- It is stated that the United States wilt offer $\$ 1,000,000$ indematy to Camada for the fisheries. Cheek!
- Mr. Bolckow, M.P., of England, has entered another action in the Superior Court aganst the Sonth Eastern Railway Company.
- The American ishemen on the P. P . Islaid shores, with few exceptions, are reported as having met with noor sucecs.
-The patent oflice at Washington was seriously danaged by fie on donday, and a large number of valuable models destroyed.
-Still they come. The Fidelity Savings Bank of Chicaro suspended payment on Mouday. A peceiver lins been applied for.

- Tho Merchants Bank will close its Pembroke agency in a few days.
- The mumber of buildings now going up in St. John, N.B., is about 700, of whiel 300 are of brick.
- The Kingston leml smetting works wore formally opened last Friday. They are the only works of the kind in Cmada.
- The Ontario Provincial Exhibition is being held in Jaondon this week. Whe entries number 10,300 , boing 700 more than last sear.
- The first cargo of this season's herrings from Labrador, consisting of 2,974 barrels and: 059 half barrels, arrived in this port the end of last week.
- The question is to be testad at Inaliftx, whether vessels belonging to' residents and registered as belonging to the port are liable for city taxes.
- Commencing on Monlay next, metcorological reports will be forwarded by telegraph and posted up in n number of the principal post offices in the Dominion.
- It is said that the Gulf Ports SS. Company intend running $a$ weekly line of steamers between New York, Porto Rico nnd St. Thomas during the coming winter.
- The well-known firn of Joal Scales \& Co., tobncco manulacturers, Toronto, liave dissolyed. Mr. Scales will henceforth conduct the business alone.
- The Manitoba Mennonites are abont to crect a steam flouring mill on their reserve. A manufacturing firm at Baden, Ont.; have receired an order for the machinery, which is to be shipped by 1 st December.
- Bargemen at Otiawn have asked for an increase of 50 cents per thousand feet in lumber freights, but owing to the aniness of trude have been refused. Vessels may be had at the old rate, $\$ 2.25$.

- The labor difliculty that has so long existed between the firm of Messrs. R. R. Dobell \& (Oo. and the Ship Siblarers' Society of Quebec has been satisfactorily setted, and the men have returned to their work as before.
-Vessel owners at 'loronto nre protesting agranst the Govemment granting pemits to American tugs and burges to cary grain from Kingston to Montreal, there being sufficient ressels owned by Canadians to do this service. - 'The Allans' elipuer ship Cibenfant, which left here on Saturday, went ashore near Jativaltrie. A portion of her cargo was transfered to lighters, and sie was got off on duesilay withont damage. She had on board a valumble cargo of brendstails, se.
- The SS. Sarmatian, Cupt. Nird, has made the fastest tine on recoid between Lirerpool and Quebec, by 5 hours and 30 minntes. She landed her mails in odnys 2 et hours after receiph, and they were delivered in Montreal on Saturday at 110 clock.
- Mr. Kew, of the lim of Kew, Stobart d Co., North West taders with headegurters in Win-: mipeg, has retired. Nr. Jien, a cousin of Mr. Stobart, has been admitted. The firm will henceforth beknown as Stobart, Bden \& Co.
- Some traders are in the habit of issuing adyertisuments in the form of bank bills. This is illegul. Mhere are at present wo such in circulation in this city, of the denomination o fifty cents and one dollar. They are such good imitations of genuine bills that the unwary are linble to be deceived by them.
- The estate of Sparks \& Crawford, Ottawa, has prid the following dividends: Orawford, personal, 20 cents in the dollar; Sparks, persoma, 5 cents; the firm, 3 cents. The book debts of the estate, umounting to $\$ 9,000$, were sold for $4 \frac{1}{2}$ cents on the dollar.
- At a mectiug of the creditors of Pouliot
\& Robitaille, of Quebec, Napoleon Pouliot offer-
ed a composition of 60 cents on the clollat secared, which was aceepted. At a meeting of the creditors of P.J. H.Hensley, of Montreal, 55 cents on the dullar, secired, was offered and atecepted.
- An Ottawa lumber firm has been awarded the contract for the building of the following stations along the Q. M. U. \& O. R. R. line: Cahmet, Dointan Ohene, Montebello, Japinuatville, North Nation Mills, Ange Gardien, I'lurso, Buckingham, Gati neath Ioint, Aylmer. Whe contract price is $\$ 2,000$.
- A prssenger ly the Sarmotion was arrested by the Quebee Customs anblborities on Siturday, and $\$ 40,000$ worth of damonds in his hossession seized for an alleged attempt to sumggle. A roblery took place un the steamer, aud he was suspected of having liad to do with it, but was acquitled of that cbarge.
- A Prescott (Ont.) puer says that hop pickiug in that scction is now finished, and the growers are busily engaged in preparing them for market. One man had six acres under hops, and estimates the crop at abont five toms, a yield that has never been surpassed there. Prices are likely to rule low on aecount of the abundiant crop.
- A despatch from Sarnia says that the Presidents of the Grand Tronk and Grent Western Railways have issued instrictions to their executives to maintain equal or agreed rates, fares, and facilities, and have concurred in the appointment of a Joint Committee of the two Boards for the better enforcement of these ins|ructions.

I'lie I'rolecleur had on bonrd 10,000 bushels jeas. The cargo was insured in the Merchants Marine for its full value, and is partly re-insured in another compaiy. The barge is owned by Mr. Hubert Lavallie, and its value is estimated at nbout $\$ 4,000$. There was no insurance upon it.

