

Growing Feeling Against Germany in Turkey The Food Shortage in Berlin is Very Serious Austrians Claim Success Against the Italians

ANGER AGAINST THE GERMANS IS GROWING IN THE TURKISH ARMY AND AMONG THE WHOLE PEOPLE

Field Marshal Von Der Goltz Did Not Die a Natural Death—Another General Was Assassinated and Efforts Have Been Made to Poison Enver Pasha—German Soldiers are Standing Guard at Constantinople.

ERZERUM LOSSES HEAVY

By Special Wire to the Courier.
New York, May 22.—A special cable to The World from Bucharest, via London, says:

A high Turkish official, who has arrived in Bucharest from Constantinople says:

"Anger against the Germans, Enver Pasha, Minister of War, and Talaat Bey, Minister of the Interior, is growing in the Turkish army and among the people.

"Field Marshal Baron Von Der Goltz did not die a natural death, as was reported, but was assassinated in Bagdad by a Turkish staff officer, Hikmet Bey, who was shot by a German officer.

"General Von Blume, a commander of cavalry, was assassinated by a Turkish officer after the Russians took Trebizond. Several other German officers have been killed in Constantinople.

"An attempt to poison Enver Pasha was made recently in the Turkish capital.

A CONSPIRACY.
"An extensive anti-German conspiracy was discovered in Constantinople lately. Ahmed Riza Bey, the Sultan's son-in-law; Shikri Pasha, a former minister; Khelousi Bey, Gon-

cuiz Nadi Bey, several high officials of the army, and influential members of the Young Turk committee on national defence were arrested.

"Some were exiled and imprisoned in the fortress at Sinope, Asia Minor; others were hanged and shot.

"The conspirators had distributed a manifesto throughout the army calling on the soldiers to turn their arms against the country's internal enemies. Enver Pasha and Talaat Bey, who have sold Turkey to the Germans.

"German soldiers are guarding the Supreme Palace (state and foreign ministries) and other official quarters.

THE KAISER'S PROMISE
"After the fall of Trebizond the Kaiser telegraphed to the Sultan promising 100,000 German soldiers to fight side by side with the Turks.

"General Liman Von Sanders and Enver Pasha are on the Caucasian front trying to organize an army of 400,000 against the Russians.

"The committee of Union is divided into factions. The Grand Vizier, Said Halim Pasha, Medhat, Shikri Bey and Reckid Bey lead the party opposed to the government.

"The Turkish losses on the Caucasian front amount to more than 200,000. The Russians have taken 40,000 prisoners. Besides, 50,000 soldiers there have succumbed to epidemic diseases.

CASUALTY LIST OF LAST WEEK

Over 9,000, and of Those Over 1,600 Were Killed.

New York, May 22.—A London despatch to the Sun, under yesterday's date says:

To-day's official casualty list, covering the losses in killed, sick, wounded and missing on all British fronts during the last week, gives the number of officers as 306, of whom 79 were killed, and that of men as 8,797, of whom 1,547 were killed.

This makes the week's total number of casualties 9,097, of whom 1,626 were killed.

HAVE CARRIED PEAK OF THE ARMENTARA

Austrian Official Report Claims Capture of 3,000 Italians.

Berlin, May 22.—via Sayville wireless)—Austro-Hungarian troops have carried the peak of Armentara ridge, the scene of some of the heaviest fighting in the recently inaugurated offensive along the southern front.

This announcement is made in the official Austrian report of May 22, which states that a violent cannonade was heard last night and that more than 3,000 Italians were captured on Saturday by the Austrians, who also obtained possession of several villages. They took 25 cannon and 85 machine guns, the statement says.

A SEA BATTLE

THINGS GOING FROM BAD TO WORSE IN BERLIN IN THE MATTER OF GETTING FOOD

For Several Day the Capital of Prussia Has Gone Without Sausages—The Butter Ration Will be Reduced—New Dictatorship Scheme.

