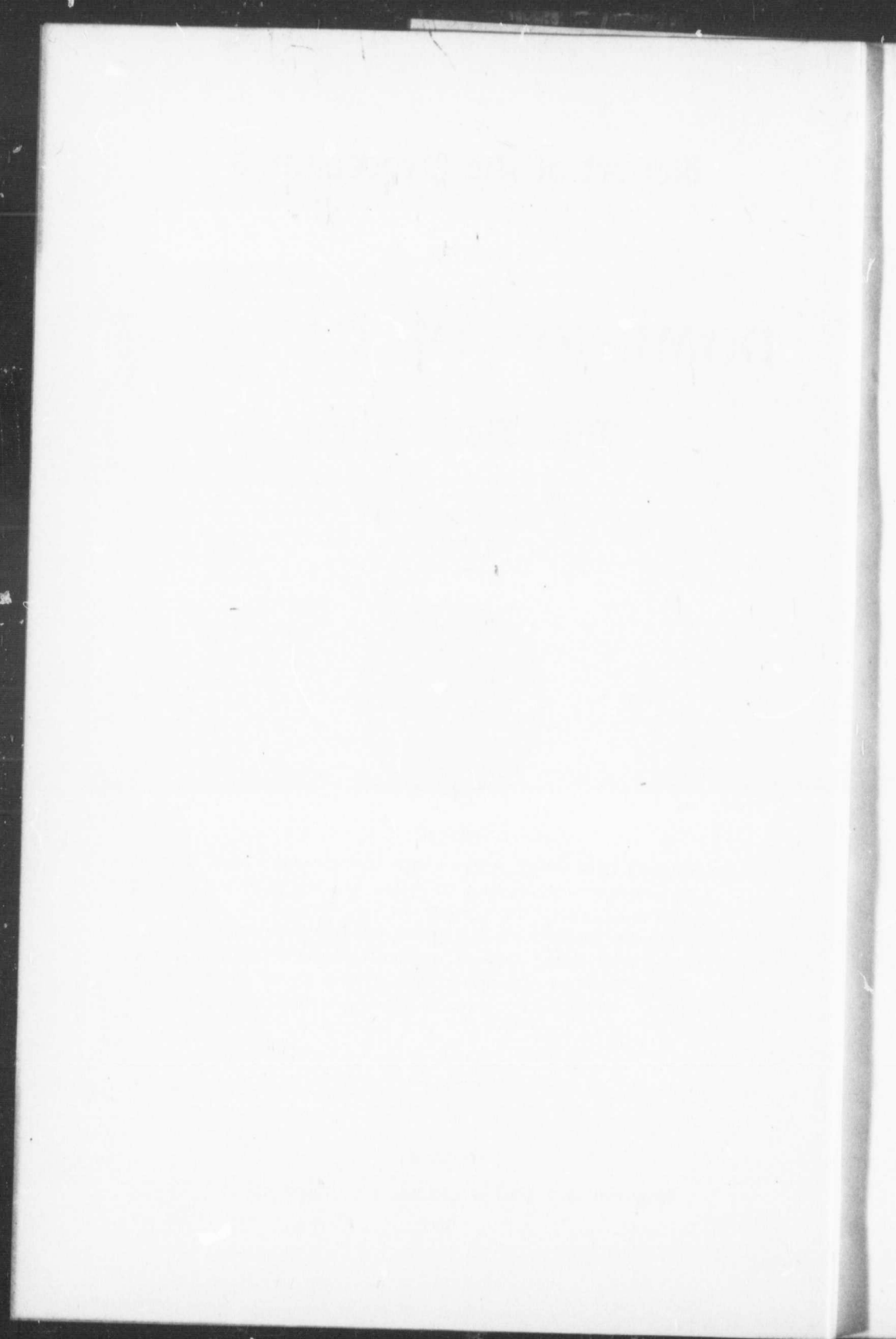

REPORT OF
Lieut.-Col. Hugh H. McLean, 62nd "St. John Fusiliers,"
COMMANDING THE BISLEY TEAM,
1899.

SAINT JOHN, N.B., DEC. 5TH, 1899.

Lieut.-Colonel the Hon. J. M. Gibson,
President Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, Ottawa.

Sir:—As Commanding Officer of the Bisley Team for 1899 I beg to submit the following report:—

All the members of the Team reported to me on Friday morning, the 23rd June, and at 11 o'clock on that day I inspected them in review order at the Armoury of the 5th Royal Scots, Drill Shed, Montreal. Major General Hutton, C.B., who was in camp at Laprairie, telegraphed his regret at being unable to be present at the Inspection, and wished the team every possible success. The officers on the team were provided with complete uniform. Some of the non-commissioned officers and men were not fully equipped, but through the kindness of Lt.-Col. D. A. Macdonald, Chief Superintendent of Stores at Ottawa, the articles they were deficient in were supplied before the steamer sailed. All the members of the team provided themselves on their arrival at Bisley with Kahki jackets and shooting caps. This gave the team a neat and uniform appearance.

We went on board the Steamship "Tainui" on the morning of Saturday, the 24th June. Lt.-Colonel Tilton accompanied us to Quebec. Before leaving the ship he made a short address to the Team, which was received with great enthusiasm. The accommodations provided for us on the steamship were first class in every respect. With the assistance of Captain Dunlop and the Officers and Steward of the ship we were able to properly celebrate Dominion Day. A *feu de joie* was fired at noon by the team, the ship's guns assisting us, and after three hearty cheers "God Save the Queen" was sung. In the evening a banquet was given, the members of the team appearing in full uniform. The Rev. J. Edgar Hill, of Montreal, presided. Loyal and eloquent speeches were made and the day's celebration wound up with all joining in again singing the National Anthem. I should also mention that a programme of sports was car-

ried out during the day, under the direction of Capt. Cartwright, Surgeon-Lieut. Bertram and Lieut. Robertson. On the voyage over the members of the team, with the assistance of Hugh Paton, Esq., of Montreal, raised over £50 for the Seaman's Orphanage, Liverpool. R. A. Dickson, Esq., of 2261 St. Catherine St., Montreal, was one of our fellow passengers. Before parting with us at Liverpool he very generously offered for competition among the members of the team a gold watch. The watch was won by Pte. R. A. Fleming. It was formally presented by Mr. Dickson at Bisley.

We arrived at Liverpool on Tuesday afternoon, the 4th day of July. A carriage and baggage van of the London and Northwestern Railway were placed at our disposal. We had arranged with the agent that we were to be taken through to Bisley, but by some mistake we were taken into Euston Station, necessitating a transfer to Waterloo Station. Arriving there, we found that we were too late to connect with a train for Bisley and were obliged to stay in London over night. We arrived at Bisley on July 5th, and found that Sgt. John Deslauriers, of Ottawa, had everything in readiness for our reception. I made a contract with Messrs. Ind, Coope & Co., caterers at the camp, to provide meals for the members of the team. They carried out their contract to my entire satisfaction. Team began practice on the 5th, which was steadily continued until the matches commenced. It was the general opinion of the members of the team that a week's practice at Bisley was quite as good as two weeks at any other place. I found the Canadian building in thorough order, and I certainly think it is a great credit to Canada to have such a building on the grounds. It attracts the attention of all visitors and is a splendid advertisement for our country.

I think also that the Council should impress on the Canadian Immigration Department that a grant should be given each year to the Association, as the members of the team afford the best medium of disseminating information respecting Canada. This year, Mr. Colmer sent out to me a large supply of pamphlets and literature, which, with the assistance of the members of the team, were distributed through the camp. We took particular pains to show visitors views of different parts of Canada, and also gave them such information as they might require. I would suggest that the Immigration Department arrange with the Commandant each year to give a Smoking Concert in the big tent at Bisley. At this concert stereoptican views could be exhibited, and with a good lecturer a great deal of information could be given about the country, and I am sure the result would be to bring to Canada a large number of desirable settlers.

I wish also to refer to the soldierly bearing of the members of the team, and the perfect harmony that existed. From the time they arrived at Bisley until the close of the meeting every man was anxious to do his best. All invitations that would interfere with necessary practice were declined, and everyone appeared to be determined to do all in his power to uphold the good name of Canada and win success. I never saw a body of men working together who were actuated by a higher or stronger sense of duty.

KOLAPORE MATCH.

The Match for the "Kolapore Cups" came off on Friday, the 14th day of July. The competitors were teams from the Mother Country, Canada, India, Jersey and Guernsey. It was very much regretted that the "Victoria" team was not present. That team won the trophy in 1897, and last year was only beaten by three points. The match commenced at 9 o'clock a.m. All the teams got to work at the targets at once. Shooting was conducted on what is known as the "Queen's conditions," viz., seven rounds per man at 200, 500 and 600 yards. At the first range kneeling position, at 500 yards position any with head to target, and at 600 yards any position. The weather was not perfect, but there was little to grumble about. The wind blew lightly from the left front and was occasionally fitful, but that was somewhat compensated for by the advantage of good light. At the finish of the first range the totals stood:— Mother Country 243, Canada 240, Guernsey 237, India 236. Jersey 229; at 500 yards the Mother Country made 265, Canada 263, Guernsey 258, Jersey 254, India 246. The aggregate scores at the close of this range stood:— Mother Country 508, Canada 503, Guernsey 495, Jersey 483, India 482. The shooting at the last range was very exciting, the Mother Country and our team running a neck and neck race. The British team did not throw away a shot, and while to the last moment the result was in doubt, the Mother Country team became the winner with an aggregate of 768, the highest ever made. Canada came next with 759, winning the second prize of £80 stg. Guernsey won the cups last year with 744. The highest score ever made before at this match was 751, made by the Victoria team in 1897. The match yielded three centuries, Priaux (Queen's Prize man) of the Guernsey team made 101 out of a possible 105, Capt. Rennie of our team made 100, and Armourer Sergeant McCallum of the 1st Argyle, also made 100,

LIST OF FIRST PRIZES WON.

While our team was unfortunate in not winning the Kolapore cups a number of first prizes were won, viz:— Surgeon-Lieut. Bertram won the "Grand Aggregate," "Corporation Aggregate" and "Volunteer Aggregate." Lt. Blair won the "Wingrove Aggregate," Lieutenant Gilchrist won the first prize in "Premier." Capt. Wilson won the first prize in the "Kynoch." Capt. Cartwright won the first prize in the "Gregory." The Grand Aggregate includes the scores made at the "Queen's First Stage," the "Saint George's First Stage," "Martin's Cup," "The Alexandria," "Daily Graphic," "Daily Telegraph" and "Graphic Series." The first prize consists of a challenge trophy, Associations gold cross and £20. Dr. Bertram's aggregate of 360 for this prize is only three points less than the highest ever made before. The following members of our team also won prizes in this match: Capt. Wetmore, Lieut. Alexander Robertson, Lieut. R. A. Robertson, Sergt.-Major Huggins, Sergt. Crowe, Pte. Simpson and Pte. Fieming.

VOLUNTEER AGGREGATE.

The Volunteer Aggregate includes the scores made in the "Queen's First," "Saint George's First," and "Martin's." Dr. Bertram won the trophy and £15. Dr. Bertram's winning score was 196. The following members of the team also won prizes in this match:—Capt. Wetmore, Sergt.-Major Huggins, Sergt. Crowe and Pte. Fleming.

CORPORATION AGGREGATE.

The Corporation Aggregate is for 100 guineas, and is open only to the Indian and Colonial Volunteers. The aggregates are reckoned the same as for the Grand Aggregate, first prize £25. Dr. Bertram's score, winning the first prize of £25, was 360. The following members of the team also won prizes in this match:—Pte. Fleming, Sergt. Major Huggins, Capt. Wetmore, Sergt. Crowe, Lieut. R. A. Robertson, Pte. Simpson, Capt. Wilson, Capt. Rennie and Lieut. Alexander Robertson.

WINGROVE CUP.

The "Wingrove Cup" is given for aggregates at 800, 900 and 1000 yards with service rifles. Lieut. Blair's winning score was 137. An equal score was made by Lieut. Fletcher of Liverpool, three members of our team standing next, Capt. Wilson 136, Capt. Rennie and Pte. Simpson 134 each.

QUEEN'S.