Mr. G. II. Dumesnil, a genteman well known in business circles, has been appointed by the Board to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Goff. The President of the Montrenl, Portland and Boston Railway; as well as the new manager of the Cunada Agricultural Insumance Company, have our warmest wishes for their succiss.
- The general terms have been agreed on for a lease of the Oanadn Southern Railway and its dependencies (excepting the Ohicago and Canada Southern) to the Nev York Central and Fludsou, the tems being that the present Canada Soathern first mortgage bonds shall bo called in and nev bouds issued in their place, to bear 3 per cent for three years and 5 per cont. for the next succecding seventeen years. The other bonds of the Unada Southern are to be scaled down, and new 3 to 5 per cent. bonds issued for them. The whole of the latter will amount to $\$ 14,000,000$. As Mr. Vanderbilt owns $\$ 1,800,000$ of Canadn Southern bonds and $\$ 10,000,000$ of Canada Suathern stock; this road practically liecomes a Vanderbilt property, which will take its chances with Nev

- The import trade of St. John, N.B., has increased largely duing the past cight months. The value of goods entered for comsumption and warehouse is given as $\$ 671,441$, which is more than double what it was in the same period of 1870. This is accounted for by the fuct that a large quantity of merclinadise was destroyed in the late fire which had to be replaced; and by returning activity in many branches of tinde. The increase in the amount of duties collected is signifieant, as it indicates that there has been a large call for goods to meet the increased consumptive demand. The exports in August foot up 5440,890 , as aghinst 371,850 the corresponding month last jear. The time of St. John, notwithstanding the serions check which it received by the late fire, seems to be in a bealtiyg and fairly prosperous condition.
- Cannda bids fair to make a very credinbie exhibit at the Paris Exhibition next year. T. O. Feefer, the Dominion Commissioner, has been risiting the provincial and. local shows, and selecting articles of neeit to send. Dr. May has been visiting mannfacturing centres with a like purpose. The English catilogue will not only give a description of Camadn, but uferery city, town and village from which any exhibitors come, and will also show the eharaeter and extent of the manulicturiag industries in ench, as well as the faciities of production and shipjing possessed by ench single producer, it is also moposed to interest the different arricultumal societies in the country to collect specimens on the stalk of the different cereals grown in Onnada, in order to show the number of grains on ench head, and the chargeter and quality of the straw. Models in wax of our fruits and regetables will be shown. The Government will spire no pains to make this ccuntry appear to the best ndvanage.

Somerville, $n$ mabble dealer of Ota O , is in a tight place, and wants an extension of $9,12,35,18$ and $2 t$ months, with interest, at 7 per cent, secured by in second mortgage on reat estate. He shows good assets of Sll,000and nominal ussels of $\$ 10,0 \% 0$. He has $\$ 10,000$ of book debts not included in the above, of which about $\$ 1200$ may be classed as doubtfal and the rest but. This is certanly a very latre sim to be debited to profit and loss, and probatbly might have been lessened with proper cotreand attention. It is hatily the thing for a man to necept Government appointmenis to the detriment, us it may prove, of his creditors' interests.

FINANCE AND JNSURANCE REVIEW:
MONTREAL, SEPT. $28,1877$.
THE RECEN'J STRIKISS.
The last number of the North American Revicu contains an interesting letter addressed to the editor by Col. Thomas Scott, one of the railway magnates of the United States, on the subject of the recent strikes. It is too long for insertion, but our readers will be interested in knowing the views of a leading capitalist as to the canse and consequence of a strike of the most formidable character that has occurred for many, years. It was on the 16 th July that the firemen and freight brakemen of the Baltimore and Olio Railroad struck work at Martinsberg, in West Virginia, and it soon becane known that no freight trains were allowed to pass that point in cither direction. The movement spread in every direction with great rapillity, and the conseguence was an embargo on the entire freight trafic of more than 20,000 miles of railway, while the whole passenger trafic and the movenent of the mails was at the mercy of a nob. Great commercial cities like Chicaro and St. Louis were suljected to a violent disturbance of all their business relations, and worse than all, the great manufacturing city of Pittsburgh was
made for 24 hours a scene of riot, arson and bloodshed. Th several other cities and States the laws were set at defiance, the properties of the various railway companies seized; injured and in some cases destroyed, the civil anthorities overpowered or overawed, and even the military organizations of several States called out only to be proved inefficient. The xioters acted as such people have frequently acted elsewhere under the influence of a kind of insanity. Suffering from the depression of the times which necessitated a reduction of wages, they resorted to a destruction of the very property, the existence of which alone rendered the payment of any wages possible. Mr. Scott goes back to 1873 as the origin of the de pression, or wither he refers to that period as the time when the weight of the burclen which the civil war imposed upon the country began to be severely felt. In a few hours there was a total collapse of that eredit on which the whole fabric of the apparent prosperity rested, and as a consequenco the capital which had been freely lent to all enterprizes oflering, where there was even a show of prospective profit, was suddenly withdrawn. Since that time every important inclustry in the country has been compelled to practice tho closest and most rigid economy in order to escape marketing its products at an absolute loss. All the industries of the country have, it is said, passed through the same experience; the cotton and woollen mills of Now England, the furnaces and mines of Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indian, Illinois and Missouri have the same story to tell. In many establishments the business has been carried on chiofly in order to give employment to the operatives, and without aflording any prolit to the owners. The very milroads which were selected for mob violence and oprobrium had given orders in advance for rails not required at the time, in order to prevent the closing of the large rolling mills in Pemsylvania. It is further asserted that the reason for the milways reducing local freight charges to tho lowest points ever known was to aid the depressed industries of the country, and to cnable manufacturers to continue business and thus keep their men steadily employed. It is asserted with regard to the special class of ralway employees, firemen and frejght brakemen, that there are few vailways in the United States that are not employing a much larger foree than their business requires. The policy of the railway companies in leducing wages was to ena: ble a larger number of employees than was actually required to earn a competence during the period of severe depres-
sion, to the close of which all business men were looking forward. Mr. Scott, we are glad to notice, emphatically denies that any considerable portion of the outrages on life and property were committed by railway employees. On the important lines of railway his estimate is that 90 per cent. of the men where strikes occurred were faithful to their duties, and either remained at work or stood ready to resume it whenever they were relieved from the intimidation to which they were subjected by the rioters and their leaders. It was a small minority of discontented men who, as General Hurleert of Ilmois expressed himself, "pemited them. "selves to be the muclens around which "tho idle, vicious and criminal element "could gather. Reinforced by these dark "and disreputatble allies, they destroyed "property, stopped commerce, deranged "the mails, burned great public buildings, "broko up tracks, amb thus paralyzed the "natural circulation of the Common"wealth." The paper before us urges the necessity of this most important subject receiving the earnest attention of the members at the approaching Session of Congress. The able lawyers, it is hoped, will franc a law which will give to the owners of every highway carrying interState commere, whether by land or water, in which citizens of different States are interested, or carrying tho United States mails or other Government property, the right to appear by petition properly verified before the tribunals of the United States, in orcler to show that the movement of such traflic has been interfered with by unlawfil combinations, by threats or by violence, and which upon such showing will give these tribumals the right, when necessary, to call upon the United States in the form now authorized by law lo enforce their process by arresting the rioters, and the suppression of all such unlawful combinations. It is said that the magnitude of the evil to be met and deall with ean hardly be overstated. We fully concur in the opizion that somo eflective reniedy for an evil of such magnitude as these combinations to effect their object by volence, is absolutely necessary. We doubt the efficacy of the sery cumbrous proceedings recommended, but we have been chiefly led to notice the subject, because at any thoment we may have to deal with similar combinations. We have more than once pointed out what we believe is the trie remedy, viz, the establishment of an efficient Dominion Police scattercd over the wholo country, but uider an organization lhat would revider them effective. Wo have a model in the Irish Constabulary, but, by
the cooperation of our cities, towns and counties, a more economical arrangement could be ma ha.

