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PROVINCIAL RIGHTS.

The Question of the Home-Planks in the Dominion.

To THE EDITOR.—Prior to confederation the British North American Provinces carried on business each on its own account. A partnership was proposed. After much agitation a convention of representatives from the different provinces met in Quebec in 1864, when were adopted the famous resolutions which were to form the basis of the partnership agreement. Delegates were despatched to England to promote the passage of an Imperial Act, based upon the letter and spirit of the Quebec resolutions. The result was the constitution under which we now live, known as 'The British North America Act.' This is a shameful departure from the spirit of the resolutions took place in now only too evident. That the principle of Provincial Rights in its fullest significance is the foundation stone of our Federal system, and the only one upon which it can endure, is admitted by everybody who has sufficient intelligence to form an opinion upon the subject, and read the signs of the times. The people of this Province will not submit to any interference with their rights; and in the struggle that has taken place, and which, owing to the constant encroachments of the Central Government, must continue, they have, I feel assured, the hearty sympathy of the large majority of the people of the other Provinces. Indeed, it is the smaller Provinces who have the largest interest in this question, and Ontario in fighting her own battles, is battling for the rights and liberties of every province in the Confederation. Now that Provincial Rights as opposed to the centralizing tendency of the Conservative party has been adopted as one of the leading planks of the Liberal platform there are a number of questions of this class which I would like to see brought within the domain of practical politics, and with the view of inviting discussion I mention those I consider the most vital and pressing ones:

- 1. Local Control over Local Railways.
2. The Regulation of the Liquor Traffic.
3. The Appointment of Judges.
4. The Regulation of the Franchise.
5. The Regulation of the Electoral Divisions.
6. The Subsidy Question.
7. The abolition of the Veto Power on the part of the Federal Government, and its relegation of the Courts of Law.
8. The Abolition or Reform of the Senate.

1. Railways. It is an undoubted usurpation of the rights of the Provinces, and a violation of the spirit if not the letter of the constitution for the general Parliament to assume control of railways constructed with the funds of the Provinces and the municipalities.

2. Liquor Traffic. The fact that for sixteen years the Province of Ontario has maintained an unchallenged control of the license system is proof positive that such was the intention of the framers of the Confederation Act, and if any doubt has arisen upon the subject the constitution must be amended by having that doubt removed. The people of Ontario will never submit to have a question so closely allied with the morals of the community dealt with by a Parliament composed of a majority from the other Provinces of the Dominion.

3. All judges except those of the Supreme Court should be appointed by the Governments of the respective Provinces. The Provinces have the making of laws relating to property and civil rights; and it is not a strange anomaly that the judges to administer those laws should be appointed by the Federal Government. It is a base upon our constitution that should be removed.

4 and 5. The Provinces should also have complete control of the franchise, both for Provincial and Dominion purposes; as well as the kindred matter of the fixing of the electoral divisions. This arrangement would render a gerrymander on the part of the general Parliament impossible.

6. The subsidy question is one that must be equitably and finally settled at an early day. The Provinces must be taught to live within their means, and that they must not look to the Federal treasury for relief from their embarrassments. A free-and-easy method with the subsidy question is liable to be used as a wholesale engine of corruption to bolster up the cause of a falling Ministry.

7. Veto The right of the Federal Government to veto Provincial Acts should be abolished. The question as to whether the Acts of the Provincial Legislatures are ultra vires or not is a judicial or legal one, and can only be properly decided by a court of law. The Cabinet at Ottawa, the majority may or may not be lawyers, is not competent to decide a question of constitutional law. We have had recent and abundant proof of this. All Provincial Acts should be submitted to the Privy Council at Ottawa before receiving the Governor-General's assent, and if in their opinion any such Act is ultra vires, the Supreme Court shall decide the matter with right of final appeal to the Imperial Privy Council.

Occupation for Invalids.

We hear now and then of marvellous cures of consumptives effected by the use of the instruments of music, requiring the utmost exertion of the lungs; of spinal affections dissipated by heavy household work, and taking in washing. Such statements may be as the bushel of chaff, yet they hold a grain of common-sense wheat. The musical instrument, the scrubbing brush, or washboard, per se may have been of little avail, but the patient's mind was diverted, the pleasurable sense of doing or making something gave a healthful excitement to the blood and languid appetite.

