Commercial Summary.

A BRANCH of the Merchants Bank of Halifax has been opened at Kingston, Kent Co., N. S.

TENDERS are out for the construction of a woollen factory in Simcoe, which we believe is to be conducted on a large scale.

At a special meeting of the directors of the North Shore Railway, on Friday last, the president was authorized to proceed immediately with the construction of the road from Huntingdon to Longueuil.

The Craven Cotton Company (Limited) has been incorporated with a capital of \$225,000. The directors are Messrs: Clayton Slater, I. Cockshut, W. Buck and Jno. Harris, of Brantford, and Jas. Slater, of London.

Winsor, N.S., is agitating for the erection of a water supply service. A Halifax exchange says: Judging from the quality of water at present to be had in that town the building of such works would be a great improvement and a most necessary one.

An agricultural and industrial exhibition will be held at Truro, N.S., during the first week in October next. A prize list of \$2,500 has been published. The competition is open to the whole Province, and no charge is made for entry of exhibits.

The number of failures reported in Canada last week was 11, an increase of 2 over the preceding week; the number reported in the States was 131, an increase of 7 over the preceding week, and 49 more than for the like period last year.

The Morton Dairying, Farming and Colonization Co. of Manitoba, organized some time in February last, with a capital of \$1,000,000, have become incorporated. Among the promoters are Messrs. A. Hodgson, A. J. Brice, George, Bishop, Charles Huston, Thomas Cramp, John Smith and J. D. Crawford, of this city.

It is stated that a better system of maintenance of the streets of Montreal is about being inaugurated,—not before it was needed. Some of the aldermen state that during the last ten years the Corporation have spent \$1,500,000 on the streets, and to-day have nothing to show for it. The expenditure up till the 1st inst. amounted to \$100,000, and for the year, to \$200,000.

J. C. PATERSON, hatter and furrier of Quebec whose assignment was reported in our last issue, has compromised with his creditors at 25c on the dollar, secured, and payable in four, eight, and twelve months. His liabilities amount to some \$21,949, with assets of \$14,108.

Mr. H. WALLIS, mechanical superintendent of the Grand Trunk Railway, is in Western Ontario, looking for a location for the proposed large increase of workshops for the Amalgamated Grand Trunk and Great Western Railways. The site is expected to be either Brantford or London, the latter city being the most probable.

It has been suggested—and the suggestion meets with much favor—that the Citizens Committee in connection with the Exhibition to be held in this city next September, include in their programme a grand banquet, to which invitations be sent to the Premier, to Hon. Ed. Blake, the Mayors of the Canadian cities, and the governors of the New England States.

The Lindsay Paper Mills Company, with a capital of \$60,000, has been incorporated. The names of the promoters have been previously published: Messrs. A. A. Stevenson, W. D. O'Brien, Richard White, R. Jellyman, A. L. Brown, H. Dobell, P. A. Peterson, H. J. Tiffin, C. R. Hosmer, A. H. Plimsoll, A. H. Sims, Robert Campbell, G. W. Craig, C. T. Gibbs and Hon. A. W. Ogilvie.

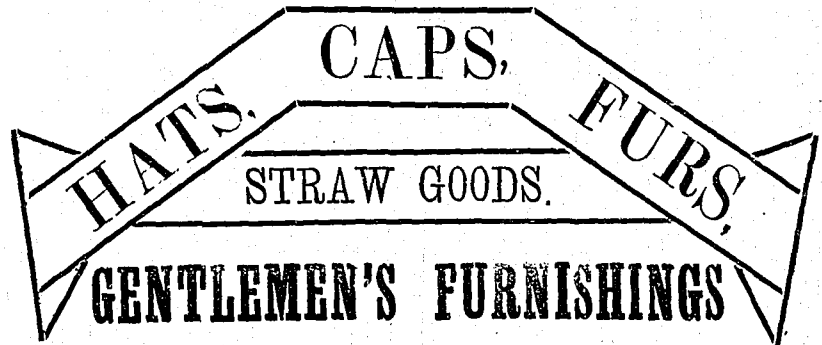

The East Mississippi Co-operative Endowment Association of West Point, Miss., purports to be chartered by the State, and, in addition to the usual matrimonial department, with its promise of \$1,000 within sixty days after receipt of satisfactory proof of marriage of the beneficiary, has also a birth department, holding out to parents the glittering bait of \$1,000 or \$2,000 for each child born to them.!

WEST & PEACHEY, foundrymen, Simcoe, Ont., owing to their being crowded out by work, have been obliged to purchase from H. J. Glazebrook, Esq., the large planing, sash and door factory, formerly occupied by Mr. Lewis, adjoining their premises. This building is now nearly one hundred feet long. Messrs. West & Peachey are now employing twenty men; and, as they intend entering into the manufacturing of boilers and engines, it is probable the number will be increased to 100. They are also making preparations for electric light, which will be the first building of the kind using it in this part of the country; elevators are also in course of construction.

Messrs. Job Abbott and P. Johnson, of Toronto; Angus Thom, of Montreal; H. Macfarlane, of Stratford; and L. Lyman, of Northampton, Mass., are applying for incorporation as the "Dominion Bridge Company, limited," with a capital of \$500,000, and head office in Montreal. It is expected that the factory will be located in the vicinity of this city, though no site has yet been selected; a large track of land will be required. The buildings, it is stated, will be numerous and extensive. The Company, who purpose manufacturing much of the iron and steel they will require, hope to commence operations in March or April next.

It is proposed to form a joint stock company to build a large dry dock at this port, outside of the new Wellington basin, with forges and other appliances for repairing iron ships of the largest size,—a staff of competent workmen to be kept permanently employed. The estimated cost is \$350,000. The shipping interests of Montreal have long been placed at a disadvantage for the want of a dry dock sufficiently large to receive sea-going vessels. Already this season nine ships have had to be sent to Quebec for repairs in the dry-docks there, and to be brought back again for their cargoes, entailing great expense, while some vessels have been sent to sea sadly in want of repairs.

The estimated cost of the new wing of the Windsor Hotel, this city, to be erected forthwith, is \$25,000. At a meeting of the shareholders held last week the report of the syndicate appointed in July 1877, to finish and furnish the building, was read, showing that about \$200,000 had been paid from rent and surplus profits, and building and effects were now handed over to the Company as representing a liability of \$799,500, viz., stock, \$364,500; bonds, issue of 1882, \$435,000—total, \$799,500, on which dividends and interest will accrue. The interest on the bonds being 7 per cent. will be on \$435,000, \$30,450, and a 7 per cent. dividend on the stock proposed to be paid will be on \$364,500, equal to \$25,515, or a total of \$55,965. The statement of the cost of the Hotel—land, building and furniture, showed the land to amount to \$128,067.61; building, \$592,964.60; furniture, \$145,206.07; sundries, \$129,845.07; total \$996,083.35. The report being entirely satisfactory, was unanimously adopted. The sum of \$500 was voted to Mr. P. S. Ross, secretary, for extra services, also a bonus to the efficient Executive Committee.

Some Montreal houses claim to have been unfairly treated by Stewart, who after renewing several times with his Montreal creditors allowed Toronto firms to obtain judgments without notifying the former.

The Boucherville Creamery has entered an action against the Canada Co-operative Supply Association, this city, for alleged breach of butter contract awarded them by tender.

GEO. FRASER & Co., retail grocers, this city, Jas. Noble, merchant tailor, Toronto, and Meteyer & Bro., small boot and shoe manufacturers, this city, have assigned in trust.—John Fletcher, builder, Toronto, offering to compromise at 50c on the dollar.—Matilda Valade, fancy goods dealer, this city, reported to have failed, and Charles Vezina, boots and shoes, Quebec, left the city, having been closed up for rent.

Messrs. E. Roos, C. Rettlebron and H. R. Sharpe, who lately carried on business under the firm name of "The Roos Manufacturing Company" at Walkerton, Ontario, as boot and shoe manufacturers, made an assignment last Monday to Mr. P. Oress of Port Elgin, tanner, who will continue the business pending the meeting of creditors called for Tuesday next at the office of Messrs. Barrett & Klein at Walkerton. Disagreements among the partners said to be the cause of the trouble.

SLEBY LEE, Ottawa, shoe manufacturer in a small way, is offering to compromise liabilities of about \$15,000 at 50c on the dollar. The creditors are chiefly in this city, and seem to be divided upon the offer. The assets, consisting of stocks, show a slight shrinkage, and are

estimated at about \$14,000. Lee has been in business about thirty years; he formerly conducted a retail store in the Eastern Townships, and his present trouble is perhaps chiefly due to the sudden flight of one of his customers.

