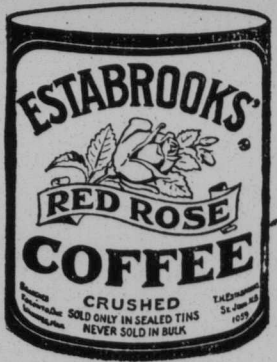

New Brunswick Seed Is of High Quality

Competitions in St. John's Fields of Seed Grain Result Creditably to Province—Northumberland Stands High

Improvement in quality and increase in yield of farm crops through the production and use of better seed, has been the object of an educational campaign through comparative trials in various fields of seed grain, instigated by the seed breeder of the federal department of agriculture, in co-operation with the provincial department of agriculture. During the last four years there has been a large increase in the number of competitions conducted throughout Canada, and much interest in the competitions has been manifested among the farmers of New Brunswick. In the grain competitions for 1911 there were 21 competitors in Kings county; 30 in Northumberland county; 44 in Victoria county; 58 in Westmorland county, and 15 in York county. The competitors in Kings county who made the highest marks were: J. W. Paterson, of Rossville, who scored 923 points on oats, and Robert Robinson, of Sussex, who made 92 points in barley and Jas. McFarlane, Sussex, who made 823 points on wheat.

In Northumberland county G. R. Lennox, of Chatham, made 95 points, and Geo. E. Fisher, of Chatham, 94 points on wheat, and Alex. Dickson of Chatham, made 931 points on oats. In Victoria county, Christian Adams, of Salamis, led in wheat, with 88 points and Donald Lines, of Tonquin River, led in oats with 893 points. In Westmorland county Thomas Davis, of Ross, led in wheat with 97 points; J. W. Kaye, in white oats with 924 points; A. F. Johnston, of Chapman, in black oats, with 724 points; Murray Taylor, of Chapman, in barley with 923 points. In York county, Chesley Heller, Upper Bear Island, led in oats with 864 points.

Two counties had entries in the competition for seed potatoes. In Victoria county there were 21 entries, and John Grana, of River de Chure made the best showing with 943 points to his credit.

In York county there were five entries, W. E. Palmer, of South Lake, led with 874 points.

THE GOLD SHIP

THE GOLD SHIP. The Way Treasure is Transported From One Country to Another and the Precautions Taken To Protect It.

Of the many remarkable happenings which relieve the dreariness of modern life, few appeal more strongly to the imagination than the conveyance to and fro of the great quantities of gold—worth in many cases, from an eye-glancing golden stream round the world.

Between the largest quantities of the precious metal are those conveyed weekly from South Africa, the output of the mines which, in bars, as well as the aggregated cases of yellow metal in appearance, find their way to the Bank of England and the other great banks. The value of these weekly cargoes frequently runs into millions.

Then, too, every mail steamer which carries the mails carries its quantum of gold. Gold in bars, sold in certificates, gold in the coinage of every nation.

The great mystery which surrounds the safekeeping of the gold in the banks of England may be seen on a little inspection of the complete arrangements for the safekeeping of the gold in the banks of England.

When the gold is received by one of the ship's officers, and with the assistance of a couple of quarter-masters, are carefully checked and tallied. The officer—usually the second officer—signs a receipt for them, and they are placed in a special gold, to which access is obtained by only one entrance, and that is locked and sealed.

From the moment that he has signed the receipt the officer is personally responsible for the bullion and specie and its safe custody and delivery, and access to the treasure-hold can only be had legitimately—by means of the key, which remains in his possession.

When Silence is Golden. As to the exact precautions taken to guard the bullion-hold and its contents, and its precise situation, representatives of the various companies preserve a complete, and very wise, reticence, and even sailors and officers on the sailing vessel probably have where the gold is kept, during its transshipment, so well is the secret kept.

Probably not more than three or four people in the ship are in possession of the information. The truth is that, surprising as the statement may sound to the uninitiated, there are in existence very highly organized gangs of international thieves, whose special work is the theft, or attempted theft, of gold while in the charge of the steamer companies.