The Shooting in the last stage of the "Queen's" was very exciting. Sergt. Crowe was well up and we had great hopes that he might come in ahead. However at the last Priaulx of Guernsey finished with 336, nine points higher than the score which won the prize last year. Jones the Welshman had a score of 332 with two shots to go. The first shot he fired he made an inner, which placed him on a level with Priaulx. All that was needed for him was simply to hit the target with the last shot. The last shot he fired, however, was a miss. This made a tie between him and Priaulx. Sergt. Anderson of the Scottish Rifles also made 336. There was therefore a tie between Scotland, Wales and Guernsey. The three men now went to the same target. They shook hands before commencing to shoot. The excitement was intense. Priaulx in the first shot scored a "Bull," and Anderson made an inner; Jones also an inner. In shooting off Priaulx made a "bull's eye" and an inner. Anderson made a magpie, a miss and an outer. Jones made an inner, "bull's eye," and a miss. Poor Jones seemed to have hard luck. As mentioned before if he had only hit the target he would have taken the prize. Here again in shooting off if he had made a "bull's eye" the last shot instead of a miss he would have tied Priaulx. The finish was the most exciting ever known at Bisley. At the conclusion of the match the Duke of Cambridge presented the prizes. After the presentation he inspected the Canadian team. He made a neat speech and in his usual hearty manner congratulated the team on the fine appearance it presented.

The "At Home" was held on the second Thursday as usual, over 400 being present. Lord Strathcona took this occasion to present to the winner his cup and also the Canada Cup. He made a very eloquent speech in presenting these cups. Lord Strathcona was extremely kind to the team during their stay in England. He secured for them a position to see the Grand Volunteer Review on the Saturday after our arrival at Bisley, and also invited all the members of the team to the garden party which he gave at Knepworth. With the kind permission of the Officer Commanding the "Black Watch," their band and pipers played for us at the "At Home."

On the second Sunday in camp all the members of the Team accompanied me to the quaint old Churchyard at Bisley, where each in turn dropped a flower upon the grave of the late Major Henry F. Perley. To most of us Major Perley was personally known, and his life-long interest in the Militia of Canada and Rifle Shooting, were the subjects of many a deserved tribute.

Mr. Colmer, of the Dominion of Canada office, did everything in his power to assist us. Mr. C. A. Duff Miller, Agent General of the Province of New Brunswick, visited us at Bisley, and kindly asked all the members of the Team to dinner in London. This invitation we were unable to accept. Mr. James Buchanan, of London, also invited the team to dinner, but they were unable to accept. Mr. Buchanan has kindly offered a prize of 100 guineas. Suggestions as to how this prize should be competed for are to be made to him by the Council of the Dominion Rifle Association. This prize is to be offered for competition at the next annual prize meeting of the D. R. A.

Major Helmer was a most enthusiastic and efficient Adjutant, and was untiring in his efforts in looking after the interests of the Team. The success of the team is due in no small measure to the practical way in which he performed his duties.

A list of the prizes won by the members of the team, together with the acquittance roll and statement of expenses is submitted herewith.

Report of the Council
OF THE
Dominion of Canada Rifle Association
1899.

The Council has the honour of presenting the 32nd Annual Report of the proceedings of the Association.

The thanks of the Association are extended to His Excellency the Right Hon. the Earl of Minto, G.C.M.G., Governor-General, for his interest in the welfare of the Association, as evinced not only by his generous donation of \$500 towards the Prize List of 1899, but by the practical suggestions as to Rifle Shooting, with which the Council has on different occasions been favoured by His Excellency.

The Association's thanks are again due to Surgeon Lt.-Colonel the Honourable F. W. Borden, Minister of Militia, for the free issue of ammunition to competitors at the Annual Prize Meeting, and for his contribution of \$100 towards the Prize List.

The Council gratefully acknowledge the obligations which the Association is under to the Right Hon. Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, High Commissioner for Canada, and to Major General Hutton, C.B., A.D.C., to the Queen, Commanding the Militia, for their substantial donations to the funds of the Association, and which enabled your Council to add two new matches of a practical nature to the Prize List at the last meeting. They also feel much indebted to Major Drummond, Scots Guards and Military Secretary, for his gift of a handsome Silver Cup, which was offered for competition in Revolver Shooting amongst Officers attending the Annual Matches. To the "Colt's Repeating Arms Co." for their generosity in presenting a Revolver for competition, and to the "Smokeless Powder Co.," of London, England, for the gift of a Silver Tea Service and \$60 as a prize in a match competed for with the ammunition manufactured by the Company. The E. B. Eddy Company, Hull, for a set of Indurated Fibre Ware as a special prize. Hiram Walker & Son, of Walkerville, Ont.,

for a Silver Cup as an Individual Prize for the year. And to the H. R. Ives Company of Montreal, for a casting of the British Coat of Arms. These donations were much appreciated and enabled your Council to prepare an attractive programme for the Matches.

The thanks of the Association are also due to :

(1) The Government and Parliament for the grant of \$10,000, voted at the last Session.

(2) To Lt.-Col. F. Massey, Chairman of Council, and to Messrs. Ahearn & Soper of Ottawa, for their donations of \$100 each towards the Prize List.

During the past season there has been erected under the supervision of the Department of Militia and Defence a handsome building at the Rockliffe Ranges, which, with its tasty exterior, convenient quarters for the caretaker of the Range, large and commodious verandahs, dining and reception rooms, and offices for the officials of the Association, is admirably adapted for the use of competitors attending the Matches. The Dominion of Canada Rifle Association has contributed \$1,000 towards the cost. The site is both commanding and convenient and was selected by Major General Hutton, C.B.

The Council have much pleasure in recording the fact that the targets (55 in number) on the Rockliffe Ranges are now completed and equipped, and the entire Range was in use for the first time at the matches in September last. The Range itself has been much improved by the acquisition of additional land, the completion of the firing butts at 800, 900 and 1,000 yards, and the construction of the necessary roads leading to, and on the Ranges.

The Annual Matches of the Association were held on the 28th August and following days, and were on the whole fairly successful. The extreme heat experienced for two days and the wet and consequently dark weather on the last day of the Matches unfavourably affected the competitions. The attendance was large, being 424 in all, or 64 in excess of that of last year.

There were 22 Matches included in this year's Programme, and in addition to the Gold, Silver and Bronze Medals, Silver Tea Service, 13 Challenge Cups

and the British Challenge Shield, there were prizes in cash amounting to \$7,429.00. This amount was in excess of that offered in previous years, and rendered the Programme more than usually attractive.

The marking in the butts, which was partially performed by men of the Royal Canadian Regiment of Infantry, was fairly satisfactory, and the Council feel that with practice these men would soon become expert markers.

The introduction of prizes for "Tyros" had a beneficial effect, as many new and young shots participated in the Matches for the first time. The "Hutton" and "Strathcona" Matches, instituted to encourage practice in rapidity of fire combined with accuracy in aim, proved very successful and popular and were largely patronized during the Meeting. The Governor-General's Match was for the first time fired in two stages, the first at 200, 500 and 600 yards, and the second at 800 and 900 yards. The unfortunate conclusion of this match, fired as it was in a heavy rain storm and consequent partial obscurity of the targets, detracted much from the interest and success which was anticipated by the introduction of a second stage in this match. To prevent a recurrence of the difficulties under which the firing took place, your Council would recommend that the Match should be fired in the earlier days of the Meeting, and that the separate stages be fired in the morning of different days.

The "Rifleite" competition was also well patronized, and the "Rifleite" ammunition exclusively used in the competition gave very general satisfaction to the competitors, Mr. Berry, representing the "Smokeless Powder Co." of London, England—the manufacturers of the "Rifleite,"—was present during the Matches.

The Steamboat service between the City and the Ranges during the Prize Meeting was not satisfactory, and made more apparent the extreme desirability of connecting the Ranges and City by means of the Electric Railway. The Council hopes that before another Meeting this connection may be accomplished.

The Council desire to acknowledge the courtesy of the Hon. the Postmaster General in establishing the necessary postal facilities on the Range, the convenience of which, was much appreciated by the Association.

The Council have to record with deep regret the death of Lt.-Col. Hon. Sir G. A. Kirkpatrick, K.C.M.G., late Lieut. Governor of Ontario and President of the Dominion Rifle Association from 1884 to 1892. They feel that in his death the Association has lost a valued and useful member, and one whose practical interest in the work and objects of the Association was of great benefit to the cause of Rifle Shooting in Canada.

The Council also regret to record the deaths of two of the Life Members of the Association, Messrs. Hugh Ryan and Frederick Gundry. These gentlemen represented the Imperial Bank and the Bank of Montreal in the list of Life Members respectively.

Your Council recommends that at the ensuing Prize Meeting of the Association, Matches in which the firing takes place at moving targets be introduced, being of the opinion that such competitions will prove to be a useful and instructive feature in Rifle Shooting.

Lt.-Colonel. F. C. Henshaw, of Montreal, formerly Chairman of the Council of the D. R. A., has intimated his intention of contributing the sum of \$500, to be distributed in prizes in these matches.

Colonel Henshaw's continued interest in Rifle Shooting, and this generous offer is a source of much satisfaction to all who are interested in the Association's welfare.

It will also be observed by the Report of the Commandant of the Bisley Team of 1899 that James Buchannan, Esq., of London, England, has made the generous offer of a prize of 100 Guineas for competition at the next Annual Prize Meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association.

In common with all Her Majesty's subjects throughout the world Canadians hail with proud satisfaction the fact that Colonial troops are being privileged to take part in the battles for freedom and liberty now being waged in South Africa. This circumstance cannot fail to arouse us to a sense of the responsibility we have assumed, and that hereafter Canada's "Soldiers of the Queen" will be recognized as an integral part of the forces of the Empire. Recognizing this responsibility, your Council realizes that the present is an important epoch in the Association's history, and would earnestly suggest that every possible effort should be put forth by the Dominion and Provincial Rifle Associations towards increasing the efficiency of the Militia Force of our Dominion. Your Council are of the opinion that in no way can this be more effectively done than by a well directed and general effort to develop and perfect the use of the Rifle by all branches of the service.

Your Council cannot close this Report without placing upon record its appreciation of the practical aid and sympathy extended to its work by the Hon. F. W. Borden, Minister of Militia and Defence. Your Council has been greatly encouraged to loyally discharge its obligations to the Riflemen of Canada by the support and confidence the Minister has accorded it; while his jealous care of all that appertains to the welfare of the Militia of Canada will long be remembered by every branch of the service.

The Council submit herewith :—

- (1). The Treasurer's Statement of Receipts and Expenditures duly audited.
- (2). The Report of Lt.-Col. Hugh H. McLean, 62nd Fusiliers, Commanding the Bisley Team of 1899, with the usual Financial and other Statements accompanying the same.

In submitting Lt.-Col. McLean's interesting Report the Council would direct attention to the suggestions made by that Officer. The large winnings of the

Team, aggregating in all the sum of £557, would appear to justify the sending of the Team direct to Bisley for practice, thus effecting a considerable saving in the Team's expenses. A small outlay in connection with furnishing the building with bedsteads, bedding, &c., will further reduce the expenses.

FINANCE.

Affiliation fees from Rifle Associations this year amounted to \$469.00 as against \$568.00 received last year, a decrease of \$99.00. The number of Rifle Associations affiliating is as follows, viz.: Provincial seven; County, Battalion and other Rifle Associations twenty-three, a decrease of six Associations as compared with 1898.

The receipts from Annual Subscribers to date amount to \$240.00, an increase of \$32.00 compared with 1898.

Associate Members fees amounted to \$348.00, showing an increase of \$60.00 from competitors as compared with 1898.

Receipts from Special donations amount to \$1,220.00, an increase of \$520.00 as compared with 1898.

Special donations from Banks amounted to \$725.00, a decrease of \$50 compared with last year.

Entry fees to Matches, including post entry fees and fines for challenge shots, &c., (less refunds) amounted to \$4,780.64, as against \$2,893.81 received last year, an increase of \$1,886.83. This is accounted for by the additional number of matches and the increased prize list of 1899.

Cash prizes, with the cost of special Gold and Silver Badges, amounted to \$7,481.20 as against \$4,718.35 distributed in 1898, an increase of \$2,762.85.

The net expenditure on account of the Bisley Team of 1899 amounted to \$4,949.90, as against \$5,528.82 in 1898, a decrease of \$578.92. This saving is made up largely by the team proceeding direct to Bisley and sailing from Canada a week later than the team of the previous year. A detailed statement of the expenditure by Lt.-Colonel Hugh H. McLean, Commanding the Team, will be found in the Appendix.