## RESOMPTLON IN THE UNITED STATBS.

Natters do not look at all serene in the IVnited States as to resumption, the time for which is rapidly approaching. Tho min caluse of difficulty is to bo attributod to the system of sovernment, which the vainglorious people of the great Repub. lic persist in believing the best in the world. It is admitted pretly gonerally, and especially among the classes who have devoted most attention to the sulject, that the existence of a large inredeemable cumency is an evil of great magnitude, and one that ought to be redressed withnut clelay. There is good reason to bolieve thet the Secretary of the Treasury has sound views on the question, and if he were in the position of an English or Cunadian Minister, ho wonld be able to give them full eftect. Unfortmately ho is almost destitute of power, and it seems probable, that far from there boing avon a reasonable probability that his suggeshions would be concurded in by the Houses of Congress, the fact that they enmana from the govermment will operate against them. The system of a government of chocks seems to be looked on as the bue Consorvative remedy against tho encroachments of democracy, and wo aro sometimes recommended to aclopt republican institutions as a safeguard against tho demooracy which prevails mang us. For our own part wo prefor that tho govormment should bo strong, and wo have a firm relianco that the public opinion of the country will be sufti. ciently powerful to prevent it from rumning riot. It is difficult at present to comprehend precisely what the Socrotary of the lreastry would do if he had the power, bublıo is fettored by existing laws, and thore seems no probability that legislation of a satisfactory kind will bo obtained from the present Congress. For sovoral years, legal tenders have been performing in tho United States tho functions of coin. They constitute the reserves of the National Banks, and if there were not a redundant issue, would oceu. py a most useful place in the currency, and would tend to economiie the use of coin, which at prosent at all events would be most desirablo. Tho bank notes in circulation in the United States aro in round figures about 650 inillions of dollars, 350 millions in government legal tenders and 300 millions in National Bank notes. The fact that the premium on gold purchased with theso notes is now about 3
per cont. is sufficiont proof that the currency is not much, if at all, more than the public necessitios roquire, although, jurlging by our circulation in Ganada, it scems largo. The principal evil of the systent is that the legal tomlers are in oxcoss, and the obvious romedy would bo to reduce them to an amount suthicient for tho public requirements, and to issue bonds for the surphus. The probability is that tho National Banks would be able to absorb a large portion, if not Ho whole, of tho issue of bonds, and to insue Nationm Bunk notes to neanly tho sume amomat. Thore would bu no dinger of excessive issuos, as tho convertibility of the National Bank notes into coin or legal tentors, would etivctually prevont them. The Secrotary of the l'reasury has it not in his power to soli bonds for legal tenders whiel would be the obvions mote of reducing the rodimdant issue of greenbacks, which must bo effected before rosumption can safoly tako place, and he is now pursuing a policy which is, to say the leasti, clangerous, viz., homring gold in anticipation of the peitod of resumpition, now titeen months distant. The legal mocle by which tho lesal tennem an be rochuced, is by withdrawing Tational Bank notes from cibulation, the eonsequones of which is that tho Treasury is required to call in greenbacks in proportionate amounts. It was alleged some time since, that several of the National Banks lat formed a syndicate for the purpose of facilitating withdrawals of greenbates by withdrawing National Bank notes, and then repeating the aperation. 'Whis plan, if it really wasever organized, was bitherly denonnced by the press, and semes to have been abandoned. But the Secretary of the Treasury is also required bo aceumnlate as much gold as in his discrotion may bo sufficient to enablo resumption to take place on the Ist Jamuary, 3879. Tho Now York Butletin, a most relialble authority, estimates the gold reserve at $\$ 4,000,000$ per month, and tho withelrawals of legal ten. ders at $\$ 3,000,000$ a month, which in 16 monthis would amount to $\$ 80,000,000$, which lie alleges aro obtained from tho reserves of the National Banks, and our New York contenmolary seems to appre. hend serious inconvenience to the National Banks from the clopletion of their reserves. We confoss that we do not quito seize the ider of our contemporary. The bank leserves cannot be obtained oxcept in payment of cloposits on circulation. On the assumption that the Treasury had large deposits wilb the National Banks, we could perfectly understand that a systematic montlily drain on those banks for their deposits might subject then of thoir
enstomers to inconvenionce, just as all atjnormal conditions of things invariably do. The National Banks aro not, as it hippons, indebted to the Govermment. How then ean hbeir reserves bo atheked? Jho latest stabment we have seen of tho condition of tho Nationit Banks shows That they had a larger amount of cloposibs in Juno, 1877 , than in dino, 1876 . Tho einculation was not materially difiuroni, and the offeet of the withduawal of logal tenders would mathor bo to sustan their cinenlation. Tho UnitedStates are not acquieing hoir gold by selling bonds, and wo should infer that tho surphes is a legitimato oxeess of National rovonuo over Nationel? expenditure. Still the hombling of yok is unolosimble, and it seoms most unforti. nato that there should be any obstace in the way of the simple remedy of reatueng The herght temalers by the process of lumting. We shond feel not thestightest uneasiness if we in Canada wore in a similar position to the UnitedStabes, lor without any roberence to bue stato of politival parties, we feel assumed thata Cimatian Minister of Binance would grapule at ome with the diftienty, and thathewonld bestishaned certanly by a majority, and possibly even by his polition opponents, in movinting a remedy. We own, however, that wo are mable to eonctir in the appretrensions of the Now York Balletin, that lio banks will loso their gold, and a largo portion of then legal tenders, in consequence of tho Treasmy demands. We aro inclined to think that efforts will bo mato to frighten the Socrohary of the Ihrasmy, and to induce him to abandon his mathed onergetic prepatations for resumption. From one passage in the Bullelin articlo wo shonld infer that bie 'lremsury was procuring its coin reservos by solling bonds, ant if so, it is following the only possible counse by which josumption can be effected. 'The nisfortime is that it camiot soll the gold for legal tenders and thtu redneo the eirenlation.

