
Better the fellow who brags about the kind deeds that he has done, than the fellow who keeps his mouth shut because he has never done anything for anyons else to brag about.

RAILWAY FARES

Those coming to Ceremonial might purchase a one-way ticket to Calgary and at same time secure from the Railway Agent a Standard Certificate and hand same to Noble J. S. Mc-

Cammon immediately on arrival in Calgary,

The railways have restored convention rates, but on a different basis than heretofore, now there must be one hundred or more certificates to secure a return rate of three-fifths the regular fare plus twenty-five cents validation fee, the validation fee is to cover cost of Railway Agent counting and hitting the certificates with his stamp. If there are less than one hundred, the return rate will be four-fifths regular fare plus the before-mentioned two bits.