At an adjourned meeting of the creditors and shareholders of the Montreal Abbatoir Company in this city on Monday last a draft of agreement to effect a settlement with the creditors by their acceptance of ten-year bonds at par, bearing six per cent. interest, in payment of all claims, was submitted. This agreement was signed by all the creditors present, representing about \$170,000 of the \$230,000 owed by the Company, and the remaining creditors are also expected to consent. Five trustees were appointed to receive \$100,000 as security for the creditors. Several judgments had been obtained against the Company and several seizures having been taken out, the abbatoir with all property connected with it was advertised to be sold by auction to-day. In view, however, of the partial settlement which the Directors are hopeful of completing, steps have been taken to protect the interests of the Company and the creditors.

The Union Sueriere Franco-Canadienne, of Berthier, otherwise known as the Berthier Beet Root Sugar factory, which has been in existence since the early part of last summer, is announced to be sold by the sheriff to satisfy two judgments against the institution—one for \$32,000 by *La Compagnie Fines Lalla*, for machinery supplied, and another by the Banque du Peuple, for a similar amount. Various causes are assigned for the failure of the factory, including mismanagement and too many officials with high salaries. The total expenditure by the company has been over \$300,000, and

the liabilities amount to some \$140,000. It is reported that two or three syndicates are forming to buy out the concern, with a view to continuing the beet root sugar manufacture with the same machinery and works, but under another name. The farmers in the vicinity of Berthier are said to be very anxious that the concern be continued there. A sale of the moveables of the factory took place a few days ago, and nothing will be done in the way of sugar making at the institution this summer.

A decision of importance to Canadian merchants was given the other day by the Supreme Court of the State of New York, to the effect that debtors absconding from Canada can be arrested in a civil action, and held by their creditors for the amounts due, the debts being contracted in this country. Mr. Keller, as counsel, argued this principle last fall in the case of *Bessette vs. Legru*, but as Mr. Legru was arrested on board the steamer "Labrador," sailing from New York for Bordeaux in France, it was thought by many that the *causis* was sustained, because Legru was leaving the jurisdiction of the State of New York. In the present case, that of one Mark Samuels, who kept a clothing store on St. Lawrence Main street, this city, and who absconded a few months ago, the Court has gone the full length and held that no matter where the debt was contracted or the fraud committed, if the party be found within its jurisdiction, he is amenable to New York law. Samuels was arrested at the instance of Messrs. Williamson, Hewetson & Co., this city, and afterwards by several other creditors; he retained some of the most eminent counsel in New York for his defence. He has been unable to obtain bail, as the Sheriff has declined

accepting any sureties, except those who can justify upon real estate. It is therefore not improbable that Samuels will have to lie in jail for an indefinite period.

A case now proceeding in the Police Court, in this city, and which has excited considerable interest, is that of a young Belgian broker named Ernest Duchaine, charged with having embezzled 1,500,000 francs before leaving his native land, a short time ago. When arrested last week in a book-store in this city, where he had obtained a situation, Duchaine stated that he had been a stock broker in Brussels, admitted that he had received the money from various clients for speculative purposes upon the Paris Bourse, where he operated extensively, but that he was loaded up beyond his means with stock when the late French panic came and cleaned him out of his own fortune as well as the monies belonging to his clients. Under these circumstances he left for America, and landed at New York with \$650 in his pocket, which had dwindled down to \$60 when he was arrested. Refusing to return voluntarily, he is being examined upon the extradition papers received from Belgium and filed in the court by Mr. Jesse Joseph, Belgian Consul at Montreal.

When the proceedings will have closed here, formal application will be made to the Government to have the prisoner sent to Belgium. The prisoner has a wife and family in Brussels.

**SILVER COINAGE.**

Senator Hill of Colorado has made an elaborate speech in the United States in favor of the unrestricted coinage of silver, which is a favorite measure with those interested in the silver mines, although they probably fail to realize the fact that

the practical result of such a policy would be simply to make silver the sole standard of value in the United States, which is precisely what Great Britain and Germany would desire. Nothing is more certain than that with unrestricted coinage the metal which is of the least value in the markets of the world will drive the other completely out of circulation. The United States have hitherto been enabled to maintain a bimetallic system by restricting the coinage of silver, and even with the restriction to one hundred and sixteen millions of dollars there

would have been great public inconvenience, but for the issue by the Treasury of silver certificates against the deposit of the silver coins. There is little difference of opinion in the United States as to the desirability of maintaining a double standard, but Senator Hill's speech affords satisfactory evidence either that he and those who think with him are prepared to adopt the silver standard, or that they are unable to appreciate the arguments of those who share Senator Sherman's opinion, that it is not the interest of the United States to play into the hands of the gold mono-metallists. Senator Hill wholly fails to perceive that silver has been maintained at par by the adoption of an issue of silver certificates receivable for all payments to the Government. Such certificates are to all intents and purposes equivalent to an issue of paper represented by coin. Senator Hill has made quite a number of quotations from the treasury reports of Mr. Sherman, all of which prove how thoroughly he understood the subject, and how anxious he was to steer clear of the dangers to which the United States was exposed by maintaining a bi-metallic currency at a time when France, which has adhered to bi-metallism, was nevertheless compelled to suspend the coinage of the silver.

Believing, as we do, just as sincerely as Senator Hill, that it is most desirable that the civilized nations of the world should arrive at an understanding on the relative value to be placed on the precious metals so as to secure their unlimited coinage, we can have no doubt that if the United States were to be guided by the advice of Senator Hill, and to permit the unrestricted coinage of silver, the result would be that in a very short space of time gold would entirely disappear, and all debts would be paid in a currency seriously depreciated. We do not lose sight of the fact that the general adoption of a single gold standard would be as much for the benefit of the creditor class as would that of silver standard be for the debtor class. The United States has for many years had practically a gold standard, and all contracts have been made in gold, for even during the suspension of specie payments gold was virtually the standard. Great Britain also has had a gold standard, and cannot fairly be charged with having adopted any policy to enhance the value of that metal. The true policy for the United States under existing circumstances is to act with great caution, and, without actually demonetizing silver, to co-operate with France, and by either an entire suspension of silver coinage, or by keeping the coinage within defined

limits and by issuing silver certificates, to maintain it at par with gold. This has been accomplished up to the present time by the wise policy of the Treasury Department, supported as it has been by the Banking interest of the United States. It is perhaps natural that the Senator from Colorado, a great silver-producing State, should think it desirable to secure the unrestricted coinage of silver, but there can be no doubt that the policy which he recommends would be really a short-sighted one, and that the true interest of the proprietor of the silver mines is to endeavor to bring about a bi-metallic system of coinage by agreement among all the civilized nations in Europe and America.

#### MANITOBA AFFAIRS.

If any reliance can be placed on the *Winnipeg Times*, it seems not improbable that the local Government in Manitoba may before long be in as serious antagonism to the Government of the Dominion as Ontario now is. There are no less than three questions in which Manitoba seems inclined to take independent action. It appears that notwithstanding the special yearly subsidy granted in lieu of the territorial revenue, when Manitoba was first created a Province on the understanding that the lands were to belong to the Dominion, the Government of the Prairie Province is determined to maintain its right to manage and control unclaimed lands within its confines. As to the question of right, that must depend on the conditions on which the Province was constituted, as authorized by the British North American Act. In the case of Manitoba the conditions of the Dominion Act were the subject of a protracted negotiation between the members of the Dominion Government and delegates chosen to represent the inhabitants of the territory.

The railroad question seems likely to lead to serious complications, as the feeling of the people in the North-West, as in every part of the continent, is to spare no effort to bring about competition between rival companies. There are two roads between which there must necessarily be competition, the Canadian Pacific and the Northern Pacific, and the former Company, which entered into an agreement with the Government, which has since been ratified by Parliament, naturally stipulated that if they built a road through Canadian territory, and undertook to operate it, they would be protected against the diversion of their traffic to local roads subsidiary to their formida-

ble rival. The Dominion Government can have no motive whatever for interfering with the action of the local Legislature regarding railway charters, except to keep faith with the Canadian Pacific Company. It would be much to be deplored if there should be any serious antagonism between the Provincial Legislature and the Government and Parliament of the Dominion on a question on which the faith of the latter has been pledged to a third party.

