STANDING RULES

FOR THE

CONSTITUTION AND GOVERNMENT

OF THE

Newfoundland Church Society.

NAME.

1.— The name of this Society shall be "THE NEW-FOUNDLAND CHURCH SOCIETY."

OBJECTS.

2.—The objects of this Society shall be, (1) to contribute towards the maintenance of the Clergy and Licensed Lay-Readers, (2) to assist in the erection, enlargement, or repairs of Churches, Parsonages, or School-Rooms, and in the purchase of Land for Glebe or other Church purposes, (3) to provide for sale a supply of Bibles, Prayer-Books, School-Books, and other Religious Books and Tracts, (4) to assist in creating and sustaining a Special Fund for the Endowment and Support of the Theological College in St. John's, and (5) to create and maintain a separate Fund for assisting the Widows and Children of deceased Clergymen of this Diocese.

MEMBERS.

3.—The Members of this Society shall be, (1) all persons who shall have paid to their Clergyman or the Treasurer the two preceding years the annual

sum of ten shillings for the objects of the Society; and (2) all Clergymen who shall have officiated in Newfoundland or Labrador the two preceding years with the Bishop's licence.

4.—All members shall have power to vote at the

annual and other general meetings.

OFFICERS.

5.—The Officers of this Society shall be (1) the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, President; (2) the Venerable the Archdeacon and the Rural Deans, Vice-Presidents; (3) a Treasurer; and [4] a Secretary; the last two to be chosen by the members of the Society at the annual general meeting; but in case of resignation of office, or removal, of either Secretary or Treasurer, during the interval between two Annual Meetings, the Committee shall appoint a person to act in either case, until the next Annual Meeting.

MANAGERS.

6.—The Committee of management shall consist of the officers of the Society, and certain Lay-Members, elected as Representatives in each of the Deaneries; viz., four elected by Members of the Society resident in the Deanery of Avalon; three by Members resident in the Deanery of Conception Bay; three by Members resident in the Deanery of Trinity Bay; three by Members resident in the Deanery of Notre-Dame Bay; two by Members resident in the Deanery of Placentia Bay; and two by Members resident in the Deanery of Fortune Bay.

7.—The election of Representatives shall be as follows:—On some day in Easter Week, in the year 1859, and in every succeeding fourth year, a Meeting of the Members resident in each Mission, shall be convened by the Clergyman in charge at some convenient hour and place, of which notice shall be given [with the Bishop's consent] in each Church in the

Mission, on some Sunday in the previous month; at which Meeting the Clergyman, or in his absence, some other person then to be chosen by the Members shall preside, and the Members present shall vote seriatim for the prescribed number of Representatives.

- 8.—When the voting (which may be continued, if necessary, six hours, but not longer) is completed, the presiding Officer in each Mission shall report the result to the Rural Dean, and the persons who have obtained a majority of votes in the Deanery, shall be elected Representatives; provided that every person to be a member of the Committee must be a Communicant of the Church of England.
- 9.—The Rural Dean shall report the result of the election in his Deanery to the Secretary in St. John's, the first convenient opportunity.
- 10.—The new Representatives shall be convened by the Secretary at the Michaelmas Quarterly Meeting; until which time the former Representatives shall continue in office.
- 11.—As often as it shall become necessary, from the death, absence from the Colony, resignation, disqualification, or refusal to serve, of any of the Representatives, to appoint another or others in their place, a special meeting of the Members, in the Deanery where the vacancy has arisen, shall (as soon as the Rural Dean, or, in his absence, the Clergyman next senior in standing in the Diocese may in his discretion appoint) be convened in like manner as the Easter meeting, when the required Representative or Representatives shall in like manner be elected.
- 12.—The President, or a Vice-President, and six other Members of the Committee shall be competent to manage the business at every meeting duly convened.

13.—All Clergymen of the Diocese holding the Bishop's license, shall be ex-officio honorary Members of the Committee with the right of speaking, but not, with the exception of the Officers, of voting at its Meetings.

TRUSTEE.

14.—The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be the Trustee of this Society, and shall have power to let or to take houses or lands, and to receive all rents and interest of monies as the same shall fall due, and shall pay the same to the Treasurer for the time being, taking his receipt, and handing it over to the Committee.

GENERAL MEETINGS.

- 15.—An annual General Meeting of the members and friends of the Society shall be holden in St. John's on the second Thursday after Trinity Sunday, or as soon after as the Bishop may appoint. The Secretary shall give notice to each of the Clergymen in St. John's, who shall publish it (with the Bishop's consent) in his Church on the previous Sunday.
- 16.—At the annual general meeting a report on the state of the Seciety, with the Treasurer's accounts duly audited, shall be submitted by the Committee, to be printed, or otherwise, as shall be then and there determined by the members.
- 17—A special general meeting may be convened at any time, (1) by the President; (2) by a Vice-President and six members of the Committee; or (3) by any twelve members of the Society whose payments are not in arrear; provided notice of such meeting be duly given as in the case of annual general meetings.
- 18.—The Chairman shall not vote at any general meeting, except in the case of an equality of votes.

COLLECTIONS.

19.—It is expected that a Collection for the various objects of the Society will be made every year by every Clergyman in the Diocese, from every head of a family and every adult member of the Church in his Mission, assisted if need be by his Church-wardens and other respectable Members of his Congregation.

20.—Every Clergyman shall transmit to the Secretary, a list of the Contributors to the objects of the Society in his Mission, with the amount of their several payments, and to the Treasurer one-fourth at least of his whole Collections on or before the last day in

every year, or as soon after as practicable.

N.B.—This Rule does not apply to the Clergy of St. John's, who shall send in the whole of their Col-

lections to the Treasurer.