BENEFICIAL WARS

Some People Argue That Wars and Industrial Calamities Benefit Mankind in the Long Run.

Few calamities in the world's history have been unattended by some advantage to humanity. The late Lord Palmerston is credited with having stated that even a great war had its benefits for the English people inasmuch as it induced them to study geography. There are people who go much further, and seriously argue that the horrors of war are afterwards compensated by reforms and discoveries which mankind at large would never have enjoyed but for the drastic chastisement which war inflicts. Among the arguments of this kind deduced from history is the statement that all the wealth and luxury the world has enjoyed from the industry of brass-working would probably have been lost but for the sackings and burning of the city of Corinth in the year 146 B. C. In Corinth there were immense quantities of gold, silver, and copper, and it is said that the violence of the conflagration was so great that these precious metals were melted and ran together, and thus the famous Corinthian brass was first manufactured.

Great Opportunity For Farmers

Demonstration Cars to Visit Different Places Along the C. P. R. and I. R. C., Including 7 in Northumberland.

The Farming Demonstration Special Train will start its tour of New Brunswick under the auspices of the provincial government on Saturday, June 8th.

On Friday June 21st, the train starts from Fredericton on the I. C. R. System, and on this system will be composed of seven cars: three baggage cars being fitted with exhibits and specimens of farming products.

The Intercolonial Railway has arranged for the issue of return excursion tickets at single fare from all stations to the nearest point where the demonstration car will stop.

On leaving the Province of New Brunswick at Campbellton, the train will pass under the jurisdiction and control of the provincial government of the Province of Quebec.

The dates and hours over the Intercolonial system and which intending visitors to the cars and lectures should preserve, are as follows:

Halifax, N. S., May 3.—A wireless message from Captain de Carteret on the steamer Minia via Cape Race, dated May 1, 1.15 p. m., says: "Bodies widely scattered by gales and moving eight miles daily. Faster when Gulf Stream is entered. Excepting an odd one occasionally, it is impossible to keep in touch with the bodies. Lack of observations owing to three days' fog and two days' east gale coming on, compels me to abandon search. Returning to Halifax, due early Monday. Fifteen bodies on board."

Hays' Body Found by Minia.

Halifax, May 6.—The cable ship Minia arrived at 1.45 this morning and the bodies of J. M. Hays and the others on board will be landed immediately and transferred to morgue. Any that are claimed will be ready for shipment to-day. The Halifax board of trade has sent a beautiful wreath for the mortuary car in which Mr. Hays' body will be taken to Montreal.

New York, N. Y., May 2.—Papers in the first suit for damages brought by a relative of a Titanic victim, were filed in the federal district court here today. The suit in admiralty, is brought by Mrs. Louise Robins, widow of Victor Robins, Col. John Robins' eldest son, who lost his life when the Titanic sank, and is that in which the testimony of J. Bruce Ismay and officers of the sunken steamer is desired. It charges negligence on the part of the Ocean Steam Navigation Company, and asks for \$500,000 damages and costs.

FUND \$1600,000

May Reach \$2,500,000 in Great Britain Alone.

London, May 3.—The Titanic fund, including those collected in Canada and the United States, now aggregates well over \$1,600,000. The suggestion has been made that sufficient money has been subscribed, on the mayor of Southampton states that a large number of people are needy at that place, and he wants the collection to continue.

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ANOTHER TITANIC INVESTIGATION

British Are Holding An Enquiry at London Into Causes of the Disaster.

London, May 2.—Lord Mersey, in his capacity as wreck commissioner, and five assessors, who will advise him in his questioning on the technicalities of a nautical affair, held this morning the first session of the board of trade inquiry into the loss of the White Star steamer Titanic. Scarcely a hundred people attended the opening session.

From the series of 20 questions which the new general announced would be taken up, it became evident that the inquiry would cover practically the same ground as the investigation by the committee of the American senate, but would be conducted more in accordance with the procedure of a court of law and deal definitely with stated cases.

