The Tariff.

The Manufactures' Association at its meeting at Halifax, put its views on the tariff question on re

cord in the following resolution : "Resclved, that in the opinion of this association the changed conditions which now obtain in Canada demand the immediate and thorough revision of the tariff upon lines which will more effectually transfer to the workshops of the Dominion the manufacture of many of the goods which we now import from other countries.

"That in any such revision the interests of all sections of the community, whether of mining, fishing or manufacturing, should be fully considered with a view not only to the preservation, but to the further development of all these great national industries. 'That while such tariff shail b

primarily framed for Canadian interests it should, nevertheless. give a substantial preference to the Mother Country, and also to any other part of the British Empire with which reciprocal preferential trade can be arranged to our mutual advantage, recognizing adequate protection to all Canadian producers."

THE GUNNERY RECORD.

H. M. S. Ocean, Captain Richard W H. M. S. Ocean, Captain Richard W. White, on the China station, has beaten the record for gunnery in the British navy.