21.—All Clergymen who have collected as far as possible from every head of a family, and from every adult Member of the Church in their missions, towards the objects of the Society, for the two years immediately preceding, and who have remitted to the Treasurer one-fourth of the whole Collections, shall be entitled to assistance from the funds of the Society towards any of its objects in their own Mission; provided that no Clergyman shall make a collection for his own maintenance separate from, or independent of the general collections; and that pew-rents and assessments be not considered as part of the said collection or collections.

GRANTS.

22.—It shall be the duty of the Committee to determine from time to time on the appropriation of the Funds, by making grants towards the objects of the Society under the recommendation and sanction of the President.

23.-No Clergyman declining or neglecting to col-

lect for the Society, or to transmit a list of the contributors, and their payments, and a fourth-part of his collection (as directed in Rule 20) shall be entitled to receive any grants from the Society, for himself, or for any of the objects of the Society, in his Mission; provided that where a Collection has been duly made, and the list with the fourth part of the collections transmitted for the two previous years by his predecessor, any Clergyman newly in charge may, before sending his first annual collections, ask and receive for any of the objects of the Society, excepting only his own maintenance.

24.—It shall be competent to the Committee to make grants in the usual manner to any Mission, in connection with the Society, which supports its own Clergyman; and any such Mission shall be held to be in connection with the Society whose Clergyman subscribes ten shillings, and makes a collection in his Mission, annually towards the general funds of the Society.

25.—If a Clergyman leave his Mission before the time for sending in his annual collection, the Committee shall have power, on the recommendation of the President, to grant him a sum which shall appear equitable.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

26.— In the absence of the President, the Archdeacon, or, in his absence, the Senior Vice-President shall take the Chair at all meetings of the Committee or Members, and shall have a casting vote.

27.—The Treasurer shall receive all monies forwarded to him for the objects of the Society, and shall pay or disburse the same as determined by the Committee, and shall furnish to the President and Committee a statement of accounts up to the day appointed for auditing the same.

28.—No money shall be paid or disbursed by the Treasurer except on a written order, specifying the amount to be paid, and its object; which order must be signed by the Chairman of the Committee at which the grant was made, or in his absence, by the Senior Officer of the Society in St. John's.

29.—The Committee shall meet for despatch of business in St. John's, on the first Thursday after

every quarter day, at 2 o'clock, P.M.

30.—A special meeting of the Committee may be convened at any time, either (1) by the President, or (2) by two Vice-Presidents, or (3) by any five Members of the Committee; provided due notice of such meeting with its objects be given the day before to all the other Members of the Committee in St. John's.

31.—At a special meeting to be holden seven days before the annual meeting, the Committee shall appoint two of their number to examine the Treasurer's accounts up to that season, which accounts examined, approved, and signed by the auditors as correct, shall be submitted to the Committee to be by them incorporated in or appended to the next yearly Report and so presented to the members at the next annual general meeting.

32.—The Committee shall fix the salary of the Secretary, and shall provide for all the contingent ex-

penses of the Committee and the Society.

DUTIES OF THE SECRETARY.

33.—The Secretary shall summon and attend all meetings of the Committee and Members, and shall arrange the business, and record minutes of the same to be signed by the Chairman. He shall prepare the Annual Report, and superintend the printing of the same; shall conduct the correspondence with the Clergy and others on behall of the Committee; and

shall be responsible for the safe custody of all books, receipts and papers belonging to the Society.

PRAYERS.

34.—All meetings of the Society, or of the Committee, shall be opened and closed with the prayers used at the meetings of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, or others provided for the purpose by the Bishop of the Diocese.

ALTERATION OF RULES.

35.—These Rules may be altered, repealed, or added to by the Members assembled at any general meeting; provided the proposed alteration has been stated in writing by any person intending to propose it to the Secretary at least a month before for the information of the President and Committee, and that assent has been given to it by the President and a majority of the whole Committee convened for its consideration; and provided also, that it shall be competent to the President to propose any alteration to a general meeting, notwithstanding such alteration may not have received the assent of the Committee.

NEW DEANERIES.

36.—New Deaneries created by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be allowed to elect Representatives; provided that in every Deanery there shall be at least two resident Clergymen, and ten Churches and Congregations.

SECURITIES.

37.—At each annual meeting there shall be appointed three members of this Society who shall be requested to examine all securities belonging to the general funds of this Society, or belonging, or appertaining to the Clergy Widows' and Orphans' Fund, or to any other fund over which the Society has, or shall have, control, and to report in writing to the President, or, in his absence, to the

Senior Vice President in St. John's, their opinion upon the sufficiency or insufficiency of the same, and if necessary a special meeting of the Committee shall be convened to consider such report, and to take such

action upon it as shall be deemed requisite.

38.—All Title Deeds, Mortgages and other Securities belonging to the Society, or over which it has control, shall be deposited and preserved in a suitable muniment box to be provided by the President for the time being, at the expense of the Society, and to be always kept in his charge for the use of the Society.

Note.—While it is expected that every Clergyman in the Colony will make a yearly collection for the promotion of the objects of the Church Society, and impress upon every individual under his Pastoral charge, the obligations by which he is bound to contribute thereto, year by year,—the system of the Church Society does not require any Clergyman to withhold the ordinances of the Church in any case of refusal or neglect to pay towards his support.

PROCEEDINGS

At the Twenty-fifth Anniversary of the Newfoundland Church Society holden at St. John's in the Cathedral Sunday School Building on Thursday June 29, 1866. The chair was taken at half-past seven o'clock, P. M., by his Excellency the Governor, supported and assisted by the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop, President, who requested the Rev. G. M. Johnson to open the meeting with the usual prayers.

