro-

fession, and in the case of special class excisemen seeking promotion in the Department of Inland Revenue, the examination may be dispensed with on a report from the Deputy Head, concurred in by the Head of the department, that such examination is not necessary. 51 V., c. 12, s. 8.

5. No such examination shall be required for the re-employment or promotion of excisemen who passed the departmental examinations for the special class in the excise service before the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 39. Special case of excisemen.

40. Once in each year, and not later than the fifteenth day of March, the Deputy Head of each department shall make and lay before the Board, through the Department of the Secretary of State, an estimate of the number of vacancies likely to occur therein during the ensuing year, in the first division, in the classes of— Estimates to be prepared.

(a.) Chief clerks ;

(b.) First-class clerks ;

(c.) Second-class clerks. 51 V., c. 12, s. 9.

2. To the number so estimated shall be added such further number as the Deputy Head of the department deems necessary to compensate for any death, failure of health, or other contingency. Additions.

3. A similar estimate shall be made at the same time of the number of vacancies likely to occur in the second division, to which promotions can be made: In second division.

4. The numbers so estimated shall be those with reference to which the examinations for promotion shall be held, as herein provided. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 40. Use of estimate.

41. Notice of each examination for promotion in the service shall be published in the English and French languages in the *Canada Gazette* at least one month before the examination is to be held ; and such notice shall state the number of promotions expected in each class in each division. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 41. Notices of examinations.

42. Except as herein otherwise provided, when any vacancy occurs in one of the higher classes, in either division, the Head of the department shall select from the list of successful candidates for promotion, the person whom he considers best fitted for the office, having due reference to any special duties incident to such office, to the qualification and fitness shown by the candidates respectively, during their examination, and to the record of their previous conduct in the service. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 42. Selection for vacancies in higher classes.  
*Amended by 51 V., c. 12, s. 10.*

43. Every promotion so made shall be subject to a probation of not less than six months ; but at any time during the first year the Head of the department may reject the Promotion subject to probation.

person promoted, or he may be definitely accepted at any time during the second period of six months after his promotion :

If rejected. 2. If the person so selected is rejected he shall then return to the performance of the duties in which he was previously engaged. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 43.

Further selection. 44. When any clerk who is promoted on probation is rejected, the Head of the department shall select another in his stead from the candidates whose names still remain on the lists of qualified persons, made by the board. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 44.

His former duties, by whom performed. 45. During the period for which a clerk is promoted on probation the duties of the office previously held by him shall, if necessary, be performed by a person selected for that purpose by the Head of the department. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 45.

Exchange of positions by officers without examination. 46. An exchange of positions between two officers serving in different departments, or in different divisions of the same department, and the filling of a vacancy in one department by a transfer from another division of the same department or from another department, may be authorized by the Governor in Council, to be made without examination of either officer ; but such exchange or transfer shall be made without increase of salary of either of the persons exchanging or transferred ; and no person shall be transferred from an outside to an inside division, whose age at the date of his first appointment exceeded thirty-five years. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 46.

Condition.

#### SUPERNUMERARY AND TEMPORARY CLERKS.

Employment of assistance in cases of temporary pressure. 47. When, from a temporary pressure of work or from any other cause, the assistance of temporary clerks becomes necessary in any branch of the first or second division, the Head of the department may—if he is satisfied that such necessity exists—on the requisition of the Deputy Head of the department, select from the lists of qualified candidates, for whom no vacancies have, up to that time, been found, such number of temporary clerks as are required, or, if the list does not furnish such a person, may employ any other person qualified for the service in question ; but such other person shall not be continued in such temporary employment after the period in which a preliminary or qualifying examination is held, unless he presents himself for examination and obtains a certificate of having passed the necessary examination. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 48.

Term of employment limited, &c.

Rate of remuneration.

2. The rate of remuneration to be paid for temporary service shall not exceed the minimum salary of a third-class clerk, unless the service to be performed is technical and

requires special qualifications ; and such temporary employment shall not be considered as giving any claim to permanent appointment. 51 V., c. 12, s. 11.

3. The temporary and supernumerary clerks so employed shall be paid only out of money voted by Parliament for payment of the contingencies of the department, division or office of the service in which such clerks are employed, or out of money voted by Parliament for the construction of works upon which they are employed 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 47. Out of what funds payable.

4. Temporary clerks employed continuously since the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, may be appointed permanently, if otherwise qualified, at a salary equal to their average pay during the two years previous to such permanent appointment, but in no case exceeding the maximum salary of a third-class clerk. 51 V., c. 12, s. 11. Permanent appointment of temporary clerks.

#### PRIVATE SECRETARIES.

**48.** Any member of the Civil Service may be appointed private secretary to the Head of a department, and may be paid an additional salary not exceeding six hundred dollars a year whilst so acting: Private secretaries of Ministers.

2. No salary shall be payable to any private secretary unless the amount has been voted by Parliament. 48-49 V. c. 46, s. 48. Salary must have been voted.

#### GENERAL PROVISIONS.

**49.** The Head of a department, and in his absence the Deputy Head of such department, may grant to each officer, chief clerk, clerk or other employee, leave of absence for purposes of recreation for a period not exceeding three weeks in each year; and every such officer, clerk or employee, whether in the first or second division, shall take the leave so granted at such time during each year as the Head or Deputy Head of the department determines: As to leave of absence.

2. In case of illness, or for any other reason which to him seems sufficient, the Governor in Council may grant to any officer, chief clerk, clerk or other employee, leave of absence for a period not exceeding twelve months. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 49. In case of illness, &c.

**50.** The Head of a department, and in his absence the Deputy Head of such department, may,— Suspension of officers for cause.

(a.) Suspend from the performance of his duty or from the receipt of his salary any officer or employee guilty of misconduct or negligence in the performance of his duties; In what cases.

(b.) Remove such suspension; but no person shall receive any salary or pay for the time during which he was under suspension: Removal of suspension.

- Report in such cases. 2. All cases of suspension by the Deputy Head of the department shall be reported by him to the Head of the department. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 50.
- No extra remuneration. **51.** No extra salary or additional remuneration of any kind whatsoever shall be paid to any Deputy Head, officer or employee in the Civil Service of Canada, or to any other person permanently employed in the public service. 51 V., c. 12, s. 12.  
2. *Repealed* by 51 V, c. 12, s. 13.
- Deduction from pay for unauthorized absence. 3. When the absence of any officer is not occasioned by his employment on other duties by the Government, by leave of absence, or on account of illness certified by an authorized medical practitioner, appointed by the Governor in Council for that purpose, his salary for each day of such absence, shall be deducted from his monthly salary. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 51.
- Certain payments to be made only under Order in Council. **52.** All payments of money to permanent employees, other than salaries, to be made under the provisions of this Act, and specifically stated in the estimates submitted to Parliament, shall be made only under the authority of the Governor in Council. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 52.
- As to officers having resigned and wishing to re-enter service. **53.** Any officer, clerk or employee who has resigned, shall be eligible, without examination, under the authority of an Order in Council, to re-enter the service, at the same salary in the class in which he was serving at the time of such resignation, provided that funds are available for the payment of his salary. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 53.
- Act not to prejudice certain officers. **54.** Nothing contained in this Act shall prejudicially affect the salary or emoluments of any Deputy Head, officer, clerk or employee in the Civil Service of Canada, appointed on or before the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, so long as he is continued in office, nor shall anything herein contained affect any salary or emolument granted and fixed by any Act in force on the day in this section before mentioned. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 54.
- Powers of Governor in Council not impaired. **55.** No provision herein contained shall impair the power of the Governor in Council to remove or dismiss any Deputy Head, officer, clerk or employee, but no such Deputy Head, officer, clerk or employee, whose appointment is of a permanent nature, shall be removed from office except by authority of the Governor in Council. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 55.  
Proviso.
- Attendance books to be kept; their use. **56.** There shall be kept in each department, and in the office of the Auditor General, at the seat of Government, and in each office of the second division, a book or books to be called the attendance book, which shall be in such form as

is determined by the Governor in Council, in which each officer, clerk and employee of such office or department shall sign his name, at such times as are determined by the Governor in Council. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 56.

**57.** The Deputy Heads of departments and all officers, chief clerks, clerks, messengers, sorters and packers of the Civil Service who have not already done so, and every Deputy Head, officer, chief clerk, clerk, messenger, sorter or packer hereafter appointed, before any salary is paid him, shall take and subscribe the oath of allegiance and also the oath contained in schedule C to this Act, or such other oath as is provided by some other Act, in that behalf:

Oath of Allegiance by officers and employees.

2. In the case of the Clerk of the Privy Council, and all officers, clerks and employees under him, and in the case of any officer, clerk or employee of whom the Governor in Council requires the same, there shall be added to the oath at the asterisks, in the form of the oath in the said schedule C, the words contained in schedule D to this Act:

Addition to oath in certain cases.

3 The Clerk of the Queen's Privy Council for Canada shall take and subscribe the said oaths before the Governor General or some one appointed by him to administer the same:

Clerk of P.C. for Canada.

4. In the case of persons residing or coming to reside at the city of Ottawa, the oaths shall be taken and subscribed before the Clerk of the Privy Council:

Before whom in Ottawa.

5. In other cases the oaths may be taken and subscribed before a justice of the peace or other proper authority, who shall forward the same to the Clerk of the Privy Council:

And elsewhere.

6. The Clerk of the Privy Council shall keep a register of all such oaths. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 57.

Register.

**58.** The Secretary of State shall lay before Parliament, within fifteen days after the commencement of each session, a report of the proceedings of the board of examiners under this Act during the preceding year, which report shall include a copy of the examination papers, a statement of all examinations held and of the number of candidates at each, and the names of the successful candidates, and also the rules and regulations made during the year under the provisions of section five of this Act. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 58.

Annual report by Secretary of State, and what it must show.

**59.** The Secretary of State shall cause to be printed each year a list, to be called the Civil Service List of Canada, of all persons employed in the several departments of the Civil Service, together with those employed in the two Houses of Parliament, upon the first day of July next preceding, showing the dates of their several appointments and promotions, their age, rank in the service, and salary; and shall lay the same before Parliament within the first fifteen days of each session. 48-49 V., c. 46, s. 59.

Yearly Civil Service list to be printed and laid before Parliament

As to civil servants appointed before July 1, 1882.

60. The provisions of "*The Civil Service Act*," so far as they render promotion in the Civil Service contingent in any degree upon examination as provided in the said Act, shall not apply to any civil servant who entered the Civil Service before the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-two, except in so far as regards the duties of the office to which such civil servant may desire to be promoted. 51 V., c. 12, s. 15.

## CHAPTER 18.

(Revised Statutes.)

An Act respecting the Superannuation of persons employed in the Civil Service of Canada. A.D. 1886

HER Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:—

## SHORT TITLE.

1. This Act may be cited as "*The Civil Service Superannuation Act.*" 46 V., c. 8, s. 18. Short title.

## APPLICATION OF ACT.

2. The Civil Service, for the purposes of this Act includes and consists of—
- (a.) All officers, clerks and employees in or under the several departments of the Executive Government who are paid a yearly salary, and to whom "*The Civil Service Act*" applies ; Who shall be deemed civil servants.  
Persons under Civil Service Act.
- (b.) All such officers, clerks and employees of the second or outside division of the Civil Service, as the Governor in Council, from time to time, designates, and to whom "*The Civil Service Act*" does not apply, and who are paid a yearly salary and employed in an established capacity ; Certain persons in the outside service.
- (c.) The permanent officers and servants of the Senate and House of Commons, and the permanent officers and servants employed in the Library of Parliament, who, for the purposes of this Act, shall be deemed to be in the Civil Service, saving all rights and privileges of either House in respect to the appointment or removal of its officers and servants ; Officers and servants of Senate and Commons.
- (d.) All persons now contributing to the superannuation fund ; Present contributors to the fund
- (e.) All persons to whom this Act is by some other Act declared to apply. 46 V., c. 8, s. 1. Certain others

## SUPERANNUATION.

3. The Governor in Council may grant to any person who has served in an established capacity in the Civil Service for ten years or upwards, and who has attained the Conditions of allowance.

age of sixty years, or is incapacitated by bodily infirmity from properly performing his duties, a superannuation allowance calculated on his average yearly salary during the then last three years, and not exceeding the following rates, that is to say :—

Rates of allowance.

(a.) If he has served for ten years, but less than eleven years, an annual allowance of ten fiftieths of such average salary, and if for eleven years and under twelve years, an annual allowance of eleven fiftieths thereof, and in like manner a further addition of one fiftieth of such average salary for each additional year of service up to thirty-five years, when an annual allowance of thirty-five fiftieths may be granted; but no addition shall be made for any service beyond thirty-five years;

Maximum rate for 35 years.

Breaks in service not to be counted.

(b.) If the service has not been continuous, the period or periods during which such service has been interrupted shall not be counted, and the Order in Council made in any such case shall be laid before Parliament at its then current or next ensuing session. 46 V., c. 8, s. 2.

Governor in Council may add to service of persons appointed on account of special qualifications.

4. The Governor in Council may, in the case of any person who entered the Civil Service after the age of thirty years, as being possessed of some peculiar professional or other qualifications or attainments required for the office to which he was appointed, and not ordinarily to be acquired in the public service, add to the actual number of years' service of such person, such further number of years not exceeding ten, as is considered equitable, for reasons stated in the Order in Council made in the case; and such additional number of years shall be taken as part of the term of service on which the superannuation allowance of such person shall be computed; and the Order in Council in any such case shall be laid before Parliament at its then current or next ensuing session. 46 V., c. 8, s. 3.

Preliminary inquiry by Treasury Board.

5. The superannuation of every civil servant shall be preceded by an inquiry by the Treasury Board—

(a.) Whether the person it is proposed to superannuate is eligible within the meaning of this Act; and—

(b.) Whether his superannuation will result in benefit to the service, and is therefore in the public interest; or—

(c.) Whether it has become necessary in consequence of his mental or physical infirmity:

Report of Board.

2. No civil servant shall be superannuated unless the Treasury Board reports that he is eligible within the meaning of this Act and that such superannuation will be in the public interest. 46 V., c. 8, s. 4.

Deductions from salaries.

6. A deduction towards making good the superannuation allowances hereinbefore mentioned, shall be made from the salary of every person in the Civil Service to whom this Act applies, at the rate of two per centum per annum on such

salary, if it is six hundred dollars or upwards, and of one and a-quarter per centum per annum thereon, if it is less than six hundred dollars, and the sum so deducted shall form part of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada; but such deduction shall be made only during the first thirty-five years of service. 46 V., c. 8, s. 5. Proviso.

7. The full superannuation allowance shall only be granted to persons who have been subject to the said deduction during ten years or upwards,—the superannuation allowance of any person who has not paid it, or has paid it for a less period, being subject to a diminution of one per centum for every year less than ten during which he has not paid it; except that the superannuation allowance of any person hereafter retiring, shall not be subject to any such diminution by reason of his not having paid the abatement hereinbefore mentioned, during any year or years after his first thirty-five years of service. 46 V., c. 8, s. 6. Ten years' contribution requisite for full allowance.  
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Exception.

8. Retirement shall be compulsory on every person to whom the superannuation allowance hereinbefore mentioned is offered, and such offer shall not be considered as implying any censure upon the person to whom it is made; nor shall any person be considered as having any absolute right to such allowance, but it shall be granted only in consideration of good and faithful service during the time upon which it is calculated: Compulsory retirement.  
Allowance conditional on good service.

2. Nothing herein contained shall be understood as impairing or affecting the right of the Governor in Council to dismiss or remove any person from the Civil Service. 46 V., c. 8, s. 7. Right of dismissal not impaired.

9. If the Head of a department reports with respect to any person employed in his department, and about to be superannuated, from any cause other than that of ill-health or age, that the service of such person has not been satisfactory, the Governor in Council may, as to him seems fit, grant such person a superannuation allowance less than that to which he would have otherwise been entitled. 46 V., c. 8, s. 8. Diminution when Head of Department reports unsatisfactory service.

10. If any person to whom this Act applies, is constrained, from any infirmity of mind or body, to quit the Civil Service before the period at which a superannuation allowance might be granted him, the Governor in Council may allow him a gratuity not exceeding one month's pay for each year of his service; and if any such person is so constrained to quit the service before such period, by reason of severe bodily injury, received without his own fault, in the discharge of his public duty, the Governor in Council may allow him a gratuity not exceeding three month's pay for every two years' service, or a superannuation allowance not exceeding Gratuity when yearly allowance not earned.  
Gratuity in case of bodily injury on duty.

one-fifth of his average salary during the then last three years. 46 V., c. 8, s. 9.

Provision for abolition of office, reduction of staff, &c.

**11.** If any person to whom this Act applies is removed from office in consequence of the abolition of his office for the purpose of improving the organization of the department to which he belongs, or is removed, or retired from office to promote efficiency or economy in the Civil Service, the Governor in Council may grant him such gratuity or superannuation allowance as will fairly compensate him for his loss of office, not exceeding such as he would have been entitled to if he had retired in consequence of permanent infirmity of body or mind, after adding ten years to his actual term of service. 46 V., c. 8, s. 10.

Pensioners under sixty liable to serve if required, under penalty of loss of allowance.

**12.** Every person who receives a superannuation allowance, and is under the age of sixty years, and is not disabled by bodily or mental infirmity, may be called upon to fill, in any part of Canada, any public office or situation for which his previous services render him eligible, and which is not lower in rank or emolument than that from which he retired; and, if he refuses or neglects so to do, he shall forfeit his said allowance. 46 V., c. 8, s. 11.

Service before Confederation to be counted.

**13.** Service in an established capacity in any of the departments of the Executive Government or offices of the Legislature of any of the Provinces now included in the Dominion of Canada, before such Province became a portion thereof, by any person who has thereafter entered the Civil Service, shall be reckoned in computing his period of service for the purposes of this Act. 46 V., c. 8, s. 12.

Discretionary power of Governor in Council.

**14.** In any case of doubt the Governor in Council may, by general or special regulations, determine to what persons the provisions of this Act do or do not apply, and the conditions on which, and the manner in which, they shall apply in any case or class of cases. 46 V., c. 8, s. 13.

Payment of allowances.

**15.** The allowances and gratuities granted under this Act shall be payable out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada. 46 V., c. 8, s. 14.

#### REPORT OF SUPERANNUATIONS.

Annual return to be made to Parliament.

**16.** The Minister of Finance and Receiver General shall lay before Parliament, within fifteen days after the commencement of each session thereof, a statement of all superannuations and retiring allowances in the Civil Service within the year, giving the name and rank of each person

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superannuated or retired, his salary, age and length of service, the allowance granted to him on retirement, the cause of his superannuation and whether the vacancy has been subsequently filled, and if so, whether by promotion or by a new appointment, and the salary of the new appointee. 46 V., c. 8, s. 15.

## REPORT

OF THE BOARD OF CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINERS FOR THE YEAR  
ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1889.

*The Honorable J. A. Chapleau, Q.C., LL.D., Secretary of State:—*

SIR,—The practice from 1882 to 1888, as authorized by the Civil Service Act, was to hold two Entrance Examinations annually, each examination embracing three classes of candidates, viz. :—(1) Candidates taking the Preliminary or Lower Grade Curriculum; (2) Candidates for the Qualifying, or Higher Grade, (3) Candidates taking Optional Subjects.

The examinations were held in May and November, and at all the places prescribed in the Act, viz. :—Halifax, N.S., St. John, N.B., Charlottetown, P.E.I., Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Kingston, Toronto, Hamilton, London, Winnipeg and Victoria, B.C., besides, on a few occasions, at such other places, as the Governor General in Council deemed it expedient, in the interest of the public service, to do so.

But in 1888, with the view of reducing the number of applicants for examination (which had been continually increasing, until it was considered excessive), the Act was so amended as to limit these Entrance Examinations to one in the year, in November, at which season the number had always been smaller than in the spring—owing probably to the fact that many persons who in the spring were anticipating appointments if successful had, by the fall, sought and found other occupations.

It had also been customary to hold one General Promotion Examination for all the Departments, save the Excise Branch of the Department of Inland Revenue, in May, and then one for the Excise—a large body in itself—at midsummer. Then, it was optional with the Government to order Interim or Special Promotion Examinations at such other times as they might consider necessary; but the amendments of 1888 to the Civil Service Act not only abolished one Entrance Examination, but made it obligatory on all branches of the Civil Service, if examinations were desired, to come up to the General Promotion Examination in May, so that the Excise candidates were debarred from their usual midsummer opportunity. This change had likewise the effect of abrogating the Interim or Special Promotion Examinations.

The general result of these changes has, however, been somewhat different from what had been anticipated, as will now be shown :—

First, the candidates who came up to the Entrance Examination last November, instead of being fewer than in former years at that season, were about twice as numerous, and nearly equalled the number present in previous years at both examinations.

Secondly, the crowding of the work, consequent upon this increased attendance, within a limited space of time, seriously embarrassed the Board; for there were some 5,000 candidates' written papers to be carefully inspected and valued, which involved the necessity of continuous and rapid night as well as day work for several weeks, as otherwise the results could not have been reached until very late.

Thirdly, the obligation imposed upon the Excise offices to send their employés to the General Promotion examination in May was reported to the Board by the chief officers of the Department of Inland Revenue as simply impracticable, and although the number of Promotion candidates at the examination was very much larger than ever before, the Excisemen who had the same right to come up as the clerks of the other Departments, were not afforded the opportunity. It is alleged by the Inland Revenue Department that the Excise clerks cannot possibly be spared from their duties in either spring or fall, and that, consequently, the rule which restricts Promotion examinations to the month of May is simply equivalent, in their case, to a prohibition. If it be so, then, apparently, the rule requires modification.

As just intimated, the number of candidates from the other Departments at the Promotion examination in May, 1889, was unusually large. This was in part due to the fact that the Civil Service Act, as amended, limited that examination, in respect to employés whose appointments dated prior to the 1st July, 1882, to "Duties" only, meaning, as the Board apprehend, the duties they were engaged in or those of the positions to which they aspired. This new feature had the effect of bringing forward a certain number of the older hands who had previously declined to encounter an examination on the whole curriculum.

#### NATURE AND BEARING OF THE EXAMINATIONS.

As a good deal of misapprehension seems to exist with regard to the nature of the several examinations, and to the positions in the Civil Service for which they qualify the successful candidates, this seems a favorable opportunity to state:

1st. That the Preliminary or Lower Grade examination, as it may be more appropriately termed, embraces Penmanship, Orthography, and the first four rules of Arithmetic, Reading—print and manuscript. This examination, it is clear, offers very little difficulty, and is, therefore, successfully passed by a large proportion of the candidates. The maximum of marks in each subject is 60, and an average of 50 per cent. or 30 marks are required; but the minimum on any subject is 18, and any one falling below that figure is necessarily ruled out. Success in that examination qualifies the candidates to become "Messengers, Letter Carriers, Packers, Tide-waiters, Sorters, Porters, Box-collectors, Assistant Inspectors of Weights and Measures, and Temporary Copyists," and to occupy "such other offices in the Lower Grades as may be determined by the Governor General in Council." It would be well if the candidates for this examination and those who take special interest in them would bear in mind that it does not entitle the successful men to clerkships. This would obviate a great deal of the unnecessary correspondence with which the Board has constantly to deal. It may also be added that failure in one subject at this examination is equivalent to total failure, and that there are no optional subjects in connection with it.

2nd.—The Qualifying or Higher Grade Examination comprises Penmanship, Orthography, Arithmetic, Geography, History—of England, France, and Canada—Grammar, Composition and Transcription. These are all Obligatory subjects, and each is rated at 100 marks. In order to pass, the candidates have to make 50 per cent. of the whole or 400, but must not fall below 30 marks in any one subject. However, if a candidate fails in one subject only but makes the average, he is entitled to come up for that one subject at the next ensuing examination—not afterwards, nor more than once. This examination qualifies for 3rd class clerkships, and, in fact, for all offices to which the holders may be advanced.

3rd.—The Qualifying Examination candidates may also claim to be examined in Options, which comprehend translation from English into French by English candidates, and from French into English by those using the French language. Composition in the same way, Bookkeeping by Double Entry, Précis, Shorthand and Typewriting. The maximum of marks in these subjects is also 100, but it is required, in order to pass, that at least 50 per cent. be made in those treated. A candidate may take any or all of the Options, and any one who has succeeded in the Qualifying and in one or more of the Options up to four is entitled, if appointed to office, to \$50 for each Option so taken over and above the entrance salary (\$400.)

All the examination papers are prepared and printed in both languages, and the candidates are at liberty to choose that in which they prefer to be examined.

By a new provision in the Civil Service Act, the graduates of Canadian Universities may, upon the production of their certificates, be entered as qualified for employment in the Public Service without examination.

The Board having been frequently importuned by unsuccessful candidates and their friends to review, or, in other words, to amend their valuations, deem it proper to say that, while not holding themselves infallible, they take all possible care in the examination of the work done, and invariably give full value thereto. More than

this they cannot do, and it is therefore, altogether useless to ask them to change their decisions.

At this stage, it is in order to say that a large proportion of the candidates who present themselves at the Qualifying examination are utterly incompetent, and should themselves be well aware of the fact. There seems to be a prevalent idea among them that, although they may know little or nothing of Arithmetic, Grammar, History, &c., yet, that if they manage to make 400 marks, they are well qualified for the Public Service, which, of course, is simply a mischievous error. A considerable number of candidates, well enough prepared for the Preliminary Examination, enter themselves also for the Qualifying, because it costs no more, and others take Options for the same reason, thus entailing upon the Government largely increased expense for printing, stationery, Sub-examiners' fees, &c., without any advantage to themselves or any one else. Thousands of papers from these incompetent persons have had to be examined and, of course, rejected. When it is stated that, at the last Qualifying examination, rather more than half of those who came up failed, the force of these remarks will be understood. There certainly seems to be no good reason why candidates for the Qualifying examination and for Optional subjects, who occasion from 150 to 200 per cent. over the cost of candidates for the Preliminary, and who are generally persons in much better circumstances, should be admitted upon the payment of the same small fee. It would certainly not be unreasonable to expect that the fees should defray the actual expenses, especially as they are extremely moderate. The Board would, therefore, respectfully recommend that the fee should be graduated in the proportion of the expenses occasioned by the several examinations. The effect of such a scale would probably be the weeding out of a good number of the candidates for the higher grades, who present themselves because it costs nothing, but who may entertain the delusive hope that, somehow or other, they may get through.

#### IRREGULARITIES.

Rumors of irregularities or frauds in connection with the examinations having from time time been circulated, the Board think it opportune to offer a few remarks in relation thereto. It ought not, perhaps, to be a matter of great surprise if among the thousand or more candidates who come up annually, there should be some who seek for success by undue or even fraudulent means. The number of such, however, is happily small.

During the eight years which have passed since the system of Civil Service Examinations was established, three instances of attempted personation were detected and punished.

A more common impropriety is the practice of copying from each other during the progress of the examinations, and this kind of wrong-doing is the more mischievous because those who indulge in it do not seem to realize its gravity. Strong candidates act as if it were only a kind and neighborly act to assist the weaker ones, and in very crowded rooms, as at Montreal, Ottawa and Toronto, it is an extremely difficult task for the officers in charge to effectually prevent the commission of the offence. It ought, therefore, to be known that improprieties of this kind are sure to come to light when the papers of the candidates are examined at Ottawa. In such cases both the helpers and the parties helped, are regarded as equally culpable, and the Board would recommend that all candidates so knowingly and wilfully violating the regulations should be declared disqualified to hold positions in the Public Service.

#### JUDICIAL INVESTIGATIONS.

By referring to the report for 1888, it will be seen that for sufficient reasons it had been deemed necessary to clothe the Board with certain judicial powers, and they have now to state that during last year they were brought under the necessity of exercising them. While inspecting the work done at the November examination in 1888, they discovered that one of the Sub-examiners had furnished corrected copies of the Orthography paper to three candidates (an act strongly suggestive of the probability

of his having supplied other papers and to other candidates). An investigation was forthwith instituted and the implicated parties being sworn the offence was clearly established. The papers of the men at fault were cancelled and the examiner himself was relieved of his office. It being the first trial under the Act, the extreme penalty was not imposed. Three other investigations were held for an offence which, from the evidence adduced, seemed to render it very probable that the candidates had become possessed of the printed question papers before the examination, and their (work) papers were also cancelled.

Rumours to the effect that the printed question papers had been surreptitiously obtained by some candidates in advance of the examinations have been circulated from year to year, and the Board are aware that one attempt at least was made to procure them from the printers. These papers are always represented to the printers as strictly confidential, and the strongest cautions are given against their being tampered with. But as these rumours are revived in connection with almost every examination, the Board feel convinced that to insure perfect security and to make it impossible that these papers should come beforehand in possession of any one, save the three Examiners, they recommend that in respect of all future examinations they should be set up under their own eyes and printed in their own office.

#### THE EXAMINATIONS.

The regular general Promotion examination for the whole Service was held this year as usual, during the month of May, and the number of candidates who presented themselves was as under :—

## INVENTION AND DISCOVERY.

Nor are we yet done in the field of invention and discovery. The application of coal-gas and petroleum to heating and cooking operations is only trembling on the verge of successful experiment; the introduction of steam from a great central reservoir to general use for heating is foreshadowed among the coming events; the artificial production of butter has already created a consternation among dairymen; the navigation of the air by some device akin to our present balloon would also seem to be prefigured, and the propulsion of machinery by electricity is even now clearly indicated by the march of experiment.

We make a mile of white printing paper and send it on a spool that a perfecting printing-press unwinds and prints, and delivers to you, folded and counted, many thousands per hour. Of a verity, this is the age of invention, nor has the world reached a stopping place yet.—*Anon.*

For ordinnery batheing, the water shoold be hott, warrm or coald ackording to the feelings of the individual. Watever feals best is best. A good tyme to take a bath is imediatly after a meel before digession comences. Unless a bath can be takon imediatly after a meel it shoold not be taken untill too or threa ours after. Watch the effects and exersise comon sense.

