EATON'S SIGN LARGEST CONTRACT YET MADE WITH TORONTO HYDRO SYSTEM FOR 2500 HORSEPOWER

Will Pay \$50,000 a Year for Electrical Energy To Supplement the Supply Now Generated by Their Own Plant-Hydro Commission Will Increase Its Supply from the Provincial Commission In Order To Comply With the Terms of the Eaton Contract.

LL details of the largest contract yet made by the Toronto A LL details of the largest contract yet made by the Toronto Hydro-Electric Commission were completed yesterday, when an agreement was signed by the T. Eaton Company for a supply of 2000 kilowatts, or about 2500 horsepower, of electrical energy from the commission. The Eaton Company will use this to supplement the supply now generated in their own plant, and will pay the Toronto commission about \$50,000 a year for the additional electrical energy needed in the big store and factories. The hydro-electric system will be immediately strengthened, and within the course of a few weeks the commission hope to be able to link the big store with the chain of factories and other buildings now using hydro power.

Negotiations were first started about the latter part of June. H. H. Couzens, general manager of the Toronto Hydro.

June. H. H. Couzens, general manager of the Toronto Hydro, acted for the commission, while George W. Thompson, chief engineer, looked after the interests of the Eaton Company. The Toronto Electric Light Company was after the contract, but the Eaton Company favored the Hydro, and last night the officers of the Hydro were able to assure The World that the deal had gone thru.

The contract secured from the Eaton Company is the largest the commission has ever obtained, with the possible exception of the agreement for the supply for the dredging operations in Toronto Bay. P. W. 

HUERTA MUST RESIGN WITHOUT POWER TO NAME HIS SUCCESSOR

Mexico's Dictator Not Expected To Accede to Demand, and U.S. Diplomatic Representative Will Probably Be Handed His Passports---Huerta Keeping Memorandum from His Advisers---Met Diplomatic Corps, But Object Is Unknown.

WASHINGTON SENDS ULTIMATUM

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 3.—(Can. Press) --- President Huerta has been told he must resign the presidency of Mexico without loss of time, and that he must not leave as his successor Gen. Blanquet, his minister of war, or any other members of his official family, or of the unofficial

coterie whom he might be expected to control.

This ulfimatum from Washington was conveyed to President Huerta thru his private secretary, Senor Babago, by Nelson O'Shaughnessy, the American charge d'affaires, acting under instructions from the state department.

HUERTA IS SILENT.

Senor Rabago presented the memorandum to his chief late Sunday, but up to this evening President Huerta had returned no answer to it, and, as far as could be learned, had guarded its contents from almost all his official and intimate councillors. CROP MOVEMENT A BIG STIMULUS

Southern Alberta's Business Interests Feel the Commercial Wave.

CARDSTON. 

Table Etiquet

BILL NYE said, and very truly, that the rule of dining-room etiquet was but vaguely understood. He wrote: "It is in exceeding poor taste to put the napkin in the pocket and carry it away. It should be folded by the guest and left beside the plate, where the hostess can easily find it and return it to the neighbor from whom she borrowed it

for your use."

The arrangement of the dining table may be planned so that both guest and family may be comfortable thruout the meal with no question in the mind of either as to what Mr. Nye or Harry Lauder would advise as correct table usage if the following hints are used:

Knives are placed at the right of the cover and forks at the left. All the flat silver is no longer put on the table at the commencement of a meal, but the pieces that are needed are brought in with each course. This is a great step toward common sense in dining, for the variety in number of forks and knives used at a seven-course dinner bewildered everyone.

Only one spoin and that a large soup spoon is laid by the plate; if a pointed one is there also it is for grapefruit. Remember that the spoons should always be placed in cup or dish or at the side of the dish at the end of the course and not on the linen. Men, of course, are the worst offenders.

Bread and butter is eaten from a small bread plate placed at the right of the dinner plate. Honey, preserves and sweets are placed on this little plate also, if they are served.

Salt and pepper shakers are usually conveniently placed, but if a large open salt box is passed, a salt spoon should accompany it.

The cheese course seems to puzzle hosteses most of all. Many things decide how it shall be served; the kind of cheese, the foods it is to be eaten with, and the sort of a dinner you are giving. The cheese is usually sent in on a cheese platter with a silver cheese knife. Hard and soft cheeses are treated in the same manner. The biscuits or wafers that accompany it should be small and very crisp. Cheese straws or cheese crackers may be used with some courses if you do not wish to serve cheese. I will be very glad to give directions for making these delicacies to my readers. Some writer has called fresh and dried fruits "finger foods," and this describes them very well, and after them the finger bowl is really needed. It is placed before the guest on a plate and a doily or a small embroidered napkin is beneath it. This is brought in on a fruit plate and the bowl and its plate is set at one side, and when the fruit is passed it is put on the plate in readiness for it, but this is arranged to suit the convenience of the hostess. It is quite as good form to bring the fruit on individual plates and then have the finger bowls placed. You may put an after-dinner mint or a wintergreen wafer on the finger bowl plate to be eaten as a digestive at the end of a rich meal if you please.

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

Toronto Telegram, Nov. 3: Extension of the city limits is advocated by subdividers who promote annoxation as a means of increasing the price of land and making it harder for the city's workers to buy a part of the earth's surface on which they can build homes of their own. The establishment of a metropolitan district on the lines advocated by Controller Church would spread city taxation over all the farms that are destined to become part of the city in the next 30 years.
