Town and County Items.

Yesterday a gentleman of sporting propensities lost \$20 to the keeper of a livery stable, being a bet which he made that a span of horses belonging to the latter could not trot a mile in four minutes. They did it in 3.53.

The Guelph Amateur Dramatic Club are going to Elora next Wednesday night, and will play in the Drill Shed in that village, the drama of "The Drunkard." We can say to the people of Elora that the same play has been highly appreciated on more than one occasion by a Guelph audience.

TAYLOR TO-NIGHT.—Remember that the English Comique, Mr. James Taylor, will appear in the Town Hall to-night. He has acted before Royalty itself, and his testimonials bear witness that he has given satisfaction. "A night in merry old England," which is the piece on the programme gives him opportunity for assuming different guises, and displaying his wonderful versatility of talent.

BOARD OF TRADE MEETING.—A meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade was held last night to take into consideration the propriety of parties taking stock in the Dominion Express Company. After the matter had been discussed for some time, it was moved by John McCrea, seconded by Mr. Wilkie, that this Board of Trade having heard the statements submitted by Mr. Rogerson, on behalf of the Merchants' Express Company, and believing that the business of the Dominion would be greatly benefited by the establishment of such a Company, beg to commend it to the favourable consideration of the business men of Guelph.

UNIVERSITY EXAMINATION.—We are glad to see by the printed class and prize lists of the recent University Examinations that the students from Guelph make a very creditable appearance, J. Goldie and John Black taking honours in classics, and D. Stewart and J. Wilkie stand high in the third class of classics, having made considerable advancement in their ratings since examined for matriculation. J. Black also takes honours in English Grammar, and Natural History, J. Wilkie in Chemistry, J. Goldie stands high in French and German, so does Wilkie in German and Stewart in English; all four stand high in Mathematics.

SODA WATER FOUNTAIN.—Mr. Berry has the only soda water fountain now in town. It is of Italian marble, shaped like an ordinary cottage, and was made in Boston by Mr. J. W. Tuft who procured a patent for it a short time ago. It is really a rich and beautiful fountain. The soda water having ascended from the cylinder below the counter traverses several windings of a pipe laid in ice, and is discharged when required from a large silver plated tube. In other draught-tubes, one on each side of that mentioned, are designed for the drawing off of mineral water. A number of taps, silver-plated also, are arranged in a row along the front of the fountain, and a touch of one of these suffices to gratify the choice of the drinker with the flavor of strawberry, raspberry, pineapple, ginger, &c. Ladies are supplied with silver-plated glass-holders, and there are moustache cups for gentlemen. The fountain is a very fine one, and Mr. Berry deserves all the patronage which hot, dry weather would be sure to bring him.

DOMINION DAY.—Every person is encouraging of everybody else on the street if anything is to be done towards getting up a celebration on the anniversary of Confederation. It does look as if the days of big celebrations in Guelph had passed; but it is thought that an effort should be made to have a demonstration of some kind on the first of July, particularly as the Queen's Birthday was allowed to pass over with negative notice, that is, by simply suspending work, and letting those who wanted to witness or engage in exciting amusement seek the scene elsewhere. It is evident that if there is to be fun there must first be a committee to raise subscriptions. The Town Council have not a cent to spare, and the celebration must therefore be contingent on private liberality. There are some gentlemen who have a little spare time on hand, or whose occupations are such that canvassing would not interfere with the despatch of their business; let them try. It will have been observed from notices which have appeared in the MERCURY that a number of picnics have been arranged to take place in the vicinity during the day. We shall be happy to note any progress that may be made towards the attainment of an end which seems to be universally desired.

Ross Robertson, Toronto, Grand Lecturer; Bro. Wm. White, Tweed, Grand Director of Ceremonies; Bro. M. B. Hicks, Toronto, Deputy Grand Secretary; Bro. Dr. Johnson, St. Catharines, Deputy Grand Treasurer; Bro. H. Lemmon, Brantford, and Bro. T. E. Young, Picton, Deputy Grand Lecturers; Rev. G. S. Mullen, Oenabruck, Rev. Elliott Grasset, Simcoe, Rev. A. Dawson, Eganville, Rev. M. Morris, Rev. W. Burns, Omemee, Rev. J. R. Thompson, Halifax, Rev. D. Fitzgerald, Charlottetown, Rev. P. E. T. Bliss, New Brunswick, Rev. W. L. Scott, Three Rivers, Rev. G. Hill, Markham, Deputy Grand Chaplains.

ACCEPTED.—A letter has been received from England, stating that the Rev. Ashton Oxenden, Anglican Bishop elect of the Montreal diocese, and Metropolitan, has accepted his election.

Congregational Union.
MONTREAL, June 12th.
The Union met, and after a prayer meeting, which lasted for an hour, resumed business.

Rev. Mr. Smith read the narrative of the state of religion in the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec during the past year. During no previous year had there been so many accessions to the various Congregational Churches through conversions, nor so many new ministers taken into the ranks. The progress of temperance was also noted in connection with the churches.

Rev. Dr. Robinson reported the work of the Indian Missionary Society. Satisfactory progress was noted.

Rev. Dr. Wilkes spoke of the Labrador Mission. The laborers of this mission were Congregationalists, but much of the funds by which it was supported, were given by Presbyterians. A Miss McFarlane, from Maine, a real heroine, had raised about \$500 in gold in the United States to give to this work, and had herself gone there with it. The people are mostly fishermen, and a church is established among them under the charge of the Rev. Mr. Butler.

The Finance Committee's report was read, showing a deficiency of \$142. To meet this deficiency it was recommended that the sum of \$2.25 be deducted from the travelling expenses of each delegate. The report was laid on the table.

Moved by Rev. W. F. Clark and seconded by Rev. J. Rogers, that it be a special instruction from this Union to its delegates to corresponding bodies in the United States, to convey, along with our most cordial assurances of national kindness and ecclesiastical unity, our strong sense of the undesirableness and impropriety of all allusions to annexation, in the addresses and letters of representative brethren from the other side of the line.

After some discussion the resolution was withdrawn the mover saying that the principal object he had in view had been accomplished when an expression of opinion was obtained.

June 14th.
An hour was spent in the usual devotional exercises.

The Rev. W. F. Smith read an essay on revival, referring to some misconceptions on the subject, and pointing out the different accompanying characteristics of the divine visitations, according to the circumstances of the district and the habits of the people. He also answered some objections to what he called, these extraordinary manifestations of zeal, which however, were justified by their blessed results; nor could the same amount of zeal and energy, perhaps, be employed in any other channels. At the same time he cautioned churches and individuals against certain dangers connected with the revivals, such as neglect of other departments of Christian labour and a feeling of subsequent lassitude at a time when the results of the revivals ought to be secured and consolidated. He also warned against the possibility of spurious revivals and spurious conversions, and the depending too much on rapturous states of feeling.

An address to His Excellency the Governor General, on his accession to the Government of the Dominion, was read and adopted.

The Rev. George Douglas, and the Rev. Mr. Borland, both of Montreal, were then introduced by the Rev. Dr. Wilkes, as a deputation from the Wesleyan Conference.

It was resolved that the session of the Union in 1870 be held in Toronto.

The Rev. Robert Campbell, minister of St. Gabriel's church Montreal, was then introduced by the Rev. Dr. Wilkes, as a delegate, to convey the fraternal greetings of the Synod of the Church of Scotland in Canada to the Congregational Union.

The Rev. W. F. Clarke, the Rev. J. R. Dickson, and Mr. O'Hara of Bowmanville, were appointed delegates to the Temperance Union at Toronto.

In the evening the Rev. W. F. Clarke delivered an address on the progress of congregational principles as developed and developing amongst other bodies. Some remarks by other members followed, and then the proceedings of the Union were brought to a close.

Canada Presbyterian Church Synod.
HAMILTON, June 15th.

The Committee on statistics handed in their report, from which we gather the following: Number of ministers on roll, 295; number having congregations, 284; congregations who have not sent returns, 30; number of families on returns sent in, 15,448; adding for those who have not reported, the total families will be 27,688; increase of families, 2,854; total communicants, 46,341; increase of communicants, 5,472; total persons under influence of the church, 128,440; children attending Sabbath schools, 26,584; increase of children attending Sabbath schools, 1,754; number in Bible classes, 7,829; increase of number in Bible classes, 353.

The Synod afterwards resolved itself into a conference on the state of religion in the evening addresses were delivered by Rev. Donald Fraser, delegate from the Free Church of Scotland, Robt. Carter, Esq, delegate from the American Presbyterian Church, and from Rev. S. J. Rogers from the Reformed Dutch Church.

A resolution of welcome was unanimously passed.

June 16th.
Col. Haultain moved a committee to draft an address from the Synod to His Excellency the Governor General of the Dominion, Sir John Young.

Reports from Committees on Records of Synod and the several Presbyteries were each taken up in their turn and passed.

The draft of the new Act on the reception of ministers from other bodies was read, and a debate thereon ensued.

THE PEACE JUBILEE.—The Coliseum was packed on Wednesday with fully fifty thousand people. Every seat was taken, and thousands were glad to find even standing room. President Grant's reception on entering was most enthusiastic. The programme to-day was mainly of a classical character. The Starspangled Banner and the Anvil Chorus aroused tremendous enthusiasm, and were both repeated.

MORE EMIGRANTS.—Thirteen car-loads of emigrants, sent out under the auspices of the Misses Logan and McPherson and E. Hobert, arrived on Wednesday morning in Toronto, by the Grand Trunk Railway. Mr. Donaldson is taking steps to find employment for them, and those that are wanting help should call at the Emigration Office as soon as possible.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Mr. Motley's Instructions.

Mr. Forney in a despatch which has been sent from Washington to the Philadelphia Press, a few days ago, gives the following as the instructions under which Mr. Motley is to act.

The Government is in daily expectation of news of the presentation of Minister Motley to the Queen. His time thus far since his arrival in Great Britain has been occupied in arranging matters of a personal character, and it is understood that he is now ready to make his formal appearance at Court.

A vote of thanks being given to the chairman, the company separated, expressing their satisfaction in the proceedings of the company.

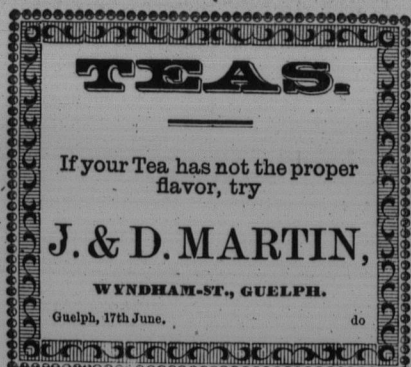