## HYGIENIC ADVICE.

## FOOD.

1. Having determined what sort of food is best adapted to our several constitutions and conditions, the next question to be answered is this: "How much of it should we eat at a meal?" This is a very important matter, because of the generalization indulged in by physicians and others who give advice upon the subject. Two meals a day are sufficient, says one; three meals are better, says another; four meals are best of all, says a third. Each one applies his particular theory to everybody without any discrimination, forgetting that while some constitutions are adapted to two meals a day, others require three meals, and some others perhaps four.

2. In like manner we generalize as to the quantity necessary for each meal, and to each ingredient of it. In a medical publication we have recently seen a solemn warning against the habit of eating too much; and in another of equal authority, a portentous caution against the practice of eating too little; as if the same general advice is applicable to everybody. This advice is usually fortified by some stupid maxim from some celebrated man, that intolerable old sage, Abernethy, being the favorite reference. In the article warning us against eating too much, the writer tortures us with "the truth of the great surgeon, Abernethy," which truth is this: "One-fourth of what we eat keeps us, the other three-fourths we keep at the peril of our lives."

3. In another medical journal we have lately read a treatise equally profound and stupid, which deplores the popular habit of eating too little. It also is fortified by maxims drawn from the wear and tear of the body, the fuel necessary to keep up the fires of health and life, the continual waste of tissues, which must be supplied with new material, and similar wisdom, the conclusion being that a greater quantity of food than we are in the habit of taking is necessary to supply our daily waste and degeneration.

4. In these matters the individual person must be considered, and therefore all general maxims are dangerous which prescribe the kind and quantity of food necessary for healthy existence. The ration of daily food which best agrees with any particular man is the correct ration for him, although it might be too much or too little for his twin brother. It might be well to advise every man to examine his habitual bill of fare and see whether he has not permitted appetite to add more dishes to it than is necessary, and also it might be well for us all to make a rigid self-examination and find out whether the gratification of the palate is not tempting us to eat too much. And while we are about it, we may as well give ourselves a rigid cross-examination, lest an ambition to avoid sensuality and its consequences, may tempt us to eat too little.

## VACCINATION.

5. Within the past two years a class of reformers has sprung up that is denouncing vaccination in most vigorous terms. Their denunciation is right, but their reasoning is wrong. They have found instances where vaccination has produced terrible diseases, and lifelong suffering; hence a hasty and wholesale objection to the

entire system. The resulting diseases were caused by the transference of impure vaccine virus from persons tainted with scrofula, or other ailments. These maladies might be inherited but might not yet have become manifest, and still be transferable through vaccine virus. The percentage of evil results from vaccination with human virus might not be more than one in twenty, yet this is sufficient to warrant a valid objection to all vaccination with human virus. Were mankind entirely healthy, the virus from this source would be as safe as to get it from the cow. The business of producing vaccine virus direct from the cow has now become so large that there is no difficulty in obtaining it, and no other should be allowed. Successful vaccination from pure virus is a sure modifier of small-pox, but its practice should be indulged in, if at all, with great caution. A bad case of vaccination is worse, very much worse, than small-pox, for it leaves the system permanently injured, if not quite ruined; while small-pox, if rightly treated, will never cause death, will never be made to leave the face pitted, and will invariably leave the patient in a healthy and wholesome state.

#### BREATHING.

6. We should always, both day and night, breathe through the nose and not the mouth. Breathing through the mouth makes the fauces dry, which they should not be; and the absence of breathing through the nose leaves its mucous membrane to be continually moist, which is also an unnatural condition. Also, breathing through the mouth at night is the cause of snoring, and such breathing has caused many a fatal cough. Children do not breathe through the mouth when asleep, and adults will not, when they learn how to get a living without fatigue, continual worry, and mental and physical exhaustion. The habit of breathing through the mouth by day, can easily be controlled by the mind; also to quite a considerable extent it is possible to prevent the habit at night, through a firm decision of the mind that it shall be done. Where additional aid is required, it will be successful to tie a handkerchief around the top of the head and chin.

#### INSOMNIA.

7. Remedy for sleeplessness, caused by overtaxed brain and night work. Surely the cause must first be removed. Nature will not be forever patched up with drugs and at last come out as good as new. The cause having been removed, a milk diet for supper is good, and to have new milk is better where it agrees with the constitution. Also, the patient should lie down at night, not with any view to sleeping, but with a view to having a good rest. Keep the mind passive, or as nearly so as possible, and rest and rest and rest. It is surprising to what an extent good rest will be found a substitute for sleep. We have known a man who had almost slept none for seven years, yet continued in perfect health. It is important to have confident in such rest, else worry would follow, which alone would cause illness. Where this confident rest is taken, refreshing sleep will at last be resumed.

#### TONICS.

8. Where an artificial drug tonic is needed, quinine is the best. Its action is longer, and it leaves the system less depressed than other tonics. For a cold, it is seldom the best remedy. With persons where it agrees to take it for a cold, it should be taken in at least ten-grain doses, and often a single dose will be sufficient. Many take it in two-grain doses, and often, but in this manner the result is not so good.

#### DYSPEPSIA.

9. Dyspepsia is a much misunderstood disease. Because one is dyspeptic it does not follow that the stomach is necessarily weak. A symptom of indigestion—in these days of bushels of theory to handfuls of fact—is taken as an omen that an immediate resort to gruels and all other unhealthful foods is imperative, and the patient

soon makes himself a victim if he was not so before. The remedy is to listen to and obey the voice of nature more, and be governed by scientific ignorance less. A so-called dyspeptic stomach will often be able to digest a bit of cheese, or a little boiled cabbage, or some juicy beefsteak, with far greater ease than it does the ever-drenching and surfeiting liquid foods. The appetite does not come from the stomach; it comes from the demands of the system which focalize in the stomach, and the feeling for some particular article of food is caused by the absence in the system of the element which that special article contains. As a rule, such article is the one that should next be eaten, and if man would be governed by this rule more and by the doctors less, he would soon be able to class dyspepsia among the things that were. Give the instinct free reign, as free as the animal does, and indulge it no more than he does, and consult the intellect less, and dyspepsia will soon take wings. There are some cases of really weak stomachs, and these should pay great attention to their feelings with reference to the quantity, quality and kind of food eaten. Persons differ so much in constitutions, dispositions and natures that no one rule could be naturally adapted to all. The best general rule is for each person to pay the highest possible respect to his feelings as they change and vary from day to day. Nature is a great teacher; we cannot listen to her still small voice too much.

#### BATHING.

10. In the matter of bathing, it is not a question of how one bathes as it is that he bathes at all. The best medicament that can be added to the water is will and spirit. Even soap is not needed, for soap is an injury to the skin. Salt and mustard and sulphur and many other things are often recommended to be put into the water, but these are only relics of ancient quackery and the world loves to hold on to anything that is ancient. As to the frequency of baths, this depends on a thousand varying conditions. Many who don't bathe at all are the healthiest, and some others that bathe all the time have no good health. The condition of the constitution should be taken strongly into account, when deciding on a course of bathing, for the first question to be considered is, how much bathing, in a given case, can be endured with impunity. While bathing is a good practice, many are killed by it. If one is in somewhat poor health, the frequency of the bath should depend on how much of the energies are being daily used up in perhaps some very laborious occupation. With all the strength consumed in a strife to keep the table supplied and the children clothed, once a week is as often as a bath could be taken profitably. If no vocation was making drafts on the patient's strength, two or even three baths a week would be health giving. Indeed, in such a case, the frequent bathing might be necessary as a partial vocation. If one is sick in bed with a fever, there should be a daily bath, and sometimes twice a day, and these baths should be given by an intelligent nurse. For ordinary bathing the water should be hot, warm or cold, according to the feelings of the individual. Whatever feels best is best. As to the hour for bathing, the best time is when one feels the strongest, and finds it the most convenient. A good time to take a bath is immediately after a meal, before digestion commences. To take it half or three quarters of an hour after a meal would be injurious, as it would arrest a commenced digestion. Unless the bath can be taken immediately after a meal, it should not be taken until two or three hours after. The objection to taking a bath at night is that one is generally too tired then. There should be a reactionary glow follow the bath, and when it immediately follows a meal, especially in run-down cases, such subsequent vigorous glow is the more certain to arise.

100	The curative value of ocean climate in many diseased conditions of the human body is strikingly demonstrated by Dr. Gihon, a medical director of the navy in the Philadelphia <i>Medical News</i> . He argues that the slowly convalescent from whatever disease—protracted fever, nervous weakness, incipient pulmonary trouble or overwork—recuperates with marvelous rapidity during a pleasant ocean voyage. Dr. A. N. Bell, in the same journal, presents some remarkable statistics, showing the beneficial influence of ocean air upon a resident population. Taking the population of Turk's and Caicos Islands in the tropics as the basis of his researches, he finds that in the ten years the average annual death rate from consumption and all the other pulmonary diseases was about three in one thousand. This is a very low degree of mortality, but not lower than has been observed among sailors breathing sea air most of their lives. In 1756, Blondin, a medical authority, showed that while deaths from phthisis in the British Army varied from nine to twelve in a thousand, in the British Navy, from 1830 to 1856 inclusive, the deaths from that fell disease were less than two in a thousand.

## MANUFACTURING INTERESTS OF VANCOUVER.

1. One of the most important factors that can be brought to bear on the development of a new region like British Columbia is manufacturing. The existence of rich stores of natural wealth is of little consequence, unless there are some means of reducing that wealth to a commercial basis. Resources become valuable in proportion as they are utilized. Few of the articles of commerce are found, as such, in their natural state. The natural products generally require more or less modification before they enter, to any great extent, into the markets of the world; and the further this process is carried into the section where the raw materials are produced, the more of the benefits of the natural riches are retained at home and development is accelerated. The business men of British Columbia are keenly alive to the advantages which manufacturing brings to them, and they lend it every encouragement. The nature and extent of the manufacturing interests of the Province will compare favorably with those of any other region of similar characteristics and in a corresponding stage of industrial development.

2. The variety of natural resources existing in British Columbia makes it a good country for the prosecution of nearly all kinds of manufacturing. The woods of the Province are valuable and abundant, the mines possess untold wealth of many kinds, and fisheries, farms and ranches contribute to the support which factories must have. Good transportation facilities are a recent acquisition, but they are increased in response to the rapidly growing demand for them, and no fears are entertained of any hampering influence from that source. Besides the many other resources that now enter into the calculations of manufacturers there, new discoveries are constantly being made and the utilization of the vast volume of raw products can not but make a manufacturing region of more than ordinary importance.

