AFGHAN AFFAIR STILL UNSETTLED.

Second Russian Line of Defence at Constantinople.

Russia States that She will Honorably Fulfill the Treaty of Berlin.

MANCHESTER, Nov. 7.—The Guardian's London correspondent says:—Before the plenipotentiaries left Berlin Earl Beaconsfield and Count Assoluto had been discussing the possibility of a treaty providing that if Russia should endeavor to remain on Turkish territory after May 15, 1878, she would be obliged to evacuate it.

ROMAN, Nov. 7.—The Pioneer states that the Albanians in the Rhyber Pass are deserting largely in consequence of sickness and hunger. Hopes are entertained that the British demand for the evacuation of the Albanians at Jellaband is from thirty to forty days.

MATRUH, Nov. 7.—An ex-soldier has attempted to assassinate Gen. Brogan, formerly Minister of War. The General was unhurt, and the assassin has been arrested.

LONDON, Nov. 7.—The Times, commenting on the elections in the United States, says:—It is very gratifying to see that we publish the results of the November election in the United States. The gravity of issues on which the voters are practically to decide could scarcely be over-estimated, and there was some ground for apprehension that the spirit of the American Democracy might turn the scale of regional agitation and ruinous policy. Now, as we witness the election of a President, we are glad to see the country from the consequences of party dissension, and the influence of sectional politicians. Little thanks are due to the leaders of the Republican party, and still less to those of the Democratic party, who can be credited from the guilt of patting with the infatuated, repudiating and socialist agitators, which culminated in the formation of the Green-back-Labor party. The Times thinks it not improbable that both Tilden and Tilden will disappear from the front ranks of the Democrats before 1880, and that Bayard will be their candidate for President.
