This appears to have been proved, and the natural result one would have thought would have been the voiding of the election. But another and singular result followed. The names of the petitioners themselves were on the voters' list that was proved illegal, and the count held that as they were not on any legal list of voters, and as a petitioner must be a duly qualified voter, they therefore, not being duly qualified voters, had no right to petition against the return. As they were the only ones who had petitioned, it was held that there was no legal petition at all, and so the case was dismissed. The result of this singular decipion—which we are bound to assume to be a true interpretation of the law—is, that while an irregularly constructed voters' list does not give the persons on it the right to petition against an election, it gives them the right to elect a member of Farliament. Mr. Ryan can hold a seat given him on the basis of an Mlegal list, but his seat cannot be petitioned against on that basis, because they who prove all the votes to have been illegal, prove their own illegal also, and thereby lose the right of protest.