3. As lumbering was the first industry that engaged the attention of British Columbians, its present value is greater than any other. It employs more men and yields a larger annual output, reduced to the stern scale of dollars and cents, than any other manufacturing industry in the Province. Sawmills are in operation at various points of advantage along the coast line, on the shores of the numerous indentations, and on two or three of the larger rivers. The total number of mills now in the province is twenty-six, varying in their output from three thousand feet daily, which is the product of a small Indian mill on the Naas River, to one hundred and ten thousand feet of sawed lumber. Vancouver is the great lumbering centre for the whole region, and it has within its limits and in the immediate vicinity six saw mills, one planing mill, one shingle mill and two large sash and door factories, the annual product of which is valued at \$2,500,000.00. These mills furnish regular employment to about fifteen hundred hands. They turn out various grades of rough and planed lumber, to suit the demands of the market, and a large portion of the product is exported to foreign countries.

4. In shipping the lumber, it is found advantageous in many instances not to saw it too small. Besides the large pieces of timber for special uses, a portion designed for boards to be used for building purposes is left in square sticks. Cargoes for long ocean voyages are often prepared in this manner, because the cost of handling the timber, which is an important item to the shipper, in that form is but a fraction of

what it would be in the form of planks or inch boards, and all that has to be done in order to convert it into lumber of any desired thickness is to run it through a gang at its destination. A vessel can carry more lumber in this form than in any other, and do it with less risk. The large markets of China and some other foreign ports are prepared to receive lumber in this form, and the custom of merely squaring the timber for such shipments is growing in favor among lumbermen. Most of the consignments, however, are of the usual classes of lumber. The principal foreign countries to which timber is shipped from Vancouver are China, Japan, Australia, and the States of Central America, South America, and Europe. It is the leading article of commerce with those countries.

5. While the foreign demand was the first developed and is constantly growing in importance, the recent changes that have occurred in the industrial condition of the north-western Provinces of Canada render the domestic and local markets of scarcely less moment to the manufacturer. A considerable number of the saw mills recently established depend entirely on the local demand for their patronage, and they find it increasing fully as fast as the facilities for supplying it. The farming sections and mining camps of the interior are using large quantities of lumber, and the growing towns along the line of the railway also have a brisk trade in that commodity. The manufacture of sash, doors and blinds in Vancouver is a profitable adjunct of the sawmill business, and it is capable of great expansion. The demand for that class of manufacture is chiefly in the cities, where much building is being done.

6. A furniture factory, having an annual output worth \$75,000, has passed through the experimental stage in Vancouver and received such encouraging support that its capacity is being greatly increased. All ordinary household furniture is made there. The country has an exhaustless supply of the finest maple, alder, cedar, pine, spruce, etc., that could profitably be manufactured into furniture and machinery. A carriage factory, with a capacity for manufacturing \$75,000 worth of carriages per annum, was lately built, and the enterprise promises to be more than ordinarily successful. Among the other manufactories of wood that would find a good field for operation at Vancouver may be mentioned woodenware factories and pulp mills. There is an especially promising opening for the manufacture of all kinds of woodenware, the materials being at hand and the demand for the product being very strong. Cooperage works would also flourish. Any manufacturing institutions that can use fir, cedar, spruce, cypress, hemlock, pine, maple or alder will do well at Vancouver.

7. There is great need for smelting establishments in British Columbia to aid in developing the mineral resources. A lead smelter of a daily capacity of sixty tons has just been completed in Vancouver, and it will treat ore from mines over six hundred miles distant, as well as from those that are nearer. Efforts are being made to have a large iron smelter erected in the city, a liberal bonus being offered to reliable parties who will inaugurate such an enterprise. Iron and coal are now produced in large quantities within thirty miles of the city, and there would be no lack of patronage for a smelter. Reduction works for gold and silver ores are also needed to encourage the mining of the precious metals in various parts of the Province.

8. The largest manufacturing establishment now in operation in the city belongs to the Canadian Pacific Railway Company. The terminal works and machine shops of that company do an immense amount of work in building and repairing railroad stock, and consume large quantities of wood and iron. All the iron used could, with the proper means for working, be taken in the ore and put through every process of preparation by local industries. To supply the means for working, which are now lacking, is one of the things the business men of the city have in view. Iron smelters, foundries and rolling mills are sure to be established in Vancouver. There now is a foundry and machine shop in the city, besides the Canadian Pacific machine shops, but none of the iron used is smelted by local industry. The foundries and machine shops do a large volume of business, and it will

not be long before the other complements of iron working will be numbered among the manufacturing industries of the city.

9. The steadily increasing volume of agricultural products is calling attention to the necessity for utilizing them to better advantage than has yet been done. Most particularly is attention directed to the need for preparing the products of the ranch for use at home, instead of sending them abroad to be treated by the skilled labor of other people and then returned for consumption near where produced. Wool and hides are the chief articles of this class of goods. Woollen mills should be constructed in Vancouver. They would have peculiar advantages in that the tariff prevents competition from better developed sections of the Pacific slope, and the long haul from the east increases the selling price considerably, and Australian wool can be shipped in free of duty to mix with the home product, thus enabling manufacturers to make a superior quality of goods. Labor may be easily obtained, and the demand will more than warrant the establishment of such enterprises. The entire wool crop, not only of the local ranches and farms, but of all the north-west Canadian Provinces as well, will go to Vancouver when it has woollen factories to handle it. In this line of operation Vancouver is almost beyond any sort of rivalry. The superior facilities for obtaining the raw products and for marketing the manufactured articles gives it great advantage over other manufacturing places. China and Japan will take all the woollen goods that can be manufactured there.

10. Tanneries and manufactories of boots and shoes are also among the institutions that would benefit Vancouver and be profitable investments. Tan bark is cheap and plentiful. The north-western Provinces would be glad to send their hides to British Columbia to market, and all kinds of leather goods could be manufactured to advantage in Vancouver. Of course, more or less of this kind of work is done in the custom shops of the city, but large establishments are wanted—institutions that will employ a great number of hands and give the city a reputation abroad.

11. Another of the staples of trade with foreign countries is flour, and the farmers about Vancouver are raising wheat enough to warrant the erection of flouring mills of large capacity. This will surely prove a profitable field for large mills operating in the foreign trade. Smaller mills will do a flourishing local business, and use buckwheat, Indian corn and miscellaneous grains for home consumption.

12. Among the more important of the city's industries is the Vancouver Lime Works, which, from a very small beginning in 1887, has grown to be the largest lime works in the Province, having a capacity for producing one hundred and fifty barrels of lime per day. The limestone is obtained from the company's quarters on Texada Island, and the product is said to be the best in the market.

13. Vancouver has three breweries, which, in addition to supplying the local trade, are beginning to bottle and ship their product. The city has the usual complement of manufacturers and repairers, such as carpenters, blacksmiths, tinmiths etc., but it is reaching out for larger enterprises and more of them. There is no other city in the country of the age of Vancouver that can show the variety and volume of manufacturing that it can. If it had been established thirty or forty years, and the region around the town were thoroughly developed, its list of manufactories would not have special significance. But it should not be forgotten that the city is the result of but three years' growth, and that the country surrounding it is just beginning to yield its resources. The manufactured output of Vancouver is now of great importance to the whole Province, and what it will be a few years hence, at its present rate of advancement, is very gratifying to contemplate.

14. With its sawmills, car shops, foundries, machine shops, carriage works, planing mills, sash and door factories, furniture factory, lime kiln and smelter, Vancouver has a very satisfactory nucleus about which to build extensive and varied manufacturing interests. It is attracting capital to those interests and supporting a large portion of its population by them. It draws to the city a class of skilled artisans that gives it a substantial political, as well as industrial, existence. The success which has attended the efforts of the manufacturers thus far is one of the best arguments that can be employed to induce others to locate there.

15. The healthy condition of its manufacturing interests is one of the most important influences that contribute to the general growth of Vancouver. The mere fact that it is an important transportation point would not necessarily secure permanent prominence, and if it were only a commercial city others would grow up with the development of the country, and might eclipse it; but having the by no means to be despised advantages of superior transportation facilities and a large commerce, the building up of extensive manufacturing industries intrenches it in the leading position it has assumed and gives it an impetus for further advancement that could not otherwise be acquired. The effect is observed in all lines of business. There is no hesitation for fear the present prosperity shall prove to be transitory, no distrust of the future. The city does not feed upon the tributary country without giving any return benefit, but it rather becomes an active agent in promoting the growth of the entire region by utilizing the forces that would otherwise remain dormant.

16. The manufactories of Vancouver are on both Burrard Inlet and False Creek, where there is ample water front and at the same time direct railway communication. The railway extends across the city and runs along both water fronts. Across the inlet is Moodyville, only three miles away, where one of the largest sawmills in the Province is located. At the head of the inlet is Port Moody, another sawmill town. On the south side of False Creek are choice sites that are being improved for factories. There is on every side a warm welcome for such institutions, and special inducements in various ways are offered for the investment of capital in manufacturing. Aside from the ordinary business advantages that exist, suitable bonuses of cash, free building sites, or otherwise, are volunteered by the business men.

17. The large area which the city already covers, and the considerable distance in many cases between residences and offices, shops or factories, render desirable facilities for conveying people between those points. This need has led to the organization of a street railway company, which has obtained a franchise on several of the principal streets and is bound to build and equip for operating this year between three and four miles, traversing the city so as to accommodate as great a number as possible. This road will be rapidly extended, so as to compass the whole city. Whether it will be operated by horses, electricity or steam, is not yet determined. It is not to be built through a barren suburb to assist in selling real estate, but through thickly populated districts, and it is one of the many evidences of the substantial character of the city.

18. An important feature of the industrial situation at Vancouver is the protection which is afforded by the Canadian tariff laws. The duties imposed on foreign importations effectually exclude the competition from older-settled and better-developed sections of the Pacific slope, and the cost of transportation from the east is great, so markets of the entire Province at least are at the disposal of Vancouver manufacturers, and that is no small consideration. Then, the exceptionally good means for reaching all parts of the world by water and land transportation lines places an unlimited market before them. The variety and richness of tributary resources and the commanding geographical position which the city occupies add features that make this an unrivaled location for most kinds of manufacturing.