In a later artiele on tho same subjeet, the Bulletin criticizes with somo severity a sohemo of Mr. Crittendon for finding tho legal tenders, and withchawing them entirely fom cireulation. Wo think some of the Juthetin's olbjections to this schome erroneous, We camnot admit that it is a sound argument to use, "that legal "tenclers are a part of the money with "which the country transtocts its ex"changes, and that to witidraw them in "tho way ho proposes, would deprive the "country of one half of the tools by 4which it effects its business operations, "and the banks of the money on whiche "they make their loans and effect their "payments." If areenbacks were fun led,
there would, of courso, be no limit to the issue of National Bank notos socured by tho deposit of United States securities, as at presont. Such notes would tnke the place of the greenbacks, and restore to the country the tools for trunsacting its oxchanges. We concur with the Bulletin in objecting to the total withdraval of the greenbacks, because it would render a much larger quantity of gold necessary. The estimate of the Bulletin is that the banks require for their reserves 160 millions of legal tenders, and if that bo correct, it would be desirable to retain in circulation 200 millions, or if the govern: ment were to undertake to furnish the entire small note circulation, 50 millions moro might safoly be retainoc. Tho Bulletin seems to object to the funding of legal tonders at all; which in our opinion is indispensablo to a satisfactory rosumption of specio payments. That funcling shonde take place certainly to the oxtont of 100 millions, and possibly 50 millions more might bo added with advantage.
We shall watch with interest the procoodings in the next Congross on the questions affecting resumption. There will be all kinds of schemes proposed, viz, the postponemont of rosumption, the romonetization of silver, a mensure whioh can only bo chametorizod as a fraud on tho public oroditors,and the Treasury recommendations, which we have no doubt will be sound.

## INCIDTANTS IN AMERICAN COMMERCIAL LIFE.

One cannot but help being struck at times, in visiting other countries, to see the various and often novel coursos pur. sued in making the soarch aftor weallh as socure as possible. This is nowhere moro noticcable than in the cities of tho United States of America. Whether this condition is the outflow of keen competition, or an innato commercial enpacity in the people, it is havd to define ; but certain it is that if there be a right way to do $n$ thing, it sooms as if the Yankeo had discovered it. A fow incidents-actunl facts in the witer's oxporience during a rosidonce in Now York-may be of intorest to men of business in Canada, and possibly tend to guide thom to a more safe course in tho prosocution of their businoss life.

In spenking with a prominent Now York importer a short while since; and for illustration wo will style him at ter merchant, ho said in general conversation, "I don't like your Canadian business. You all want your goods on four or six months' credit'" His principle was this, that when ho bought tea,so soon as he saw an advance
in it ho sold it at once, and so secured his profit. But to take a note, ho argued, was moroly to enter on mother risk quite foreign to his business. The only true profit was money in hand; to deal in papor was a bankar's or bill discounter's vocation, and was not his trado. Therefore if ho could not get the cash for his goods, ho didn't want the Canadian trado, unloss ho could at once sell the noto without recourse. He then tumed up his bill-book, and ho had not ono bill recoivable. He had taken plenty, but invariably disposed of them so soon as ho had passed a contract for the sale of his goods. This man's ideas wero indisputably correct. He was only prepared as a tea importer to tako a risk on the fall or rise of the tea market, and having done that, his wholo undivided energies wero strained in watching this market and taking hold of the first advance. But to burden himself with bills roceivable, ho said, was not his business, it was a money broker's or spoculator's simply, and wero he to add this to his ton business, one or tho other, he guessed, must: bo negloctod. Of courso in Amerioan citios the purchase of commercial prper without racours is a business largely carried on, and every commercial man has a rate fixed to his namo ; some, $6,7,8,10$ per cont., and it is no detraction to the roputation of any house to find its paper on the street, for the bost names can be seen thore alnost daily, In a commanity whoro money is not worth more than 21 por cent, the purchaso of commercial paper at 8 and 10 per cont is a fair, legitimato, and often a good paying business. So it will bo soon that the views of this ten morchant wore commorcially sound, and ho was a better tea merchant than ho who carried a book full of bills recciv. able, the looking after which woudd un: doubtedly abstract tho larger portion of his timo and best energy.
A short while since a house in Now York failed for $\$ 400,000$. Immediatoly it was made public, the outside world im mediately said, "So-and-so are hoavily stuck." One firm roforred to, the writer spoke to one of the principals, and said he hoped they wore not heavy losers. "Guess not," was the shrewd answor. "Cateh this weazel asleep." This house had sold the insolvent firm goocls to $\$ 24,000$ in amount, but the paper had all been clisposed of be. fore the goods had been delivorod. It therofore can be imagined that in this state of things the banks do not do a large dis count business with their customers, it is a speeulator's calling. Thoir trado is moro in call lonns, exchange and produce bills se cured on bills of lading, advances on bonds and stocks, $\mathbb{S c}$., $\mathbb{S c}$.

