


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Making Gas Mantles.

es are used yearly in the United tes, the method if lighting in which ney are employed is now familiar to every one, although it was introduced only about 20 years ago. Yet very probably there are but few persons who use the mantles who know how they are made or what they are made of. Here is a brief summary:

Knitting. A thread of suitable size is knit into a tubular fabric on a machine modified from those used in knitting underwear. A large variety of stitches is made and designated as single weave, double weave, triple weave, etc.

Saturating. The lengths of knitted fabric are placed in a suitable vessel, and the so-called lighting fluid is poured over them. After the fabrii is soaked in the lighting fluid for a certain length of time it is put through an equalizer for the purpose of equalizing the amount of fluid carried by each web. The fabric is then placed upon suitable forms of glass or wood and dried.

Sewing. The fabric is now taken and folded in at one end and carefully plaited and in ashestos cord drawn through to form the head and loop of the mantle.

Modelling. After the head is made the saturated fabric is shaped over a wooden form.

Burning out. The modelled fabric s then hung on a suitable hook and ignited at the top. The thread is burned out, leaving the ash composed of the oxide of thorium and cerium.

Hardening. After the cotten is burned out the soft, flabby ash is placed over a blowpipe, where the gas and air are controlled in such a way as to blow it out in the form of a

Dipping. In order to prepare the mantle for the subsequent handling and for shipment it is dipped into a bath of collodion and allowed to dry Trimming. After the collodionized mantles are thoroughly dried they are pased to an operator, who trims off the rough edges of the skirt and reduces the mantles to a uniform length



Club Votes for Public Ownership.

Public utilities should be stateowned. This was the decision of the Cathedral Men's Debating Club at last night's sesion, when the debate ranged round the resolution "That public utilities should be stateowned." The leaders of the sides were: affirmative, Rev. J. Brinton and Hugh G. Ford; and negative, Geo. H. House and H. Hawkins. Speakers from the floor were: James Jacobs. H. Noonan, Conrad B. Hefferton and J. R. Smallwood. The affirmative side won by several votes, although the negative side put up a plucky fight. It was made clear by the affirmative that t was the principle involved in the esolution which had to be debated. The resolution did not read "now," or "at the present time." There was no time limit. It might be now or a hundred years hence. The affirmative side naintained that the principle of public ownership of public utilities was right, even though at the present time it might be generally impracticable. It did not follow that it would be always impracticable. The negative side rested its case on the fact that in most cases where public ownership of public utilities had been tried in recent, and in war and post-war, years, it has failed. Instances of such failures were cited.


AN ABERDEEN SENSATION.





REFRIGERATING MACHINERY.

The boiler plant consists of two 212-H.P. Heine cross-drum high pres sure water tube boilers, supplier through a feed-water heater made by the Harrisson Safety Boiler Company The engines are Ames Unaflow type direct connected to Allis-Chalmer 100 KVA two-phase, 60-cycle, 220 volt 277 R.P.M. generators. This equip ment supplies lights as well as power to the whole plant.

The condensing equipment was fur nished by the Schutte-Koerting Company and is multifet efector type The pumping equipment consists of two 1,000-gallon pumps furnished by the Union Steam Pump Service Company of Battle Creek, Mich.

Refrigeration equipment was designed and manufactured by the Carbondale Machinery Company and consists of two generators, two absorbers, two brine coolers, three exchanges, ammonia pumps, condensers, receivers and rectifiers.

From an operating standpoint the plant has proved a success, but whether or not the project of freezing fish for transportation to France will prove profitable cannot be judged until an exhaustive effort has been made to popularize frozen fish in Paris and environs, which it is understood will be commenced during the coming winter.-N.Y. Fishing Gazette.

York and Lancaster United.

It was on January 19, 1486, that Henry VII. of England married Elizabeth of York, and thus ended the Wars of the Roses by uniting the Houses of York and Lancaster by the strongest of ties, those of mutual interest, if not of mutual affection. Henry had a difficult part to play before his accession to the English throne, for many of his supporters were anxious that he should marry Elizabeth of York before he had gained, by might or strategy, the throne of England. Henry, however was determined to reign as England's lawful king and not to assume the subordinate position which that step would have necessitated. He had no intention of reigning by favour of his wife, andalthough he readily swore in the Cathedral of Rheims to reconcile the hostile parties by contracting an alliance with Edward IV's daughter-he took care that the marriage was not definitely settled until by his victory at Bosworth, and the death of Richard III. on the battle field, he had attained the Crown by means of his own resolute and spirited policy.

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
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