Receipts from ordinary sources for the year amounted to \$17,847.64, which with the grant of \$200.00 from the Government of British Columbia, and a special contribution of \$15 in aid of the Bisley Building, together with an advance from the Ontario Bank of \$3,432.10 exhibits a total of \$21,494.74 at credit side of the account.

The general expenditure amounted to \$21,716.98, which includes the following charges on account of the Bisley Building, of \$303.53, and \$3,106.18 in connection with the New Building at Rockliffe Ranges.

This leaves a balance on the debit side of \$222.24.

BISLEY BUILDING.

A Statement of this account will be found in Appendix, showing an expenditure during the year of \$303.53, made up principally of Caretaker's wages, ground rent, poor rates, taxes, insurance, and certain repairs, &c., carried out under the superintendence of Mr. John Deslauriers, of Ottawa, when in England the past Summer.

The Association is indebted to John Morrow, Esq., of Toronto, for a handsome Hall Clock for the Building.

It will be observed by the Treasurer's Statement that a grant of \$200 has been received from the British Columbia Government in aid of the Building Fund, which has been duly acknowledged.

The balance due the D. R. A. under this head since the erection of the Bisley Building in 1897 to date, as shown by the Statement in the Appendix, amounts to \$3,959.82.

A competent Caretaker is in charge of the Building, which, with its contents, is covered by insurance to the extent of £2,200, sterling.

The lease of the ground on which the building is erected is in the name of the President of the Dominion Rifle Association. It would seem desirable in view of the holdings of the D. R. A. that it should procure from the Federal Parliament an Act of Incorporation.

Annual General Meeting held 5th April, 1899.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association held in the Committee Room of the House of Commons on Wednesday, 5th April, 1899, at 11 o'clock a.m.

Lt.-Colonel Gibson, President, said:—Your Excellency and gentlemen of the Dominion Rifle Association, in rising to move the adoption of the Report which has been submitted and is now being distributed amongst you, I have very great pleasure indeed in congratulating the Association upon quite a number of features, regarding which I may be permitted to say a few words. In the first place, I think we may all feel great satisfaction in the manner in which the Report itself has been got out—it is very minute and detailed in its reference to all matters, and the workmanship of the report itself is creditable and very taking in its appearance, and in all respects, I think, embodies just what the most exacting member of the Association could desire to see contained therein. In the next place, I may say that I am sure all our members join most heartily in according to His Excellency, Lord Minto, a very warm and cordial reception on this, the occasion of his first visit to this Association. We have had the pleasure of

similarly welcoming his predecessors, and it is, I am sure, a matter of considerable satisfaction to all of you to know that in the continuous line of Patrons and prize-givers in the persons of the Governors-General of Canada there is to be no break. Indeed His Excellency, I think, practically connected himself, or allowed his name to be connected with this Association as almost one of the first things which took place upon his arrival in this country, and, I am sure we feel all the more satisfaction from this evidence of interest in our Association, to see him now occupying that position to which he has been called by our Gracious Sovereign, from the fact that he is no stranger to Canada; that he is no stranger to the Militia of this country; and because he was one of those who took part in our Canadian campaign of 1885 in the North-West. He knows the Militia, and is well known by the Force at large, and it suited us admirably, in the right sort of way, when we heard that one of ourselves was to succeed the late Governor-General at the end of his term as the head of the Executive of this country. I am quite sure from the knowledge he has of military matters, from the experience he has had among the Militia of this country, that His Excellency will continue to take a lively interest in the National Force, and also in that important adjunct, which we consider ourselves, the D. R. A., and I hope I may be allowed to welcome him also at our annual competitions, when there is being demonstrated what can be done from the rifleman's point of view by the crack shots of the Dominion of Canada.

Since our last annual meeting another change has taken place—we have a new Major-General, and although he is not entirely new to the D.R.A., because he honoured us by opening our new ranges at Rockliffe last September, and because he has already made himself familiar with what we are doing and what we ought to do; still, this is the first annual meeting at which we have had the opportunity of welcoming him, and I have had the honour and pleasure of meeting him. The Militia of Canada know enough of Major-General Hutton already to know that in him we have an administrator of the Militia Force of this country whose aim is to smarten us up a little, to see that we are not only a force on paper, but that we shall be more than ever before a real military force. Everyone knows that the General is a master of enthusiasm, and, inasmuch as he has had great experience, and is throughout the Empire known as a distinguished and able soldier, it goes without saying that his presence in the Dominion of Canada is a matter of great importance, and will be a matter of prime importance to the Militia of this country. His predecessors—distinguished men—were not all of them in touch with the D. R. A. Sometimes we thought some of them were willing to just countenance us now and then, and that they thought us with our purposes rather an ornament than an Association of practical utility. General Hutton thinks we may not only be ornamental—I hope we may always be that—but that we may also be exceedingly useful to the Militia, and he has given a most practical instance of that by sending to myself a communication on a most practical matter, traced on most practical lines, which has been laid before our Council and been discussed by that institution. I am not sure we can go as far or as fast as the Major-General wishes we could go. I am not sure

that although we have new ranges affording us increased advantages, that we can at once take up all the advanced system of competitions which the General Officer refers to, but I have no doubt at all that as time passes we will be able to take up those firing exercises which he considers, and rightly too, are essential to the well-being of the skill and efficiency of the modern soldier. Hitherto our competitions have been confined to individual skill in the use of the rifle. We had our team matches of course, but those were simply a number of individuals whose aggregate made up the score, but we have had very little indeed in the way of practical firing, advancing and retiring, and at appearing and disappearing targets—we had our so-called "Military" matches, but we have been unable to go so far as the General thinks we should have done. We can, of course, do much more upon our new ranges, and of course it will require a certain additional expenditure of money for all these things, but I hope it will be done in the near future—all new ventures take time, but I hope we will move gradually in the direction indicated by the General Officer Commanding. I think, however, this is a time when I may say a word of the difficulties which we find, or rather perhaps that we anticipate we will find, in connection with these new undertakings. It is a great many years ago since I considered the bearing upon rifle practice of the new rifle. Those present will, I am sure, bear me out that the want of target accommodation, not only at the Provincial centres, but everywhere, is the greatest drawback, not only to us, but one may even say to the Militia as a whole. The danger of using a rifle such as that with which the Force is now armed is very great; the range of its projectile is so extreme that the majority of our old ranges throughout the country are unsuitable and unsafe for its use, and the great difficulty I foresee will be the furnishing of adequate target accommodation at the various Battalion headquarters; for unless opportunities are provided for individual practice in the various localities, it is useless for us to expect large gatherings of riflemen and large entries at our Annual Meetings. This will, however, I believe, be remedied in time, but it takes a good deal of time to do much in this direction, because a great deal must be left to local effort and where there has to be a joint effort between the locality interested and the Government there is generally delay. We do, however, hope to see year by year increased range facilities provided, and we hope to advance as fast as we can do so in the direction desired by the Major-General. (Applause.)

I think, gentlemen, we have reason to congratulate ourselves upon the report sent in and published of the Bisley Team which went across the water last year to represent Canada. Colonel Cooke's report contains a statement of events and achievements which I am sure cannot but be satisfactory to us all. True, the Team did not win the Kolapore Cup: the Queen's Prize was not won by a Canadian, and some other events were not so successfully contested as in previous years, but I do see a great deal in what the Team did in which to take a good deal of satisfaction. The first man on the Canadian Team in the Kolapore eights headed the field, and that is something. The first four men headed the field, the first five men headed all but one team and tied with that; and the first seven men of our Team were ahead of the team which won the Cup. One

can always excuse defeat by a liberal use of "if's." (Laughter.) I will only use one "if"—if an excellent shot on the Canadian Team only had his usual luck, Canada would have won the Kolapore Cup. (Applause.) In the individual competitions the Team did well. In the "Prince of Wales," second only in importance to Her Majesty's Prize, Lieut. Robertson, "77th," tied for the first place. Lieut. Ross, "13th," won the "Gregory" with 34 out of 35. Lieut. Gilchrist won the "Alexander Martin" with 49 out of 50 points at 1,000 yards. In that great match the "St. George's," Sergt. Broadhurst was well up in the last stage, and also took a high place in all matches, and first in the "All-Comers' Aggregate," and tied for first place in the "Grand Aggregate." He was only six points behind the winner of the "Queen's." I do not think too much can be said in favour of Sergt. Broadhurst's success at the last Bisley meeting, and so long as our representatives can come back to this country with a showing like that, I think we have reason to be satisfied and may take a good deal of pride in the excellence of their marksmanship. (Applause.)

It is known to you all that the Association has established on Bisley Common a permanent home. It is known as the "Canadian Home," though, I think, the Duke of Connaught called it the Canadian "Palace." It is a home for all time for our Canadian Riflemen, and will, I am positive, ensure the permanency of teams from Canada to participate in these competitions, because it would be a most lamentable thing if from motives of mistaken economy the Government did not send over a Team to occupy it. (Hear, hear.) It has, of course, cost some money, but Canada will get full benefit for every cent expended upon it.

About the opening of our new ranges. I was unable to be present, I regret to say, but that function was better performed by the Major-General Commanding who was present on the occasion and has taken so much interest in the range throughout. On all sides I hear the greatest praise and satisfaction with the new ranges expressed, and the possibility of adding new features, such as has been suggested by General Hutton, and I have every confidence that we can look forward to future meetings of the D. R. A. with a great deal of satisfaction indeed. I have for many years been strongly impressed with the idea that we have been wasting too much ammunition at the 500 yards range. With our new rifle 800 and 900 yards should be just as common as was 500 and 600 yards with the old one, and I trust that in the re-arrangement of the Matches for the present year, a good many competitions at 1,000 yards and 800 and 900 will be found to have taken the places of the old competitions at 500 and 600. This is, of course, for the Council to deal with, but I think you will find that the dull monotony of firing at 500 and 600—perhaps I should not say actually "dull monotony"—will hereafter be interspersed with longer range shooting, as of course it is now imperative that our Militiamen should be trained as much as possible in the use of their weapons at the longer ranges rendered possible by the increased power and precision of the new rifle.

The Report very properly calls attention to the loss which this Association has sustained in the death of its first President, Sir Casimir Gzowski, A.D.C. to the

Queen. All who knew him can testify to the enthusiastic interest he always took in all matters connected with the Association. Those who took part in the old Wimbledon Meetings can testify to the satisfaction felt at seeing—I was going to say the majestic figure—which the old gentleman always presented on Wimbledon Common. He was not only popular with us, but was well liked by the authorities there, and I am sure Canada is much indebted to Sir Casimir Gzowski in many directions not generally known to the public here. The functions at which he presided there; the interest which he took not only in our Team, but in the general operations of the N.R.A., all went to make him a conspicuous figure on Wimbledon Common, and through him to bring added credit to Canada and Canadians. I can truly say I know of no greater loss the riflemen of Canada could have suffered than the loss of the late Sir Casimir Gzowski; and I do not think it is at all out of place for me here to express the feelings which I am sure animates every member of this Association, that his successor, Sir George Kirkpatrick, for many years the President of this Association, and a long-time friend of our riflemen, should have been deprived by illness of attending here with us at this meeting. We all sympathize very much indeed with him and deplore the illness with its consequent suffering which has deprived us of his presence and advice.

I do not wish to weary you—I am becoming aware my remarks are becoming rather lengthy (No. No.), but I would express the pleasure which I feel, and I am sure all of you feel, at the new faces we see here. We have been very much satisfied in the past with the liberality of the Minister of Militia in regard to ammunition—with the liberality of the Government in connection with the erection of the Bisley Building—we all feel very grateful for the consideration accorded us in these matters. Now I occupy the peculiar position of having been nominated to my position during the regime of a good Tory Government and I must say we always received every consideration at their hands. Sir Charles (Sir Charles Tupper) who is here to-day—and it is not the first time—manifests his interest in this Association. All who were present a few years ago know his interest and assistance in carrying out the erection of the building at Bisley, and I have no doubt that no one is more pleased at the outcome of that project than he is. I much regret that the Minister of Militia is out of the City—we would like him here to hear our modest request for funds. (Laughter). You know military men are always in want of funds (laughter), but we have the “Admiral” of our Canadian Navy (laughter), Sir Louis Davies, with us, and I may say we will expect him to promise us all that we may ask. (Laughter) Not being the permanent head of the Department he may be able to be more free in his promises than other Ministers at times have been. (Laughter).