In the matter of employment, the female invalid has a great advantage over the masculine sufferer. There are so many light, deft tasks of needle work, and fancy handicraft for a woman's fingers, albeit those fingers are but frail, trembling ones. The writer knows of a lady, who through the painful months of wasting consumption kept her feeble hands busy as long as they could move. Specimens of her work, useful or ornamental, are still lovingly preserved in the home she left years ago.

An invalid still able to ride or walk may often assume some of the most errands daily necessary in a household, may make it his or her business to post the letters; small things truly, but often enough to give color to an otherwise aimless ride or walk, taken simply because it is one's duty to take the exercise.

The care of a few pots of flowers, or better, a flower border, the weakness and feeling of a flock of chickens will greatly relieve the intolerable ennui of doing nothing and feeling one's self a member of the ground.

The writer well-knows there are hours when our physical ailments will not be put aside, when the burden of weakness presses too heavily to be for a moment forgotten. But there can be no doubt that gentle occupation will often greatly help the sick head and heart; and by turning the mind, which so warmly sympathizes with the body, into different channels, alleviate, if but for a brief season, sharp physical pain. These friends or nurses are wise who can suggest to the invalid, still capable of such exertion, light and attractive employment. Taste and natural bias must, of course, in a measure be studied, for Dr. Armstrong wrote truly:

If, as reliable statistics show, the Dominion with a population of 4,300,000 spends \$27,000,000 annually in intoxicating liquors, then Huron's share, with a population of 75,000, must not be less than one sixtieth of that sum, say \$500,000.

DYNAMITE.

The New Parliament Buildings Blown up.

Narrow Escape of Two Ministers—Dynamite Supposed to Have Been the Agent—Considerable Damage Done.

Quebec, Oct. 11.—About 1 o'clock this afternoon an explosion occurred at the new parliament buildings, destroying a considerable portion of the masonry and windows of the new building, which was just being roofed in. The explosion at first was supposed to have been the boiler of the engine used for hoisting material, but this exploded and to be the case. Neither can it be attributed to gas. All the employees but one named Martel, a joiner, were absent at dinner. When the first explosion shook the neighboring houses thousands ran to the source of the shock, while those in the vicinity witnessed a mass of stones flying into the air and spreading over hundreds of feet on all sides. Carpenters were engaged near the parliament house preparing timber for the roof, all of whom escaped but one, although the debris fell around and close to them.

The explosion did considerable damage to windows in the vicinity of the parliament house. Almost all the windows in the house itself in the section where the explosion occurred are shattered. Martel, workman, and Charlebois, contractor, are the only persons injured, and these slightly. The damage by the first explosion was considerable. A hole about twelve feet long by five wide was blown out of the wall on the third story and directly over the right hand entrance to the assembly chamber and near the place where the speaker's chair was situated. The second explosion occurred in the northeast corner of the same building. The corner stone forming the support of the building was badly bulged, and it is doubtful if it can be repaired without letting down the whole.

The damage by the first explosion consists of an aperture in the wall of the third flat about fifteen feet in height and directly over the entrance to the assembly chamber. Several cross beams were broken into fragments by the concussion, and the solid walls were so cracked as to render them insecure. Provincial Treasurer Robertson, Minister of Railways Flynn and Attorney-General Fallour, with several members of the legislature, were on the grounds in conference with the contractor shortly after the explosion. The attorney-general and the judge of sessions had a narrow escape from being blown up when the second explosion occurred in the northeastern corner of the same building, where they were holding a conference in the second story. The huge corner stones underneath the windows are blown out and the wall above will have to be taken down. The second explosion was most mysterious, though it did little damage. Martel, the joiner, was seriously wounded by several pieces of stone striking him on the neck. Fragments are so deeply imbedded in his flesh that the doctors could not safely extract them. A guard of police and volunteer militia was engaged all the afternoon in searching the debris to ascertain the origin of the explosion. A guard of artillery is surrounding the grounds in front of the building where the explosion took place.

There are any amount of rumors as to a meeting between the parties who engaged in the terrible work, but nothing will be definitely ascertained until the government has finished its examination. If the perpetrators are caught they will have little mercy shown them. A rude estimate places the loss at \$15,000. The local cabinet tonight issued a proclamation offering \$1000 reward for information as to the perpetrators of the outrage.

Precautionary measures have been taken by the military authorities of the citadel to protect the powder magazine and military stores. A high authority asserts that the government was anonymously informed by letter lately that a dynamite attempt would be made on the public buildings, but it was treated as a hoax.