After prayer, the business of the evening commenced with the reading of the Report and of the Treasurer's accounts, after which the following Resolutions were proposed, seconded, and carried unanimously:—

Moved by Rev. Thomas Boone, seconded by John Bowring, Esq.

1. That the report now read, with the Treasurer's accounts, be adopted and printed.

Moved by Rev. T. M. Wood, seconded by Dr. Crowdy.

2. That this meeting desires to acknowledge with reverence and gratitude the mercy and goodness of God to the Church Society during the past year.

Moved by the Rev. W. W. LeGallais, seconded by A. Harvey, Esq.

3. That the circumstances of many of the Missions in this Diocese are such as to require increased provision for their Spiritual needs, and that this meeting pledges itself to do its utmost on behalf of the Church Society to supply the great wants under which so many Missions are labouring.

Moved by the Ven. Archdeacon Kelly, seconded by the Hen. Judge Robinson.

4. That in the opinion of this meeting steps ought to be taken to raise an endowment fund specially for the Theological College in this Diocese, in order to provide, and maintain a supply of duly qualified candidates for the work of the Ministry.

Moved by Rev. W. K. White, seconded by the Hon. J. S. Clift.

5. That the thanks of the Newfoundland Church Society be given to the Right Reverend the President for his counsel and assistance, and to the Treasurer, Secretary and Committee for their services during the past year, and that W. H. Mare, Esq., be Treasurer, and the Rev. G. M. Johnson, Secretary, for the ensuing year.

The Bishop then proposed the following additions to the standing rules of the Society on the suggestion of the Hon. Judge Robinson:—

- (1) At each annual meeting there shall be appointed three members of this Society, who shall be requested to examine all securities belonging to the general funds of this Society, or belonging or appertaining to the Clergy Widows' and Orphans' Fund, or to any other fund over which the Society has, or shall have control, and to report in writing to the Fresident, or, in his absence, to the Senior Vice-President in St. John's, their opinion upon the sufficiency or insufficiency of the same, and, if necessary, a special meeting of the Committee shall be convened to consider such report, and to take such action upon it as shall be deemed requisite.
- (2) All Title Deeds, Mortgages and other Securities belonging to the Society, or over which it has control, shall be deposited, and preserved in a suitable muniment box to he provided by the President for the time being, at the expense of the Society, and to be always kept in his charge for the use of the Society.

And the additions proposed were unanimously adopted.

It was then agreed that the meeting at its close should be adjourned till the next day, (Friday) then again to assemble in the same place for the consideration of an alteration the Rt. Rev. the President desired to propose in Rule 2 of the Standing Rules of the Church Society, and for determination upon the notices of motion given at the last annual meeting of the Society by the Rev. G. M. Johnson, Secretary, affecting the Standing Rules for the management of the Clergy Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

Moved by Rev. Edward Colley, seconded by Ewen Stabb, Esq.

6. That the thanks of the meeting be given to His Excellency the Governor for his kindness in presiding on this occasion.

The meeting was then adjourned till 3 o'clock on the following day, (Friday), and dismissed after singing the doxology, with the usual benediction by the Right Rev. the President.

The following alterations were agreed upon and made, at the adjourned general meetings of the Church Society held in the Cathedral Sunday School on Friday June 29, and Monday July 2, in the standing rules for the government of the Newfoundland Church Society, and of the Clergy Widows' and Orphans' Fund:—

STANDING RULES OF THE NEWFOUNDLAND CHURCH SOCIETY.

Moved by Rev. G. M. Johnson, seconded by Hon. Judge Robinson.

RULE 2.

After the words "Religious Books and Tracts," to be inserted as follows:—(4) to assist in creating and sustaining a special fund for the endowment and support of the Theological College in St. John's, and (5) to create and maintain, &c., &c., to the end.

STANDING RULES OF THE CLERGY WIDOWS' AND ORPHAN'S FUND.

Moved by the Ven. Archdeacon Kelly, seconded by the Rev. E. Colley.

RULE 4.

All Clergymen in the Diocese holding the Bishop's license may secure the benefit of this Fund by contributing within six months from the time of obtaining their License from the Bishop as fol-

lows:—(1) Unmarried Clergymen and Widowers without a child, one pound (£1) per annum: (2) Married Clergymen (and such as shall afterwards become married.) and Widowers with a child, two pounds (£2) per annum.

Moved by Rev. G. M. Johnson, seconded by Rev. E. Colley.

RULE 5.

Annual subscriptions shall be payable in advance on the 1st day of January in each year:—provided that Clergymen on entry shall for that year pay only a rateable proportion of the annual subscription up to the first day of January following. Thirty days grace shall be allowed, but every Clergyman, neglecting to make payment within that time, shall forfeit his claim upon the Fund, to be recovered only upon payment of arrears, with ten per cent thereon, before the following first day of January.

Moved by Rev. G. M. Johnson, seconded by G. T. Rendell, Esq.

RULE 6.

Any Clergyman neglecting to subscribe according to Rule 4, or to pay his annual subscription within the time limited by Rule 5, may, if the Committee see fit to admit or re-admit him, secure the benefit of the fund by the payment of two pounds ten shillings (£2 10) if married or a widower with a child; and one pound ten shillings (£1 10) if unmarried or a widower without a child, from the day on which the last annual subscription he paid was due, or from the day of his being licensed by the Bishop, and from the date of such admission or re-admission he shall come under the operation of Rule 4.

Moved by G. T. Rendell, Esq., seconded by the Ven. Archdeacon Kelly.

RULE 7.