In moving the adoption of the Report I may say I do not think this Association ever occupied a better position—a position to do more for rifle shooting than ever before. Many of us have been for years practical riflemen. On the Council of this Association will be found men of the greatest experience in rifle shooting and some of the most skilled marksmen to be found in this country; and in the use of the rifle by the ordinary Militiaman the advice of gentlemen who are them-

selves reliable shots may be heard, and so far as they are found sound and practicable they may be taken all advantage of by the General. Too far and too long have we been running in parallel grooves—the Militia authorities and the D.R.A. Major General Hutton does not think we should run in parallel grooves, but should run together. (Hear, hear, from General Hutton.) This is of paramount importance. It is admitted the soldier is a useful institution to the community and the State, but the soldier who cannot use his rifle effectively is only of comparative usefulness, whilst the soldier who can use his rifle must be of incomparable utility to his country. Our mission is to aid and assist in making all our men as useful as possible—to offer incentives to greater proficiency and skill in the use of the weapons put in their hands by the State, and to be the corollary, as it were, or colleague of the musketry instructors under the Militia Department. Our whole aim is to help and assist that Department in training and making efficient our citizen soldiery. Gentlemen, I move “the Annual Report as printed be received, accepted as read and adopted.”

Major J. J. Mason, 13th Infantry : The President has so fully gone into all matters connected with the Report that it would be superfluous for me to add any remarks. I beg simply to second the adoption of the Report.

On the Motion being put, it was declared carried unanimously.

Lt.-Col. S. Hughes, M.P., moved, seconded by Major F. S. MacKay :

“That the thanks of the Association be tendered to His Excellency the Rt. Hon. the Earl of Minto, G.C.M.G., Governor General of Canada, for his presence here to-day, and for the interest he has already evinced in the welfare of the Association by generously consenting to become its Patron.”

Lt.-Col. Hughes said :— In moving this motion which I have just read, I would beg your indulgence, gentlemen, to make a few very brief remarks in reference thereto. His Excellency, Lord Minto, is no stranger to Canada and requires no certificate at my hands before a Canadian audience, and more particularly before a gathering of Militia Officers. The Militia knows right well that His Excellency has earned the right to be considered quite one of ourselves : that he has a distinguished career as a soldier, and that in addition he has had the opportunity of serving our Dominion upon active service in the field. As I said, it is not necessary to go into his career—we know he comes of a fighting and distinguished family on the border and that the blood of the old moss-trooper still flows in his veins—that his family have contributed several very distinguished men, ornaments indeed to the public and military services of Great Britain, and that with these examples to guide him he cannot but be a marked success in the present high position which he occupies. He himself has had a very varied experience, and I am sure we all welcome him very warmly to Canada, and are quite sure he will maintain in every way the high reputation established by his predecessors.

Major MacKay, 65th Batt. : I have much pleasure in seconding the resolution of thanks to His Excellency for his kind donation to our Prize List, just moved by my friend, Colonel Hughes. I can add but little to what has been said. I am quite sure the whole Militia was much gratified when they heard of His Excellency's appointment as Governor General. As has been said, he was looked upon as practically one of ourselves. I had the privilege of serving in the campaign of 1885 with His Excellency—that is, we both served in the same campaign, and I always understood that his previous knowledge of war, derived from his experiences abroad all over the world was of the greatest value to the commanders at that time. As Col. Hughes has said, he comes of a military race and is sure to be a credit to the high position which he now holds. Mr. President, I have great pleasure in seconding the resolution.

The motion being declared carried unanimously, the President conveyed the thanks of the Association to His Excellency.

His Excellency the Earl of Minto, Governor General of Canada : Mr. President and gentlemen, I assure you it is a great pleasure to me to be here with you all to-day. I always feel since coming to Canada that I have come back again amongst old friends (hear, hear), and I feel it all the more in an assembly of Militia Officers. I must thank Colonel Hughes and Major MacKay for the far too flattering allusions made. I appreciate the allusions to the old Scottish border-land from which I come. I fear some of my ancestors met with rather a sudden death from the Englishmen on the other side of the border, but as far as I can gather they stood up stoutly and generally gave a pretty good account of themselves, which is one of the great lessons we must learn from them, and I must say I believe the people there still inherit the sterling qualities of their ancestors. (Hear, hear.) I have been connected for a good many years with military rifle shooting and I hope you will allow me to make a few remarks on that head. The D. R. A. is to develop—Col. Gibson has told us—is to develop as far as possible the good qualities of rifle shooting. Now, the shooting as practiced at all our meetings was modelled originally from Wimbledon, and as you know, that took its start on account of the French war scare when the Volunteer movement was inaugurated, and the Wimbledon shooting was originally to make the service attractive to men joining rifle regiments, as well as to encourage skill with the rifle. Since that time rifle shooting has much developed and progressed, and it has often seemed to me to be questionable whether the same system which was originally applied to what may be termed a sport, is the proper one from which to obtain the best results for shooting development for military purposes? No one admires a good rifle shot more than I do, but the presence of one good rifle shot in a regiment is very far from making good field shooting for military purposes. As you know I have had some connection with the Auxiliary Forces at home, and I have done all I could in my Brigade to encourage good shooting, but I must say I have a holy horror of what is called "pot-hunting." Nearly every Battalion has a good number of men who go in for rifle

shooting, but I do not know as that altogether meets the requirements. Prizes given should not only encourage individual shooting, but good collective shooting, and more especially the control of fire, and the efficiency in controlling and directing fire by officers and N. C. O's. There are difficulties, of course, to be surmounted in arranging competitions to enliven and sustain and increase these qualities, but these qualities are of such inestimable value in modern military operations that it is well worth some sacrifices and trouble to encourage them. We have a most striking example in the latest campaign. The fighting about Omdurman last September showed most conclusively, in my opinion, the great value of good average shooting, well under control, and well directed and husbanded—the very great value of good collective fire. Col. Gibson has intimated in moving the adoption of the Report that he felt sure the Association would be able to very shortly do something in connection with your competitions that would in some measure encourage this collective shooting, instead of devoting your entire attention to individual shooting, excellent though, of course, that is. I would like to say that you have a very distinguished and able soldier now in command in the person of Major General Hutton, thoroughly up in all the science of musketry and all that is required for creating and establishing an efficient army. I am quite sure he can establish a good system for the Militia, but success rests not only with General Hutton, but with the officers of the whole Militia, who must take up and support heartily what he advocates and inaugurates. I saw and fully concur in the suggestions made by General Hutton to the Council of the D. R. A., and I wish to say that Colonel Gibson has answered those suggestions in a very nice and able way. He knew that while the Force had many good individual shots, they were not very high in collective firing, and I cannot impress too much on C. O's that if you are ever going to take your men into the field you must have them develop good collective firing beforehand. I appreciate very much the resolution of thanks which you have voted. I think the D. R. A. is a most worthy object for the Governor General's support, and can only say I will continue to take interest and follow in the footsteps of my predecessors, but in any prize which I would give I would like to make conditions in connection with the control of fire, collective firing, etc. I have a great admiration for the Canadian Militia and want to see them just as good and just as highly qualified in musketry and training as any other force could be. (Applause.)

Moved by Lt.-Col. Geo. R. Starke, R.O., seconded by Lt.-Col. J. Bruce, 10th Royal Grenadiers :

“ That the thanks of the Association are tendered to the Government and Members of the House of Parliament, not only for the liberal grant again voted at the last Session of Parliament, but also for the additional grant of \$5,000 towards the cost of the Canadian Bisley Building, and also to the Government of the Province of Manitoba for its contribution of \$200 for a Ilke purchase.”

Hon. Sir Louis Davies, M.P., Minister of Marine and Fisheries, and Acting Minister of Militia and Defence : I shall endeavour in the very few remarks I

shall make in reply to the resolution of thanks to both Houses of Parliament which you have just passed, to remember that I am addressing a body of practical men and not a Parliament, therefore my remarks, I hope, may be covered by minutes rather than by hours. (Laughter.)

When Col. Gibson in a very seductive manner stated that the demands he was going to make upon the Government should be promised by me, I felt very great relief indeed to think that I was only the Acting Minister and that if I rashly promised any undue demands, it would be my colleague, the Minister of Militia and Defence who would afterwards have to stand in the breach. (Laughter.) Joking aside, I would like to say, however, that Parliament has always been willing to deal generously with the Militia and with the D.R.A. The liberality of the Government has been continuous year after year, and I know that the moneys granted you are given with great cheerfulness. We all recognize the good work your Association is doing; the value it is to the State; and are always willing to accord every consideration to applications or votes for your purposes. I attended a few years ago the meeting at Bisley and visited the handsome building you have erected there and I assure you I joined with very great pleasure in voting the small sum of \$5,000. for that purpose. I think we can congratulate ourselves upon the excellent common sense of His Excellency's remarks about rifle shooting. (Hear, hear.) I have always attended your meetings here year after year and have attended the Matches in my own Province and was there impressed in the same way with the sameness of the faces seen there year after year, and it has seemed to me that the best results in the way of getting a large number of fairly good shots rather than a small number of experts was not being obtained. I hope the riflemen of Canada will take to heart seriously the common sense views expressed by His Excellency.

I was requested by Dr. Borden (Min. of Militia) to express his very great regret that he was unable to be present here with you. He has taken great interest in connection with the new range and I know he is also making personal efforts for obtaining a new range for the City of Montreal. Owing to the rapid growth of the City and Suburbs it has become dangerous to practice with your new rifles on the range lately in use. I hope he will be successful, and can only say, as one of his colleagues that I will be most anxious to second him in his efforts to improve the efficiency of the Force. I know you are waiting to hear from more experienced gentlemen present and so shall make no further remarks, except to assure you that I am most heartily in accord with your aims and objects, and thank you very much on behalf of the House of Commons for the resolution of thanks you have just passed.

Sir Charles Tupper, Bart., G.C.M.G., C.B.: I may say I have very great pleasure in supporting the resolution which has been so ably moved and seconded by Colonel Stark and Colonel Bruce, and offering your thanks to the Government and House of Parliament for the assistance they have rendered to your Association. I am glad to be able to concur in what has been said by the Hon. Minister

of Marine and Fisheries, and to assure you that on all matters of the defence of Canada we don't know any politics. (Applause.) We all concur on both sides of the House in what is a duty to our common country. There is no subject of greater import than unity of action in placing the Military and Militia forces of the country in a position to defend Canada, if necessary. I do not think there was ever a period more important in that regard than the present. I have no desire to be put down as an alarmist or to have you think that I consider that we are on the brink of war or anything of that kind, but we must take care to make ourselves respected by the people of other countries, and we must do it more than we have done in the past (Hear. Hear.) We meet to-day under pleasant auspices. We recognize in His Excellency the Governor General a distinguished soldier and one who brings to the discussion of these matters a great deal of experience, not only in the field, but in connection with the Militia of Scotland and the old country generally, and I may say, therefore, that to me it seems an exceptionally fortunate thing that the position of Governor General is occupied by a gentleman who is so able to second and assist these measures which I consider so important. We also have in the person of Major-General Hutton a distinguished soldier, one who brings to his new position not only great ability but also great experience. I would like to say that I have perused with great interest the report which he has felt it his duty to bring to the notice of the Government. While doing credit to the personnel and to the zeal and devotion of our military defenders, he lays bare many of our deficiencies, and I have come to the mature conclusion that if the defence of our country is to be taken in hand seriously, we must take to heart those statements made by the experienced officer who has been sent here to advise us in all military matters; and the House of Commons and Parliament must raise and elevate the defensive forces of this country to such a degree that the results will not only heighten our own respect, but also enforce the respect of others. (Hear, hear.) Your President has referred to his nomination and election to his present office by his political opponents. Well, I do not think I am going to apologize to the Conservative party for their electing Colonel Gibson to the position of President of this Association. This was simply following out the principles of that party, namely, to obtain the best man for the position possible. (Laughter.) I would simply move a resolution which has been put in my hands thanking the Canadian Club of London, England, for their generosity to the Bisley Team, and in this connection I would say that I would regard it as a great misfortune should anything prevent the sending of a Bisley Team from Canada. It is not only an opportunity of exhibiting the prowess and skill of Canadian riflemen, but it is an opportunity of presenting Canada in that field of Imperial competition where they meet not only the best men in the British army, but also the best men from all the outlying parts of the British Empire, and I consider that it is one of the greatest object-lessons, one of the best advertisements of our people, that this great Empire is able to bring together from the remote ends of the earth men who are able to distinguish themselves in a contest of skill with arms. I feel the Bisley Teams and the old Wimbledon Teams have earned for Canada the very highest

respect, and that they have been a most valuable factor in promoting that feeling throughout the Empire which is now happily dominant, and upon which the future of this country largely rests. The Canadian Club in London are only too happy to assist in any way they can to that end and to make your visits to the Old Land as happy, as pleasant and as prosperous as possible. I am sure they will always be willing to do as they have done in the past, and that they also much appreciate your gratitude and good feeling. I personally need say nothing more, but simply assure you that whether on one side of the House or the other I will always be found willing to support anything and everything which this Association has in view, as well as those larger and more important points brought out by the Major-General in his recent Report, touching the greater question of the defences of Canada. (Applause.)

