W. R. to Toronto. Reshipment on the Grand Trunk at Guelph is not to be thought of, as it is the exclusive traffic of the North-west that incites the Great Western to support with its countenance the W. G. & B. Co. The failure of the Toronto, Grey and Bruce Company to build their line, would be the signal for all the Municipalities in the North-west to move in support of the W. G. & B. as the next best project. The Hamilton people had the trade of the country in dispute, down the old Brock Road, before the G. T. R. to Guelph was built, and their connections being formed, they have kept it, and the increase, pretty much to themselves until lately. The G. T. R. Co., more anxions to move freight to the eastern sections of the line, left the stuff seeking shipment from Guelph to Lake Ontario, very much to the G. W. R. and Hamilton and Guelph merchants.