They keep no stock, but sell by samples, and take orders which they forward to manufacturers or wholesales men, guaranteeing the purchases, and charging the buyers a commission of  $12\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. on the invoices and costs, except the Custom duties, which the dealers, to whom the goods are directly addressed, themselves pay:—

The capital of Messrs. Rose and Rush is \$60,000, which sum appears to their credit in the Commercial Bank.

The dealers for whom the goods are ordered give notes for the amount of the invoices and costs, at 4 months from the day of shipment, *plus* the commission above stated, and it is agreed that the said notes may be renewed at maturity for one-half of their respective amounts, in which case, however, a further commission of  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. (on the renewals, of course) is to be charged and included in said renewals.

## THE BOUNDARY BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES IN ALASKA.

*Extract from a letter in the Vancouver World from its Ottawa Correspondent.*

“At the Interior Department the other day I made enquiries as to the probable time when the report of Mr. Wm. Ogilvie on his observations with respect to the British Columbia-Alaska boundary would be ready. Mr. Ogilvie, it will be remembered, went up to the Yukon two years ago, and it is no easy matter for a man to work out the difficult calculations from the important data which it took him eighteen months to collect. Mr. Ogilvie, since his return from British Columbia, has been living in retirement at his little farm a few miles from Ottawa, and has been daily engaged upon his report, but it will necessarily be some time yet before it is ready for the printer. The question has not infrequently been asked why a joint commission had not been appointed by Canada and the United States to define and delimitate the Alaska boundary, but Canada's answer upon that point is a straight one. The officials of the Canadian Government, Dr. Dawson and Mr. Ogilvie, have fixed the boundary at the crossing of the Yukon and several places in that vicinity, and the United States officials cannot do more than that. Their observations would be of no more value than as a check upon ours, but it is patent that something will have to be done ere long relative to arriving at a basis of agreement, in order to settle the disputed question of title to mining lands in the vicinity of the 141st parallel. Apropos of this question, it will be remembered that at the request of Captain John Irving, the British Columbia Senators and Members waited upon the Minister of Customs last session to ask that representations be made to Washington with a view to securing permission for the steamer “Islander” to navigate Alaskan waters, it being the intention of the C. P. N. Co. to send that vessel to Alaska with a party of tourists. I learn, however, that nothing was done in regard to the matter, as the Government does not admit that the United States authorities have exclusive jurisdiction over the channels which are usually navigated by the Alaskan steamers.”

#### CANADIAN PACIFIC AND NORTH PACIFIC RAILWAY COMPETITION.

Some interesting discussion has been going on in Chicago recently regarding an alleged race between the Canadian Pacific and Northern Pacific Railways to reach the Yellowhead Pass. The Northern Pacific, as is well known, is heading through Manitoba and the North-West, of which one or two hundred miles are built from Winnipeg, for the Saskatchewan River, and the expectation is to reach there next year. The Canadian Pacific will take immediate steps to head it off, and, it is said, has let a contract, which is not yet made public, to build about seven hundred miles of new road. It will build this fall from Regina to Prince Albert, on the Saskatchewan River—to which place the Northern Pacific is headed—under the charter granted to the Regina and Long Lake. Next year the line will be extended from Prince Albert westward, through Edmonton and the Yellowhead Pass of the Rocky Mountains to Vancouver. The Yellowhead Pass is said to be the best and easiest of all the Rocky Mountain passes. Thirty thousand tons of steel rails are now on the way from England for the new line. This is the talk in Chicago, but President McNaught, of the N.P.R. says, they have no idea of building a line to interfere with the C.P.R. scheme.

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# REPORT.

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The Honorable J. A. CHAPLEAU,  
Secretary of State, &c., &c.,

SIR—I have the honor to submit herewith the reports of the three Chief Clerks, heads of branches, respecting the transactions of this Department during the year ending 30th June last.

I have very little to add to the full information furnished by these gentlemen. The task of organizing the new establishment has been a very heavy one, and has severely taxed the energies of all employed in the work. In undertaking the printing and binding necessary for the use of the several Departments and the two Houses of Parliament, the Government had three objects in view: better work, greater celerity in its execution, and (the other two being assured), a lowering of prices. I think Mr. Senecal has shewn conclusively that the work, in some respects if not all, has been executed with greater despatch. True, complaints on the subject of delays have not been altogether stopped; but some of these are unreasonable, and the task of satisfying unreasonable people as well as reasonable is altogether beyond us. In a considerable number of cases about which complaint is made, the fault lies with the party complaining. In others the pressure of work has rendered delay absolutely unavoidable. To meet all demands in the time which seems to be expected would require the doubling our establishment and running it at an expense which no one could justify. A successful attempt has been made during the present Session to bring out the Departmental Reports, *Hansard* and routine Parliamentary documents with all possible promptitude. And the printing of the Senate Debates, formerly executed by outside contractors, has also been taken over and carried through with all reasonable despatch. A great deal of additional work has also been thrown upon the office by the large issues of bulletins and other documents from the Experimental Farm here. When we add to this the immense amount of work upon the Voters' Lists, it will be seen that there have been some reasons for delay in the past year which did not exist in previous years.

As to the excellence of the work done, that speaks for itself. I do not think that in that respect the great improvement can be disputed by anybody.

The result as to prices has not been hitherto quite so satisfactory as expected. In fact, the confusion and added labor involved in re-organization led, for the time, both to an increase and a fluctuation in prices. Methods not hitherto used for arriving at the true cost of work and charging it out against the Departments ordering had to be devised, and the rules first adopted were really tentative—necessarily modified, from time to time, as experience was obtained. This is now happily well nigh settled, and we have arrived, I think, at a basis which will enable us in future to equalize the actual cost

of production and the charge for each job against the Department ordering it. The price for a good many forms has been for the time enhanced by the necessity of re-setting them from new type, and re-stereotyping from that type. Many of the old stereotype plates were either worn themselves or cast from partially worn type. This charge is being fast reduced to very small proportions. And many seeming discrepancies in prices have also arisen out of the fact that the contract prices for the last twenty-five years, have been below cost on some items, and very profitable on others. In a job wherein the former class of items were prevailing the work was turned out at or below cost price. In the reverse case very large profits were made. Coming now to reduce all prices to actual cost, they are in some cases decidedly increased, in others much reduced—a fact that may easily puzzle Departmental officers not aware of all these details. But I have every expectation that at the end of the current financial year we shall be enabled to make a good showing, in respect of the general cost of production.\*

For myself, I may say, that the additional duty and correspondence thrown upon me in consequence of the recent revision of the voters' lists has for sometime nearly doubled the work which would otherwise have devolved upon me.

Orders in Council have been passed restricting the articles to be kept in stock in the Government Stationery Office and issued for ordinary Departmental use, and a list is prepared showing what that stock consists of. This will very much simplify the work alike of the Stationery Office and of the Stationery clerks in the several Departments.

The question of the transfer of the distribution of Parliamentary documents and the extent of that transfer, to this Department, is still awaiting the completion of an understanding (previously in part arrived at) between yourself, on behalf of the Government, and the Joint Committee on Printing of the two Houses of Parliament. It is much to be hoped that a definite settlement will be arrived at during the coming Session, so that the work which properly belongs to it, under the Statute, may be taken over and carried forward by the Department.

Then, also, the further subject of the gratis distribution to the public of such documents and the selection of proper depositories where they can best be placed and most safely kept for the use of the public still remains for final settlement. It has long been felt that the present arrangement or lack of arrangement is very unsatis-

\*The printing of this report having been delayed till those of all the other Departments were completed, I am able to subjoin a highly satisfactory statement in confirmation of this expectation. It sets forth the charges against the several Government Departments for printing for the nine months' ended the 31st March last, as compared with the charges for a similar period in 1886, 1887 and in 1888, the last year of the contract.

From this statement it will be seen that while, during the last three years of the contract, there was a gradual increase, caused by increase in the volume of work, during the last nine months there is a decided decrease. It is very certain that there has not been any decrease in the quantity of work turned out. In that case, we have decidedly decreased the cost of the Printing:—

The Department hitherto giving most work to the printers has been the Post Office. The amount charged to that Department for the nine months in 1887-88 was \$21,700.52, while for the nine months just closed it was \$10,005.46, a saving of over \$10,000.

And in this connection, also, the provision of places in all the important cities of the Dominion where these documents may be bought must also receive attention. But neither of these latter questions can be satisfactorily dealt with till the limits of free distribution by members of the two Houses themselves shall have been settled by them.

#### VOTERS' LISTS.

The preliminary lists having to be got out within a prescribed time, it was found necessary to give some of them to outside offices to be printed. A uniform rate of 3 cents per name and 50 cents per heading was paid for those printed outside. I subjoin a statement showing list of those so printed, by whom printed, and amounts paid. I also append a list of those printed at the Government Bureau, showing cost if paid for at same rate, amounting to \$15,474.87, while the amount paid in wages and cost of paper was \$13,354.88. The total amount expended on account of voters' lists from 1st July to 31st December, including proof-reading, proof-paper, blank forms, stationery, wages, &c., is \$31,842.27. This amount does not include payments to Revising Officers, who are paid by the Auditor-General.

SIR,—I have the honor to transmit herewith a short report upon the progress made in the organization of the Government Printing Establishment, and the printing work carried out under my superintendence.

During the past as in previous years, I have made it my duty to study the most recent progress in the printing art, with the view of meeting the object for which I take it the Government Printing Bureau was established, viz., the execution of a higher class of work than heretofore, with greater expedition. And I have much pleasure in stating that wherever I have visited, for this purpose, establishments, either in the United States or Canada, the fullest opportunity for investigation has been afforded me. At intervals, during the year, and as the departments were completed in the new building, the employees were moved in, and on the 15th October I was in a position to vacate the premises leased from the late contractors on Wellington street. The organization is now so far complete as to be adequate to the current work.