Senator McKay : As a member of the Upper House and consequently under the Constitution one who has little or nothing to do with the voting of money and appropriations, I need not detain you with any extended references, but would simply second the motion moved by the Hon. Sir Charles Tupper. I do not think I could add anything to the very full and pertinent remarks of that gentleman.

Moved by the Hon. Sir Chas. Tupper, Bart., seconded by Hon. Senator McKay :

“That the thanks of the Association be given to the Canada Club of London, Eng., and to the Rt. Hon. Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, for their gifts to the Bisley Team of 1898 of valuable Silver Cups for competition amongst the Members.” (Carried.)

Lieut.-Col. Hon. E. G. Prior, M.P., 5th Regt., Canadian Artillery, moved a resolution of thanks to the Hon. Minister of Militia and Defence for the grants of free ammunition for league matches and his great assistance in connection with rifle ranges, particularly at Rockcliffe.

Your remarks, Mr. President, I am sure were very heartily endorsed by every gentleman here present, and I am sure we can congratulate the Hon. Minister upon his recovery from the effects of his unfortunate railway accident and his return to health. We have, I believe, a very excellent Minister of Militia (hear, hear,) one who is in full sympathy with our Force, its wants and aspirations in every way. Though his place during his illness was taken by able men, Sir R. Cartwright and others, there is nothing like having the real head present himself, and more especially is this the case when we have a Minister who is himself a Militiaman, who has attended camp with his Battalion year after year and knows thoroughly the wants and shortcomings of riflemen and others. I do not speak this way because Dr. Borden is away—I would much prefer to say what I believe to his face than in his absence. We can also congratulate ourselves that we have a Minister in full sympathy with the gallant gentleman who has lately come to command our Militia (Major-General Hutton.) It is a great thing to have the Military and Civil Heads of our war Department, if I may call it such, in complete accord, but I would like to say also we should have

more than the Minister in accord, the whole Government should be in accord with the General Officer Commanding in his effort to improve the defences of the country. (Applause.) I know from experience we often blame the Minister of Militia for certain things when in most cases he is enthusiastic for them, but goes to Council and has his estimates cut down. He must, however, insist upon getting what is necessary. The subject is most vital, and I confidently believe he will be backed up, not only by the Militia, but by the whole people of Canada. (Applause.) Mr. President, I would beg to move the following resolution :

“ That the thanks of the Association be tendered to the Hon. the Minister of Militia and Defence for the practical interest manifested by him in the affairs of the Association, as evidenced by the acquisition and equipment of the Rifle Range at Rockliffe, and the free issue of ammunition for the last year's Annual Prize Meeting.”

Lt.-Col. A. P. Sherwood, 43rd Battalion, O. & C. Rifles : I have much pleasure in seconding the resolution.

The President in putting the motion, said :

I concur very heartily in what has been said about the friendly feeling entertained by the Minister of Militia for us ; also, as Colonel Prior has intimated, that the root of the whole matter in connection with our Militia is the need of adequate appropriations—the necessary funds must be found if the Force is intended to be a really practicable one. I notice in the press this morning it is stated that another half million is to be added to the Militia appropriation. I hope indeed it is so (hear, hear) and I can assure those members of both Houses of Parliament present, that no better service to Canada can be rendered at the present time, than to increase substantially, this session, the appropriation for the Militia services. (Applause.) Motion carried unanimously.

Moved by Lt.-Col. Wm. White, C.M.G., seconded by Lt.-Col. J. H. Burland.

“ That the thanks of the Association are tendered to the Hon. F. W. Borden, M.P., Minister of Militia and Defence, and to Lt.-Col. F. Massey, Chairman of Council, for their contributions towards the Prize List. Also to the Presidents and Directors of the several Banks mentioned in the Annual Report, for their continued annual subscriptions; and to the Hon. the Postmaster General for the postal facilities established on the Rockliffe Ranges during the last Annual Matches.”

Major Macdonald, 48th Highlanders, moved, seconded by Major Dunbar, 8th Royal Rifles.

“ That this Association desires to congratulate Major-General Hutton, C.B. aide-de-camp to the Queen, upon his appointment as the General Officer commanding the Militia of Canada, and to express the hope that his administration of the important duties pertaining to his command will result most beneficially to the Militia of the Dominion.”

Major Macdonald, "48th Highlanders," in moving the motion of congratulation to Major-General Hutton upon his assuming command of Canadian Forces, said :

I am quite sure this motion will commend itself to all present here to-day. It is not the first time of meeting General Hutton, but it is the first opportunity that has occurred for us to formally extend congratulations to him, both as a militiaman and as a brother rifleman. We congratulate him, and express the hope that he will find his duties congenial. I am sure we are all anxious to profit by his experience and to do him credit in every way—and we trust that he may find after a year or two that he has materially improved the efficiency of our force. In our turn I am also sure we are to be congratulated in having a gentleman who has been so successful in other Colonies with military forces very like our own, appointed to our command. We feel we have a tried officer of experience and ability, who is practical, enthusiastic, and energetic, and I am sure from what he has accomplished in the short time he has been with us already and from the way in which he has made his personality felt, in a manner much greater than any other G.O.C. we have ever had with us, that we are much to be congratulated and that great possibilities are in store for us. I need say nothing further for I know you are all anxious to hear from the General Officer himself. Motion carried unanimously.

Major-General E. T. H. Hutton, C.B., A.D.C. to the Queen, Commanding the Militia of Canada, said.

May it please Your Excellency, Mr. Chairman, and gentlemen: I feel somewhat embarrassed. I came here to allude entirely to rifle shooting and the development of the D.R.A., but I must preface my remarks by stating my very deep appreciation indeed of the statements which have fallen from Sir Charles Tupper—not as a politician, for we soldiers are not politicians—but as one deeply interested, very deeply interested naturally, in all that affects the defences of our Empire, and now more particularly of Canada. As I say I very much appreciate his references. With his great experience it is most gratifying to find him so heartily supporting our efforts, for we soldiers are determined to do the very best we can for Canada, and we want to do it in the very best way possible. (Hear, hear.)

Sir Charles has referred to my report, recently presented to Parliament. I have endeavoured to lay before the Government the position in which Canada stands to-day. Most of you, I presume, have read it and know that I do not consider the military situation at all satisfactory. Many things are required, many things needed, before we can really say that the defences of Canada are in a thoroughly satisfactory and modern military condition, but I can, I know, assure the Government of the day of this, and the country at large, that we soldiers shall work together as one, and shall do all we can to bring about that wished for condition of affairs, and so it is very gratifying to find distinguished members of both Houses of Parliament assuring us that Parliament,—who holds the purse strings,—shall do its share in this great and important work. The

Chairman has alluded to a matter in which I am connected—a matter in which I wrote him about rifle shooting. Now I may at once say I shall not be content to work along parallel lines, for I remember very well from my boyhood training that parallel lines never meet. (Applause and laughter.) I want something where we can combine, where I can have the fullest assistance from your Association in training the Militia. I look upon the Dominion Rifle Association as of the very greatest importance. Bearing in mind the Militia Act and the levy *en masse* contemplated thereby, there can be no greater help than the Rifle Associations—Battalion, County, Provincial, and Dominion. I consider the Rifle Association as an adjunct and a very important adjunct of our National Force—it is a part of it—it consists of the very men to whom we look to assist in raising the general standard of the shooting of the whole Militia. Now the question is, how best to do this? His Excellency in a few practical remarks has pointed out this to us. He has had very great experience in connection with rifle shooting, and I know has given some thought how to best utilize for military effectiveness the skill engendered in individual sport, and I fully concur in all he has said. I would like to mention this in reference to what I wrote. The training of individual riflemen was essential at the time of the raising of the Volunteer Force in Great Britain, but the conditions are now quite different. Then they had a rifle of high trajectory and with which it was very difficult to make good shooting. Now we have a rifle with a very flat trajectory and with which it is not near so difficult to shoot well. Then it was necessary to pay special attention to individual shooting to get any hits at all, whereas now all individuals shoot so much better, owing to the increased power and efficiency of the weapon, that we should well afford to devote much of our attention to collective firing and firing under more service-like conditions—in other words to move on from the “A.B.C.” stage of rifle shooting to a higher form of training. I think you all follow me in this. I am finding no fault with the individual, but simply that I think we should progress and move on as we can to higher and more advanced stages of tuition in rifle practice. I presume many of you have read the accounts of the United States war in Cuba. Any who have not read Richard Harding Davis’ accounts should do so, for they throw much light upon the campaign, and from them you can see that the American soldiers won their victories just as the Boers did—because they could shoot well. What we desire is not to create a few expert shots in each regiment, but to leaven the whole mass as much as possible, and to increase the number of average fair shots and their ability to be controlled and directed by their Officers and N.C.O’s. A goodly number of average shots amenable to control is ever so much better for military purpose, than a few expert marksmen, excellent as individuals but comparatively useless collectively. I do wish to mention, Mr. President, the great pleasure I feel at the way in which my suggestions have been received, and I feel I cannot do better than leave them in the hands of the Council, knowing they will do all they can in their own way and the best way they can to give effect to them in time. We are told most things come through a process of evolution. You all know that Darwin has made that theory famous. In the same way improvements in rifle shooting can-

not, I suppose, be expected all at once, but must be gradual. I confidently anticipate that the commencement of the forward movement will not be long delayed.

Sir Charles Tupper, as a result of his long experience in London as the official representative of Canada, said there was nothing more important sent over to the old country than the Bisley Team. He was quite right. It is representative both from Canada and to the British Public and does a double good. In the old country we are apt to forget our comrades in the Colonies, but when we hear they have won such and such a match their name is in everyone's mouth, and the people are proud to know that their own kith and kin can come over and beat their best in these friendly contests. The representation at the Jubilee did a great deal of good and I hope within two years to have a Canadian Team for the Agricultural Hall and the Grand Military Tournaments held there. (Hear, hear.) There can be no question of the inestimable benefit of sending over teams to compete in these contests, and I trust we may be able to continue it.

The range you have now got at Rockliffe is an excellent one, and I think the very greatest benefits should accrue to the Force from its acquisition. I am in hopes of utilizing it for a rendezvous or training ground for a body of our troops this Summer, and hope to eventually turn it into a sort of modified Hythe for the Canadian Militia. I hope to have a number of Officers and Men here during the Summer to take a course in our modified Hythe, and I am quite sure this will be to the advantage of the Militia as a whole, as well as to the individuals selected for the course. I know very well the difficulties which our Force has in getting proper rifle ranges, long distances, &c., and so for this year hope to do the most of the musketry training with Morris tubes. This is much better than nothing, and will ensure a certain amount of training in the positions, holding the rifle, aiming, &c. I hope in addition to have a certain amount of firing done in the attack formation at regular targets, and in this way we will have this year the whole of the Militia of Canada put through a certain amount of training in the practical handling of the rifle. This will be more than they have in the Old Country, where the musketry training of the Militia and Volunteers is by no means in a satisfactory condition, as may be seen by the last reports.

I propose to give a prize for competition at 500 yards with disappearing targets, and I am sure you will all find the practice most valuable and interesting. I hope in time the D. R. A. will have competitions for our Mounted Branches and the Cavalry, as was done in Australia, and more matches at unknown distances. These are really the true tests of good marksmanship.

In conclusion I can only say that I am very much obliged indeed, gentlemen, for the way in which my name has been received and for the kind words of congratulation you have tendered me. I thank you indeed very much as the Head of a Force of which we nearly all here are part. (Applause.)

Colonel Gibson feelingly referred to the loss sustained by the Association in the death of the late Colonel Panet, Deputy Minister of Militia, and to the retirement of Colonel Walker Powell.