Every Clergyman securing the benefit of this Fund will be required to make a yearly collection for the same in his Mission and to forward the amount with his own annual subscription to the Treasurer.

N. B.—These Rules are to be substituted for those bearing the same numbers in the old table of Standing Rules for the management of the Clergy Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

REPORT FOR 1865.

At the last Annual meeting of the Newfoundland Church Society, the Committee opened their Report with an expression of regret at not being able to congratulate those assembled, as they had done at previous meetings, on the generally satisfactory and promising condition of the affairs and prospects of the Church Society. On the present occasion your Committee rejoice that there is no longer any necessity to speak of the present position of the Society, as not

being one of progress and improvement.

Your Committee cannot even now report, as they greatly should desire, any large accession to the number of Missions in connection with the Church Society, a circumstance which is still and always has been the subject of disappointment and regret. During the past year twenty-five Clergymen and their Missions in addition to those belonging to St. John's have sent contributions, thus placing themselves in a position to be assisted by the Committee as occasion shall arise. Last year the total number of Clergy and Missions co-operating with this Society was twentyfour. The Missions however composing the former number are different, Portugal Cove having for the present disappeared from the Society's list, while White Bay and Bay of Islands have been added. Your Committee cannot but remark here, that, while

the Church Society desires to embrace as it seeks to benefit every Mission in the Island, and believes that in former years it has so benefited all in connection with it, upon examination of the last year's roll of Clergy it is found that out of forty-five Clergy which the list comprises, there are still fifteen who for various reasons, at the end of near a quarter of a century of the existence of the Church Society, refuse to allow their Missions to derive the advantages offered, not the least of which it is believed arises from unanimity in a good and holy cause. Your Committee draw the especial attention of the Clergy who may now be present, to the above remarks, and commend them to their consideration, believing that still greater benefits would accrue, if all could be induced to hearty co-operation in the work for which the Church Society has been constituted, the blessings of which your Committee desire to see extended through all the still destitute and neglected portions of the Diocese.

Your Committee thankfully report an increase of £141 15s. 10d. on the amount contributed by the various Missions which have made returns to the Church Society since the last annual meeting, betokening it hoped an improvement in the circumstances of the people generally, and proving so far, that it was no want of either zeal on the part of the Clergy, or willingness among their flocks, which caused last year a diminution of the amounts returned but that the late distress was the cause of the deficiency regretted in the Report read at this meeting last year. Nine Missions during the year 1865. have however fallen short in the amount raised among them as compared with the year 1864, and the increase which it is the pleasure of your Committee to mention, arises therefore entirely from the contributions of the sixteen remaining Missions, and St. John's. Among the congregations of the three Churches in the capital, all the Clergy raised larger contributions than heretefore, a circumstance especially noteworthy and gratifying, when it is remembered that in the course of the same period the members of the Cathedral congregation have also been called upon for the first time, to fulfil obligations voluntarily undertaken for a period of years, for the maintenance of a second Clergyman to minister among them. The annexed Schedule will shew at one view what the gain has been among each of the three congregations in St. John's, and in which of the outharbor collections there has been either increase or the contrary. The Missions not named, are those which have still sent in no returns.

It will hence be seen that the expenditure of the past year has been £1,095 16s, 10d., against the sum of £711 19s. 3d. voted in the previous year, being an increase of £383 17s. 7d. The income of the Society for the year 1865 has been £1,056 6s. 5d.—that for 1864 was £907 6s. Od. Thus if there has been a larger income during the year 1865, the expenditure has been larger also, as might reasonably have been expected. It is manifest that opportunities of doing good are only limited by the funds placed from year to year at the disposal of the Church Society. With still larger means more clergy might be employed, and more Churches built, several of the Missions being far too large for the supervision their overtaxed Clergy are able to exercise, and many and populous places being still grievously destitute of the means of grace. Near eighty-five pounds more it is believed than ever contributed before have been raised in St. John's alone, and could the efforts which have produced this result only be increased so as to bring the many among the large population of this town belonging to our Church who at present do not contribute into membership of this Society, it is believed that in coming years a sum might, without difficulty be raised which would enable the Bishop to place another Clergyman at some one or other of the many

points at which he has so often at these meetings told us that additional help is urgently required. If one congregation during the past year has been able in great part to maintain an additional clergyman for its own service, and at the same time to increase its ordinary contributions—might not the congregations of the three districts of this town, during the interval between the present and the next annual meeting of the Church Society, direct their efforts to this worthy object—and could such endeavours if really made on all sides in earnest, fail to achieve the end sought and desired.

CLERGY WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The total number of Clergy now entitled to the benefit of this Fund is forty, an increase of three upon the number reported at the last Annual Meeting. The financial condition of the Fund is still very satisfactory. The following amounts have been contributed since our last general meeting:—

Subscriptions £75 0s. Od.—Collections £91 19s. 11d.—Donations £13 18s. 6d.—Interest £134 19 6d.

The total income of the past year has been £315 17s. 11d., against which the only charge has been the pension of £40 voted to Mrs. John Moreton at her husband's death. Your Committee again record with thankfulness to Almighty God, the fact that another year has passed without any additional claim upon the resources of the fund. The capital is now £2,633 8s. Od. having increased £236 5s. 4d. since the last accounts were given.

BOOK DEPOSITORY.

