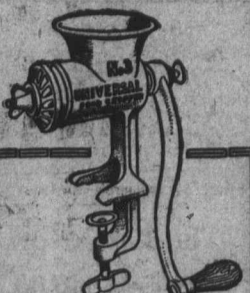

### NO FORCIBLE SEIZURE OF ARMS

Athens, Nov. 29, via London, Nov. 30—According to an Entente diplomat, King Constantine has given assurances to Admiral Du Fournet, commander of the Anglo-French fleet in the Mediterranean, that order will be maintained Friday, the date of the expiration of the Admiral's ultimatum for the surrender of the Greek artillery. The diplomat also says that on the other hand Admiral Du Fournet has promised that the measures he will take to induce compliance with his demand will not include forcible seizure of arms.

Even in these times of soaring prices, \$6150 is a prodigious price to pay for a cow. He is the most badly wounded man to reach Toronto, and he is grit through and through.

Hon. Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture, says any attempt to fix food prices would result in innumerable complications. While administrative routine will manage itself, complications require ability. In other countries they have governments can deal with complications.

### GREEK MINISTER OF WAR RESIGNS

London, Nov. 30—The resignation of General Dracos, Greek Minister of War, is reported by Reuters Athens correspondent. The reason assigned is ill-health.

General Dracos will be succeeded by the aged General Hatzopoulos, who is now in Corfu. Until he returns to Athens the war portfolio will be administered by Alexander Tselos, Minister of the Interior.

The afternoons have reached their shortest for this season, the sun setting today at 4.20. On Tuesday he will set at 4.19, at which time he will continue until the 15th, when he will begin to set later. The mornings will grow shorter until 31st, when the sun will rise at 7.39 instead of 7.18 today.

Prof. Reginald Gates, biologist of the California University, arrived in Yarmouth on Wednesday morning and proceeded for Middleton to visit his parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Gates after which he will leave for England, where he will enlist in the British army.

### QUIET ON THE BRITISH FRONT

London, November 30—The official communication from British Headquarters in France issued tonight, reads:

"There is nothing to report except artillery duels along the front. The enemy's artillery fire was particularly heavy between the rivers Somme and Ancre."

### CYCLONE KILLS NEARLY 300 PERSONS

London, Nov. 30—The death of nearly 300 persons in a cyclone at Pondicherry, India, is reported in a Reuter despatch from Madras. The storm caused great damage to property.

Pondicherry is the chief French possession in India. It has an area of 115 square miles, and a population of about 170,000.

### ALLIES READY TO BEGIN DEBARKATION TROOPS AT PIRAEUS.

Athens, Nov. 30—Via London Dec. 1—The Entente Allies are ready to begin the debarkation of troops at Piraeus, the port of Athens. The Greek Government has re-taken control of the post offices and telegraph lines in Athens, expelling the French control officers.

## OBITUARY

George Jones Miller

News of the death, at the residence of his son-in-law, F. M. Slade, Grosvenor Avenue, Montreal, of George Jones Miller for fifteen years supervisor of the Dartmouth schools, was received in this County with regret. It has been only three years since his removal to Montreal. Born in St. John, N. B., sixty-two years ago he came as a youth to Canning where he was for some years employed in the drug store of which his brother, Dr. Miller, was the proprietor, later teaching school in Canning, Canada, etc., and still later being appointed principal of the Hansport schools. In 1892 he went to Dartmouth and assumed charge of the schools of that town as Supervisor and Principal. He remained in that position for fifteen years, until July, 1907, when he joined the staff of The Morning Chronicle. He retired three years ago then going to live with his daughter in Montreal. He spent two months in Kentville this summer with his son, Lieut. Fred Miller.

Mr. Miller had three children, Clara, wife of F. M. Slade, of Montreal; Ethel, the first wife of G. Fred Pearson, who predeceased her father and Major F. W. Miller, of the 85th Battalion, Nova Scotia Highlanders.

As a teacher, Mr. Miller was signally efficient and he was well liked as a man. One of the strong points in connection with his teachings was the fact that he took an unfeigned, hearty interest in his pupils, and was genuinely sympathetic to their interest.