London, May 22.—(New York Daily Telegraph from Rotterdam says:

"In Berlin things are going from bad to worse in the matter of food. Fresh meat has been almost unobtainable, and it is now disclosed that for some days the capital has been without sausages. From to-morrow, the butter ration will be reduced to 40 grams, less than a fifth of a pound per head per week. For his amount the city council has fixed the price at 12 cents. It was only a few weeks ago that the ration was fixed at a quarter of a pound, and assurances were given that the supplies were adequate to meet this demand.

"The council now admits that this was not the case. They repeat the assurance, so far as the new ration of 40 grams is concerned, but the people are skeptical. For several weeks thousands of housewives, after waiting hours outside shops were unable to obtain a single ounce. "As regards meat, the same authorities intimated that the minimum amount was liable to be varied each week.

In the future this foreshadows a reduction also of the meat ration. Again, the admission is being made that the council was wrong in its assurances that supplies in hand were large enough to provide everybody with the legalized minimum of meat. "As a part of the new dictatorship scheme, Berlin will be divided into four districts, each containing sixty butcher shops. Responsible for each group will be two master butchers, assisted by a government official and one veterinary surgeon. To each group will be allotted a certain number of cattle, and the head of every family in Berlin has each week to order what his requirements will be in the succeeding seven days."

HAVE WITHDRAWN FROM ALBANIA

Austrian Forces Find Difficulty in Getting Up Supplies.

Paris, May 22.—A neutral diplomat, who has just returned from Albania is quoted in a despatch to The Matin from Athens as saying that the Austrians have withdrawn 50,000 troops from Albania in the last three weeks. According to this diplomat the Austrians have left only small detachments to guard the towns they have occupied, leaving a garrison of 300 at Fiera and 600 at Berat. The remainder of the troops left in the country are concentrated at Durazzo.

The abandonment of the Albanian front is said to be due to the impossibility of bringing up supplies.

The statement that the Austrians are withdrawing their main forces from Albania apparently conflicts with recent dispatches from Athens and Paris, which stated that the Teutons were about to launch an attack in force against Avlona, the only town that remains in the possession of the Italians. On May 19th the Austrians were reported to have assembled a fleet of 150 transports at Fiume to transport troops and supplies to Durazzo.

The block houses in Avocourt wood were abandoned by the Germans. East of the Meuse, infantry fighting occurred at the Haudremont quarries, captured yesterday by the French. The Germans attacked these positions and the statement asserts were repulsed with heavy loss.

Battle of Verdun Enters on its Fourth Month

Longest and Most Bitterly Contested Struggle of the War

Paris, May 22.—The battle of Verdun, the longest and most bitterly contested individual struggle of the war, enters on its fourth month today. The Germans, with characteristic stubbornness and patience, are hammering at Dead Man Hill, where the most furious and bloody fighting of the three months' conflict has taken place. Clinging desperately to the trenches that have been wrested from the French on the lower slopes of the hill, the Teutons have hurled 60,000 men backed by sixty batteries of guns of all calibres, forward along a seven mile front from Avocourt wood to the Meuse in a desperate effort to seize the coveted summit.

As has been usual in this war when either side launched a well prepared and strongly delivered offensive, the Germans have succeeded in gaining a foothold in the French first line at a cost of severe losses. However, judging from the experience of the past, it will not be a difficult task for the French to dislodge them before they

are able to follow up their advantage. Both sides will then return to their former positions to await another offensive.

That the Germans must continue their tremendous onslaught on Dead Man Hill or abandon the idea of taking Verdun seems obvious. This blood-soaked summit and its sister eminence, Hill No. 304, forms the key of the whole system of Verdun's defenses. The fire from their batteries flanks the Douaumont plateau across the river. Without the undisputed possession of this plateau, military critics agree that no attack on Verdun has any chance of success.

Just where he went, and how he got there, is more or less of a mystery.

into the square, almost invariably with a batch of German prisoners! His arrival at headquarters was the event of the day. Every one in sight would come rushing forward to see what sort of game he had bagged. From the stories that followed these exploits, he must have taken his car right into the German lines—a feat which was as dangerous as you please, but not literally impossible.