I am in receipt of letters from officers of the Government referring in terms of praise to the creditable work turned out by our new establishment. The paper supplied this year for the Annual Reports is much superior to that formerly used, and adds not a little to the appearance of the work. The building is at present lighted by the city gas; should an accident occur, especially during the Session of Parliament, when the hands are working all night, it would prove a serious drawback. I would, therefore, recommend that another means of lighting the establishment be adopted, to be used in cases of emergency. I desire to testify to the zeal and efficiency with which the clerks, foremen and proof-readers have discharged their duties.

## PARLIAMENTARY.

The printing of the Annual Reports or Blue Books for the present Session, together with the Bills, is well advanced, although Parliament assembled two weeks earlier this year. In my last report, I called attention to the very imperfect and indifferent manner in which "Printer's Copy" is supplied, and I regret to say it still continues; and I desire further to call attention to the fact that if those having charge of the proof-reading of the Reports, would see that all corrections were made in galley in place of allowing the matter to go into page form, their own work would not only be facilitated, but also that of the printer. It not unfrequently happens that the manuscript (Typewriter) of a portion of a report is sent to me with the request that I will place it in type at once, as the writer is in the city and would like to see his production in type before he leaves. Now this is plainly written and easily read, yet I must set it up, and keep the matter standing until the copy of the Report proper is sent in. With the large quantity of type at my disposal, and the increased facilities at my command, I am in a position to set up and work off any of the Reports of the Departments (with the exception of the Auditor General's and the Trade and Navigation) in two weeks, provided that the proofs are read in this office, and that the manuscript supplied is that intended to be printed. Reports are not completed in the order in which they are received, the statistical part of the report is often finished weeks in advance of the preface.

I believe more economical and better work could be turned out, if two or three special permanent translators were attached to the Printing Department, and in charge of all translation outside of the regular Parliamentary work.

The following statement will show that out of the 16 Reports sent in, nine were completed in the month of January. Taking into consideration the routine work of

the House, and that at least 350 copies of each Report are required to serve the first distribution, a fair idea may be obtained as to the tax on the working capacity of the printing office and bindery—

#### THE COMMONS DEBATES.

During the last Session of Parliament I was frequently asked why the French edition of the Commons Debates could not be more expeditiously printed, and upon enquiry I found that the several operations through which this work passes were not as clearly understood as they should be.

The following are the rules as adopted by the Printing Committee:—

#### RULES FOR THE PRINTING OF THE DEBATES OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

The printing shall be performed daily, on sheets of sufficient size as may be directed, to contain the speeches which have been delivered at the previous sitting of the House, and be published as reported in the language in which they are delivered, the said sheets to be delivered to the Distribution Office by three o'clock, p.m., after each such sitting, and the French copy of the Debates shall be published within three juridical days after the copy of the same has been placed in the hands of the Printer.

In the event of the House sitting after (12) twelve o'clock, the daily sheets of the Debates are to be delivered as expeditiously as possible after (3) three o'clock of the following day.

The type to be used shall be Brevier type, with quotations in Nonpareil.

The type to be kept standing and (3) three days allowed for corrections, and then to be made up in the revised or book form edition. The sheets of the same to be returned by the Printer for Binding.

The Chief Reporter shall see that the Printer's copy of the daily sheet be furnished concurrently with the Debate as the Debate proceeds, and said copy shall be

accepted by the Printer as correct for the purpose of the daily publication, and all the copy for each day's publication shall be delivered to the Printer within two (2) hours after the adjournment of the House—the Printer to give the Chief Reporter a receipt for the last copy delivered for that day's issue.

The Printer shall receive the revised proofs of the daily sheets for correction not later than forty-eight (48) hours after publication.

The Officer of the House whose duty it is to revise the Debates shall proof-read the daily edition, as well as transcribe corrections made by members, before sending such proof-read and revised daily edition to the Printer for correction.

The signed proofs for the bound edition shall be returned by the Chief Reporter to the Printer for press within twenty-four (24) hours from the receipt of the same by him.

The Printer may proceed to print the book form after having kept the type standing for the three days allowed for corrections.

The translation of the French edition shall be made from the revised copy, as prepared by the Chief Reporter.

The Chief Translator shall return the galley proofs to the Printer, signed for press, within twenty-four (24) hours after they are deposited for his use.

The Chief Reporter shall cause the table of contents and index of the English edition of the Debates to be delivered to the Printer within one month after the prorogation of Parliament.

The Chief Translator shall see that the index of the French edition is prepared within one month after the work of translation has been completed.

Any member requiring extra copies of his own or any speech may have them furnished, covered or not covered, as may be required, at the actual cost not including composition.

And it should be noted that estimates based upon the number of pages in the unrevised edition will not be correct if the speech is lengthened or condensed in revision.

It will be seen by the above rules that the daily edition must be delivered in the Distribution room, House of Commons, at 3 o'clock on the day following a debate. The members are then allowed three days wherein to correct their copy, and return it to the Printer. The daily edition, as a rule, makes from thirty-five to forty pages. Allowing one day to make corrections, it is evident that four days must elapse before the Translators could be supplied with the corrected copy from which to make their translation. At present there are only nine Translators engaged, and, allowing each man three pages per day, it would take about a day and a-half—say two days—to do the work. So, at the least possible calculation, and making no allowance for mishaps, six days would elapse from the issue of the daily edition before the French copy could be sent to the Printer. It would then be set up, and revises sent out, taking another three days, and making in all nine days that the English would be issued in advance of the French debates. Last Session the translation was, to a great extent, made from the daily, and the work of composition was consequently doubled by the reproduction in French and in type of all the errors of the English daily edition. The staff in charge of the French portion of the Debates is not adequate to the work required for the proper performance of it.

## THE SENATE DEBATES.

Upon the Government assuming control of the printing, and acting under instructions from the Queen's Printer and Controller of Stationery, I took charge of this work, and found it anything but satisfactory. In some instances as much as two days have elapsed before I received the "Printer's copy" of a debate, and I have been made aware of cases where the copy although prepared remained in the Senate for three or four hours, or until I sent for it, as the Reporters are not supposed to provide a messenger. During the present Session of the Senate, and at a meeting of the Debates Committee, an agreement was made with the Reporters (although it interfered to a great extent with the regular morning work of the Session) by which a portion of the copy would be sent in at 10 o'clock at night, and the balance by 10 o'clock the following morning; but, as a rule, the copy is not in before 11.30 or 12 o'clock, a.m. Again galley proofs are demanded before the daily edition is in page form—these proofs are not very promptly returned, consequently the formes cannot be made ready for press. When extra copies of speeches are ordered the delay is still greater, from the fact that the type is used from the corrected edition, which is supposed to be printed three days after the issue of the daily. Owing to these irregularities I am often in a position to deliver the printed copies of a subsequent before those of a previous debate.

In order to properly provide for this work, I should certainly have some definite knowledge as to when copy will be sent to me, in such a state that I can go to press without further delay; and I feel that I cannot too strongly urge the adoption of rules similar to those of the House of Commons Debates. The Reporters have given me every assistance they possibly could with their limited facilities.

## DEPARTMENTAL.

The printing of the Departments has greatly increased during the past year, more especially that of the Post Office Department.

The Department of Agriculture have also added largely to their work by the printing of the Experimental Farm Bulletins.

At present envelopes are printed singly, and after they are manufactured. In this way the type is destroyed through an uneven impression on press owing to the GLUING of the FLAPS.

I have asked for an amount to be placed in the Estimates for the purchase of machinery and plant to print and manufacture envelopes. By this means I will be enabled to go to press with three and four at a time, in place of one as heretofore. This will effect a considerable saving, especially when orders are sent in for 800,000. This will effect a considerable saving, especially when orders are sent in for 800,000 at a time such as I have received. The envelopes printed during the year amount to 3,898,750, of this number 2,624,000 were for the Post Office Department.

I would also recommend the purchase of machinery and plant for lithographing. During the past year some 270 requisitions have been issued for lithographing and printing. A good deal of map work and work on plans is now done in premises leased for the use of the Department of the Interior, and for one or more other Departments. It would, therefore, be a decided advantage and indisputable economy to have this work completely executed on the premises.

#### VOTERS' LIST.

On the 5th August I began work on the Supplementary Voters' List with a special staff of 70 hands, which number was increased to 145 hands. The lists of 145 counties, making 7,746 pages, were completed on the 16th September. I also printed preliminary lists for 40 counties, covering 874 pages. The copy sent in was often very badly prepared, and, as a result, alterations were numerous.

The same remark is applicable to much of the copy sent in for printing the final lists. I have now, constantly employed on that work, 38 hands besides the foreman.

A special staff of proof-readers has been engaged on this work since 1st November last under the immediate superintendence of the Queen's Printer and Controller of Stationery.

The whole work has proved to be immensely greater than was anticipated or estimated for. The changes in the three years since the last revision, especially in the city constituencies, in consequence of removals from one polling district to another, have been surprisingly great. In some instances names added amounted to 50 per cent. of the previous total, and the removals to about 30 per cent. There were, of course, exceptional instances; but, altogether, the work has, as I have said, far exceeded anything which I had been led to expect.

#### THE BUILDING.

Every part of the building is at present occupied. In order to provide for the lithographic and envelope machinery which will be required to fully carry out the requirements of the law, the building should be enlarged. For this purpose and in view of the better performance of the work of printing the Voters' Lists, an addition of about seventy-five feet to the rear of each of the wings would be necessary. I am of the opinion that this would afford ample room in every respect for years to come, and effect a saving of the rent paid at present for premises wherein to carry on the lithographic work, and a part of the heavy cost of printing the Patent Record and the envelopes would also be saved.

The ventilation of the building is not at all provided for, and although it is not felt to any great extent in the smaller rooms, yet where a large number of hands are employed—such as the Parliamentary room—the heat is intense, especially when the gas is turned on in the evening. This is a matter that should receive attention.

If the addition above referred to is constructed, and as a number of the employees live at a distance from the Bureau, I would ask that two rooms be set apart to be used as lunch rooms, one for the women, and one for the men.

#### PLANT.

I confined myself, so far as practicable, to Canadian markets in the purchase of the plant and material requisite for the work. When compelled to buy in foreign markets, I did so through resident agents in Canada.

