In view of the action of the Board of Commerce in reducing the cost of bacon to the consum r , and the consequent protest o the packing concerns, that thi ould destroy the production o acts that have been made public The packing 'interests apparently rought Mr. W. Wade, secretary of the Ontario Swine Breeders' Association, before the board to strengthen their protest. Mr . Wade stated that any further re duction in the price of hogs would be disastrous to the production of hogs throughout the country. In