Since the last Annual Meeting of the Church Society, the Depository has again been removed and is now kept at No. 221, Water Street, by Mr. J. T Burton, The removal mentioned in the last Report was a matter of necessity, and was made to the best situation that could then be procured. It is, hoped that the Depot is now permanently settled, as the premises where it is kept are in the most desirable part of the town, and on the south side of Water Street, whereas the last premises occupied were on the northern and less desirable side of that street. Last year reference was made to the fact of a considerable reduction having been made in the price of books, and the Committee are now able to speak of a very great improvement in the value and character of the books placed in the shop under the management of the Depot Sub-Committee. A much larger stock has been imported, and the wisdom of all the changes that have been made with a view to increasing the utility of the Depot appears to be shewn by the larger quantity of books sold up to the time of settling the last accounts. For the ten months accounted for before the last meeting, books had been sold (see last Report, p. 23) to the value of £232 5s. 2d., while for the eight months which had elapsed at the last settlement from the time of entering the new premises, the sales had reached the amount of £243 9s. 6d., and this sum represents a tenth larger quantity of books at least, as reduction had been made within the latter time of 10 per cent upon the former charges. The advantages which the Sub-Committee expected from the change of place and reduction of prices seem therefore to have been realized.

Since our last anniversary a lengthened voyage of Visitation has been undertaken and carried out by the Bishop. His Lordship sailed on St. Peter's Day, June 29, and was absent till the middle of October. During his absence he visited the Missions of the Labrador, holding Service in many of the scattered

settlements belonging to the Missions of Messrs. Hutchinson and Dobie, made a second circuit of White Bay, besides visiting many places on the French Shore, and confirmed and performed such other episcopal acts as were required in the Northern Missions, beginning with Twillingate, and ending at Heart's Content in Trinity Bay. His Lordship has lately visited Conception Bay, and has thus completed the Visitation of the whole of the Northern portion of this too extensive Diocesc. Your Committee regret to learn that owing to the absence on account of illness, of the Rev. Mr. Jones, no confirmations could take place in Harbor Grace, and that absence in one case, and lack of a Clergyman to take regular charge ia another, have also prevented the usual confirmations being celebrated in the settlements belonging to Portugal Cove Mission, and that of the St. John's Out-Harbours. Your Committee desire to remark upon these statements, as shewing that men are no less than means wanting for the service of the Church in this Diocese, that these Misions are now thus vacant for the first time during the past twenty It will thus be seen that while in some directions the Church is happily extending herself in new and important spheres, her operations are crippled in older Missions, at least temporarily, through the difficulty of keeping up the requisite supply of duly ordained Ministers. The Theological College has been, and is suffering in like manner since the departure of the Rev. Mr. Harris at this time last year, whose place, though no effort has been spared to procure a competent successor, still remains vacant. Under these circumstances your Committee deem it a matter of great satisfaction that the Rev. Mr. Kelly has been permitted to return to his charge in the Cathedral, and that notwithstanding much addition to those duties that would ordinarily fall upon him

from the absence of a Vice-Principal at the College, he has been enabled to meet, as far as possible, the various calls that have devolved upon him.

Your Committee have much pleasure in recording Mr. Kelly's appointment to the high office of Archdeacon in the Diocese, which they hope he may continue to exercise for many years with honor to himself and advantage to the Church.

The only other addition to the number of the Clergy, since the last annual meeting of this Society, has been by the ordination of one deacon on All Saints Day last year. Nor does the number of the Clergy seem likely at present to be increased, as although an ordination took place on Monday last, at which four clergymen were advanced to the priesthood, no deacons were added to the clergy of the diocese, whose numerical strength therefore remains still the same as before that event.

At the last annual meeting of the Church Society, announcement was made of the establishment of a new mission at Bay of Islands in charge of the Rev. Mr. Rule, of a similar character to one undertaken by the Rev. Mr. Temple for the benefit of White Bay, during the previous year. At the request of the Secretary, for the information of this meeting, both these gentiemen, who are now among us in attendance at the Bishop's Visitation, have furnished written accounts of their labours in their respective missions; and these your Committee are assured will be listened to with peculiar interest. The Rev. Mr. Rule is one of the newly ordained priests, Mr. Temple being already of the higher order.

The Rev. Mr. Temple writes as follows:—

REV. AND DEAR SIR,-

You have requested the Missionary in White Bay to furnish you with some account of his work in that distant outpost. This he has

done, sending extracts from his private journal, such as he considered interesting, or calculated to give a true idea of the rough life of a pioneer. He desires to inform you, after an absence of two years, that he sees cause of thankfulness and hope. No great results have been reached or expected; no buildings or other marks of an established mission have been attempted; but he has contented himself with striving to gain the confidence and good will of every one of the scattered families of that coast, who were willing to receive him and contribute to his support, living as they live, and watching for opportunities of being useful.

He begs to report considerable increase of income during the past, compared with the first year: £47 instead of £33: and this he looks upon as a token that his services are valued by his people, even more than the constant professions of attachment made by word of mouth. But there is yet one greater cause for gratitude to Almighty God, which is, the evident improvement and change of character in many; their respect and desire for the services of religion, and their uniform attachment to the Church of their fathers, though not recognized as members of that Church so long.

From Little Bay to Englee, are scarcely 350 souls; men, women and children, collected in groups at irregular distances.—Some of these are able to see the Missionary at their homes twice, some three times, some (as matters remain at present) four times a year. Yet many are not contented with this, but if weather permit, will follow him from Sunday to Sunday in their boats, to partake in the simple services. The largest congregation yet gathered, was on Advent Sunday, as may be seen by the following extract from the Journal.:—

Dec. 3.—Advent Sunday.—Jackson's Arm. This day I had a congregation of seventy-six persons; completely filling up the ground floor of the house; that is, both kitchen and bedroom; which, being a summer house and the family removed for the season, were fortunately cleared of nearly all their farniture. There was no possibility of obtaining anything like arrangement, we were so much crowded. I myself, during the sermon, was obliged to stand on a block in the doorway between the two rooms that I might be seen and heard by all; being literally surrounded on all sides.—This large congregation consisted chiefly of people from the south, ward, who are accustomed to reside in White Bay, during the winter, for the benefit of the sealing voyage.