His Excellency The Governor General : I rise to propose that Lieut.-Colonel Gibson be re-elected President of the Dominion Rifle Association for the ensuing year. (Applause.) Everyone knows the great interest he has taken in the D. R. A. and we have all listened with great interest indeed to the remarks he has made to-day and know he will be as great a success in the future as he has been in the past. (Applause.) Carried unanimously.

Lieut.-Colonel Gibson: I did think I might be relieved this year. In former years one Governor General ordered me to go in command of the Wimbledon Team and now another Governor General virtually orders me to re-take the responsibilities as President of this Association. (Laughter.) I do not intend to be guilty of disobedience. I remember I was taught the impropriety of that very early in my career as a soldier. At the same time I will admit I did feel an ambition to put in another year upon the new ranges before making my bow. (Hear, hear, and applause.)

Moved by Lieut.-Colonel S. Hughes, M. P., seconded by Lieut.-Colonel W. P. Anderson:

“That Section 4 of the Constitution be amended by striking out all the words in the Section, after and including the words ‘The winner of such medal,’ in the sixth line thereof.” (Carried.)

**Minutes of Meeting of the Council of the Dominion Rifle Association,
held pursuant to Notice at the Office of the Association, on
Saturday, the 25th of February, 1889, at 2 o'clock p.m.**

The Minutes of the Meeting of the 9th of June were read and confirmed.

The correspondence between the General Officer commanding and Lt.-Col. Hon. J. M. Gibson, M.P.P., President of the Association, on the subject of the

improvement in Rifle Shooting and Rifle Practice in Canada as indicated in the letter of Major-General Hutton, C.B., A.D.C., was presented, and having been received a discussion ensued thereon, when it was decided that the correspondence should be considered by the Council, and the same having been considered and discussed, Lt.-Col. S. Hughes, M.P., moved, and Major Blaiklock seconded the following resolution:

“ That upon a careful consideration of the letter of the General Officer Commanding to the President of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, and his reply thereto, this Council desires to record its appreciation, of the great interest manifested in the Dominion Rifle Association by the Major-General Commanding, endorses the reply thereto by the President of this association, and has pleasure in stating that some of the various suggestions after being carefully considered, have been adopted by the Association, and that the remainder be referred to a special Committee composed of Lt.-Colonels Tilton, Anderson, Starke, Hodgins, Major J.J. Mason, and the mover and seconder, to report upon the same to the incoming Council.—Carried.

The draft Report of Council was then taken up, and considered clause by clause, and after amendments and changes made therein, was adopted, and ordered to be printed.

Lieut.-Colonel S. Hughes, M.P., gave notice of his motion for amending the clause in the Constitution, having in view the abolition of the privilege of free entry in the Dominion of Canada and Minister of Militia's Matches of the Association, to winners of the D. R. A. Silver Medals, the motion to be considered at the ensuing Annual Meeting in April next.

The application of Colonel Eustace Balfour, Commanding the London Scottish Rifles, for permission to use the Canadian Bisley Building, submitted through letters from the Secretary of His Excellency the Governor General and the Right Honourable Lord Strathcona, was submitted.

Moved by Lt.-Col. Tilton, seconded by Lt.-Col. Wm. White, C.M.G.,

“ That the application of Lt.-Col. Balfour of the London Scottish Rifles for permission to occupy the Canadian Building at Bisley during the coming Easter Holidays, be granted upon such terms and conditions as the Bisley Building Committee may deem expedient.—Carried.

The Secretary was instructed to notify Major Drummond, the Secretary of His Excellency the Governor General, and the Rt. Hon. Lord Strathcona that the necessary permission had been granted and that the terms and conditions as to the occupancy would be communicated to Col. Balfour through the Secretary of the National Rifle Association.

The letters of Major-General Hutton, C.B., A.D.C., of the 5th January and 23rd of February, with respect to the employment of the Officers, N.C.O. and men of the Royal Regt. of Canadian Infantry, for duty in connection with the

ensuing Prize Meeting of the Association, were submitted and considered. It was decided that the Chairman of the Executive Committee should confer with the Major-General commanding with reference to such employment and as to the number to be employed and the remuneration to be paid therefor.

A discussion ensued as to the disposal to be made of the Clark-Kennedy Cup, which had been won by Sergt. Broadhurst, of the 5th Royal Scots, at the last Bisley Prize Meeting. It was decided that the cup should be transferred to the custody of Lt.-Col. Ibbotson, commanding the 5th Royal Scots, upon his becoming responsible for the cup, and for its return to the National Rifle Association.

The following resolution having reference to the death of Mr. R. W. Jameson, M.P., one of the members of Council for the Province of Manitoba, was then submitted.

Moved by Lt.-Col. S. Hughes, M.P., and seconded by Mr. H. Bostock, M.P., that the Council of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association deeply regret the loss they have sustained by the sudden death of R. W. Jameson, Esq., M.P., and desire to express their sincere sympathy with his wife and family in their grief and bereavement.—Carried.

The Minutes of the Meeting held on the 27th May last, were read and confirmed.

Col. Tilton, Chairman of the Executive Committee, having stated to the Meeting the terms of the provisional arrangements made with the Hon. the Minister of Militia and Defence, under which the building for a caretaker's residence and offices of the Association, was recently erected at Rockliffe Rifle Range, and having also submitted copies of the Reports of the Chief Engineer of the Militia Department (approved by the Minister) with reference thereto (for copies see appendices A., B. and C.,) and which reports embody the terms of the provisional arrangement referred to.

It was on motion of Major F. S. MacKay, seconded by Lt.-Col. Burland, resolved: That the Council of the Dominion Rifle Association do approve of the

arrangement as set forth in the Engineer's Report, and to give effect thereto authorize the Treasurer to negotiate with the Ontario Bank a loan for such sum as will enable the Association to pay its share of the cost of the Building, viz., \$1,000, and also for the further sum of \$1,500, due under the second contract, which further sum the Minister of Militia and Defence has agreed to pay to the Dominion Rifle Association so soon as he can obtain the requisite Parliamentary sanction therefor.

Lt.-Col. Anderson spoke of the necessity of providing an additional building so as to give accommodation to the N.C.O's. and men attending the Prize Meeting, such building to be furnished with Lockers for Rifles, etc., which could be rented and thus produce a yearly revenue, and a discussion ensued thereon, when it was moved by Lt.-Col. Starke, seconded by Lt.-Col. Burland, that a sub-committee consisting of Lieutenant-Colonels Tilton, Anderson and Sherwood be appointed to consider the question of the erection of such building, to procure plans for same and estimates of the cost of construction, and to report thereon at the next meeting of the Council.—Carried.

The Treasurer presented a statement showing the Receipts and Expenditure up to, and including the Prize Meeting, and also a statement of outstanding and unsettled accounts against the Association.

Moved by Lt.-Col. Starke, seconded by Lt.-Col. Ibbotson, that the Treasurer be authorized to effect a loan with the Ontario Bank, for a sum not to exceed one thousand dollars, to pay off the liabilities of the Association accrued, and to be incurred up to the end of the association's year.—Carried.

The question of the extension of the Ottawa Electric Railway to the Ranges was brought up by Lt.-Col. Tilton and discussed by the Council.

Moved by Lt.-Col. Starke, seconded by Major MacKay, that the members of Council resident in Ottawa, together with the Secretary and Treasurer, be a sub-committee to confer with the Ottawa Electric Railway as to the terms and conditions upon which the Railway Co. would agree to operate their line to the Rockliffe Rifle Ranges.—Carried.

The matter of the charges made by the Allan Line in connection with bringing out the Hop Bitters Prize won at Bisley by Surg.-Lt. Bertram was brought up by Lt.-Col. Tilton, who read a letter from Messrs. H. & A. Allan. The meeting decided to leave the matter in the hands of Lt.-Col. Tilton to procure, if possible, a rebate from the Allan Line.

Col. Tilton read a letter from Lt.-Col. H. H. McLean, late commanding the Bisley Team, as to the expenditure on the Bisley Building for flowers, and submitting a tender for the supply of the necessary flowers and for the planting of a hedge about the Building. It was decided that the tenders should be accepted and the work mentioned therein undertaken.

**Minutes of Competitors' Meeting, held at the Drill Hall, Ottawa,
29th September, 1899, at 8.30 p.m.**

Present—Lt.-Col. Hon. J. M. Gibson, President of the D.R.A.; Lt.-Col. Tilton, R.O.; Lt.-Col. Hood, R.O.; Lt.-Col. Bruce, 10th R.G.; Lt.-Col. Lt.-Col. Gibson was unanimously moved to the chair, which he took, and spoke as follows :—

Fellow riflemen and comrades, I appreciate the courtesy which prompts you to place me in the chair at what is distinctly known as your own meeting—the “kicker’s meeting” as it is called,—though from the comparatively small attendance here to-night, I would infer that there is nothing very much and nothing very serious anyhow for you to “kick” about. First of all, as an old rifleman, I must congratulate you all upon the progress we have been making, and upon the very excellent range which we have now secured for our annual meetings. I am sure you all must be delighted to have such a fine range, giving promise as it does of perfect arrangements in a few years. Much has been done to make them as suitable as possible, and I have no doubt that much that is absent this year, and which conduces to the comfort and convenience of competitors, will be done before another meeting, when I believe very little will be found fault with, even by the most exacting. I would like to say here, and I do it most freely and loyally, for the gentleman to whom I wish to refer is not here yet. I wish to say that the Association is under a debt of great gratitude to Lt.-Col. Tilton, Chairman of the Executive, for the work he has done in putting our new ranges in such a position as we find them now. Colonel Tilton has put in almost all his time during the past Summer in looking after these details, and I do not know what we would have done without him. With him it has all been a labour of love, and he has consistently taken as much interest in these affairs as if they were his own private business. I think the Association at large, as also every member of the Association must feel that with what Col. Tilton has done he is well pleased. He has done well, very well indeed. It is only fair for me also to say that the Militia Department has been very generous,—in the matter of ammunition, the grant towards the completion of our Bisley Building, and in every way contributing to the comfort and convenience of riflemen. I trust the Hon. Minister of Militia and Defence may be present with us before the end of the meeting, and that we may then have some opportunity of showing him our appreciation of what he has been able to do in connection with these new ranges. He has been indeed our friend, and we have had every proof of this in connection with the Bisley Building, rather an expensive structure, on Bisley Common. The Canadian Team is housed in a way almost to make other riflemen jealous. We have a building there which will be suitable for many years, and which is, I believe, an excellent advertisement for Canada. I do not know that I should say much more, having succeeded in filling up the time that has elapsed before the arrival of the Secretary (Lt.-Col. Hodgins), and also before Col. Tilton’s arrival, and I suppose I should sit down and let those here who have remarks to make or complaints to bring forward, do so without further delay. I am sure we will be glad to hear any complaint or grievance those present desire to bring before the meeting. I ought not, however, to sit down without anticipating frankly what has caused disappointment and annoyance. I refer to the ammunition (hear, hear.) It is the serious trouble of this meeting—there is no doubt about it. (Hear, hear.) I would like you to understand

that I have not been on the ground for two days without knowing about the ammunition. There is nothing more calculated to annoy and dishearten a competitor than to be served out with unreliable ammunition. It is enough to take the heart out of anybody, and in this case it is truly difficult to say what is the matter. Excellent scores have been made with Quebec made cartridges, and we are assured by the Department the make-up of the cartridge was first class, so that some other reason must have effected the trouble ; but when I asked if the storage could have effected it, I was answered by the gentleman in charge of the Government cartridge factory (Capt. Gaudet, R. C. A.), that he did not think this could have had any effect. Also the heat of the last few days have made one question if this could have caused the trouble, but I am told that although at times a certain degree of heat would have an effect, it was not thought the past few days' heat was sufficient to effect cordite. We know, however, that it was effected very greatly by some reason or other, to the detriment, I regret to say, to many of our best scorers. I need say nothing more, but possibly some of you may desire to say something or have some suggestions which we will be very glad to hear from you. (Applause.)