Another question of importance is the claim of the Manitoba Government regarding the extension of its boundaries. There is already in force an Act of the Dominion Parliament extending the eastern boundary of Manitoba to the western boundary of Ontario. It was well known when that Act was passed that the Dominion Parliament had no power, and did not pretend to claim the power, to extend the boundary of Manitoba "eastward to the shores of Lake Superior," which it is alleged the Government of that Province is resolved "to agitate" for. The objectors to the award of the arbitrators have always based their opposition on the ground that the arbitrators did not find what they call the true boundary, in other words, that having found a true south-westerly boundary in strict accordance with an Imperial Statute and an international treaty, they claimed the right to connect that legal boundary on the southwest with another legal boundary on the north east by the best natural boundary that they could find, there being no data whatever for substituting any other. Granting merely for the sake of argument all that has been contended for by the opponents of the award, it will be found that it does not affect in the slightest degree the boundary between Ontario and Manitoba. It is notorious that the really important branch of the boundary dispute is, whether the westerly boundary is on the meridian of the due north line or at the international boundary at the north-western angle of the Lake of the Woods. This is the point in which Manitoba is interested, and it is notorious that the pretension that the arbitrators adopted a conventional line, and did not pretend to have found a true boundary, does not in the least apply to it. The decision of the arbitrators on the point was not only in conformity, as they unanimously held, with the Imperial Statute and International treaty, but with the pretensions of the old Government of Canada and of the first Dominion Government, of Chief Justice Draper, of Messrs. Cartier and Macdougall, and of the Messrs. Dawson according to their evidence in the book of Documents. The Manitoba Govern-



ment are not credited with a desire to settle the disputed boundary with Ontario, but with a determination to agitate for a boundary on Lake Superior, no matter what may be the rights of Ontario.

In view of the urgency of the prompt settlement of the boundary dispute between Ontario and Manitoba, it would seem to be very desirable that there should be a separate issue raised between the two Provinces on the question in which they are specially interested. There is by no means the same urgency as to the settlement of the northern boundary as of the western, and Manitoba has no interest in the former. Again, there would be no difficulty in agreeing on a case as to the western boundary. The claims of the contesting parties are founded on an Imperial Statute, and there is very little evidence to be adduced on either side. It seems to be most desirable to put an end to the doubts which prevail as to the boundary between Ontario and Manitoba, whereas that on the north between Ontario and the Dominion is of much less urgency. The question is one on which the intervention of the Imperial Government might properly be invoked, and could hardly be objected to by a Parliament which has recently claimed the privilege of giving advice to the Queen's Imperial Minister on a question of the gravest importance. Unfortunately, however, the Imperial Government is too much occupied at present with more urgent matters to give much attention to Canadian affairs.

#### THE LABOR STRIKES.

There are wide differences of opinion in the press of the United States on the subject of the labor strikes and their consequences. We hear more of late of the strike of the freight handlers, which causes general inconvenience to all classes employing the railroads. It has been unfortunate that the new hands employed by the railroad companies have been almost all foreigners, chiefly Italians. There is some inconsistency in protectionists admitting unlimited competition in the labor market, when manufactured products are protected so largely as they are in the United States. One of the chief pleas for a high tariff has been the necessity of protecting American labor from the pauper labor of Europe, but if that labor, and the still cheaper labor of Asiatics, is brought into competition with Americans on their own soil, it must naturally cause some irritation. It cannot be denied that the cost of living has increased

very much of late in the United States, but it is alleged by those who condemn the strikers that the price of almost all manufactures has declined. The rise in the price of breadstuffs and meat has been the chief cause of the increase in the cost of living, and it is anticipated that it must soon give way.

Although the strike of the freight handlers has excited more general attention, the strikes among the iron workers have been on the largest scale, and have been the most prolonged. There is an Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steel Workers, which numbers about 80,000 members, and which is responsible for the late strike in the principle manufacturing centres. There is no doubt that one cause of the advance in prices has been the larger compensation given to labor, but the effect has been to stimulate foreign competition, which notwithstanding the high duties, has led to increased imports. Of course the newspapers differ widely as to the cause of the increase, some insisting that it is owing to the rapacity of the capitalists, others to the increase in the rate of wages. It is alleged that one effect of the high wages insisted on has been to check building operations, while in some cases contractors have suffered loss, owing to their having had to pay much higher wages after the execution of their contracts had commenced.

As a rule, the strikers this year have abstained from violence. The *emeute* in New York, which was attended with loss of life, seems to have been caused by misunderstanding, and the responsibility must rest chiefly on the Italians. It is evident that there is a good deal of sympathy with the strikers, whose cause is pleaded in several of the public journals, while substantial pecuniary aid has been rendered by persons not belonging to the class of laborers. An impartial writer declares that "the strikers on the whole have conducted themselves with unusual moderation." It seems to be admitted that during the last few months strikes have been more frequent among the laboring classes in the United States than at any former time. In all the leading industries there have been demands for higher wages, and a feeling of discontent when they have been refused. The consequences have been very serious, as the loss of wages not only involves a diminution of the consuming power of the working-men, but causes loss to those employed in producing for them. One thing is clear, which is, that protection and prosperity in the United States have not solved the question as to the division of profits between capital and labor.

#### AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS.

One of the most important contributions to statistical literature in Canada is the little twenty page pamphlet just issued by the Ontario Bureau of Industries, referred to last week. The estimates pressed into the service of writers on Canadian agricultural affairs have hitherto been little better than mere guess-work between the decennial censuses, and the conclusions arrived at consequently uncertain. The present work is largely tabular, the tables showing by county municipalities and groups of counties, the acreage of wheat, barley, oats, rye, peas and corn, together with the quantity of coarse and fine wools of the present year's shearing. These were compiled through the assistance of the teachers in the various school sections, and they certainly bear evidence of considerable accuracy. They present, at all events, as the report says, the only full return of the acreage of cereal crops hitherto made in Ontario.

The low average of wheat per acre will surprise people in Europe, especially in Great Britain, who are not acquainted with the methods of the Canadian farmer, who in most cases endeavors to cover a large area with his crops rather than thoroughly cultivate a lesser acreage. In many cases where the farmer in Ontario finds himself deeply indebted to the Loan Society, his efforts are directed towards taking from the soil as quickly as possible all the natural fertility it contains, with the ultimate view of raising the seige when the land is wholly impoverished. The average yield per acre is, in fall wheat, about 18½ bushels; Spring wheat about 15½; barley over 24; oats over 29; rye about 14½; peas about 19 1-5. The acreage of corn is 210,080, but the yield is not given, owing probably to the fact that much of it is used as fodder or fed in the cob. The prospects for the present season have much improved since the estimates were first handed in nearly three months ago. The total area under cereals is nearly 5 million acres. Wheat takes the lead, with 1,763,876 acres; oats come next, occupying 1,425,948 acres; barley is third, 835,466 acres; peas fourth, 554,464 acres; corn fifth, 210,080 acres; and rye sixth, 182,968 acres. The area under fall wheat is 1,179,284 acres, and under spring wheat, 584,592 acres, with an estimated produce respectively of 21,737,341 and 9,046,343 bushels. This is a great relative change since 1870, when the total area was 1,365,872 acres, and the product 7,891,989 bushels of spring wheat and 6,341,460 bushels of fall wheat. The change has taken place chiefly in the West Midland,



Georgian Bay and Lake Huron counties. In the last named group in 1870 the total produce of spring wheat was 1,161,341 bushels, and of fall wheat 343,553 bushels, or in the proportion of 3.38 to 1; the estimated produce for this year is 533,316 bushels of spring wheat, and 3,598,243 bushels of fall wheat, or in the proportion of 1 to 6.75. Of the counties that excel in fall wheat, Middlesex, Kent, Elgin, Grey, York and Ontario are conspicuous, and show from 20 to 21 bushels per acre. Durham, Parry Sound, Stormont, Victoria and Peterborough, also exhibit an average yield of 20 bushels to the acre, but the area sown is much less than in the more westerly counties. In spring wheat Ontario county shows the largest aggregate product, and an average of about 18 bushels. Next in order of total yield come Grey, Simcoe and York, all over half a million bushels. Owing to the growing importance of potatoes for export during the last two seasons, and the high prices obtainable, it may be hoped that the next report will also contain some statistics as to the yield. Hay and turnips might also be included with little additional trouble. Notwithstanding one or two such shortcomings the report is highly creditable to the Bureau of Statistics, and promises to be of real value to the country. Other Provinces should follow the example.