Sometimes the Missionary finds (as might be expected) great ignorance of the real nature of his office, and the duties to be performed by him, as follows:—

Dec. 9.—Refused a young man, who had lately arrived from the southward, permission to be married by a layman. His intended

wife lives thirty miles distant, and he was very unwilling to row me there and back so late in the season, thinking that I could perform the ceremony afterwards at my visit in the spring. However, as I felt that to give way once in such a matter would be overthrowing one of the principal objects of my coming, I thought it a matter of duty to insist upon going at once. After much hesitation, he told me in the evening that his brothers who were to be his bridemen, would form a crew and carry me down and back again, as he himself was not intending to return.

This last extract was on Saturday; on the Monday they started, returning on the Wednesday, and the rest of the week the Missionary was delayed by a case of sickness at Jackson's Arm, but on the Saturday following was able to leave.

December 16th.—Finding our patient recovering in some degree, I decided on starting for the station at which I had appointed to hold the Sunday service. Obtained a crew, and calling in at Sop's Island by the way, haptized a new born infant and churched the mother, then crossed the narrow Bay, reaching my resting place about dark. They had just given us up, but were the more glad we did not disappoint them. After tea I held my usual evening service, and was glad and thankful that my week of events and a journey of more than seventy miles, so late in the fall, had not resulted in mishap, or delay of any consequence, but that every effort for His Glory had been furthered by a gracious God.

About Christmas, travelling becames impossible in White Bay. The water is in a semi-frozen state called "slob," and boats are unable to make their way through it; while on the land the snow is not sufficiently settled even for rackets. Therefore the Missionary settles down, until February arrives, in a winter tilt; not a very picturesque residence, but sufficiently comfortable with a good fire, and employs himself in teaching the few pupils he can find. On February 1st the ice was pronounced safe, and he commenced his winter circuit. Walking on ice is very dangerous sometimes, especially if there is any "sea."

February 12th.—As soon as it was light, I heard one boy call out to another that the "sea" was "making"; so I began to fear we should not get away. A fine bridge of ice has been thrown across the Bight for the last fortnight, and it would be a pity to lose our opportunity on the very day we wanted to return. So as there was only a slight creaking and lifting along shore, we started home. But when we had crossed the Bight as far as Middle Arm Point, large pans of ice were detached all along the rocks, and were moving in and out with the surf. Over the cracks between these pans we had to jump to get ashore, as quickly as we might; and before we had been in the house twenty minutes, one of our sudden off shore

breezes came on, our bridge was rushing toward the other side of the Bay, and the Bight was clear water.

This week I was travelling every day except Ash Wednesday, and reached Jackson's Arm, where there were several sick people, on Saturday.

About this time a "standing edge" of ice is usually formed across some part or other of the Bay. This year it did not break up till nearly Easter. During Holy Week and the first part of Easter week, the Missionary was fully employed—holding two full services (at various houses) each day, and preaching fourteen sermons on ten successive days.

March 29th,—For the last few days the wind has been chiefly at N. E. having raised a frightful sea along shore; here at River Head we feel nothing of it but the ice is cracked and broken up, and further down the Bay the surf (as we afterwards heard) was such as had not been seen these ten years. Twenty-six fine scals were washed off the rocks, where they had been laid in apparent safety, and the punts were scarcely saved. On the French shore the damage must have been worse, for punts and stages have been seen drifting up the Bay among the ice. We hope young scals have been hauled along the shore, we should surely have had them into the Bay, had it not been for the harbor ice, which broke up with the sea and came into our parts before the heavy jam. (We afterwards heard that they reached Partridge Point and Grandyache; only 40 miles below us.)

April 1st., Easter Sunday.—A true Easter morning. Not a cloud to spoil the beauty of the azure sky. And this continued all day; quite a marvel for White Bay. What a contrast was the summer above to the snow and ice and leafless birches and dark firs. Fine hard walking this morning, therefore a good congregation, filling the small house. Holy Communion was administered to nine communicants, and an offertory of eleven shillings received.

After Easter there was less ice, and more boating; and passing over a month, the last extract from the journal shall be

April 29th., 4th Sunday after Easter.—This morning I had a large congregation, forty-two in all. Before service I held Sunday school; reading with the children the Psalms, Collect, Epistle, and Gospel for the day, and hearing them say a portion of the catechism. I also gave the best readers the Collect to learn by heart during the day, that they might be employed between services; otherwise the gathering together of so many young people will be a cause of idleness and mischief, instead of good. Held morning service with Holy Communion. Eight Communicants. The sermon was upon the subject of Agrippa's acknowledgement to St. Paul; and the

Apostle's answer; most of my remarks bearing on the words "almost," and "altogether"; and reminding the hearers that if they were only "almost christians," they might at last be only "almost saved"; "almost in heaven." We had two christenings this afternoon; one a hypothetical Baptism; the other the reception of a child privately baptized, the mother having been churched before service. Most of the people went away afterwards, and it really looked quite pretty, to see the punts one after another rowing away; the water as clear as a pond; the sky cloudless and not a breath of wind to stir the trees. In the evening we sang some hymns; and thus ended as pleasant a day as could well be experienced, such as is sometimes spent here; but not very often.

The Missionary concludes his report with acknowledgement of the care with which God has preserved him and furthered his words and works; and yet he regrets that more has not been done, but that the mission is still in so rough and rudimentary a state. However he trusts that a foundation is being laid, even although it may be hidden; a seed sown, although buried in the earth, and he hopes that if he be permitted to report in a similar manner, in four year's more, the result may be more hopeful, and more giorifying to God, than it is now.