Lt.-Col. Hood, Reserve of Officers : I wish to say, before referring to the question referred to by our President, how much I regret to have to voice a complaint. I have been working with the D. R. A. for twenty years, and I keenly feel having to take this course, knowing quite well how faithfully the Executive has worked during all these years for the welfare of our Association. I think every man at this meeting must admit that to Lt.-Col. Tilton is due very largely the gratifying position we are in to-day, and the defects that have been apparent in the ammunition in use at the Rockliffe Ranges could not have been foreseen by the Executive Committee. I would wish to have this meeting pass off without a single complaint, and we all wish for an entirely successful meeting. So far as numbers go, I think it is a success. So far as the work upon the range goes, I think it is also a success ; but so far as concerns the ammunition which was put into the hands of competitors the past few days, it must be a matter of very grave disappointment and chagrin to Lt.-Col. Tilton, as it is to myself and many others. Of course many of us who fail to make scores like to lay the blame on the ammunition. This has been my experience for many years, but I had the honour of firing at the O. R. A. matches last week. There were, I think, 330 riflemen there, and we did a great deal of firing, not only in the regular matches, but also in the Extra Series, and I do not know of one single complaint registered with the Executive Officer, or any officer, on account of the ammunition. The ammunition used was wrapped as "1898" ammunition, and it was good ammunition undoubtedly. The ammunition given us the last two days is also wrapped as "1898," but I for one make bold to state it is not the same. (Hear, hear, and applause.) We have some 450 competitors at this meeting and I question that I do not know of a single man of that four hundred odd but what had a miss or misses on account of the ammunition. I dare say on an extremely hot day there would be some effect on the cordite, but we had the same heat at Toronto for one day and no difference was noticed. It has

Considering this, I would now recommend that the main building be constructed according to the contract, and that the extension for competitors' dining room and caretaker's quarters be built, the former not finished inside and the latter completely finished to make comfortable quarters for the winter. The extra cost for this will be \$1 500.00, the money to be advanced by the D.R.A.

It will cost \$350.00 more to sheet both sides of partitions in the Officers' dining room and hall. It would be well to do this also this year, making the total cost \$1,850.00.

CONSTITUTION.

ADOPTED AT ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, 1877.

Clause 4 amended at Annual Meeting, 1899.

1. That the Association be denominated "THE DOMINION OF CANADA RIFLE ASSOCIATION."

2. Any person being a subscriber of \$2.00, and paying the same before the first day of September, or the second day of the Annual Prize Meeting, shall become a member of the Association for the current Association year, and any member may continue his membership by the annual payment of \$2.00.

Any person may become an Associate Member of the Association, for the current year, upon payment of the sum of \$1.00, and shall have the privilege of taking part in the annual matches, but shall not be entitled to vote at any meeting of the Association.

3. Donors of \$40.00 at one time to the funds of the Association, or of a prize of not less value, to be competed for at the Annual Prize Meeting, shall be entitled to be enrolled as Life Members of the Association, they having the full rights and privileges of ordinary members, and their names to be published in the Annual Report.

Donors of money or prizes in kind of Five Dollars value and upwards, but less than Forty Dollars, shall be entitled to be enrolled as members for the year in which they contribute to the Prize Fund, with rights and privileges of membership.

4. Any Provincial Rifle Association of the Dominion subscribing not less than \$25.00 annually, and any other Rifle Association of the Dominion subscribing not less than \$12.00 annually, to the funds of the Dominion Rifle Association, shall be considered as being in connection with it. Each Affiliating Association shall be entitled to receive a Silver Medal for competition by its *bona fide* members.

5. There shall be a Patron and Vice-Patrons, to be named by the Council.

The Governor General of the Dominion of Canada for the time being shall be respectfully requested to become "Patron."

6. There shall be a President, to be elected at the Annual Business Meeting of the Association.

7. There shall be a Vice-President for each Province, to be elected in the same manner as the President.

8. There shall be a Council of members of the Association, who shall be elected in the following proportions :—

Fourteen from Ontario, Ten from Quebec, Six from Nova Scotia, Six from New Brunswick, Four from Manitoba, Four from British Columbia, Four from Prince Edward Island, Two from each of the North West Territories, so soon as Associations are formed therein and affiliated with the Dominion Rifle Association, as Provincial Associations, one half in each to be elected at the Annual Business Meeting of the Dominion Association, the other half by the Provincial Associations of the respective Provinces at their Annual Meeting ; the names of those elected by the Provincial Associations to be notified to the Secretary of the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association on or before the day of the Annual Business Meeting each year. Six members of the Council shall form a quorum.

9. The Council shall at its first meeting choose from its own members the Chairman of the Council.

10. The Council shall annually elect at its first meeting an Executive Committee, consisting of fifteen (15) of its members, and in the event of a vacancy occurring therein during its term of office, the same may be filled up by the Executive Committee from the members of the Council. Five (5) to be a quorum. The President of the Association and Chairman of the Council shall be *ex-officio* members of the Executive Committee.

11. The Presidents of the various Provincial Associations in connection with the Association, and the District Officers commanding districts, *being members* of the Dominion Rifle Association, shall be *ex-officio* Vice-Presidents, and all Vice-Presidents shall be members of the Council.

12. There shall be a Secretary and a Treasurer at Ottawa, both to be appointed annually by the Council, and holding office during pleasure, who shall receive such compensation for their services as may be voted by the Council.

13. The Council shall have the arrangement of the income and funds of the Association, rendering an account to the yearly meeting, such account having been previously audited by a person or persons, not members of the Council, who shall be annually named by the Council for that purpose. The Council shall also have the entire management and superintendence of all affairs and concerns of the Association, and shall or may do all such acts and deeds as shall appear to them necessary or essential to be done for the purpose of carrying into effect the object and views of the Association.

14. The Executive Committee shall give effect to such instructions as the Council may from time to time order, respecting the management of the affairs of the Association.

15. The Council may from time to time make such rules for their guidance as they deem necessary.

16. The Annual Prize Meeting shall be held in Ottawa, at such time and under such regulations as may be determined on by the Executive Committee, as to all points not previously decided upon by the Council ; and such Prize

Meeting of the Association shall be conducted by a Special Committee of five members, three to form a quorum, appointed by the Executive Committee, either from the Executive Committee or other members of the Council, with power of substitution by the Executive Committee from time to time as occasion may demand, and said Special Committee shall have power to hear and determine all matters arising at the meeting submitted for their consideration, and their decision, or the decision of a majority of them, shall be final, conclusive and binding; but they, or a majority of them, may at their discretion refer any question to the Executive Committee, in which case the decision of the Executive Committee shall be final.

17. An Annual Report, embracing an audited account of the Finances, shall be drawn up by the Secretary, under the direction of the Council, and shall be published and sent to members of the Association at least one month previous to the Annual Business Meeting.

18. The Annual Business Meeting of the Members of the Association for the Election of Officers and the Council, and the transaction of other business, shall be held at Ottawa, on the third Wednesday after the assembling of the General Session of Parliament of the Dominion. At the close of such Annual Meeting or adjournment thereof, the Association year will terminate.

19. A General Meeting shall be held on the second day of the Annual Prize Meeting for the discussion of all matters that may be brought forward by any members or competitors attending the matches, but no changes in the Constitution shall be made except at the Annual Business Meeting.

20. No alteration in the Constitution shall be made except by a resolution duly passed at the Annual Business Meeting, or some adjournment thereof, and no such resolution shall be proposed unless a notice in writing of the terms of such resolution, signed by two members as proposer and seconder thereof, shall have been given to the Secretary one month previous to the Annual Business Meeting at which the same is to be proposed, and it shall be the duty of the Secretary to immediately notify all members of the Association of such proposed amendments.

21. The Council shall have power to fill any vacancy occasioned by death or resignation in their number, from among the members of the Association.

GENERAL BY-LAWS OF THE ASSOCIATION

ADOPTED AT

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING, 1877.

Amended 1881 and 1882.

Meetings of
Council.

There shall be two Ordinary Meetings of the Council. The first of which shall be held immediately after the Annual Business Meeting of the Association, and the second, on the first day of the Annual Prize Meeting.

Extraordinary
Meetings.

Extraordinary Meetings shall be summoned by the Secretary, if required by the Chairman, or by any four of the members of the Council, at such place as the Chairman may direct—notification being sent to each member of the Council at least fifteen days previous to such meeting—and the requisition for the meeting, and the notices to the members must state the object or objects of such Extraordinary Meeting

The Council to
keep minutes of
all proceedings.

The Council shall keep minutes of its proceedings at all meetings, which shall be entered in a book kept for that purpose by the Secretary, and open to inspection of any member of the Council.

Finance Com-
mittee.

There shall be a Finance Committee, consisting of three members of the Council, to be chosen at the first meeting.

Treasurer to
deposit sums
received in
Savings Bank.

The Treasurer shall deposit from time to time, in such chartered bank as the Finance Committee may direct, all sums of money received by him on behalf of the Association.

Expenditure of
sums for cur-
rent expenses.

All expenditure of sums for current expenses which may be required by the Secretary, must be authorized by the signature of the Chairman of the Executive Committee, or, in his absence, by some one of the Finance Committee, and the Treasurer shall pay all orders duly signed in such manner.

Expenditure of a
general nature.

Other expenditures of a general nature are to be made only upon the authority of the Council of the Association.

Annual
Accounts.

A detailed statement of all receipts and expenditures shall be rendered annually to the Council by the Treasurer, made up to and closed on the 30th November.

been stated by those who know that very large numbers of old shells have been filled at the factory at Quebec.

Major Blaiklock, 5th Royal Scots : Excuse me, Mr. President, but I would like to tell Colonel Hood that Capt. Gaudet states emphatically that no old shells were so re-filled.

Lt.-Col. Hood, R.O. : I can quite understand that Capt. Gaudet may not know of it, but I have a very good assurance that a large number of shells were re-filled. I am told old shells were re-filled, and the annoyance we have had on account of ammunition would certainly go towards bearing out this assurance rather than contradicting it. Now, I think the D. R. A. should stop experimenting with ammunition. We had a commission of enquiry upon the ammunition in the old days, both upon the Snider and Martini-Henry ammunition, and now we have bad ammunition for the new rifle, and more enquiry is urgently needed. I do not know what the D. R. A. intend to do or what the Executive should do, but I can say that there is very great discontent among competitors of all ranks. I for one would strongly recommend that hereafter competitors should be allowed to bring their ammunition with them. They would get the very best, and the onus of any trouble would then be upon the individual. Something must be done, for the position is most serious for competitors, the majority of whom come long distances and are under many sacrifices to attend, and they have a right to count on being provided with or being able to purchase ammunition that is reliable. If nothing is done I can assure the D. R. A. that they will not have as good a meeting next year, and this would be deplorable in the face of all the good work that has been done. (Hear, hear.)

Lt.-Col. Gibson : As I have already stated, the complaint about the quality of the ammunition is, I believe, well founded. Upon this I do not think we can get up any argument. We are all of one mind about it. (Hear, hear.)

Pte. W. E. Bennett, 43rd Bn. : It might be well, Mr. President, to hear from the Executive as to what steps were taken to obtain ammunition for this meeting.

Lt.-Col. Tilton, R.O. : I shall be very happy to state for the information of this meeting the precautions which were taken by the Executive to ensure that the ammunition used at this meeting should be perfect. Before doing so I would take the liberty of acknowledging the kind and appreciative references made by Col. Hood to my work for the Association. I really deserve little credit, because very little could have been done except for the co-operation of the Head of the Militia Department, the Hon. Dr. Borden, and as I see our friends of the press present, I wish publicly to state the obligation we are under to that gentleman for the work accomplished since we met here a year ago.

Colonel Hood has spoken of the disappointment of the Executive, in common with the competitors, about the ammunition furnished for the meeting. I can say for the Executive that we are more than disappointed. We are keenly and bitterly chagrined at the outcome, and I will state what was done by the Execu-

tive in their endeavour to make sure that the ammunition furnished would be of the best. We had observed the shooting at Rockliffe, both by the "43rd" and the "Guards" during the summer, when using what is known as the open-nosed bullet. Although some capital scores were made, a mishap occurred similar to that which was reported from Bisley. Dr. Courtenay, the esteemed surgeon of the 43rd Bn., had a bullet strip in the barrel and the nickel jacket or outer covering remained wedged in the grooves. I at once brought the matter to the notice of the Department, and urged that ammunition of this kind should not be issued, stating that we felt responsible for the safety of competitors so far as lay in our power to afford it, and were assured that the ammunition should be both safe and reliable. The Militia Department at once decided to have sent here a supply of "1898" ammunition which I had reason to believe was exceptionally good. It now seems that this ammunition, which we thought the best obtainable, is not as good as that of the present year, which was used in the league and class firing, and other shooting during the summer. Much as we regret this ammunition trouble—much as competitors regret it, the Head of the Department will regret it more—as no expense has been spared to fit the cartridge factory at Quebec with the best possible equipment. In conversation with the Superintendent of the factory (Capt. Gaudet), he frankly acknowledged he could not tell why the ammunition was bad, but we are not alone in this. Those of you who have followed the course of events at Bisley, know that similar trouble was experienced there on the first two days of the shooting, resulting in every round of the ammunition originally provided for the meeting being withdrawn. Col. Hood will doubtless remember that some years ago when 100,000 rounds were ordered through the War Office for the D. R. A. matches it was found imperfect and had to be reshipped to England. I think hereafter we should endeavour to have practical tests made before issuing ammunition for our matches. As to the question of heat affecting the cartridges, I do not think this likely. Capt. Gaudet is of the same opinion and also states that no used shells were re-filled.