#### VAGRANTS.

As no privileges can be obtained without incurring some responsibilities, so also no advantages can be secured without a drawback. We are now congratulating ourselves on an increased emigration from Europe, and we have no doubt that the country at large will be very greatly benefited thereby, therefore we need to see what disadvantages may be occasioned by this large addition to our population in order that we may consider the best means of mitigating them.

Amongst the emigrants there must needs be many who have left their native country because they were not prospering there as they wished; there will be some whose friends have assisted them in the hope that they will display that industry in the new country which they failed to practice in the old; there will be some who are chronically discontented, and who will not be made happy by mere change of scene; and there will be many who, being good and true, will displace inferior people who have been more content to wait than to labor. From these and many other causes we may reasonably expect a large addition to our migra-

tory population; some honestly in search of employment, some hopeless from frequent disappointment, some degenerating into professional tramps, and some confirmed thieves as well as tramps; food and shelter are as necessary to these as to other human beings, although we have read of several cases in which men have fainted for lack of food in a country where the people are usually well-to-do and hospitably inclined.

It would be a wise precaution to organize a system whereby these people could be treated in accordance with their merits and the circumstances of each case; perhaps some modification of a passport system might be devised which would answer the requirements of the case, inasmuch as these passports would only be issued at the place whence these people started on their travels to persons who had been residents of the place for the space of one year, who were of good character and habits, and who were in search of employment as stated therein. These certificates being made by the Mayor of the place would be vised by the Mayors of the places they subsequently visited, after they had satisfied themselves that those bearing them were really in search of employment as stated, in default of which assurance he would commit them to hard labor in the common jail. The seal of the municipality would be the sign of the genuineness of the certificate, the issue of a false one or the forging of one would be alike punishable, so as to prevent the passing along or the passage of objectionable persons, and whenever emigrants are assisted in their passage from the old countries, similar certificates should be required of them.

So long as people pay their way and behave themselves properly, no one has or should have any right to demand more from them, but directly they become a charge on their fellow-citizens, the latter should be enabled to judge as to the character, habits and pretensions of those whose necessities they are called upon thus to relieve; and honest people should be enabled to demand that assistance which may be denied to them on the ground that there are too many tramps and no one can judge among them. That these suggestions are not ill-timed, nor these precautions unnecessary, is shown by the number of wayside barns destroyed by the smoking of tramps, and the enforced alms distributed by those who are afraid to offend them lest they should suffer from their displeasure.

In the meantime the insurance companies should rigidly exclude from insurance all wayside barns and unoccupied

buildings, as well as hay and corn stacks situated near main roads, because those tramps who are reckless cause the burning of many of these sheltering places, and some of them will smoke either to appease hunger, to while away time, or to soothe the sorrows of their nomadic existence.

#### ADULTERATION OF CHEESE.

Adulteration would appear to be the order of the period. No sooner does any article of food which requires skill in the preparation become popular than the process of adulteration begins, first in very slight proportions, but gradually increasing according as profits are cut into, or cupidity becomes too strong for the moral check. Coffee and tea, especially the former, are adulterated to nearly the same extent as wines and liquors, of which more anon; for the present our dealing is with cheese, an article which for a long time has defied the skill of the adulterator. There have been of course imitations of Stilton, Cheddar and other popular makes, but they have all been produced from milk, however impoverished by skimming. The adulteration of cheese has at length been proved quite as practicable as that of butter. The Secretary of the Royal Agricultural Society of England wrote to the Thunderer last month on the subject as follows:

Last April I received two cheeses as a present from the proprietors of a large cheese factory (at Little Falls, N.Y.), one of them made with the bluest skim-milk mixed with lard, and the other with the same quality of skim-milk mixed with oleomargarine. The letters which announced their despatch gave detailed information as to their mode of manufacture, and showed clearly the probability that a very extensive trade would shortly be established in these articles if their quality proved sufficiently good for the English market. I handed a sample of each cheese to my colleague, Dr. Voelcker, as chemist to the society, sent samples to agricultural and commercial experts, and generally endeavored to ascertain the opinion of competent persons upon them. I published in England and wrote to my friends in America that in my judgment the oleomargarine cheese was an excellent imitation of American Cheddar, but that it should be sold under its proper name. Competent judges in the city and elsewhere informed me that if they had not been told the contrary they could not have distinguished the oleomargarine cheese from ordinary American cheese, and it was variously valued at from 52s. to 56s. per cwt., wholesale, and from 8d to 9d per lb. retail.

Another correspondent, a large dealer in cheese himself, is of opinion that a little fat or oleomargarine put into skim-milk cheese would make it more nutritious, but it is necessary such fat or oil should

be pure. If, however, any door is open for adulteration, the fullest advantage will be taken of it, and, as in coffee, even the adulteration will be adulterated. It is the custom in the United States when the hog is slaughtered and found to be unfit for bacon, to boil it down for lard or fat. If this be the fat used, it is less desirable for food than pure skim-milk cheese. As to oleomargarine, this article is supposed to be made from the caul fat, and when that is so, it is good food, as of course it is really dripping; but it is different when any kind of oleomargarine is used. We all know that there are fats called under that name; oil also is used—for instance, cotton oil or any other, to cheapen the so-called oleomargarine, and there are many patents which profess to take away any bad smell or taste from tainted fat; but they cannot take away its disease or make it pure. We have not as yet learned that Canadian cheese makers have attempted to adulterate the product; it is needless to remark that as soon as the fraud is detected, whether in the United States or Canada, the entire make must suffer in reputation, and the only remedy is the honest one, that of branding the article with its proper designation.

#### THE FISCAL PROBLEM.

The Provincial Treasurer's million and a half loan is stated to have been absorbed with little or no difficulty; indeed it would appear as though a much larger sum could be similarly raised. But there seems to be no abatement of the disposition to resist the tax levied on the banking and insurance corporations, and the opinions of some eminent authorities are against its legality. It is probable that a friendly suit will determine the matter as regards the banks. The insurance companies have decided under the advice of counsel to pay the tax under protest, and to petition the Governor for its disallowance; the expectation is that its course will be similar to that of the late Policy Stamp Act. Meantime it does not quite accord with the usual prudence of the chiefs of the insurance profession that the written or printed arguments furnished them on the subject should be made public.

As for taxing the railway companies, the only alternative for the latter is to increase their rates, but as these are now about as high as by law allowed, it has been suggested that the tax be levied only on second class passenger fares for which it appears there is no limit provided, and by this means give a large

number of persons, who have much of the benefit and little or none of the expense of governing the country, an opportunity of contributing their mite towards replenishing the exchequer. Whatever success the upright and worthy Treasurer may meet with in remedying the evils which he found on entering office, few will be surprised should he feel himself compelled to "bring forward" a portion of the deficit for another year or two. But the debts must be paid sooner or later, and the problem is how to raise in an equitable manner the wherewithal.

#### INSURANCE DECISION.

A case of great importance, as affecting the liability to assessment of members of mutual insurance companies in this province has recently been decided by Mr. Justice Mathieu of this city. It has hitherto been thought that it was only necessary for the directors to issue a notice of assessment and file a copy of the resolution to enable them to collect the assessment. Two members of the Joliette Mutual Fire Insurance Company, Mr. Robidoux, of Farnham, and Mrs. A. Dupras, of Hochelaga, thought differently, however, and claimed that the company was bound to show that losses had been sustained, as well as the amount, before the members could be held liable. This defence was held by the judge to be perfectly valid; he remarked that "the company had been placed into voluntary liquidation in February, 1881. On April 6th following the directors and liquidators made a first assessment of \$24,000 and in December last a second one of \$20,000, which included the balance due on all premium notes then existing. This suit was brought for the balance due on defendants' premium notes. The defendants pleaded that these assessments were unnecessary and unjustified; that there existed no claims against the company for losses for which they were liable; that the company was in the hands of speculators, who considered it their own property, and who have bought the assets of the company, and believed themselves entitled to recover them in full. From the proof made, it appeared that the liquidators sold the balance of the assessments, amounting to \$29,000, for \$3,300, to a certain party who is a partner of Mr. J. J. Webster of Magog, himself interested in the Company. It was under this transfer that a large number of suits were taken in the name of the company. Now, apart from the proof made, can the company recover, on the filing of a copy of the resolution of the Directors, without proving the existence of the losses and the proportion due by the defendants? He thought not. Mutual insurance companies are peculiar. The insured are also insurers; they expect no profit, but agree to pay a share of certain losses, namely, those that may happen while their policies last. They are assessable for certain specified losses only, which must be proved to exist. No evidence of this nature has been made here by plaintiff, and the two suits are dismissed with costs."

A correspondent, evidently concerned in the

matter, has written to one of the evening papers to the effect that the above sum of \$29,000 must be lessened by " \$15,000, written off for bad debts." The purchaser who received \$14,000 worth of good debts for \$3,000, or even \$1,000 would have little cause to complain as to profits. Mr. Webster, it is claimed, denies being directly interested in the matter, although he was appointed manager of the company in January, 1881, but he wishes it to be understood that some six judges had given their decision the other way in cases similar to that adjudicated by J. Mathieu. Policy-holders who are compelled to pay only the full amount of their notes have not as much cause for discontent as have the makers of those of earlier date, or in existence during certain losses of the company, and who have been assessed for one half-per cent on the amount of their insurance over and above the amount of their premium notes, as formerly explained in these columns.

**THE CUSTOMS SEIZURES.**—The business community is exercised again this week over a seizure on the part of the customs authorities. It is alleged that Messrs. Lord & Munn, dealers in Newfoundland and other produce, have for some time (a year or two) been successfully evading the duty on American flour by certain practices not sanctioned by the tariff. The authorities being, they claim, possessed of indubitable proof in the matter, seized a few days ago some 1,700 barrels of flour belonging to the firm as security for the fines penalties or duties to be enforced against them. There is nothing whatever irregular in the goods seized; they are merely held as security by the authorities, who in thus endeavoring to stamp out smuggling are deserving the gratitude not only of the business community who cannot pay duties and compete fairly with those who evade them, but of all those who contribute to the revenue by the payment of taxes in the various indirect ways in which they are imposed. The seizure of teas consigned to Kirk, Lockerby & Co. by Dudley, Hall & Co. of New York, referred to last week, has been sustained by the government. The firm will therefore be compelled to pay the 10 per cent. duty as on teas from the United States, and what is also of considerable consequence, the value is to be estimated according to the market price in New York. The chief point maintained by the government appears to be that the teas were entered at New York as an import instead of an export entry, thus altering the nationality of the goods. The firm maintain that owing to the valuation of marine insurance losses, which must be adjusted in New York where the policy ends, the warehousing of such goods in that city is rendered unavoidable, as otherwise the damages which are common to nearly every cargo could not be properly ascertained; were they sent direct to Montreal, it would be difficult to recover. But we have good English and Canadian marine insurance companies who have offices in Montreal, Toronto and elsewhere. The goods are a low class of Japan, and not the least damage in the matter is the loss of the trade on over 700 packages pending the decision of the government,—which was given on Monday last.

MANY persons possessing both the time and the wherewithal and who do not go to the seaside to seek society, complain of the effect of the overcrowding at the popular places of resort which do not as yet boast of any means of drainage beyond that supplied by nature's self. But there is a limit to the absorbing power of sand, and the occasional and recurring cases of typhoid are compelling hotel proprietors to think a little over the drainage problem, a serious one on a flat, almost level, beach. It will probably require an epidemic and a consequent general flight to bring the matter thoroughly home to those who have but a very short season for their harvest.

The Atlantic and North-Western Railway Co. have acquired the right of way to span the River St. Lawrence above the Lachine rapids, and near Caughnawaga. Though the water there is deep, the distance is less than in some other localities. It is to be ready for traffic in Oct., 1884.—In a few days, the Canada Atlantic railway line is expected to extend across the Rideau canal, the iron bridge near the capital being nearly completed. The line will then be almost completed between Ottawa and Coteau Landing, and the other section of the line between Roules Point and Valleyfield will be commenced; this completed, and there only remains to connect the two lines by a bridge across the river at Coteau. Pending the building of this bridge, the road will use a ferry.

## Financial and Commercial

### MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS.

THURSDAY, 27th July, 1882.

The absence of many business men, who have fled from the city to resorts noted for a lower and more congenial temperature has, of course, a sluggish effect upon the wholesale trade, but in those lines of staple goods which are the first to move there are undoubted signs of increased activity; and, on the whole, the usual July average of business is being done. Dry goods are moving out freely, boots and shoes are more active than for several years, iron and metals very firm and in improved demand, leather steady, with a fair movement for the season, groceries fairly active, and a steadily increasing business reported in wines and liquors. Produce, especially breadstuffs, less active the last couple of days, owing to depressing advices from England; still, the prospects for an active Fall season have rarely been brighter. So far as the crops are concerned there is every reason to consider the outlook encouraging, if not brilliant. Samples received in this city of new Spring wheat and barley grown in Ontario indicate that, in quality as well as quantity, the crops this year will equal, if not surpass, those of any previous year in Canada, and there is a fair promise of one of the strongest foreign demands for the surplus products ever realized. The lumber trade also promises to be decidedly active this Fall, and arrangements have just been made for direct lumber shipments from Ottawa to Australia. Business at the banks quiet, though there is some prospect of a more stringent money market. Commercial paper discounted at 7 per cent, and stock loans on call quoted at 6. Sterling Exchange quiet and steady at 103½ to 109 between banks and 109½ over the counter. Drafts on New York, 1-16 to ¼ prem. Business on the Stock Exchange continues quiet, and confined to a few leading securities: the market opened weak this morning but closed firmer this p.m. Quotations have undergone few changes; Bank of Montreal closes at 211 bid, and 211½ asked. Richelieu has been depressed during the week and has declined 2½ per cent, closing at 70 bid.

ASHES.—Receipts are again very light. First Pots have been sold this week at \$5.15 down to \$5.00, a fair quotation to-day being \$5.00 to \$5.10. Seconds \$4.70 to \$4.60. No Thirds offering. *Pearls*—All the old stock of First Pearls has been sent to the States. A lot of 26 barrels choice tares has since come in, but we have not yet heard of their being sold. We quote nominally \$8.50 to \$8.75. Receipts since 1st January: 4,162 barrels Pots, 300 barrels Pearls. Deliveries, 5,198 barrels Pots, 576 barrels Pearls. Stock in store at six o'clock on Wednesday evening, 303 barrels Pots and 31 barrels Pearls.

BOOTS AND SHOES.—Trade continues active; leading manufacturers are now busy shipping

Full goods to British Columbia, Manitoba, and the North West Territory,—orders from these districts being more numerous and larger in volume than in previous years. Nearly all the factories are doing a much larger business than last year, in sorting-up as well as Fall orders, and some of them will be kept fully employed until the 1st December next. The "lasters" in one or two of the factories struck during the week for an advance of 25c per case, which being conceded, the men have returned to work. Remittances as good as expected at this period.

CATTLE, ETC.—Transactions in shipping cattle the past week have been more numerous than for some time, and prices have slightly advanced. The receipts at the local markets last Monday comprised 2,000 head of cattle, 6,306 sheep and 600 hogs. Fair to choice shipping cattle realized from 5½c to 6½c per lb.; and conser grades from 4c to 5½c per lb.; live weight. There was also a fair enquiry for butchers' cattle, from both local and out-of-town buyers, and the supply of good grass-fed heaves was quickly absorbed. Good to fair stock sold at from 5c to 5½c per lb., live weight, and commoner grades at from 4c to 4½c per lb. The offerings of Sheep was large, but the quality was not very choice, and sales were made at from \$4.50 to \$7 each. Lambs sold at from \$2.50 to \$4 each, and Calves changed hands at from \$3.50 to \$5 each for small, and from \$6 to \$10 for good to choice. Dry Goods.—Business in fall goods has opened more active than was generally expected, and is fairly distributed; all the leading houses are busy, trying to keep pace with orders for travellers, which are coming forward quite freely. The merchants West of Toronto are reported to be a little more hesitating than those in Eastern Ontario, while in some Western districts, notably in the vicinity of Owen Sound,—where harvesting has been commenced,—the people cannot remember ever having such good crops as this year. One or two leading Montreal firms shipped more goods last week than during any corresponding period for many years. The demand for all kinds of goods is rather active, but especially have Cape Greenaway, and dark prints of large patterns and bright colors, been in request,—so much so that one large importing house is unable to fill all the orders received. The problem, which the trade finds difficult to solve is to ascertain the quantity of woollen goods safe to unload upon the country retailers, in view of the heavy stocks of these goods held over from last year. There has been an advance in New York of 2c per lb. for raw cotton, and we are told that for repeat orders 1-16th per cent. increase on former prices is asked in England. Payments fair for the time of year, more or less renewing being expected at this period.

DAIRY PRODUCE.—In Butter there has been literally nothing doing for export in the city all week, and at present writing business is almost at a stand-still; buyers complain that prices are far too high to admit of purchases. A limited jobbing trade continues to be done, at about last week's quotations. There is more

business transpiring in the country, creamery having been sold there in fair-sized lots at 23½c which is about the ruling figure for fresh lots in this market. The local *Cheese* market also rules quiet, without material change in values, which favor buyers if anything. French factories have been offered here, but buyers were not anxious operators, and business generally has been small. The Liverpool cable dropped another 6d to 57s on Tuesday, and this had a quieting effect upon our market. The daily receipts of cheese this week per Grand Trunk West were about 10,600 boxes. A determined effort is being made on the part of factory men to resist any encroachment upon their position by buyers, as they have seldom been closer sold up for the season than at present. In this market we quote 10½c to 11c for fine to choice factories. Yesterday there were sales of 200 boxes French cheese at 10½c, of 350 do. at 10½c. Freight on butter and cheese now quoted at 30s. New York market has been generally quiet and steady.

**DRUGS AND CHEMICALS.**—No particular features in this line calling for particular remark excepting *Gum arabic*, which are affected by the troubles in Egypt, and have advanced in values about 10 per cent. with the prospect of a still further advance. In New York buyers are holding off, but holders of stocks are firm in their views and not anxious to sell. In Marseilles, which is a large market for gums, holders have withdrawn entirely from the market in anticipation of a serious rise in price. *Quinine* is rather higher, but as this article seems to have got into the hands of speculators there is no certainty as to its future course, the supply and demand having little effect in regulating the price. *Opium* is slightly affected by the Eastern troubles, and is a little higher in New York, an advance of 10c to 12½c having taken place on prime quality. The demand for good in this market is only moderate, and prices are without change. In England the chemical market is without improvement, though makers encouraged by reduction of freights expect this will soon come. For *Soda Ash* makers are able to get full prices for special brands, but ordinary kinds are dull. *Caustic* is weak; *Blanch* is decidedly easier, the price being £3 17s 6d down to £3 15s. *Soda Crystals* are firm at £3 5s, several large orders at £3 2s 6d being refused. Exports of chemicals from Liverpool for June, 1882, 11,777 tons, against 11,593 tons in June, 1881. Exports for six months ending June, 1882, 78,242 tons, against 70,142 tons for like period of 1881.

**FLOUR AND GRAIN.**—Under the influence of fair weather, the English wheat markets have been depressed the last couple of days, and prices for both spot offerings and futures are steadily declining. With favorable weather England may yet reap a fair average wheat crop, if not a good one. Imports in the United Kingdom for the week show an increase of 80,000 qrs. wheat, and 50,000 brls flour, and a decrease of 80,000 qrs. corn, as compared with those for the week previous. Latest advices from the West state that receipts of wheat, which have been very heavy in Chicago this week, at interior points are decreasing considerably. To-day Liverpool market is cabled dull and lower, with a decline of 6d per cental all round for wheat. Chicago wheat market was steady at about ½c higher than yesterday. The home market ruled quiet; there were sales of Canada Spring wheat at \$1.25 to \$1.26 for cargoes, and during the week \$1.29 was realized. Canada White Winter Wheat quoted at \$1.26 to \$1.27, and Red do nominal. Toledo Red Winter is now offering here at \$1.15 to \$1.16. Cargo lots of oats changed hands yesterday at 46½c. Corn quiet at 85c to 86c, peas worth 95c to \$1, and rye 70c to 72c. The Flour market has ruled quiet, with values easy, and slightly lower than last week; business almost nil.

**FRUITS.**—In common with all other products of vegetation, green Fruits are later in season this year than usual. Business, however, is fairly brisk. Several carloads of new Apples

have been received this week from the Western States, and, under a fair demand, are selling at \$4 to \$5 per barrel. No Canadian harvest apples expected in the market before next month. A few lots of *Peaches* from the Southern markets were received earlier in the week, and sold in drawers at \$3.50. California *Pears* and *Plums* in light supply, and can be bought here at \$6.50 to \$7 per box for pears, and \$4 do for plums. Receipts of *Cherries* yesterday large, consequently prices were weak and suffered a decline, \$1.25 per basket being the average figure obtained. Fruit from the local orchards was plentiful, and sold at \$1 to \$1.25 per pail. A few lots of Quebec *Strawberries*, of fair average quality, selling at 15c to 20c per quart. *Lemons* continue in good request, and moving freely at \$7 to \$8 per box, or \$10 to \$12 per case. Stocks of *Oranges* well nigh exhausted, the season being about over; demand light, at \$7 per box or about \$12 per case, but few cases offering. *Bananas*.—Receipts this week heavy, and being very ripe they had to be worked off at low figures: \$2.50 to \$3.50 per bunch for choice, and 75c to \$1.50 do for poor to fair qualities. *Cocoanuts* in light supply, and demand slow, at \$6 per hundred.

**FREIGHTS.**—There has been a large business done this week at 5s to 5s 6d for Liverpool and Glasgow; 5s 6d to London, 5s 3d to Bristol, and 5s 6d to 6s to U. K. for orders,—for heavy grain.

**GROCERIES.**—*Teas.*—There is a quiet market for most teas. Prices of good to choice Japans remain firm. In Young Hysons, Gunpowders and other China greens, there is little doing. Fine to choice black teas steady. *Sugar* as last reported for granulated. The higher class of yellows is scarce and firm. West India grocery grades unchanged. *Molasses.*—Barbadoes keeps at about previous figures with only light business. *Syrup* in fair request. *Rice* firm. *Coffees.*—Business moderate, and prices continue as before. *Spices.*—Pepper firm. Nutmegs also keep full value. Common kinds ginger as African and East India firm at advance before noted. *Cassia* and pimento steady. *Fruits.*—Business light as usual at this season. Valentins and the higher class of Smyrna raisins are not in large supply and firm. Inferior Eleme raisins neglected. Malaga fruit dull. Currants steady. Nuts and almonds as last reported. *Salt* is very scarce at the moment, 11s coarse firm at 65c. Factory firm.

**HARDWARE AND IRON.**—Trade in general hardware, although not active, is as good as can be expected at this time of year. Remittances very fair. A steady business is being done in *bar iron*, but sales comprise only small lots, at unchanged quotations. The *pig iron* market continues firm, with a decidedly upward tendency, in sympathy with British markets. Business here, however, has been nearly altogether of a jobbing character, at an advance of about 50c per ton on last week's prices for all leading brands. A few fair-sized lots of *Culder* have been sold to consumers at \$22 and \$21, respectively, for Nos. 1 and 3. There is a disposition on the part of large consumers to hold off until the latter part of August or early part of September, before stocking up for the winter; they may, however, have to pay still higher prices, and it would appear that present purchases are in their favor. The British Government having withdrawn nine large steamships from this port for transport duty in the Mediterranean, it would appear as if a further advance in freights would reasonably follow, but as an off-set to this it must be remembered that a large quantity of grain will likely be offered here for export this year, and it is thought this may attract vessels to this port. *Tin plates* quiet, but the tone of the market firm in sympathy with cable advices from England. Prices in England are above the views of buyers here. The London market for *Ingot Copper* has advanced, but this market has not yet been notably affected in consequence; there is a stiffening tendency, however. *Ingot*

*tin* steady and unchanged. *Nail* list also unaltered.

**HIDES AND SKINS.** Receipts of native *hides* about as large as usual at this period and reported equal to the demand. The offerings are now free from grubs. Prices unchanged. *Lambskins* steady at 50c to 55c each, though not so plentiful as last week; clips bring 50c each. Very few *catfishskins* offering; nominally quoted at 14c per lb., but the season is about over.

**LEATHER.**—Business not active, but fair with most houses, for the time of year—midsummer holiday season. There has been a steady demand during the week for nearly all kinds, but large sales are the exception: some round lots of black leathers,—*Splits*, *Upper*, and *Buff*, have been placed at easy prices. There is a better feeling reported in England for *Splits*, and this market is expected to benefit thereby; one local dealer shipped 11,000 lbs. *Splits* this week, and it is stated that other shipments are in prospect. A fair demand is being experienced for *Buff* and *Pebble*, at unchanged values. *Sole* leather very firm; the market for *Hemlock Sole* indicates a stiffening tendency, in sympathy with the New York market for *dry hides*, which is reported very firm, with prospects of an advance in prices. *Slaughter Sole* in light supply and good request at unchanged figures.

**LUMBER.**—Wholesale trade dull and quotations remain unchanged. There is some movement in small lots. Receipts of new lumber are quite green, and will have to be kept in stock for some time. Shipments to the North-west continue, and it is generally believed that Manitoba will form a new important market. The shipments from the new lumber section in Michigan to this market have proved quite satisfactory. Cargoes for Great Britain and South America continue to leave this port weekly, and this year's exports are expected to exceed that of 1881.

**OILS.**—The market for *Sad* and *Cod* are quiet and firm, and prices remain steady. No quotable transactions to note.

**PETROLEUM.**—Is firm, at 15½c f.o.b., London, and freight at Summer rates equal to 18½c in store here. Demand light, even for this season of year. Crude at Petrolia quoted at \$1.40 f.o.b.

**PROVISIONS.**—The Chicago provision market is wired somewhat firmer to-day; pork was easier yesterday, and closed 12½c to 15c lower for Aug. and September. *Lard* also was 2½c to 5c per 100 lbs. lower for futures. Chicago hog market was firm yesterday, with receipts estimated at 13,000, against 8,724 on Tuesday; shipments 3,363. In Liverpool yesterday pork advanced 1s to 92s, and lard declined 6d to 62s. As usual at this period, the local market rules quiet, business being confined to supplying a very moderate jobbing demand, at about last week's quotations: \$25 to \$25.50 for American *Mess Pork*, and \$26 to \$26.50 for Canada short cut mess; the latter is scarce. There has been some business done in *Extra Prime Pork*, on Lower Ports account, at equal to about \$19.50 in bond; prime *Mess* is quoted at \$21 to \$22 in bond. *Lard* quiet, under a light demand, at 15½c for Fairbanks', and 14½c to 15c for Canada. *Hams* steady at 15c to 15½c for uncovered, at 16½c to 17c for canvassed. *Eggs* quiet and steady, with supply light; selling in cases at 18½c to 19c per doz.

**WINES AND LIQUORS.**—This market is reported quite active; shipments of champagnes to the North-West continue to be made, and orders are coming forward freely from all parts of the country. There is considerable enquiry for fine liquors, also for *Clarets* and *Ginger Ales*. *Brundies* are still firm, and gins continue scarce. *Ales* are active and moving off in large-sized lots. Payments reported good.



Wool.—Market quiet, as usual at this period, but the demand from manufacturers appears unusually light this summer. Dealers do not anticipate any quotable movement until August, and prices for fine foreign descriptions remain steady and unaltered. Stocks are fair, but there is not much coming forward. Canadian coarse wools dull, and quotations entirely nominal; large concessions would probably be made if there were any buyers on the market.

Sales of choice at from 25c to 27c, and fair to good from 22c to 24c. Cheese firm, and in fair demand; sales of choice at from 10c to 11c, and from 9c to 10c for fair to good. Eggs firm, sales of Canada and Eastern at from 19c to 20c. Peas unchanged; Canada selling at from \$1.20 to \$1.25 for choice. Potatoes coming forward freely, prices declined. Sales have been at from \$3.50 to \$4.25 per bbl.

TORONTO WHOLESALE MARKETS.

(By Special Telegraph.)

TORONTO, July 27, 1882.

Since our last there has been a slight improvement in some lines of wholesale trade, and there is every indication of a large fall business. We have had very fine weather, and if it continues a few weeks a large crop of fall wheat will be harvested. In some parts of the Niagara district it is about ready for the reaper. A good many country merchants have visited the city lately, and wholesale dry goods and millinery houses present appearances of activity. There is a disposition to get rid of stocks, and profits are consequently small. The production of goods has increased, and stocks generally are very full. Payments are said to be fair. In hardware there is considerable activity, with a large movement in shelf goods, harvesting implements, and the like. Iron is firm, and even higher prices talked of. There is no change in the condition of the grocery trade; the movement is slow and likely to remain so until after the harvest. Values are unchanged, and as a rule steady. The wheat and flour markets have declined in sympathy with outside. Buyers are

scarce, and holding back in anticipation of lower prices later on. Sales are confined to immediate wants. Provisions quiet but firm; with business altogether of a jobbing character. The money market has been fairly active; the demand for call loans has been good and rates steady at 6 to 6½ per cent. Prime commercial paper is discounted at 6 and the ordinary at 7 per cent. Sterling exchange dull; 60-day bills are quoted at 109 to 109½ between banks and 109½ across the counter. Demand bills 109½ to 110. Gold drafts on New York steady at par to ½ premium. The stock market has been much more active, and values considerably higher than last week, especially for local bank shares. Sales the past few days were as follows:—Montreal at 211½, Toronto at 186½, Ontario at 127½, Commerce at 144, Merchants at 129½ and 128½, Federal at 147½, 148½, 152½ and 152, Imperial at 137, 138, 138½ and 139½, Dominion at 195½, 197½, and 199, and Standard at 113½, 114 and 114½. Loan and Miscellaneous shares were quiet and as a rule firmer, with sales of Building and Loan at 105½ and 105½, Real Estate at 99½ and 100½, Western Canada at 207, London and Canadian at 133, Huron and Erie at 160, Canada Landed Credit Co. at 123, Ontario and Qu'Appelle at 206 and 210, and Consumers Gas at 152. The market closed to-day fairly active and firm with sales of Montreal at 211, Toronto at 187½, Imperial at 121, Federal at 152½ and 152, Dominion at 200, Standard at 115, Consumers Gas at 151½, and Canada Permanent at 226.

Boots and Shoes.—There is a good steady trade being done, orders for fall goods from travellers being very satisfactory. Some houses are busy shipping, and factories as a rule are in full blast. Values are steady and kept down by competition. Payments fair.

Coal and Wood.—The demand for coal appears slack; prices are steady, and present appearances do not favor lower figures. Egg, stove, grate and chestnut sell at \$6.50 a ton; the best soft at \$6.50 and inferior qualities at \$5.50 to \$6. Wood continues unchanged at \$5 a cord for hard and \$4 for pine.

Coal Oil.—There is but a moderate movement as is usual at this season of the year. Canadian refined sells at 18c per imperial gallon, American at 23c for prime and 25c for water white. The crude market at Petrolia remains quiet at \$1.40 per barrel.

COUNTRY PRODUCE.—Apples.—During the week the arrivals from the States have increased and prices are easier. Barrel lots of new fruit sell at \$4.50 to \$5. Beans are in small stock and firm, sales in a jobbing way being made at \$3 to \$3.25 per bushel, according to quality. Eggs are in moderate receipt and firm; dealers continue to pay 18c to 19c per dozen

for case lots and sell at 20c. Hogs are unchanged; the supply is small, and butchers pay \$9.75 to \$10. Hops are held in few hands; and prices are firm; sales of small lots of choice are reported at 28c to 30c. Onions dull and prices nominal, there being no stocks. Potatoes are offering more freely and prices are lower; new sell at \$3.00 to \$3.25 per barrel. Poultry firm, with a limited supply; chickens are quoted on the open market at 50c to 60c a pair, ducks 65c to 75c and turkeys at \$1.25 to \$2. Tallow scarce and firm; rendered is worth 84c and rough 4c to 4½c.

DRUGS AND CHEMICALS.—There has been a fair trade this week, and remittances are generally good. Oil Lemon is steady at \$3.50 to \$4.25 per lb. Golden Seal Root, 50c per lb. Cuttle fish bone, 45c. Opium is steady at \$4.75. Quinine continues in moderate demand and firm, \$2.25 to \$2.40 per oz. Tartaric Acid firm at 63c to 65c. Cream of Tartar unchanged at 35c. Turpentine firm at 80c to 85c. Linseed Oil steady at 76c for boiled and 72c for raw. Glycerine easier at 40c to 43c. Potass Iodide steady at \$2.30 per lb. Potass Bromide steady at 45c to 48c per lb. Alcohol continues firm at \$2.75 per gallon. Morphia steady at \$2.95 to \$3.10 an ounce. Cube berries steady at 65c per lb. Paris Green, 20c to 25c. Chemicals are quiet and prices firm. Dye-stuffs quiet; cochineal steady at 60c per lb.

FLOUR AND MEAL.—Flour has been less active this week, shippers anticipating a further decline. There has been little or no demand in consequence, but stocks are by no means large. A sale of old standard Superior Extra was made on Monday at \$5.80 on track, which is the only sale reported. Yesterday more offered at that figure, but it was not taken. Extra is purely nominal at \$5.70 to \$5.75. The stock in store is 1,800 barrels against 1,300 barrels last week and 500 barrels the corresponding week of last year. Bran quiet and steady at \$11.50 on track. Oatmeal is firm with a moderate demand; car lots rule at \$5.20 to \$5.30. Cornmeal sells in small quantities at \$4.40 to \$4.50.

WHEAT.—There has been a small movement the past week, with sales restricted to immediate requirements. The general feeling is that prices will be lower, hence the indisposition to purchase. Most of the business has been on p. t. On Monday No. 1 Spring sold at about \$1.29, and No. 2 at \$1.25 to \$1.26. The next day car lots of No. 2 Fall sold outside at equal to \$1.22 and \$1.22½, and on spot at \$1.20; yesterday prices were nominally unchanged. The stock in store is 130,829 bushels against 147,060 bushels last week and 130,531 bushels the corresponding week of last year. The wheat market to-day closed dull and easy. No. 2 Fall offers at \$1.20, and No. 2 Spring at \$1.24.

COARSE GRAINS.—Barley.—There is no movement in this grain, and prices are purely nominal. The stock in store is 6,138 bushels, the same as last week, against 18,642 bushels the corresponding week of last year. Oats have ruled steady, with business rather quiet; sales of car lots have been made at 49c, and 49½c on track. The stock in store is 2,509 bushels against 3,209 bushels last week and 10,049 bushels a year ago. Peas are quiet, with prices nominal in absence of transactions; we quote 82c to 85c. The stock in store is 5,271 bushels, the same as last week, against 661 bushels a year ago. Rye dull, with prices purely nominal. The stock in store is the same as last week, 4,778 bushels, against none the corresponding week of 1881. Corn quiet and steady at about 93c to 94c on track.

FREIGHTS.—Rail freights are unchanged. Ocean rates are rather firmer at 28c per cental for flour and meal to Liverpool; 35c for boxed meats, and 49c for round lots of butter.

**GROCERIES.**—Business shows little or no change from last week. The demand is moderate only, and prices are unchanged. A brisk trade is anticipated after harvest. Payments are fair. *Fruits* are very scarce and firm: Loose Muscatels, \$2.65 to \$2.80; Layers in boxes, \$2.90 to \$3; Sultanas, 11c to 11½c; Valencia are now exhausted, and prices are nominal. Sultanas, 11½c to 12c; Currants, 6½c; Prunes, new, 8½c to 9c. Sugars quiet and steady; Redpath's ordinary granulated sells at 9½c, and extra at 9½c, and St. Lawrence at 9½c, medium refined at 8c, and bright very scarce. *Teas* quiet and unchanged, with sales chiefly confined to jobbing lots; one or two lines of young llyson firsts sold at 42c. *Fish* quiet, with business altogether in God at \$6; none other in market; Sardines, 11c for ½s and 22c for ¼s; Salmon, half barrels, 9c to 10c; Dry Cod, 5c per lb. *Peppers* firm, at 27c for white and 16c for black in lots. *Rice* steady, with sales of round lots at \$3.75. *Tobaccos* unchanged. Manufactured Black goods—3s, 6s and 12s—39½c to 42c. Bright goods—Navy, 48c to 57½c; Myrtle Navy, 61 to 62½c; Solaces, 41c to 50.

**HARDWARE AND IRON.**—This branch of trade continues active. The demand for shelf hardware appears to be much ahead of last year at this time, and merchants generally are in high spirits. Some large orders have been received the past week from Manitoba as well as neighboring towns. Heavy goods continue firm in price, and sales are very satisfactory. Prices throughout the list remain unchanged from those published last week. Remittances are good.

**HIDES AND SKINS.**—There is little activity in this market, but prices are firm at last week's quotations. *Hides* are scarce and firm, with sales of a few small lots of cured at 8½c. Dealers pay 7½c for the best green cows and 8½c for steers. There are few *Calfskins* offering, and prices are almost nominal at 13c for green. Both *Pelts* and *Lambskins* are in fair receipt and firm at 45c.

**LEATHER.**—There is a moderate business doing, and the prospect appears favourable. The demand from city manufacturers is fair, and values are unchanged from our quotations of last week.

**LIVE STOCK.**—*Cattle.*—The demand has been moderate and prices steady, with receipts about equal to requirements. Really choice export lots are worth 6c per lb., but there are few offering. Reports from Britain are better this week, but shipments continue comparatively light. Good butchers cattle sell at 4½c to 5c per lb., and inferior at 3½c to 4c. *Sheep* are in good shipping demand at 4½ to 4¾ per lb., but butchers do not appear to be buying. *Lambs* are unchanged, with sales at \$2 to \$4 a head, according to quality. *Calves* in fair offer and steady, at \$10 to \$14 for first class, \$6 to \$8 for second, and \$4 for inferior. *Hogs* are steady at 7c to 7½c per lb., with few offering.

**PROVISIONS.**—*Butter.*—The supply during the week has been restricted, and not sufficient for the demand from city dealers. Holders are firm, but prices are too high for shippers, and many have stopped buying. Choice lots sold to the jobbing trade at 18c to 20c and medium at 15c to 16c. Country lots of choice selections are worth 16c to 17c by the car. On the open market pound rolls sell at 21c to 23c. *Bacon* quiet and firm, with no sales of car lots reported; small lots to the trade are quoted at 13½c to 13¾c for long clear and at 12½ to 12¾ for Cumberland cut. *Hams* in small stock and firm; sweet pickled are quoted at 14c and jobbing lots of smoked and canvassed sell at 16c to 16½c per lb. *Mess Pork* is held firmly at \$24.50 to \$25, with few transactions. *Lard* in moderate demand and unchanged at 14½ to 15½. *Cheese*

firm, with a fair demand; choice lots are worth 11½c to 12c, and medium 11. *Dried Apples* are about done, and prices nominal at 7c to 7½ per lb.

**WOOL.**—Fleece is quiet at steady prices; sales having been made at 18c to 20c per lb. The demand for fine wools moderate. Supers firm at 27c to 27½c, and extra at 32½c to 34c.

Secretary-Treasurers of Municipalities

IN THE

### PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.

The attention of Secretary-Treasurers of Municipal Corporations in the Province of Quebec is called to Sections 1, 2 and 9 of the Act 45 Vic., cap. 22, intitled: "An Act to impose certain direct taxes on certain Commercial Corporations," which came into force on the 27th May, 1882:—

1. In order to provide for the exigencies of the public service of this Province, every Bank carrying on the business of banking in this Province, every Insurance Company accepting risks and transacting the business of insurance in this Province, every Incorporated Company carrying on any labor, trade or business in this Province, every incorporated Loan Company making loans in this Province, every incorporated Navigation Company running a regular line of steamers, steamboats or other vessels in the waters of this Province, every Telegraph Company working a telegraph line or part of a telegraph line in this Province, every Telephone Company working a telephone line in this Province, every City Passenger Railway or Tramway Company working a line of railway or tramway in this Province, and every Railway Company working a railway or part of a railway in this Province, shall, annually, pay the several taxes mentioned and specified in section three of this Act, which taxes are hereby imposed upon each of such commercial corporations respectively.

2. The term Bank includes Savings Banks; the term Insurance Company comprises Life, Fire, Inland, Marine, Guarantee and Accident Insurance Companies, but does not include Mutual Insurance Companies organized under the laws of this Province; the term Incorporated Loan Company includes Building Societies; and the term Incorporated Company does not include companies publishing newspapers or periodicals.

9. The clerks or secretary-treasurers of every municipal corporation shall annually, on or before the first day of June, return to the Provincial Treasurer the names of all commercial corporations of the nature of those mentioned in this Act, established or doing business within their respective municipalities, specifying the number of offices, places of business, factories or workshops of each; and in default of so doing they shall severally be liable to a fine of twenty-five dollars, and in default of paying of such fine to an imprisonment of twenty-five days.

Secretary-Treasurers are hereby notified that instructions will be given to prosecute those who may be in default on the 1st day of September next, under the above sections.

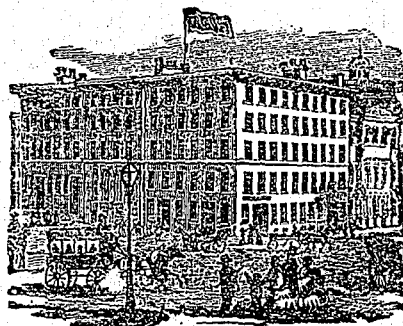