The following is the account given of his Mission by the Rev. Mr. Rule:—

The Humber Sound, forming one of the arms of the Bay of Islands is the southernmost and most populous part of the new mission of Bay of Islands. Until within a very few years back the inhabitants were very few, being only the descendants of a very few first settlers. The number of families of original inhabitants now living in the Sound is thirty, of whom twenty-four are of the Church of England, the rest Roman Catholics. There are also a few families who migrated from St. George's Bay twelve or fourteen years ago. All the rest of the inhabitants have settled in the Bay of Islands within the last four or five years. They are from the Western shore, the North American Provinces, Labrador, St. John's and Conception Bay. Those from St. John's as yet are almost without exception Roman Catholics.

The total number of families in the Bay, including four families in Middle Cove, and one family at Little Harbour, just outside the South Head, is about 120, of these half are of the Church of England, a few are Presbyterians, or Methodists, and the rest are Roman Catholies.

North of the Bay of Islands is Trout River, where are four families. In Bonne Bay there are eighteen; and in harbours north of Bonne Bay, as far as Cow Head, which is the limit of the Mission,

sixteen families. From Trout River to Cow Head, inclusive, all are of the Church of England, with but two exceptions.

From Cow Head to South Harbour, the two extremities of the mission, the distance is sixty miles, without counting the indraught of the Bays.

The Humber Sound is about seventeen miles deep, and generally from a mile to two miles broad. The hills running along each side of the Sound are very high and steep, sometimes rising immediately from the water's edge—sometimes a sort of terrace running along the side of the hill, and ten or twenty feet above the level of the water,—sometimes, especially in the coves, the ascent is comparatively gradual.

Except here and there, when there is a little piece of beach, or when a little of the ground has been cleared by the inhabitants, the whole is covered to the very water's edge with thick tangled woods, chiefly of fir, spruce, pine, birch and dog-wood.

There are no roads,—but from Christmas, or a little later to the middle of April. the Sound is firmly frozen.

About the 1st of June, after the planting is finished, almost every man in the Bay, and a great many entire families leave the Sound and go to the outside islands, or plant themselves along the coast between the Bay of Islands and Bonne Bay, and spend the greater part of the summer in the cod fishery. This ontside coast is very high, bare and precipitous. The fall and winter are spent in the herring fishery in the Scund.

The population is scattered along the whole length and breadth of the Sound. On some parts it is much denser than in others, but our own people are pretty evenly distributed. This of course makes it difficult to provide regular and frequent services for the whole of the people, and will render it necessary, besides services in the Church, which will be built in the most central position available, to hold alternate services in other parts of the Bay.

The Church, however, is not yet built, and except by external means, could not be built. The mission is undertaken on the self-supporting principle: and while many of the people appear quite willing to do what they can to make up a salary for the elergyman, though it be a very small one—my experience of the people and their circumstances, shews me that it would be unreasonable to expect them to support their elergyman—that itself a new thing with them—and to build a church and parsonage also, at all events in the infancy of the mission.

The people in the upper part of the Bay, however, have already built a log house, twenty-five feet by seventeen inside, which has been used since last Sexagesima Sunday, as a place of worship, and in which probably I shall take up my quarters on my return.

In the lower part of the Bay the people have promised to build a house about the same size as this one, but in a little better style, to be used permanently as a chapel-school, with a room for me to lodge in when in that neighbourhood. The distance between these two places will be ten miles; and it is proposed to build the church about midway between the two, so that all may have opportunities of worshipping in a church—a building consecrated, and in style of building and arrangement, worthy, or at least as worthy as our means will allow us to make it, of the worship of God and ministration of the Sacraments, and fit to raise the peoples'sthoughts to a reverent esteem and value of holy things.

Hitherto I have been the guest of one of the people, very hospitably treated by him, but yet sharing with him the roughness of an unfinished house in a new place. But I cannot impose upon the good nature of one individual, nor indeed for my own sake and the sake of my own work, be a mere lodger with another man's family: and therefore I hope on my return to have the log house which is already built, made fit for me to rough it in next winter, and indeed until some better place of residence can be found; i.e. until the people with assistance from without can manage to build a parsonage.

It is designed when the means can be procured to build a small church in Bonne Bay where, as in the Bay of Islands, the population is increasing, and where, unlike the Bay of Islands, the people nearly all live within a convenient distance of the site proposed.

Of the social, still more of the religious condition of the people, though the subject of chief and greatest interest, it is not so easy to speak. I have been but a short time among them; and time alone can shew what men are, or what they may become. Suffice it to say, that among this extremely miscellaneous population, there must be, and there are, persons of all sorts—the hopeful, the doubtful, and the depraved. And for all these persons, especially in a growing settlement, how very necessary are the means of grace. For the hopeful, that the beginnings of good may be nourished and confirmed: for the doubtful, that they may be aroused from their lethargy to a sense of eternal things: for the depraved, that they may be reformed, or at least that others may be preserved from the influence—and it is a very evil influence—of their bad example for all, that on this new place there may be set the stamp of Holiness to the Lord.

It gives great pleasure to your Committee to see so many of the Clergy assembled at his Lordship the Bishop's visitation, and they are sure all present at this meeting will share this feeling. It ishoped that as the Clergy will doubtless gain much information from hearing his Lordship's opinion expressed, for their guidance, upon the various weighty matters which formed the subject of his charge, as well as from communication with each other face to face, so also they will not let the present occasion pass without giving the assembled members of the Church Society the benefit of hearing from their lips, such details respecting their different missions, as will be eagerly listened to by all. It is believed that the proportion of the clergy present is larger considerably at this than at any former visitation, and it is hoped that the benefits to the Clergy and Laity of the Diocese will be

large in proportion also.