Many other incidents of shewd Yankee business life might be given, but this will suffico for the present.

## WHE BANK STATEMEN'TS.

We publish the summary of the bank returns for August and a similar one for the corresponding month of 1876 . They scem not to call for any special comment. The most notable difference is in the great roduction in loms on the collateral security of stocks and bonds. The cupital is about threo millions less than last year, and the circulation nearly a million less. The public doposits have increasod and the govormment slighty diminished. There is a considerablo diminution in the indebtedness to forcign banks, which is an indication that less money is employed abroad. Jite statements next month will probably be more interesting.


## IMPERLAL CONPHDERATION.

The leaders of both the political parties have again taken the field, and are loolding meetings with renewed vigor. Mr. Blake, whose heath has led him to abstain from ttending these meetings, las beon making a specel in South Bruce, which will haturally excite interest. We are indebled to Hie Mail for the report that we have seen, but it must be a mengre one. Mr. Blake is known to entertain views which have not been up to the present time. ex-
pressed hy any of his colleagues, nor indeed by himself since he assumed the responsibility of a Minister of the Crown. We refer especially to the repurentation of minoritics and to some motefinal seheme of Tmperial Confederation. Sir dulius Vogel has in an article in the Naucleenth Centory which has been copied by the Conatian Monlhly, propounded his views on this question. Mr. Blake, if the Mail rejort be correct, has certainly not committed himself very far. We copy this passage of his speceh :

He desired to say a word in reference to our relations with the Nother Comitry. He believed, in common with many others, that our relations were momalous, and that our present form of Government was not likely to be perpetual. He thonght we masi exchange dependence for association, exchange our position of colonists tior the responsibilities of partnership with the mother hani. Mr. Forster, M.P., in at specch at Elinburgh in 1875 had recognized that the ohatige mast come. He (Ir. Bhake) invited the people of Canada to Jook the situation in the face, and prepare their minds for the change; for, he said, our present position is not perpethal.

Mr. Blake does not explain what there is that is "anomalous" in onr relations, nor does he state the grievances under which we labor. The meanity of "association" is simply the assumption of a large share of Imperial expenditure from which we areat present Prec. Wecan understand quite well that English statesmen may desite to bring about some change, the object of which would be to require the principal colonies to share the cost of the army, the navy, the diphomatic service and possibly, other Tmperial charges. We do not believe that we wond obtain any compensating benefits, and we are not aware that we have any grievance to complain of in our present relations with the mother country. To us it seems shecr madness to propose any change in this direction although if any were proposel by Englami it might be entitled to respectfil consideration.

## COMPROMISING.

A scrions difficulty in the way of a retum to a licalthy state of business thronghout the country is the frequent compromises which retail dealers are able to effect with their creditors, ether moder the act or by private arrungement. The result of these settlements is that the honest man who is willing to pay in full is placed nt a disadvantage alongside the dishonest man who compromises. A settlement is so easily obiwined now-a-days that unless a man is possessed of the strictest possible integrity he is strongly tempted, though quite solvent, to ask for a compromise to place himself on a par with his neighbour. $\Lambda_{n}$ instance of this in a well-known town has come to our notice. A dealer, whom we shall call Tohn Swith, effected a com-
promise at 50 cents on the dollar. His neightour, John Jones: who is in the same line of business, finds tha smith, by means of the setilement he has whtaned, is mulerselling him by 20 per cent. He therefore, though quite able to pay his debts in full, calls a meetiog of his ereditors, who, when they come together, ark him what he is prepared to offer. He asks how mach Smith paid, and when told, says he will pay the same, as he thinks he ean do am well!

The temptation to do this sort of thing is very strong, and though very wrong, we fear it is too often resorted to by those who are not strictly honest. Wholesale min are too ready to comive at it, and though they may in some instances make morn out of an estate than if it passes into the assignee's hands, we doubt if they are not losers in the loing ran. A correspontent of a comtemporary suggests that the wholesale merchants should buy up the stocks of hankrunt retailens, wher than Jet them fall into the hants of those who sell them at less than current prices, greatly to the detriment of honest traders who are striving to get a living by doing a legritimate business. We fear this suggestion is impracticable, but wholesalers might do much to reniedy matters by refuising to grant a compromise except in extreme cases, and by making examples of those who misrepresent their standing, as we are glad to know one honse in Montroal has done in the ense of one Alexander Robertson of Belleville, who, after receiving every consideration from his ereditors, deceived them, and represented himself as being in a much vetter financial position than lie really was. He has lieen in jail since April, and when brought before the juatge will probably receive the just reward of his dishonesty.
Speaking of bank rupt sales as a result of this pernicions system of compromising, a correspondent siys:-
" 1 cominy merchant cannot, at the present time, go to Montireal and buy cottons, prints, and flannels, and sell then at a profit, as dealers in bankiupt stocks are actually selling the same kind of foods at less thin wholesale price. Many of the farmers and mechanics who rum accounts at credit stores, will take the money they should pay the parties that give them credit and buy goods at these stores they do not retually need, just because they can buy them cheap; and the merchant in turn hits to pay high rates of interest for getting extension on his bills."
If retail men in good standing would take firm ground in this matter, it would be of advantage to themselves. We know of one instance where a prominent retailer refused to deal any longer with two wholesale houses, whose proprietors had voted for giving a compromise to a man whose character was not abo ve suspicion.

