

1 am informed on unimpeachable authority, says the Times' correspondent at Saloniki, that the Bulgarian irregular troops, left in charge of Kayala, after its surrender some time alleging that the Moslems had plotted a massacre, arrested 150 Turks and slaughtered them mostly with bayonets outside the town. This action was taken in spite of promises to protect the lives of citizens. A further excuse for the massacre was the allegation that the Turks had burned several villages before the entrance of the Bulgarians into the town of Drama, and that 150 Christian families had perished. A number of leading Jews have been arrested. Grave fears are entertained for their safety. They also allege that when the Bulgarans entered Serves, they were fired on by the Turks and an officer and two soldiers were killed. Thereupon the Bulgarians began to clean up the town, massacring a hundred persons by the Moslem process.

LONDON, Dec. 1. George Renwick, the corespondent of the Daily Chronicle at Constantinople, telegraphs:-"I learn on excellent authority that the Balko-Turkish Conference has reached a solid isis of agreement which augurs well for an early conclusion of negotiations. The delegates are now at work on the following points: (1) Adriande to remain Turkish territory under certain stipulations, including the reduction of fortifications; (2) Tur-key to enter the Balkan confederation for customs purposes, the exact condition of this partnership is not de finitely fixed: (3) Autonomy to 1 granted to Albania, under control the Allies: (4) Macedonian Mussul mans of any territory annexed by the coalition to receive certain privileges

LONDON. Dec. 1. Whilst the danger that the belligerents may fail to settle their differences asked to plead at this stage of the and hostilities be resumed looms large, the fact that both armies before Constantinople have practically reached a deadlock is the strongest force making for peace. Military experts consider that it would be almost possible for the Allies to break the Tchatalia works, while it would be impossible for the Turks to succeed in an offensive movement Bulgaria has come to the end of her resources in men, and has called out the drafts of 1913 and 1914, who are youths of 17 and 16 years, while one Army Corps in front of Adrianople consists of old men.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 2.30 a.m. The Cabinet has approved of the protocol of an armistice, which will be signed to-morrow. An irade has seen issued sanctioning the protocol which will be signed by Turkish and Bulgaria on behalf of the Allies. It will thus apply not merely to Tcha-talja and Adrianople but to all Turkey in Europe. The armistice will last as long as the preliminary negotiations for peace continue, and it is stipulated that the position of the belligerents shall remain exactly as present there have been no 'pour par-lers' on the subject of peace, there-fore statements in reference to the watre.—nov28tf.