It has been the good fortune of the Society, with. it is believed, one single exception, to be always favoured with the presence of the Bishop on these occasions; but though the Society has enjoyed the patronage of all former Governors since its formation, it has not often had the privilege of welcoming them personally at its anniversary, and His Excellency's ready acceptance of their invitation to preside is therefore thankfully acknowledged by the Committee, as they are sure it will be also by the Clergy and meeting generally. For these advantages as enjoyed at present, as well as for all the blessings which have attended the operations of the Church Society, during the past and former years, your Committee desire to invite all to join them in expressions of devout and humble thankfulness to Almighty God.

Subscriptions paid after Jan. 31, in each year, will come under a fine of 10 per cent. See Rule 5.

STANDING RULES

OF THE

Clergy Widows' and Grphans' Fund.

- 1.—THE NEWFOUNDLAND CHURCH SOCIETY'S Special Fund, for assisting the Widows and Orphans of deceased Clergymen of the Diocese of Newfoundland, shall consist of all monies paid to the Treasurer of the Society for that object.
- 2.—The Committee of the Church Society shall have the management of the Fund.
- 3.—Every Rundred Pounds of available surplus shall be invested by the Committee as opportunities occur. Smaller sums shall be deposited every quarter in the Savings' Bank.
- 4.—All Clergymen in the Diocese holding the Bishop's license may secure the benefit of this Fund by contributing within six months from the time of obtaining their License from the Bishop as follows:—
 (1) Unmarried Clergymen and Widowers without a child, one pound (£1) per annum: (2) Married Clergymen (and such as shall afterwards become married,) and Widowers with a child, two pounds (£2) per annum.
- 5.—Annual subscriptions shall be payable in advance on the 1st day of January in each year:—provided that Clergymen on entry shall for that year pay only

a rateable proportion of the annual subscription up to first day of January following. Thirty days grace shall be allowed, but every Clergyman, neglecting to make payment within that time, shall forfeit his claim upon the Fund, to be recovered only upon payment of arrears, with ten per cent thereon, before the following first day of January.

6.—Any Clergyman neglecting to subscribe according to Rule 4, or to pay his annual subscription within the time limited by Rule 5, may, if the Committee see fit to admit or re-admit him, secure the benefit of the Fund by the payment of two pounds ten shillings (£2 10) if married or a widower with a child; and one pound ten shillings (£1 10s.) if unmarried or a widower without a child, from the day on which the last annual subscription he paid was due, or from the date of his being licensed by the Bishop, and from the date of such admission, or re-admission, he shall come under the operation of Rule 4.

7.—Every Clergyman securing the benefit of this Fund will be required to make a yearly collection for the same in his Mission, and to forward the amount with his own annual subscription to the Treasurer.

8.—The Widow of every Clergyman who shall have paid his annual subscription, and forwarded an annual collection, till his death, or till incapacitated by mental or bodily infirmity, shall be entitled to receive a yearly Pension of thirty pounds (£30) currency, during widowhood.

9.—If the Fund should at any time permit, the Committee may increase the amount of Pension to any sum not exceeding £50; such an addition, however, being subject to be withdrawn wholly or in part, should the state of the Fund not warrant its continuance.

10.—If the Widow die or marry again, the Pension shall be paid to Trustees for the benefit of such Children of the deceased husband, as may be, if boys, under sixteen, if girls, under eighteen years of age.

11.—The Trustees named by a deceased Clergyman, in the event of the death or marriage of his Widow, shall be recognized by the Committee in paying the Pension for the benefit of the child or children; but if the Trustees so named are unwilling or unable to act, the Bishop of the Diocese shall act as Trustee in the application of the Pension.

12—If the wife die before her husband, his child or children shall receive the Pension, so long as there is a claimant under Rule ten.

13.—The pensions shall be paid half-yearly by the Bishop's order on the Treasurer on the first of January and first of July. The first payment to be calculated for the interval from the husband's death to the day of payment.

14.—If a Clergyman, having joined the Fund after the 24th June, 1863, removes from the Diocese after having served less than fourteen years, his connection with the fund shall cease, and he shall be entitled to receive back half the amount of the annual subscription he has paid. If he removes after having served fourteen years and less than twenty-one years, he shall be allowed to remain in connection with the Fund by paying an annual subscription of six pounds, or nine pounds if residing within the tropics; or he may receive back half his annual subscriptions, upon which his connection with the Fund shall cease. If he removes after having served twenty one years, he shall be allowed to remain in connection with the Fund by paying an annual subscription of five pounds, or seven pounds ten shillings if residing within the tropics; or

he may receive back three-fourths of his annual subscriptions, upon which his connection with the Fund shall cease. All Clergymen in connection with the Fund previous to the 24th June, 1863, to be governed by the original Rule 14 thereof.

15.—A yearly statement of the Treasurer's accounts with this Fund shall be published with the Society's Report.

16.—None of the above Rules shall be altered, or repealed, except at a general meeting of the Church Society, and after a full years notice to the members of the proposed change.

"The following is the original Rule 14, governing Clergymen in connection with the Fund before June 24, 1863.

14.—If a Clergyman removes, with the Bishop's consent, from the Diocese, after officiating in it not less than seven years, he shallbe allowed his claim upon the Fund, on the payment of an annual subscription of three pounds (£3); or, if he desire it, may receive back half the amount he has paid; which repayment shall release the Fund from all his claims upon it."