It may be consoling to our business men who sulfer throngh this system of compromising to know that in older comitries, such as Hughat, the same trouble is expreviencel, and, jolging from the drat of a new insolvent act, with very litlle prospeel of a tegal remeny being obtained. The remedy lies with the creditors. If they were not so realy to grant a setilement, it would mot he so olten asked for.

## RATES.

It appears to be an abmitted fact that fire insurmee mates are now far too low to be at all profitable to the compmios, or safe for the policy holders. In fact we cousider the position one that admits of no cloubt, and we woild urge upon the companies the ouly safe course they can pursue, viz, miso the rates to $n$ point where there can be some prospect of profit to themselves and security to their patrons.

In a recent issue we advised the companies; more particularly those engaged in agricultuma insurance, to meet and diseuss the situation, especially as to rates, mad we are haply to find that our alvice, though not yet fully carrien out, has been to some extent neted upou, for individual companies have approved of our suggestion, and have resolved to pursue a more earefuland conservative course. We are satisfied that ashort experience of the policy we suggest will opernte largely to the bencfit of the compnies themselves, nud will improve the security they ofler. To companies doing a general fire insurnace lusiness we tender the same advice. Consult with one another, stop this cliildish competition, for the inmediate result of it is demornization, and the cnd ruin,
We camot, in finct we do not, expect the wenk companies to stand ont for rates, becnuse the most of them are managed by purties of limited experience, and such men regard the mere accumulation of business and a large volume of bisitiess as "the one thing needful," the one thing indispensable to an insurance company. Hence it is we have the unreasoning, bliud, stuphd, we had almost said criminal, competition, and consequent reduction in rates and the increase of unsound risks. Such companies have niways existed, if their mere living a sort of lingering denils can be called existence, and they cuuse trouble to thenselves and all others. But the really soma companies, such as the many british companies whose standing is beyond doubt, whose names are ns familiar as houschold words, and loved as well; to theso ndd our own well established companies and ithe old American standards who live fought the fire-batile at burnings all over the country, whose policies, signed, sealed and delivered, are a guaratee not only for the indemnity they represent but are also "good" for fair, upright trentment when the evil day overtakes the insured-why such companies should come down to this pitiable position of begging business, haggle over it, and be thankful to get it at any, the very lowest rate, we camot and never could understand. When banks, and other money-lending institutions, importers, wholesale dealers, manuficturers, in a word, those who lanve moncy invested in syecu-
lation, or enterprises of nore or less hanard, and desire to secure it agninst the munges of fire, when they want their "money's worth" safe beyond any "if" or but," they patrunise these solid well-tried insurance companies who have earued for themselves thendaning reputation for sterling honor and unquestionathe ability to meet their engagoments. Nose com. panies hive the right to sity what is and what is not a fit rate for the risk they aceept, nad if they were only wise in thes day and genemtion they would accept none but paying rates, for the commercial classes must hare security and nre willing to pay for it.

We firmly believe that if a sland was taken upon their rights by these companies, British, Cinadian and American, entirely reliatile every one of them, by asking fair rates and laking none else, not only would their busimess not diminish but it would increase, and the day of the small tottering concerns, the meve adventurers, would som have an cat, the business atmosphere wond be purged and purified by their absence, and all interests would be benclited by the change.

As insumate is now eonducted, it is simply a matter of cetanty that the compunies are wasting their menus, the hard carned money of the shareholders, nud the commmity in too many:instances are accepting that which is neither brend nor fish, iusuranee that is not what it claims to he, intemnity agrinst fire. As said in a former arliele, we are writing in the interest of the community as well ns in the interest of the compnies. Wo desire for the one that security which the other professes to give, and we well know, all should know, that instlegunte rates, the rates row curent, ean never purelase intemnity, ind that it is only a duestion of crital against time how long the companies ean indulge in the luxury of trating the public as they have been dong for many years:

Rates monst be adjusted to their hazaro, or some of onr stanneliest compmas will return to Whence they canc, across the occan; or neross the lakes and many of our home companies, even the best of tham, will staggen to the fall and finally hite the dusi.

The insumace finternity should lisenss the sithation, ant now is the time.

lifatide ohl accombts. Orops are unusually lion. Bater very good, and moving freely at fitsent rates, hat it is all requiten to remove old scores, consequentiy we are not looking for nay great improvements in trade this Fall.

## MONTREAT, PUR'VAND AND BOSTON RAMWAY.

Fvery new arenue of commanication opened up gives increased tende fichitits and an impretus to business. The Intest radition to the means of tratice to and from Montreal is the ribiway whose manc heads this aticle. This road will furnish a new meins of access to Portand, boston and New Fork independent of the Grand Trunk.

The official inspection of the line, which is now completed to West Faralan, $3: 3$ miles from Montral, was mate last Satumby. A party, consistiner of E. H. Goll, President of the road; I. F. Foster, Superintendent; In. $A$. Wood, Chief Engineer ; A. L. Light, Governwent Inspector, aml a number of invited guests, lefi Montreal at 9 a.m., nad taking a specital train at St. Lambert, proceciled to West Farnham, stopping on the way to inspect the various bridges, especially tunt orer the Richelien, which is being strengthened by the addition of further trusses and suphorts than were contempiated in the originil plan. On the return trip, some fast ruming was made, and the smoothiness of the road was fivorably commented on by all on board. The government engineer expressed his salisfuction at the condition of the roar in no manistakeable temes.

At West Furnham a junction is made with the South Bustern rond to the White Monntains and Poston, and when the line is completen to Frelighsburg, 21 mites further, : connection will be formed with the Porland and Ogdensburg road, nflorting commonication with enst and west. Having partaken of lunch on buard the Imin, the paty renched st. Iambert abond: o'clock, and roturned to the city by fery.

