## WAR IS ON.

All is not well in the ranks of the elect. The tempest that long has been brewing has at length broken loose. J. W. Willison, until within a short time ago cruwn timber agent, has turned the vials of his wrath less upon thetibiberal pary and incidentally upon the head of the commissioner of the Yukon territory
Thare is no doubt of Mr. Willision's earnestness, and what is still more to the point, there is little doubt as to the truth of a great deal of what he has to say.
"I am a man," says Mr. Willison, who is thoroughly disgusted with the Liberal party and their miserable attempts at reform in this country.
THE LIBERAL PARTY HAS LOST ONE SUPPORTER AND ONE VOTER IN ME. I am a miner, and as such I despise Mr. Ogilvie and his policy."
Thus it will le seen that open rebel dion has at length begun against the party and the men who have labored so assiduously during the past two years to throttle the Yukon territory in its very infancy.
Twelve months ago the excuse was offered, if excuse it may be tèrmed, that the government at Ottawa had been ill-advised. That it was in total or almost total ignorance of the actual con ditions existing in the Yukon territory and that as soon as it came to a realiza tion of the real situation, radical meas ures for the relief of this overburdened country would be immediately forth coming.
But alas, the lapse of tíme has brought only renewed grievances. So closely have the reins been drawn, so restricted are the opporuniti s left open to the miner, but for whose efforts and sacrifices there would have been no gold
discovery in the Yukon, that men are now selling their rights (?) as free miners-something that ought not to he offered for sale at any price-men are selting their rights, we repeat, for the paltry sum of $\$ 50$. It is time that 000 some one in the Yukon territor sounded the slogan of war upon the political party that is responsible for the existence of such conditions. There is a shadow of hope at least in the prospect of an overturning in Dominion politics. But so long as the present regime is in powet there will be little whemad atrese

The fact that there is in Dawson a demarrd for refined, high class entertainment was amply demonstrated a the Palace Grand läst night. The music was of a character that appealed to the finer and nobler sentiments of everyone whose good fortune it was to be in attendance. The contrast between an evening spent in listening to the strains of classic music and one devoted to the ordinary forms of public enterainment in Dawson is a very marked ne. Dawson will be a better town as result of such entertainment as was given last night. The Nugget congratu ates the management on their success and hopes that succeeding programs will be as well patronized as the initial one.
Intending Nomads should not over look the fact that the season at which work can be done at Nome is comparatively a very brief one. When the summier is over it is a case of cease work in so far as the beach in concerned and there is little likelihood of any considerable amount of work being done on the creeks during the close season. To make his stake at Nome, therefore, a man under ordinary circumstances must figure only on the open season of frum three to four months. There are a number of features of the Nome proposition which detract largely from its at tractiveness
The thousands of people who were supposed to have their minds made up to reach Nome over the ice durng the present winter will undoubtedly diminish into very much smaller numbers Eighteen hundred miles of ice travel in the middle of an Aretic winter will in volve hardships and privations from which the stoutest heart may well shrink. If any considerable number of ambitious cheechakbs start from Skagway en route to Nome during the present winter it is altogether probable that the large mapotity of them will be con tent to abide in Dawson, until navigation opens if indeed they are enabled to reach this point.

No decisive movements of in Africa can be expected the arrival of Lord Roberts, who is now en route. The full gravity of the sit uation is realized in London as clearly as it is in Capetown or at the front. The Boers will not be conquered unti by the force of overwhetmingly superior strength they are literally suept of he face of the earth.

If the Yukon territory were blessed with wise and equitable laws, no coun ry on earth would furnish better oppor tumties for vigorous, self reliant man thood to achieve success.
