



Perhaps Lord Rose bery's exhortation will fall on good ground and bear fruit, and for reformation we must look to the next generation. Boys and Parents.

"I wish to make it clear at the very beginning of what I have to say, said Lord Rosebery, "that I am addressing, as I was told to address the boys, and not the parents. I will not say that boys and parents are permanently hostile bodies-I am parent myself-but there is certainly a great difference of view on man uestions to which I need not fur ther allude, such as pocket-money, amount of work that an ablo odied boy can do, and so forth.

"Now, the point I wish to labo for the moment is that of courtes good manners," added Lore Rosebery. "The necessity of then had been seen by one of the great saints of the educational calendar. About "Paddy" Nolan.

The Magistrate Had Reasons of His Own for Feeling Nervous.

The late P. J. Nolan, of Calgary, whose resemblance to Hon. T. Mayne Daly was frequently remarked, was an Irishman with a spontaneous and irrepressible wit, an excellent storyteller and an original and daring practical joker. His fund of anecdotes was inexhaustible, and the number of stories told about himself was legion. Here is one of them:


