## Germany's Reparations Due Every Ten Days.

### First Payment Made to France-- Armed Men Raid Police Barracks--One Million Pounds For Irish Free State-- Arctic Explorer Sued by Lecture Manager.

**GERMANY PAYS.** PARIS, Jan. 18. Germany made her first payment of 21,000,000 gold marks in accordance with the recent decision of the Reparations Commission at Spa, providing for such payment every ten days pending a decision of the whole reparations issue.

**POLICE BARRACKS RAIDED.** BELFAST, Jan. 18. The police barracks at Charlestown, County Mayo, were raided by fifty men to-day, who escaped with considerable quantity of arms and ammunition.

**FINES FOR NEW GOVERNMENT.** DUBLIN, Jan. 18. The Bank of Ireland has agreed to pay one million pounds to the Irish Provisional Government.

**WHAT ABOUT THE LOSSES?** WINNIPEG, Jan. 18. The question of profits between Grain Dealers and Producers by means of participation certificates is urged by the Canadian Government in a resolution to be presented by the House of Commons by J. Barnier, member for St. Boniface. Compelling the Grain Dealers to furnish annually to the Government full returns of grain handled, cost and profits, and to make average and screening certificates, it also requested.

**TRUBLE IN EGYPT.** CAIRO, Jan. 18. In connection with the receipt of a letter from the British Legation in Egypt, the British Legation in Cairo, who were on guard, obliged to fire in self-defence. Two natives were killed and six wounded, dying later. Some of the British Legation's employees and several police officers were injured.

**STEFFANSON AGAIN IN TROUBLE.** NEW YORK, Jan. 18. The Arctic explorer, Stefansson, is being sued here by Lee Clark, lecture bureau manager, who claims that the explorer failed to pay to the contract to give lectures under his management. Stefansson filed his answer yesterday, in which he complains of an alleged zealotism on the part of the manager in press agenting him. "Exaggerated and untruthful representations were made," he charges, "with respect to defendant's scientific work and discoveries, and these were of a character as to seriously injure the reputation of the defendant as a scientist, and also as an authority on matters concerning the Arctic regions of the United States and Canada and elsewhere." In addition he charged Lee Clark, by continuing to advertise lectures after he had informed that his health would not permit him to give any, had caused many people to believe he was not reliable in the matter of keeping appointments. He counter claims for twenty thousand dollars.

**FINES SENTENCED.** LONDON, Jan. 18. Six men charged with complicity in the theft of machine guns and rifles, last November, from the Barracks, at Windsor, and the Barracks, in London, were sentenced to-day to twelve months' imprisonment. One other was sentenced to six months and two more were discharged.

**ARRESTS IN CALCUTTA.** CALCUTTA, Jan. 18. Forty-four persons were arrested for civil disobedience.

**UNIONIST HAS BIG VICTORY.** LONDON, Jan. 18. Percy Newman, Coalition Unionist, was elected in Tamworth Division, Warwickshire, by a majority of over the Labor candidate. The victory was caused by the death of Wilson Fox, Coalition Unionist, who died in 1918.

**RUSSIA'S REPRESENTATIVES.** MOSCOW, Jan. 18. The Premier Lenin or Foreign Minister Chicherin will head the Russian Soviet delegation to the Economic Conference, it was officially announced to-day. Other members include Leonid Krassin, Minister of Trade and Commerce, and Maxim Litvinoff, Chief of the Legations abroad.

**FLUENZA AGAIN EPIDEMIC.** LONDON, Jan. 18. An outbreak of influenza is still spreading, and submarine crews are being put to sea for their annual voyage with the Atlantic fleet because of the ravages among them. At the attendance of children at

moving picture theatres is prohibited and public schools are closed. At Northampton one-tenth of the teaching staff is down with the disease. Twenty-five deaths occurred at Birmingham last week, while for the month 120 deaths are reported from Middlesborough. The weather is now cold and it is thought will cause an abatement in the epidemic.

**SOUTH AFRICA'S FINANCE.** LONDON, Jan. 18. Apart from the miners' strike the financial outlook in South Africa is rather less gloomy than anticipated. Reuter's Cape Town correspondent says. While the newspapers forecast that the budget will show a deficit of four million pounds sterling, an official statement puts the figures at 1,750,000 pounds sterling.

**POPE SUFFERING FROM COLD.** ROME, Jan. 18. Pope Benedict was suffering from a cold to-day.

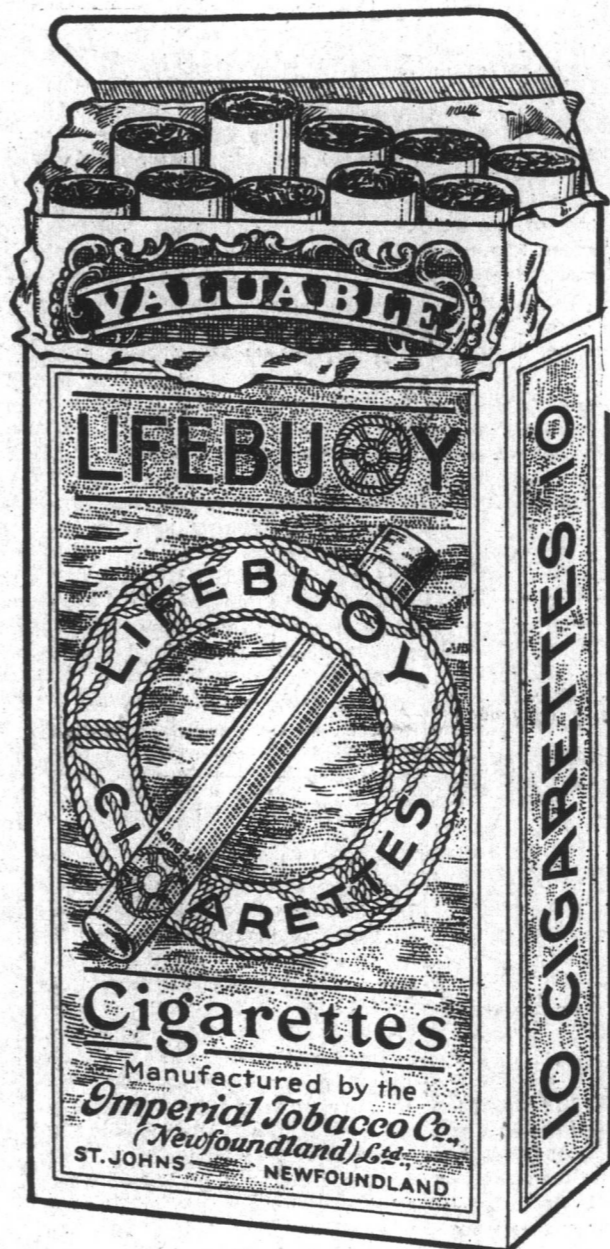

## Making Gas Mantles.

Millions of incandescent gas mantles are used yearly in the United States, the method of lighting in which they are employed is now familiar to every one, although it was introduced only about 30 years ago. Yet very probably there are but few persons who use the mantles who know how they are made or what they are made of. Here is a brief summary:

**Knitting.** A thread of suitable size is knit into a tubular fabric on a machine modified from those used in knitting underwear. A large variety of stitches is made and designated as single weave, double weave, triple weave, etc.

**Saturating.** The lengths of knitted fabric are placed in a suitable vessel, and the so-called lighting fluid is poured over them. After the fabric is soaked in the lighting fluid for a certain length of time it is put through an equalizer for the purpose of equalizing the amount of fluid carried by each web. The fabric is then placed upon suitable forms of glass or wood and dried.

**Sewing.** The fabric is now taken and folded in at one end and carefully plaited and in asbestos cord drawn through to form the head and loop of the mantle.

**Modelling.** After the head is made the saturated fabric is shaped over a wooden form.

**Burning out.** The modelled fabric is then hung on a suitable hook and ignited at the top. The thread is burned out, leaving the ash composed of the oxide of thorium and cerium.

**Hardening.** After the cotton is burned out the soft, flabby ash is placed over a blowpipe, where the gas and air are controlled in such a way as to blow it out in the form of a mantle.

**Dipping.** In order to prepare the mantle for the subsequent handling and for shipment it is dipped into a bath of collodion and allowed to dry.

**Trimming.** After the collodionized mantles are thoroughly dried they are passed to an operator, who trims off the rough edges of the skirt and reduces the mantles to a uniform length.

## Two Governors Resign

### HIGH COST OF LIVING AND DOMINION APPOINTMENTS.

In the House of Commons recently Mr. Churchill informed Sir Newton Moore that the Governors of South Australia and Tasmania had, to his regret, found it necessary to resign their appointments. He could not say whether this step had been taken as a result of the heavy taxation now levied in England.

Sir Newton Moore asked whether in future appointments guarantees would be obtained from the governors designate as would prevent a repetition of such an unsatisfactory state of things.

Mr. Churchill said the question was a very difficult one in view of the heavy expenditure of the appointments and the difficulty of finding suitable persons who had sufficient private means.

### Club Votes for Public Ownership.

Public utilities should be state-owned. This was the decision of the Cathedral Men's Debating Club at last night's session, when the debate ranged round the resolution "That public utilities should be state-owned." The leaders of the sides were: affirmative, Rev. J. Brinton and Hugh G. Ford; and negative, Geo. H. House and H. Hawkins. Speakers from the floor were: James Jacobs, H. Noonan, Conrad B. Hefferton and J. R. Smallwood. The affirmative side won by several votes, although the negative side put up a plucky fight. It was made clear by the affirmative that it was the principle involved in the resolution which had to be debated. The resolution did not read "now," or "at the present time." There was no time limit. It might be now or a hundred years hence. The affirmative side maintained that the principle of public ownership of public utilities was right, even though at the present time it might be generally impracticable. It did not follow that it would be always impracticable. The negative side rested its case on the fact that in most cases where public ownership of public utilities had been tried in recent, and in war and post-war, years, it has failed. Instances of such failures were cited.

### The Princess's Wedding.

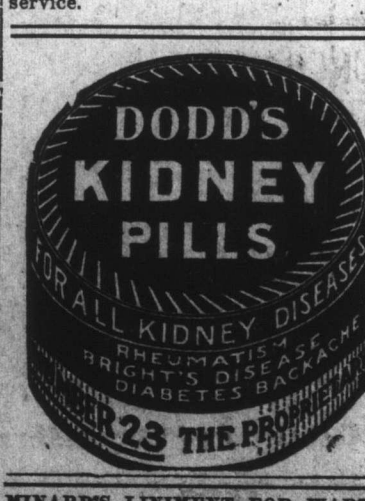
GETTING THE ABBEY READY FOR THE CEREMONY.  
Preparations for the wedding of Princess Mary and Viscount Lascelles are being steadily advanced. Shortly workmen will be busy in Westminster Abbey erecting galleries round the nave to provide increased accommodation for the ceremony. The organization of the Marys' Gift is practically complete. Answers are gradually being received to the cables sent to the Dominions, and nearly every country in Great Britain has its organizer. Among the many notable Marys who have undertaken county organization are Lady Mary Astley Cooper, Dorset; Lady Mary Montagu, Huntingdonshire; the Countess of Leicester, Norfolk; Lady Katharine Mary Bulwer-Lytton, Hertfordshire; Lady Mary Thynne, Somersetshire; Lady Mary Crichton, Berkshire; Lady Elphinstone, Edinburgh; and the Countess of Lindsay, Fife. A youthful organizer is Lady Mary Onslow, who is looking after Surrey. She is only 11. Lady Mary Cambridge, who is regarded as certain to be a bride-maid at the wedding, is organizing Shropshire, and Lady Mary Howard is in charge of West Sussex. The Royal Family are likely to be at Sandringham for some time yet. It is customary for them to remain in Norfolk for most of January, as the King likes a little quiet sport and a rest to prepare him for the coming season. Princess Mary and Lord Lascelles have had a little hunting since their arrival at Sandringham.

### Scene in Church.

AN ABERDEEN SENSATION.  
An incident which caused not a little sensation is reported to have occurred in Woodside Parish Church, Aberdeen, on a recent Sunday, as the result of a dispute between the minister and the organist. The trouble arose in connection with the musical arrangements for the church services. On this matter the minister, the Rev. P. A. Dunn, and the organist, Mr. Andrew Henderson, held different views. The organist claimed more power in the selection of the music than the minister was disposed to grant, and Mr. Dunn took up the position that he must select the music, with a view to harmonizing the whole service. The matter was referred to the elders, a majority of whom decided that the organist should tender his resignation. The organist resigned, and was made the recipient of farewell gifts by the church choir.  
Sunday was Mr. Henderson's final day of duty at the organ, and immediately the minister entered the church at the forenoon service he began playing "See the Conquering Hero Comes." The incident created an immediate sensation amongst the congregation.  
One lady at once rose and left the building, while another lady, on the impulse of the moment, seized a book with the intention of hurling it at the head of the organist, and was only prevented from doing so by another person grasping her arm. The minister was much affected by the incident, but ignored it and proceeded with the service.