Richeson's Fate To Be Settled To-Day

May 8 is the earliest date when the Massachusetts Governor's Council may begin consideration of the fate of Clarence V. T. Richeson if the Governor refers the petition to his advisers. Several local witnesses are expected to take the stand and testify to "spells" of curious actions on the part of the prisoner which they attribute to insanity.

Search for Bodies Ended

Halifax, N. S., May 3.—A wireless message from Captain de Carteret on the steamer Minia via Cape Race, dated May 1, 1.15 p. m., says: "Bodies widely scattered by gales and moving eight miles daily. Faster when Gulf Stream is entered. Excepting an odd one occasionally, it is impossible to keep in touch with the bodies. Lack of observations owing to three days' fog and two days' east gale coming on, compels me to abandon search. Returning to Halifax, due early Monday. Fifteen bodies on board."

Hays' Body Found by Minia.

Halifax, May 6.—The cable ship Minia arrived at 1.45 this morning and the bodies of J. M. Hays and the others on board will be landed immediately and transferred to morgue. Any that are claimed will be ready for shipment to-day. The Halifax board of trade has sent a beautiful wreath for the mortuary car in which Mr. Hays' body will be taken to Montreal.

BAPTIST MISSION BOARDS TO UNITE

Rev. D. Hutchinson, Rev. W. Camp, Rev. M. F. McCutcheon and other Baptist clergymen will leave for Toronto this week to assist in making the final arrangements for the merging of the Maritime Baptist Mission board with the Dominion board.

DR. MERSEBAU SELLS OUT

Dr. H. Mersebau, of Reston, has sold out all his interest there to Dr. Ernest Rommel, who has been in the west for five years. Dr. Mersebau has been in Reston for seven years and plans after leaving in June to study in London for two years. Dr. Rommel will immediately take possession there.

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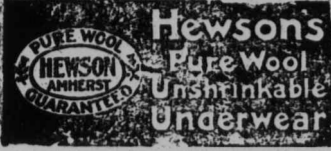

ON THE RIVER. The str. Miramichi began running Saturday on the Newcastle route, with Capt. Bullock in command. The str. Alexandra made her first trip down river on Monday last, calling at Loggieville, Oak Point, Bay du Vin, Burit Church and Neguac.

PHYSICAL COURSES FOR TEACHERS. A course of physical training for school teachers will begin in Fredericton in July. Instructors will be sent to Richibucto, Edmundston and Bathurst for convenience of teachers living in those sections. There will be a special course of military training for teachers attending the summer school of science in Yarmouth.

FIND MANY BROWN TAIL MOTHS. Mr. J. D. Tothill, brown tail moth expert of Ottawa, who has for the past several months been securing western N. B. in quest of that dreaded pest, will complete his work of destruction this week. At present there are three parties hunting for moths, one is at Minto and will work towards Sheffield; another is at Harvey working to Debec, and a third is at Debec, working its way in the direction of Harvey. When these districts are covered the work in this province will be completed. Altogether so far there have been 2,200 nests of the dreaded pests discovered since Mr. Tothill started several months ago.

He was interested in some property in Scotland, which he had fallen heir to, and was returning to Oldtown by New York, when the vessel went down.

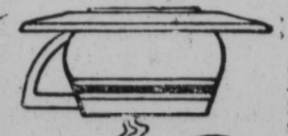

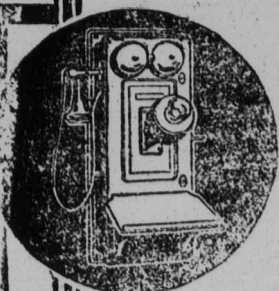

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties: Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead.

Duties: Must reside upon the homestead in pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry including the time required to earn (homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead rights cannot obtain a pre-emption entry for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3 per acre. Duties: Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.

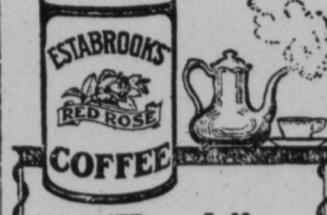