It is conteniplated to ran regular trains to West Famban on and after lst Ootober, and a few weeks later the line, which is nearly all graded, will be openel to the province line.

- The Special Tasurance Commission of the Connecticat Legishatheresumed their inrestigations on the 4 th inst. They propose to secure at once a copy of the contract made between Fenry J. Furber ant the Charter Onk Compning under which the former received compensation for the cancellation of his claims agrinst the Company. 'Ple Wiggin contract looks more and more formidable. Wiggin refuses to yield, and threatens to sue for the amount due him. Ne is willing now to compromise for $\$ 0,000$.
- Alvices from the Magatalen Islands to the Bd inst. state:-The ced nnd mitekerel fisheries are not good. Corl bait is scarce. Makerel is abundant, but will not bite. Twenty-fivo Amerienn vessels which wow fishing around the Islands last week were doing well. On August 30 a sudden nud terrific squall of wind nid rain passed over the Islands, injuring sevcral fishing vessels.
- Nie telephone is coming into use in a practical form. Dr. Foster, Government In-
spector of Mines intDugland, has placed one down the ventinting shatt of a mine inCormwall. The instrument having been at tached to a covered copper wire, persons sueaking at the bottom of the mine were distinctly audible on the surface. The telephone will supersede the inefficient cord siguals hitherto used as a means of communiention between the interior of deep mines and the surface.
- Throughout the length and breadh of Camabi, and from New Yurk to Chiengo, mal thence to the Pacific enist, has been noticed an incrensed activity in business circles. Money is in better demand, merchmalise is moving more freely, and $a$ degree of restored contidence permentes the mercantile commanity, such $n_{5}$ has not been experienced since the days of the late depression in trade began. These ciremmstruces, occurting in advince of the genernl movenent of the crops, is a clieering sign for the future.

Fhorion.-A well-known insmance adjuster recently went to see a man whose homse land been destroyed by fire. Sind the :uljuster: "How did the thing lappen?" Honse owner: "Don't know-its a mystery". Anjusice: "Well, I know." House owher: "Lot's hive it, that's just what $I$ 'd like 10 find out:" dijuster: "Its fricion." House owner: "firictionfriction? what's that?" Adjuster: "Why, friction is the result of rubling a \$1000 poliry on a $\$ 600$ house.?

- That "a free canal is cssential to the prosperity of the State," and that "the water route is superior to the rail way," are the lending positions taken in a valuable pamphlet by Mr. Alonzo Richmond, presirlent of the Bulfalo Board of Trade. Mr. Richmond bolds that "if the lirie canal were fiec from tolls nad in gool order," freight, is is clearly shown by the statements ho presents, "can be moved at a good profit to boatmen, in lots of 240 tons or more, at the rite of 42 cents for whent and 4 cenis a bushel for com from Bumalo to New York, and 18 cents a barrel for flour, provided the bontmen can bave a return cargo of about 100 tons, at from 50 to 60 cents a ton, free in and out."

Clawson Whast.-The doublas to the milling qualities of this grain, says the Galt lheporter, Lus caused on millers to make extra exertions to have it tested, and one of them, who had ground a quantity of it, placed some of it in the: hands of our bakers, to have it tested nlong with Spring and lyendwell. The result was that, while it was considered slighty deficient in quality for bread-in color and strength-it was so little behind that the result could searcely bo looked upon as unsutisfactory; especially when it is considered that the flour used was made from new "Clawson," and hat it nppears to be ngrain that requires a little time after early threshing for maturing for milling. Having many excelleat qualities in the way of growth and yield, our millers do not Jike to condemn it, or ndive farmers to discontinue its cultivation. Again, there has scarcely been $a$ whent bronght into this section that has not improved in quality in our land, and there is evers reason to think that if there is now nngthing deficient in the "Claw. son, the cultivation of a year or sowill remove it.

- There was considerable discussion at a recent mecting of the members of the Baltimore Corn and Flour Exchange over the order of the Whent Committee forbidding the inspector 10 grade as standard grades artificially dried whent The general fear was expressed that if the opinion was formed abrond that wheat was artificially dried there it wonld injure Batimore as a whent market. They stated llat only some ten thousand bushels had been dried by a pritent machine, which is constructed on the fan principle, the wheat being dried by the air passing through it, and that no kiln was usoh. The denlers in whent, says the Gazelte, "fearing that the grading of this wheat might inure this market, called the attention of the committee to the fact, and it wis at once stopped. The amount that had been shipped was but a trile in comparison with the bulk of the grain hhat had pissed throngh the clevators. Any way, now such wheat would not be graded hy the inspectors, and there is an end to the matter.?
-The Ruilucy Age says :- It is probable lhat civilization will eventually reach such a stage in this country that the iden of suspenting telegraph wires on lofy and unsightly poles, nut only thorough the wilderness and pairic, but in the bandsome, streets of great citics, will be considered as primitive and absurd as is now the iden of an ox-cart for rapid transit. To sny nothing of the disfignrement emused by the present custom, there is to be considered the constant danger to the wires from wind, lightning, malice and necident, and the loss attending frequent interruption of communication. They have adopted the better why in Germany of loying telegraph wires under grount, arguing lint, althongh it costs much more at first than the pote system, it will be economy in the long run in doing nway with constant repairs and interruption, andwhat is of great importance in miy country in the of war-making it dillicult for an cuemy to cut the wires, not knowing where to find them. A subterranean line has alrealy been opened between Berlin and Mayence, and it is intended to connect Frimkfort and Strasburg in the same way. There has been some movement townal this method on this side the water. It will become practical eventually.
- A Montreal gentleinan, who lins recently becu in Manitoba, arranging for $a$ supply of North West whent for mills in which he is interested, thus writes :-