For some years his health had not been good, but his cheerful spirit was triumphant over physical weakness and he retained to the last his interest in the work of education in his adopted province of Nova Scotia. The funeral took place on Sunday afternoon at Canning.

All deserters from the Canadian Expeditionary Force will be pardoned, provided they report again for duty by Dec. 15. His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire has signed an order-in-council extending this clemency to all soldiers who are now deserters, or who are reported as being absent without leave. There are hundreds of such men, many of them in the United States, whither they went, taking French leave of their units in Canada. It is expected that scores of them will return as soon as they know they are to be pardoned.

Canada's new Minister of Militia, Hon. A. E. Kemp, M.P. for Toronto East, a manufacturer, a past president of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, an active worker in many organizations and societies, industrial, social and philanthropic, is one of Canada's successful business men as well as one of the prominent members of the House of Commons. Mr. Kemp's acceptance of office will make necessary a by-election in east Toronto, but his majority of 4,801 in 1911 indicates a pretty safe constituency, even if the opposition decides to contest the seat.

### KILLED IN ACTION

(From the Yarmouth Light)

Our hearts were saddened yesterday when Mr. J. Archibald Blackadar, Municipal clerk, and Mrs. Blackadar received official notice that their eldest son, Gunner George W. Lee Blackadar, had been killed in action on the 9th inst. "Somewhere in France." The terrible tragedy of the war is thus brought again to our doors, and the hearts of all go out in sympathy to the bereaved parents and two brothers, the youngest of whom, John, only 17, is now with the Highland Brigade at Witley Camp, England. The other brother is Dr. Karl of the staff of the Victoria General Hospital, Halifax. After finishing his studies at the Yarmouth Academy, Lee took a course at the Normal College, Truro, specializing in both institutions in manual training, in which he was afterwards very successful as a teacher in the public schools at Bridgewater, Lunenburg, North Sydney, Sydney Mines, Middleton, Bridgetown and Annapolis Royal. At the time of his volunteering he was a student at Acadia University in Applied Science, and was also teaching manual training in the Acadia Collegiate Academy, and in the public schools at Wolfville, with every prospect of a career of great usefulness, but heeded the Empire's call and early last winter joined the McGill Corps, and went across to England in February. He had been on the firing line since July 1st, and as far as known here, had not received a scratch previous to the blow that ended his days. He was greatly beloved by all who knew him, and his tragic death is keenly felt. He was 28 years old and a member, since boyhood of the Heron Baptist church.

### SSIGNAL SUCCESS FOR BRITISH FORCES

London, December 1—Conspicuous success, has been gained by the British in their campaign against the Germans in German East Africa, the War Office announced today.

"On Oct. 19, a strong German force commanded by Major General Walle, dislodged from Tabore (in the central part of the colony) came in contact with British, south of Iringa," the statement says.

"Simultaneously the enemy in the Hahenge area took the offensive against the British on the Ruhudje river with the evident intention of assisting the western German forces to penetrate the British cordon and form a junction with the main force.

"The attempt broke through and was repulsed near Aeuriranga and the British gained a conspicuous success on the Ruhudje, driving the enemy over the river with the loss of 200 killed, 82 prisoners and booty.

"The main body of the western German force divided into two parts. One invested the British post at Lupembe and was driven off. The remaining force was isolated in the Moule mission station and forced to surrender about 500 strong on November 26. A howitzer, ammunition and three machine guns were included in the booty. The remnants of Major General Walle's force, having lost the bulk of its artillery and machine guns and suffering probably 50 per cent of casualties making eastwards for Mahenge.

# Moose in Northern Ontario

THOUGH perhaps not so famous for its big game as British Columbia or New Brunswick, Ontario possesses many valuable wild animals, which the hunter loves to pursue in the fall and early winter. None of the game of this province is more interesting than the moose. He is to be found in many haunts, but his favorite resorts seem to be in the Timagami district, around Desbarats, Bisson, Missanable, and White River, and is often to be seen in the region stretching from Fort William to Wabigoon Lake.