Few people seem to realize that many of the highways leading cross-country and connecting the hostile lines had not then been destroyed. They were fearfully guarded by barbed wire barricades, and their surface was torn and pitted by shell holes; but neither side was willing to eliminate a means of communication which would be of vast value in case of an advance.

His car would come back looking as though it had been through a thousand years of war, but the occupants were generally safe and sound, and, as I say, they had things to show that they had given the Germans cause to regret receiving a visit from Commander Sampson. So far as I am aware, no one has yet come forward to claim that reward of twenty thousand marks.

These are the roads that Commander Sampson must have used on his swift trips of destruction. On the front of his car was a formidable arrangement of upright scythe-like wire cutters, strong enough to rip through the entanglements and bunt the wooden supporting posts out of the way; and with these, backed by the momentum of the ponderous car, he forced his way on steel studded tires through barbed wire and shot and shell, and accomplished the impossible—not once, but again and again.

The Situation.

Russian troops have joined the British in Mesopotamia. Members of the Czars cavalry made the junction, and they are stated to be merely the advance guards of some strong forces. Thus once more the bear, whom the Hungs thought they had licked, looms large on another portion of the war horizon. Highly important developments may be expected on the Tigris from this out.

The battle of Verdun, the most long continued and persistent in all history still proceeds without any abatement. The Germans of necessity, must get Dead Man Hill and Hill 304 if they are to accomplish any definite results and to this end they are spending men and material with undiminished prodigality. Up to date they have not recorded anything but fringe successes. The outcome may still be classed as a matter of uncertainty.

The Kaiser is in Berlin, straightening out Ministerial matters. Some heads are slated for the basket in connection with the food crisis and what the Emperor regards as inadequate steps for conservation.

The Exit of Laurier.

The feeling seems to be quite general in well-informed circles that Sir Wilfrid Laurier has tired of public life. He has had a very long spell of it, and the indications point to the fact that in his old years he is not averse to having another take the reins. His recent course with reference to the bi-lingual issue serves to strengthen this idea. He knew that his action would alienate all his Western followers, which it did, and his one idea seems to have been to make a prominent stand on behalf of a Quebec agitation, (wholly unwarranted) as against the rest of the Dominion. In this he was followed into the lobby by several other Liberal members, who have thereby rightly jeopardized their seats. It is not conceivable that he would have taken such a step unless he felt reckless as to the consequences.

Matters have reached such a stage as far as the party is concerned, that it was current talk in Ottawa before the session ended, that a caucus of some of the leaders was held with reference to a new chief. The names of Graham and Oliver are said to have been submitted without meeting with the approval of the majority, and that of Lemieux secured a majority, but developed too strong a minority to make him a possibility. Wesley Rowell, the Opposition leader in the Ontario House, is now said to be under consideration.

Exit the Free Trade Fetish.

One of the many things hit by the war is the Free Trade idol so long worshipped in the Old Land. The London Times on a recent occasion, in discussing the matter, said:—

"This question of trade policy is not only, or even mainly, a material question, though it is foolish to underestimate its material side. Our dependence on supplies from Germany, revealed in a flash by the war, touches our national pride as much as it affects our pockets. It is bad enough to realize that German prosperity has been largely built up at our expense, so that we have helped to pay for the ships and guns and munitions which were all the time designed to be used for our destruction. It is far worse to know that, while our trade system thus helps to aggrandize the enemy, it has also starved our kinsmen and our friends. We have been culpably lax in the past about the development of our own resources, content to buy in the cheapest market, contemptuously intolerant of 'sentimental' considerations in connection with trade questions. But we are satisfied that our people as a whole, both in England and in the Dominions, are determined to have done with it. They have determined, that the end of this war shall see, not only the downfall of Prussian military power, but of the insidious and intolerable influence which had in very many cases reached a point where Germany actually dominated the trade, not only of this Empire, but that of our Allies."

For very many years "Made in Germany" goods have flooded the British Isles.

Preferential trade within the Empire—and now with the Allies added—is no longer regarded in any quarter as a dream but an actual and a vital necessity.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Application to be made in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district in which the land is situated. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 80 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent is secured. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$20 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years after purchase. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in certain sections by or under land.
