## Germany Began War to Obtain New Domains

London, Nov. 20.—The London Daily Chronicle publishes a resume of an article written by Maximilian Harden, one of the most influential German journalists, who, it will be recalled, denounced conditions in the Kaiser's entourage, and emerged triumphant from the libel suits that ensued.

In his present article, Harden loudly claims for Germany the honor of having willed and encompassed the war.

"Let us drop," he says, "our miserable attempts to excuse Germany's erable attempts to excuse Germany's action. "Germany's hour has struck," he says, "and she must take her place as the leading Power. Any peace which does not secure her the first position will be no reward for her ef-forts, however many shining mil-liards be brought into her treasury. Germany is fighting for herself alone and yet she is sure that all men who desire the good-will of the world will rejoice in the result for there must be rejoice in the result for there must be end of the policy which had frighten-ed off all free-born people from fel-lowship with the strongest of contin-ental powers. ental powers.