This season the hunters in Northern Ontario are sure to have an exceptionally good time, for the great forest fires that have recently occurred there have driven the big

game from their secure homes in the recesses of the vast woods, and now they are forced to shelter themselves under scantier cover than would satisfy them formerly. Furthermore, the season has been extended from November 15 to the end of the month.

Not long ago, the delightful sport of hunting big game was confined to the male sex, but now it is quite fashionable to see ladies with rifles in hand out on the hunting grounds, and often their aim is steady as that of some of the members of the sterner sex. Just as there is something of an accomplishment about a skilled fisherman, there is also something of an accomplishment about a competent moose hunter.

There are two methods of hunting the moose—the "calling" and the "still hunting." The "calling" is done early in the season, and in fine falls.

In the cold weather the "still hunting" is adopted. The details of these methods, and particulars as to how the moose feed "down wind" and how the hunters pursue their prey "up wind" should be learned by many voices in the bracing and healthful atmosphere of the woods of Northern Ontario during the present hunting season.

### THE BENEFIT OF PROHIBITION

Ottawa, Nov. 29—The penitentiary and prison population of the Dominion is now smaller than it has been for years. Prohibition, employment conditions and the enlistment of the "adventurous spirits" in the war have combined to decrease crime and empty the jails. Practically all penitentiaries report to the Justice Department that the "slack season" for compulsory boarders has been on for months. At Stoney Mountain penitentiary in Manitoba, for instance, there are not enough prisoners at present to keep the prison industries running.

### CODFISH SINKS A VESSEL

Gavelston, Nov. 30—A cargo of dried codfish that swelled when the schooner Ponhook shipped water, opened the schooner's seams and sank it, according to the crew of the Norwegian steamship Kronstad, which arrived here Saturday.

The Kronstad, two days out from the Azores, sighted the Ponhook in a sinking condition, and rescued her crew on the night of Oct. 30 in a heavy sea.

The Ponhook was enroute from St. John's for Gibraltar. Capt. Doyle and the seven men of the Ponhook were landed at Punta Del Grado, Azores.

### 320 TON SCHOONER LAUNCHED SUCCESSFULLY

(Tribune)

On Tuesday a large number of interested spectators gathered at the shipyard Cheverie, to witness the launching of the three masted schooner "Minnie G. Parsons" constructed this summer by Albert Parsons, M. L. A., Walton and his brother Mortimer Parsons of Cheverie.

The schooner was built by Jacob Miller, Noel Shore, a master builder who has been for thirty-five years associated with building vessels along the Shore and is to be congratulated on the completion of so splendid a schooner as the last.

The "Minnie G. Parsons" dimensions are 125 ft. length, 33 1-2 ft. beam and 11 ft. 6 in. hold, tonnage 320.

The men of the 246th Battalion, quartered in the barracks on the North Commons are getting into shape by their regular drills and now that a complement of officers has been attached the battalion is on a real regimental basis.

The present strength of the battalion is 570 but it is growing daily. A large batch of recruits is expected from Amherst in a day or two and the men enlisted by Lieut. R. V. Harris on his recent trip along the Eastern shore are coming in by degrees as they fix up affairs at home.

In the meantime, recruiting is going on actively in the City, the Armouries being the Headquarters.

At present a draft of 190 Highlanders from Montreal are occupying the barrack quarters in the Armouries building but permission to use the quarters there later on so that in the winter as the battalion grows they can utilize them as well as the barrack huts on the Common and thus have room for all.

The Highlanders at the Armouries had a kit inspection yesterday and the day previous they were inspected by Major-General Benson.

The railways unions of North Bay have solved the high cost of living. Some time ago a special committee was appointed to purchase food and fuel supplies as required by their members. The committee has handled within the past week two carloads of potatoes, two cars of wood, forty head of cattle, two tons of honey, eight carloads of coal, and fifty carloads of hardwood. In a few days it expects a carload of groceries and two of apples. The committee is composed of twenty-five members representing different crafts, and has saved 30 per cent on its purchases to date.

GERMANS WILL PAY FOR CARGO

The Hague, Nov. 30, via London.—Germany has declared to the Government of The Netherlands her readiness to pay damage for the Dutch freighter Bloomersdijk and her grain cargo, while the rest of the vessel's cargo is to be submitted to a prize court. Official announcement was made to this effect today to the Associated Press. The Bloomersdijk was sunk off Nantucket last October by a German submarine.