As to Col. Hood's suggestion, viz., that competitors should supply their own ammunition, I think in the event of no remedy being found to ensure the supply of good cartridges, this course would surmount the difficulty and relieve the D. R. A. of a lot of responsibility. There is, however, a much larger phase of the matter to be considered by the authorities, because it is deplorable to consider that the Government should have in its arsenals ammunition unsafe to those who may have to use it. As regards our own meeting, however, the Executive has decided to wire Toronto to-night for a supply of ammunition to conclude our matches—50,000 rounds—which will be here to-morrow. We have also decided that competitors shall have the option of using Rifleite or Cordite, whichever they prefer. There is already sufficient Rifleite upon the grounds to shoot to-morrow's matches, if the riflemen prefer to use it. I can only say in conclusion that the Executive are most anxious to do all in their power to make this meeting of representative riflemen a success. I would like to know the feeling of the meeting with regard to the use of Rifleite.

Lt.-Col. Gibson : It is very gratifying, I am sure, to all of you to know that for to-morrow we will have a supply of that good ammunition from Toronto which gave such satisfaction at the Ontario Rifle meeting last month. It would be also well to hear about the Rifleite—whether it would be well to use that for the remainder of the meeting or give competitors their choice—the new ammunition from Toronto or Rifleite, individually, for the balance of the matches.

Pte. W. E. Bennett, 43rd Bn. : After hearing the explanation from the Chairman of the Executive about the obtaining of ammunition, I think the explanation most satisfactory. I may say that my business takes me through different parts of Canada and I thus have opportunities of testing ammunition at different points. In Toronto, where I was for about a month this summer, when the league matches were being shot, I found marksmen using "1899" ammunition and well satisfied. I brought some of the Toronto ammunition back with me to Ottawa and spoke to several local members of the D. R. A. about it. From the result of our Ottawa practices the hollow nosed bullet is considered to be unsafe and its use should be discontinued. I think we have two kinds of ammunition among the "1898" ammunition provided for our present meeting. We have "1898" ammunition proper and some of "1897" wrapped in "1898" packages. We found here that "1897" ammunition required an elevation of three minutes less than that of "1898," and upon one occasion when ammunition of these two years got mixed we had the same experience of uncertainty that is so prevalent at this meeting. Now, yesterday the experience was first a high shot and then a very low one with same elevation and sighting, or vice versa, just as it was when we had the "'97" and "'98" ammunition mixed. Many others have told me their experience was similar. Lt. Robertson, of the "77th," one of our very best shots, had the same experience, and I cannot help thinking that what is given to us labelled "1898" ammunition, is not ammunition of that year's make at all. The solution of the difficulty seems to me to allow competitors to use their own ammunition, bought and provided by themselves. It is well known to most of the riflemen that there are several competitors attending the meetings here who do bring their own ammunition and use it in the matches. I was told to do so for this meeting, but was so well satisfied with the 1898 ammunition at Toronto, which I thought would be used here likewise, that I would not do so.

Major J. T. Hartt, R.O. : I would like to say, sir, that I do not believe it is a fact "known to most of the riflemen," that men do bring their own ammunition and use it on the range. and I think if any rifleman does know of such being done he should notify those in authority in the proper way—right on the range when he becomes aware of such irregularity and not wait to speak of it here in a vague, general way.

Pte. W. E. Bennett : Well, I had heard of such being done and I am quite sure others have done so too.

Lt.-Col. Gibson : I think that matter was a source of great complaint some little time ago, but I was not at all aware that such was done now. Of course it is very tempting to smuggle in a little safe ammunition when one can get it, and when the ammunition in use has been found to be very bad. Still, even if there is uncertainty about ammunition, it should be the same for all, there should be no handicapping by some having a better ammunition, unless all have the same facility to obtain those better cartridges.

Major Dunbar, 8th R.R. : I am sure we can all speak enthusiastically of the new range, and I do not think anyone can blame the Executive in any way. Our ammunition at the various Provincial meetings was good, but we should always remember it is just as difficult to get good ammunition as it is to get good riflemen. The hang-fire seems to give a good deal of trouble, but we found out at Toronto if we held on just a trifle longer, we could score all right. I think the best way to get over the difficulty of unsatisfactory ammunition is for each man to be permitted to get his own. Any man can now very easily substitute ammunition if he desires to do so.

Major Helmer, 43rd O. & C. Rifles : I think, Mr. President, that a very serious case indeed has been made out, viz :—that ammunition has been provided wrapped in old wrappers and not of the make competitors are led to believe it is ; and I consider it looks even worse from the fact that the Government are giving us free ammunition. One is apt to think they are giving us poor stuff on that account, unloading on us, as it were, because it is not paid for. But though one naturally thinks this, I cannot believe that the Department is palming off on us an old make of ammunition in new wrappers; this would be a very mean thing to do and I cannot believe it is done. If wanting to unload, the Government could surely find some other way of doing it than upon competitors at the D.R.A. Meeting. (Hear, hear.)

Lt.-Col. Gibson : I do not believe any of the Officials of the Militia Department would countenance "unloading" as was mentioned. I do not for a minute think the Department would desire to do such a thing, and because they give us free ammunition it is unfair to conclude they desire to get off with as cheap a gift as possible, even at the risk of safety and reliability in the ammunition furnished. I quite agree that the matter should be investigated—it is of supreme importance, both to the Department and the whole Militia, and if anyone thinks it is looked upon by the heads of the Department as of trifling importance he is indeed very much mistaken. I am sure the whole matter will be the subject of very grave concern and careful investigation, and if there has been any breach of rules or orders in regard to the wrapping up and packing of the cartridges, the parties so responsible will not go unpunished. I am very sure the whole matter will be most carefully looked into.

Staff-Sgt. Hayhurst, 13th Bn., (G.M.) : The ammunition trouble is of course the real big trouble of this meeting, and I cannot help thinking that some of the

makes of "1897" and "1898" must in some way have got mixed, for any rifleman knows that from the variation in elevation of shots from different packets and even from the same packet this year, that the ammunition is not of uniform make. There is a difference to be noticed in the wrapping of the cartridges, and I have been told that packets with a brick red lettering are more reliable than those with a brighter red, all of the same year. It seems to me there ought not to be such a difference in Government made ammunition and more particularly any difference in the mode of marking for a make of any one year.

Pte. Deuchars, 43rd Bn. O. & C. Rifles: Might I ask, sir, why there is this difference in the marking of the wrappers for "98" ammunition?

Major Blaiklock, 5th Royal Scots: It is quite true, there is a difference in the marking, and I asked Major Gaudet how this came about, and he told me that the red ink ordered for lettering the wrappers was not as they desired it when received, but to obviate delay in waiting for the right kind, they went on using the first, or brick red color. They afterwards got the scarlet color and used it instead of the brick red.

Pte. W. E. Bennett, 43rd Bn. O. & C. Rifles: I have noticed that there was a good deal of difference between one color of ammunition and the other.

Capt. Sutherland, 43rd Bn.: I would like to propose that Rifleite be used at the option of competitors for the remainder of the meeting.

Lt.-Col. Tilton: We have 20,000 rounds here to shoot the Rifleite competition with, and there are 50,000 rounds in the country, should competitors desire it.

Lt.-Col. Gibson having to leave at this stage of the meeting, Lt.-Col. Tilton took the chair.

Major Helmer, 43rd Bn.: At Bisley this year Rifleite won 75 per cent. of the prizes.

Lt.-Col. Tilton: That is indeed a very emphatic and practical test. The Match Committee will take up the matter in the morning, but it is too late now to arrange for its use in the first match to-morrow. There are 50,000 rounds of Rifleite at Quebec and it can be brought here by express if needed.

Pte. W. E. Bennett, 43rd Bn.: I would like to speak about the marking. The marking as a whole has been very bad, and on target 28 particularly so. Pte. Byers and myself were treated villainously. Major Sankey, the Range Officer, can testify to the execrable marking on this target. Why, we had not only to challenge the target down, but had to challenge again to get it up. It was very bad marking.

Pte. Quinney, 43rd Bn.: And on target 34, Colonel, the marking was very bad.

Lt.-Col. Bruce, 10th R. G.: Well, I can only say I fired on target 34 and it was the best marking I ever had none. (Laughter.)

Pte. W. E. Bennett, 43rd Bn.: I think if you will look it up you will find the good marking was done by local men and not by the men of the permanent corps.

Lt.-Col. Tilton: Not at all. I understand from Capt. Aumond, in charge of the butts, that the marking has been well done by the men of the "Royal Regiment." They have proved willing workers and are doing well. To-day the officer in charge reported that the marking was well done.

Pte. Quinney, 43rd Bn.: I know better than Capt. Aumond and know these men are not marking well. They went down unwilling in the first place, and only because they were ordered to do so. They are not interested in their work, and the competitors as a whole are consequently suffering, and it is more bad marking than bad ammunition that is the trouble with this meeting.

Lt.-Col. Tilton: I consider that the officer in charge should know how his men work. It is true there was a little dissatisfaction among these men at first, but there was dissatisfaction last year with our local men who took us by the throat at the last minute, as you all remember, for 50 cents more per day. The Executive were determined to try another plan this year, and I contend it has worked out fairly well.

Capt. Curran, 12th Bn.: I think it was a good idea to get these men, especially after the experience of last year, but I am told they only get 75c. per day in addition to their soldier's daily pay. They have long hours, it is most tedious work and very trying on the eyes, and I consider 75c. is ridiculously small pay for such work. I am sure none of us would be willing to do it, nor could we enthuse much on such emolument. I believe if men are paid decently they will always work satisfactorily. I hope the Association will treat these men generously.

Lt.-Col. Tilton: I might explain that after the experience of last year when the markers on the first day demanded an increase of 50c. per day before they would put up a single target, the Executive determined they would do their best to prevent a similar repetition this year. Knowing of the intended concentration of the "Royal Regiment of Canadian Infantry" at Rockcliffe, it was suggested and approved of by the General Officer Commanding, that the services of men of the Regiment be secured as markers. The Secretary therefore made requisition upon the Officer Commanding the Royal Regiment for the number of men required and the D.R.A. will pay them such remuneration as is approved by the General Officer Commanding. I think you will find we will pay them fairly for their work.

Staff-Sgt Hayhurst, 13th Bn. (G.M.): I am glad to hear the Chairman say these markers will be paid fairly. I sympathize very much with them. They have a long day and very trying work. It is very hard indeed.

Pte. W. E. Bennett, 43rd Bn.: Might I ask here if the Match Committee have taken any action upon my protest?

Major Blaiklock, 5th R.S.. As Chairman of the Match Committee I might say we received a protest from Pte. Bennett, but there was no report of any Range Officer, and no information accompanying the protest upon which we could act. All we could make out was that you were not getting the worth of your money.

Pte. W. E. Bennett, 43rd Bn.: Then you are not up to your duty !

Major Blaiklock, 5th R.S : I thank you.

The Chairman then declared the meeting adjourned at 10.15 p.m.

Sir:—With reference to the proposed building to be erected at the Rockcliffe Rifle Range for the Dominion Rifle Association and Cartaker's quarters.

I have the honour to report that there is a proposition before me from the Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Dominion Rifle Association as follows :

They agree to erect the building, a plan of which is attached under my supervision, and provide quarters in it for a caretaker, and also to give the sum of \$1,000 towards the erection, provided the Department of Militia and Defence give \$2,000, which sum is now in the estimates for caretaker's quarters.

The building is to be handed over to the Department on completion, or before, as may be desired.

The building shown on the plan herewith can be erected and shingled outside, but only partially finished inside this year for the sum of \$3,000. It will cost in the neighbourhood of \$1,500 to complete the building another year.
