NO COURT HAS BEEN ABOLISHED; there has only been a change of name. The high court is declared to be "a continuaetc. tion" of the three courts which compose it, and possessed of the same jurisdiction. Furthermore, every existing judge is decapable and liable to perform all duties which he would have been capable or liable to perform, as if the new act had not

passed.

Why, then, should it be considered that the commissions of the judges had expired? There has been a fusion of the courts, but none of them have been abolished. The wounded president had yesterday another day of little change. His appetite has improved and the condition of his stomach is more favorable. In the afternoon the swollen gland was opened and a small quantity of pus escaped. This was immediately followed by an increase of pulse, which continued until late in the evening. There is further talk about the removal of the patient from the white house, and Dr. Bliss telegraphed Dr. Agnew at Philadelphia yesterday to return to Washington at once to consider the matter. The president himself appears to be possessed with a morbid desire to get away—which can't be regarded as a good sign.