RUSSIANS DRIVING AUSTRIANS OUT OF CARPATHIANS

Operations on a Large Scale Taking Place

Petrograd, Dec. 1, via London, Dec. 2.—The new Russian drive into the wooded district of the Carpathians, which began three days ago with the purpose of diverting part of General Von Falkenhayn's troops from the Roumanian front and preventing a further invasion of Roumania on the Transylvanian side, is acquiring momentum as it proceeds. The drive, reports here say, has now developed into operations on a large scale on a line of 200 miles from Korosnezo, in the Carpathians, to the River Dovtjan, on the Roumanian-Hungarian frontier.

The important line of communications from Kirlibaba to Marmorossiget, which possesses especial value on account of the scarcity of railways and good roads in this region, is now under control of the Russian guns on the neighboring crests, which fell to the Russians during the hard fighting of the past two days.

Thus far, military observers say, the Australians apparently have been taken by surprise and have been unable to withstand the Russian attacks at any important points. In the amount of war material and the number of prisoners taken, as well as the precipitate abandonment of positions by the Austrians, military observers contend that the operations bear close resemblance to the early days of General Brusiloff's summer campaign.

The result already obtained by the Kirlibaba-Marmorossiget road in part, declare the observers, will reach its full strategic significance in the case of the Austrian surrender of Kirlibaba. In this event, it is expected here, the Russians will have little difficulty in crossing the ridge of the Carpathians and advancing along the valley of the Nagy Szamos River.

The obvious effect of this move, the military observers here say, would be to bring General Von Falkenhayn's advance into Wallachia to a stop and would greatly improve the position of Bucharest.

DIED AT 90 YEARS

**KIRLIBABA IS UNDER  
FIRE OF RUSSIAN GUNS**

Petrograd, Nov. 30.—The new Russian offensive in the Carpathians has resulted in considerable gains. It is announced officially. Heavy fighting is proceeding for possession of the important pass through the Carpathians at Kirlibaba, and today's announcement says the town of Kirlibaba is now within rifle range of the Russians.

"On the Western front, in the region of the village of Peraplanka, northeast of Smorgen (east of Vilna), small enemy forces attempted to advance on our trenches," says today's communication from the War Office. "They were checked by our fire and driven back to their own entrenchment."

"Our artillery dispersed three columns, each about a battalion strong, which were moving eastward from the outskirts of the little town of Goradichi.

"In the region of the village of Korytniza we captured a salient enemy position which projected deeply into our front. In the wooded Carpathians we gained possession of Rukada height, eleven versts southwest of Wakarka, capturing 100 Germans and three machine guns.

"In the region of the heights east of Kirlibaba, the battle is still proceeding. In the last two days we have taken about 900 prisoners in this neighborhood, and captured thirteen machine guns, two bomb mortars, one mine-thrower and two projectors Kirlibaba is under our fire."

The following official account of military operations on the Caucasian front was given out here today:

"A hostile detachment which advanced in the region of Wansk withdrew after an unsuccessful night attack in the direction of Wanstan.

"In the Sakkiz region we captured a Turkish transport of 47 animals laden with grain."

**THE ROUMANIAN TROOPS

### Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

**T**HE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

**Duties**—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live with a nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

**Duties**—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

Settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. **Duties**—Must reside six months out of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The act of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

### ILLUSTRATION STATIONS IN CANADA

The Department of Agriculture of the Dominion Government is carrying on illustrating work in crop production and cultural methods with farmers in the Province of Quebec, Alberta and Saskatchewan.

Farmers owning or operating land favorably situated for carrying on of such work co-operate with the Department.

The farmer puts under the direction of an officer of the Dominion Experimental Farm System, a part of his farm having a good wide frontage on a well travelled highway, each field having the same frontage along the same highway, so that the crops and cultivation are unavoidably in evidence to the casual traveller and easily inspected by the interested visitor.