In the selection of the heavy machines for the press-room, bindery and stereotype room, I gave the preference to that class of machine which is strong and durable, simple in construction, consequently easy of manipulation, adjustment and repair. Appended is a list:—

This increased expenditure is covered by the additional value of stock on hand, made up principally by the purchase of Hansard Volumes from the late printing contractors, printing papers heretofore charged to the Queen's Printer's work account on receipt instead of, as now, being kept in stock and issued only as required by the Printing Branch, and to the necessity for keeping a somewhat larger quantity of small-wares to meet the general demands of the service.

It will be seen from the comparative statement hereto annexed that the gross total increase for the departmental inside and outside services amounts to \$37,528.66, which is made up of the undermentioned amounts :—

With reference to the increases it should be stated that the amount shown against the Department of Public Printing and Stationery, is caused by the contingencies of the new Printing Bureau, and that beyond a normal increase in the Queen's Printer's work account the increased amount stated is altogether due to the Parliamentary Printing paper being again charged through this channel instead of direct to the Joint Printing Committee of the two Houses of Parliament as last year, and hence there is no charge against that Committee this year at all—the account being closed in fact.

And, relative to the decrease, a word of explanation is necessary. In the case of the Department of Agriculture, the decrease of \$3,944.86 is principally caused by a payment of \$3,001.80, for pamphlets last year, against which there is no corresponding outlay this year, and the item of \$4,979.65 (Immigration Branch) is largely accounted for by an expenditure last year of \$4,298.98 also for pamphlets, against which there is likewise no similar charge this year.

The Supreme Court decrease of \$2,473.74 is explained by the fact that it consists almost altogether of books, which are now purchased by the Registrar instead of through this office as formerly, and the amount of \$5,127.64, in the case of the



North-West Mounted Police, is due to the great bulk of the supplies for the year 1887-88, as well as 1886-87 being both charged in the former year's account.

The cause of the large decrease against the Joint Printing Committee of the two Houses of Parliament is explained under the head of increases. As to the other decreases I should say that, undoubtedly, some of them are due to retrenchment in ordering.

Over and above this, however, there yet remains, a tangible decrease in the amount expended on books. But for this reduction the demands for goods generally would have shown an increase rather than the small net decrease of \$937.52.

During the year values have fluctuated only to a slight extent. The noticeable revival of trade in England has somewhat stiffened prices there, besides leading to delays in the execution of orders, thus causing some inconvenience. From the United States the office has been enabled, on the contrary, to purchase at old rates, and in several instances at lower figures. In Canada also, values have shrunk in some lines, no doubt from very active competition, to a point where the margin of profit seems questionable. As a whole the office has fully maintained its prestige for buying at the closest figures in the best markets, for keeping up the standard of quality and improving it wherever possible without adding to the cost thereof.

In my last report I had the pleasure to point out the remarkable expansion of purchases in the home market for Canadian manufactures and other goods bought from Canadian houses, and to add that in accordance with your desire, care would be taken to further extend this connexion when this could be effected advantageously. I am able at the close of another year to record that the expenditure in this direction has been more than maintained. It now amounts to \$130,719.84, an increase of \$4,439.11 on the present year, making an increase of nearly 70 per cent. for the last two years.

There exists a laudable endeavor on the part of home manufacturers and business houses to meet the requirements of the service, and it is evident that considerable success has attended their efforts. Taking printing paper as an example, of which the Government is a large consumer, commendable progress has been made in its manufacture and finish, so much so indeed, that the importation or purchase of other than Canadian-made printing paper is reduced to a minimum.

In book papers also a steady advance is noticeable, though for the finer grades of writings, copyings, cartridge, and colored, as well as linen papers, the supply has to be drawn from other sources.

Details of all the accounts will be found in the statements hereunto annexed, viz. :—

(A.) A general statement of expenditure and issue of goods.

(B.) A comparative statement of the issue of goods for the two fiscal years 1887-88 and 1888-89.

(C.) A statement of expenditure and issues by months for the year ending 30th June, 1888-89, further brought down to the 31st December, 1889.

Though the statements show a slight net decrease on the whole year, I cannot say that the necessary details of the office work has in any way diminished. Rather the reverse in fact. One reason for this is the small quantities of articles asked for on many requisitions entailing the same detailed entries as larger orders, and also calculations of an intricate character, besides multiplying requisitions. I cannot but think the intention is that Departments, for the inside service use especially, should order in bulk, keeping say a month's stock on hand at all times, and therefrom supply its various officers, rather than as now in many cases ordering from hand to mouth, so to speak. Such a course would, at all events, materially lessen the labor of the office and its enormous detail.

Another source of extra labor exists in consequence of indefiniteness in describing goods required by Departments. This prevails in a large proportion of the requisitions received and points very urgently to the necessity of the projected

printed Stock List, whereon each article is properly and accurately described. With the issue of this list, the difficulty mentioned should practically cease to exist.\*

Permit me also to say a word relative to special sized envelopes. These have grown to such proportions as to outnumber the regular sizes, of which a very large range is kept in stock. Undoubtedly special sizes and special materials are necessary for some more important purposes; but with all respect, I submit they might be considerably reduced with corresponding economical effect. All such orders have to be made by hand and consequently the cost is much greater (25 to 35 per cent.) than would be the case were the regular sizes in stock used. One Department (the largest user of envelopes) has already cut down its specials very considerably, and I have no doubt whatever of the favorable result pecuniarily.

I have pleasure in again recording the zealous and willing assistance afforded by my staff. The manner in which their various duties have been discharged, generally speaking, are worthy of commendation. The more so indeed as since my last report the office has taken over the great bulk of the stationery supply to the Intercolonial Railway, and the supply of School Books and stationery to the Indian schools throughout the Dominion. These additions have added to my own responsibilities and those of my officers still further, though the work has been done without increase of staff. To do this efficiently has needed further improvements in the office arrangements which are now as near to what they should be as possible, and to which the comparatively few complaints and arrearages of supply abundantly attest.

Naturally the fitting up of the new store-rooms has received anxious care. The fixtures in our old offices being unfitted for more than very partial use, the new ones have been designed with both a view to efficiency and economy. I sincerely trust, Sir, that they will meet with your approval, for I feel confident they will prove thoroughly serviceable as well as being arranged to meet every emergency which may arise for some time to come, though it is possible that some further accommodation may be needed for the very large accumulation of Parliamentary publications.

Demands during the year have reached 11,591, the largest number yet received by 340; invoices and accounts have been entered to the number of 1,167, an increase of 2; 1,174 letters were received and registered, an increase of 216, and 4,020 letters were mailed, an increase of 308. In addition, 3,979 packages of goods were despatched by mail, an increase of 267, as well as 185 cases by freight for the outside service, an increase of 14.

## REPORT OF THE JOINT LIBRARIANS OF PARLIAMENT, FOR 1890.

To the Honourable the Speaker of the Commons :

The Joint Librarians of Parliament have the honour to report as follows for the year 1889 :—

The Librarians have great pleasure in acknowledging the valuable donations made to the Library by His Imperial Highness Prince Roland Bonaparte, who devotes his leisure and fortune to promoting the progress of science, himself taking a leading and earnest part in scientific studies. These donations consist of the Prince's contributions to anthropology, and various monographs on the countries visited by His Highness, and bear the following titles :—

Les habitans de Surinam, Paris, 1884.

Les premiers voyages des Néerlandais dans l'Insulinde.

Les derniers voyages des Néerlandais à la Nouvelle Guinée.

Note on the Lapps of Finmark ; la Nouvelle Guinée ; le fleuve Augusta ; la Nouvelle Guinée ; le Golfe Huon, also—

Escard. Le Prince Roland Bonaparte en Laponie.

The special grant placed at the disposal of the Librarians to enable them to complete the American and Canadian section has been made use of to purchase since last session several important works, amongst others :—

Vie de la mère Marie de l'Incarnation, Paris, 1735.

Grönlands Historiske Mindesmøker. 3 vols.

Massachusetts Historical Society proceedings, from the beginning in 1791 up to date ; in all 24 vols.

(This collection contains a most valuable record of papers relating to the early history of the United States and Canada.)

Leonard's Report (in manuscript, which has never appeared in print) on Nova Scotia, addressed to Lord Sheffield in 1789.

A collection of the Missions des Oblats, in which are found many documents on the settlement of the Red River district and the North-West.

We may also mention several works on Pre-Columbian discovery of America ; and twelve letters written by the Hon. L. J. Papineau to Robert Christie, the historian ; they refer to the last years of M. Papineau's political life.

Among other such interesting additions to the Library may be mentioned a copy of the "Anti-Jacobin," purchased at second-hand, which on careful examination, proved to be the copy owned by Sir James Mackintosh, from whom, as his friend Lord Macaulay said, "Scholars and Statesmen loved to receive the lessons of a serene and benevolent wisdom." In these volumes, Sir James Mackintosh has noted, on the authority of Canning, from whose copy the notes were transferred at the house of Dundas in Scotland, the authors of the various satirical pieces in that famous periodical.

During the year due attention has been paid also to the practical side of the Library.

The Law Section will be found, it is hoped, to contain the latest necessary books and editions.

The Statistical Section has been enriched by a considerable collection of reports of Boards of Trade, Chambers of Commerce, and business associations



of various kinds, covering almost the entire field of mercantile operations in the United States.

The latest additions to the literature of Political Economy in all countries interesting to us will be found on the shelves.

An attempt has been made to collect the pamphlets and speeches delivered during the recess on Trade questions, but in the absence of a compulsory law, this attempt must always remain imperfectly successful.

The public interest attaching to the disputes concerning Alaska has suggested the preparation of a special list of papers relating to that country, which will be found in the Annual Catalogue.

The Librarians trust that Parliament will encourage them in placing restrictions on the issue from the Library room during the Session, of books of reference, and in particular, of the Congressional Documents of the United States, the Sessional Papers of Great Britain, and Law Books. The absence of these volumes, in the hands of private members, often for an undue time, occasions great inconvenience to others. The Library itself being the most convenient place for the study of public questions, the sending out of books of this character ought not to be necessary.

The Librarians, in conclusion, desire to call the attention of Parliament to the obvious fact that the space in the Library is almost fully occupied in most directions, and hopelessly exhausted in some particular sections. By careful re-arrangement, some space may still perhaps be provided for the practical part of the Library; but at an early date it will be necessary to take into serious consideration the necessity of providing additional space.

All of which is most respectfully submitted.