I crnnot refrain from riving you a few lines alout the great wheat ferms of this coumtry. 1 will give you a slight ider of one of lic largestof them. The Dalrymple fanm is situated 20 miles west of Fargo on the line of the Nowheru Pacific Ratway, and contains 11,000 acies. 1,200 acres were broken ur in 1s75, nid sown with whent Inst year. This yenr there are 4,000 aeres in whent, and 3,400 ateres additional were broken this year for seeding next spring. Mr. Dalrymple neso owns the Grundin firm, 35 miles north of Fargo. It contians 40,000 ncres. On this farm there are 3,500 neres in whent this ycur, and 3,000 acres ndditional broken up for next year. 'lo harvest this crop of 7,500 seres of wheat now in progress, Mr. Dalrymile has 42 self-binding reapers, $22 \pi$ horses and mules, and 150 men. One reaper, with two men and a boy; cuts. on an nvernge fifteen acres per day, or fifteen sheaves per minite. There are now nine theshing machiacs, ench with it capacity of threshing 1,000 bushels per
day, at work on the farms. In addition to this, Mr. Dalrymple has nother from, colled the Cottage Grove farm, of 2,000 acres, 1,500 of which is in whent this year. So Mr. Dalrymple has 9,000 acres of whent this yenr, and will have hand ready for 15,000 neres next year. He inteads breaking ou an averare 5,010 acres each year until he hats his whole 51,000 neres under cultivationi. So fir as threshed, the yield has been 23 bushels of whent per acte, and of splendid rimality. It is put into cars and shipped to Duluth imme-diately-one fill train every duy; and the Montreal bakers will shortly havo an opportunity of testing the fivorite wheat from the Red River valicy. Mr. Datrymple Lells me that althongh this is only the second year of his enterprise his met prolit, at the present price of wheat, will be over $\$ 10$ per acre each year. There are many other latrge farms, the hadsoniest and best cultivated firm being that of Jolin Dunlop, Essy. of Woodstock, $O$. It contains 11,000 acres, 1,700 of which are in whent. He has the hest root crop and the finest cattle, sheep and swine in the territory. I have beer driving through these immense farms from morning till night for three days. Wherever I go as far as the ege can reach all is whent.

MPORT ANT COMMERCIAL DECISION.
stoprage of goons in tmansipt.
The cose of Wiley ot al. Wa. Smith, in which the unamimons decision of the Gourt of $A p$ petts in Gatitio has been allimed by the Supreme Gourt, establishes a principle of great importance to the mercatilile commerce. Plantifls sold to E. Bembehati \& Co. 250 barrels of currants, which were entered in bond by the vendees. One humered mad difty harrels had been sold when the vendees becane insolvent, and plaintifls instituted proceodings ngansi the nssignee to recover the rematimin 100 harrels, on the ground that being still int bond the frensitus hat not teminated.
Moss, J. A a in pronombeing judrment in apm peal, sad: - "i pron so entitely ju aceord with the judgment prononnced by my brother Burton, that I shonla have contented myseld with a simple expression of acepiesconce had not the reent inportance to the mercantile community of the question involved in this appeal induced me to endervor to explatin the reasons and cousiderations by which I have been bronglit to my emolasion. The system of storing goons in bonded warehonses belonging to thenselvos is almosi wniversally adopted by importers, and any decision affecting rights in such goods must be of vital consequence. Large nimbers of persons are concerned to know what are the respective rights of the unpaid vendor of such goois, nad of the freneral crediturs of the vendee upon his hecomfag insolvent. I ngree with the expression that fell from Mr. Justice Galtupon the original hearing of the case, that to hold otherwise than that, in a case like the present, the trousitus is at an cond, would be to hat down a rute that so long ths the duties were unpaid the ormsious continues. 'Ithe express ground of the platintifls ease is lhat, until the dutios are paid, the goods cannot be deemed to hatve reached the possession, either actial or constrictive, of the purchaser, but remain in the castody of the offects of the law as intermediate parties between the ramdor and the vendee, so as to provent she temination of the bomsitus. The duties need not be paid for two years after the goods ure first stored; they may be sold by the originat ventee, and their situs chtanged to another bonded warehouse lielonging to this sub purchaser, withoist the duties beiner paid or the custody of the law being relinguished. It is not siflicult, therefore, to perecive that the principle contended for is attended with grove consequences; that principhe onght to be sulbjected to careful examination."

Afor copions quotations from numerons nuthorities, the learned. Judge concludes :"1 venture to think thint the decision we are pronobucing not only has the support of sound legal princijtes, bui will be conducive to genemal convenience and the secmity of mercantile transactions. No doubt it is a persuasive equity wheh restores to the unpmid rendor lis goods, instead of distributing them among the general creditors; but a vendor has ample metns of protecting himselt if he chooses to employ them, instead or asking a court to lay down a tule which would enable him to seize goods months after they had apprently been the absolute property of the rendee, subject only to the pryment of daties rad which, it rathlessly pressed to its horical results, might authorize him to follow then from bonded warehonse to bombed warehonse all over the Dominion."

Neither nuy of the firm or employees knew of this hate anil consecutently the rouf slowly ignited untif it incrensed o as to atract the public cye. Chas. D.s Bdwards' loss will; not exceed \$1000, sund is insured for $\$ 8000$ in the British American on stock, sund for $\$ 6000$ in the Gitizens and British American on engine, boiler and tools. Miller Bros. \& Mitehell lose $\$ 1,000$ by water on machinery, origimal phans, de., and we insured for Sb, wou in the Commercint Union and un Euglish Company. Jas. Wright \& Co., whose loss will not exceed $\$ 800$, are insured for $\$ 2,000$ in the Lancashire lusurance Compmy on lumber and unfinished work. They also lose some machinery, plans, etc., which are not insured, which amount to mbout $\$ 500$. W. T. Johbitt, occupying part of the second flat as a cabinct-makker, loses about \$250, no insuranec. The buidding belongs to the estate of the late Oliver Edwards, and is insured for $\$ 12,000$ in the Royal.