The Department, for the first year at least, furnishes the seed necessary to sow such of the fields as it is decided to put under crop that year. In subsequent years the farmer saves enough of the best of the crop grown on these fields to do the necessary seeding. This, of course, provided the grain produced is satisfactory as to purity and generative power.

All cultural and harvesting operations in connection with these fields, i. e., the ploughing, harrowing, etc., of the field and the sowing, harvesting and threshing of the grain therefrom are done by the farmer.

All work indicated above is done in exactly such ways and at exactly such times as directed by the Illustration Station Division of the Dominion Experimental Farms System. The farmer keeps a record of the amount of time taken to perform the different operations on each field and threshes the grain harvested separately so that it will be known how much is harvested from each field.

The records just mentioned of the work and crops resulting, together with brief notes made each week, are duly entered on blank forms provided for that purpose. The work of making such notes and entering up the work done on each field does not entail more than one hour's work each month. Each week the farmer mails to the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, a form filled out with full particulars as to the work done, general weather conditions and crop progress on the different fields.

The farmer permits to be placed in front of each field a sign stating briefly the method of growing thereon, or the treatment given the plot that year.

On all these farms, whether located in the Province of Quebec or in Saskatchewan or Alberta, systematic rotations of crops suitable to the district served as well as the best cultural methods and most suitable varieties of crops are being demonstrated.

### WAR MUST BE FOUGHT OUT ON EAST AND WEST FRONTS

London, December 1—"The war must be fought to a military conclusion on the East and West fronts, with the blockade playing only a secondary part," said Lord Robert Cecil, Minister of War Trade, in discussing today, with the Associated Press, the latest developments in the world conflict.

"The condition of Roumania," Lord Robert continued, "causes us grave regret. But there is no reason to suppose the operations there will affect the result of the war, which must be fought out on the main fronts. The conditions under which we will accept peace overtures remain the same as outlined several months ago."

Asked concerning the origin of the allegation in Morning Post editorial that Germany had offered the Entente Powers generous peace terms in return for a free hand in Central and South America, Lord Robert Cecil said:

"Of course it is well known that Germany had very definite ambitions in Central and South America even before the war, but I am unaware of any peace having been offered us on the terms mentioned by the Morning Post. We have no knowledge that such overtures ever been made here."

"The London Morning Post, in its issue of last Tuesday, argued that the Germans were willing for immediate peace, and would give the Empire Powers everything desired but only on one condition, that Germany be allowed a free hand in Central and South America."

"We understand," said the editorial, "that this condition has been put forward, of course discreetly and unofficially by the German Government, and that it has been rejected by the Allies."

The editorial added that at any time in the last ten years, "we could have had an agreement with Germany by allowing her a free hand across the Atlantic."

### JOSEPH EDWARDS' GOLDEN WEDDING

Joseph P. Edwards, past grand master of Oddfellows of Nova Scotia and Mrs. Edwards have just observed their golden wedding anniversary in Boston. A largely attended reception was held in the parish house of St. James' Episcopal Church, Somerville. The Oddfellows lodges of Annapolis and Middleton N.S., sent purses of gold. Among those present were three of their children, Harry L. Edwards of Caledonia, N. S.; Mrs. Elizabeth C. Crowe and Mrs. Janet I. Buckler both of Middleton.

Mr. Edwards was formerly D. A. R. station agent at Annapolis. He came to Somerville from Annapolis last April.

Mr. and Mrs. Edwards were married at Windsor, N. S.

### POTATOES HIGH IN ENGLAND

Never before in the history of England has the price of potatoes reached the height attained in the north of England during the last week or two. Scotch merchants are sending to Yorkshire for their potatoes, the home crop being poor and the supply scarce. Dunbar potatoes sold in Edinburgh recently at \$55 a ton.

Whereas from \$125 to \$150 was a fair price for an acre of Perthshire potatoes before the war, a patch has been sold at \$475 an acre. Another merchant has bought potatoes at such a high price that to realize a profit he must sell them at \$60 a ton. In London potatoes are selling at from \$45 to \$50 a ton.

The chairman's remarks were received with applause, and the Tribunal unanimously granted the tenth son exemption for three months, conditional on his obtaining work of national importance.
