8. Watch your horse. If he stops sweating suddenly, or if he breathes short and quick, or if his ears droop. or if he stands with his legs braced sideways, he is in danger of a heat or sun stroke and needs attention at

9. If the horse is overcome by heat, get him into the shade, remove harness and bridle, wash out his mouth. sponge him all over, shower his legs, and give him two ounces of aromatic spirits of ammomia, or two ounces of sweet spirits of nitre, in a pint of water: or give him a pint of coffee warm. Cool his head at once, using Ottawa, July 6-Prayers for rain cold water, or, if necessary, chopped ice, wrapped in a cloth

10. If the horse is off his feed, try drink.

11. Clean your horse at night, so that he can rest, well, and clean him thoroughly. The salt dandruff drying on his skin makes him uncomfortable, and often produces sores under the

12. Do not fail to water him at night after he has eaten his hay. If you

don't he will be thirsty all night. 13. If it is so hot that the horse sweats in the stable at night, tie him outside, with bedding under him. Un less he cools off during the night, he cannot well stand the next day's heat.
