Huntington Hall—capable of holding 2,500 people—was filled to overflowing last evening, to witness the performances of the wonderful Denier Brothers.—[Lowell Courier.

Last night the celebrated Gymnast, Mr. John Denier (who is not unknown to fame) made his first appearance this season in a new and terrific act of skill and daring, which to be appreciated must be witnessed, and when witnessed fills the beholder with wonder and admiration. The feat accomplished was that introduced by the Hanlon Brothers and represented at Nible's on frequent occasions. It has never before been successfully imitated—but the interest manifested last night, the breathless attention, the crouching attitude of that portion of the audience not favored with front seats, proved at once unmistakably, that it was a success, and that Mr. Denier had gained the apex of professional ability. The feat is performed at a high elevation, and with such rapidity that the eye can scarcely follow the movements, which are terminated by a leap to a suspended rope by which the Gymnast descends the stage. It is a grand performance, and to be appreciated must seen.—*The Brooklyn Eagle.*

THE DARING FEAT of walking upon a rope from in front of Robinson's building, on Central Row, to the roof of the American Hall, was successfully performed last evening, by John Denier, one of the troupe of Gymnasts, now performing at the theatre. A peculiar feature of the evening's entertainment was the Gymnastic and rope exhibitions of Mr. Denier, one of the famous Revel Company. In the first part of the evening he exhibited a variety of Gymnastic feats upon the stage, which were executed with remarkable skill, and elicited deafening rounds of applause. Later in the evening Mr. Denier walked across a rope which was extended from the upper balcony to the opposite side. This feat requires considerable nerve, but it was consummated as easily, apparently, as if done upon the floor.—*Boston Journal.*

**DARING ASCENSION ON A TIGHT-ROPE.**—Yesterday afternoon, Mr. John Denier walked a distance of about one thousand feet on a tight rope, stretched over and across Canoe Cove, and extending from Castle Rock to the rear of the Nahant House.—[Boston Journal.]

Nahant, the noted rock-bound peninsula, was the scene, yesterday afternoon, of a most attractive exhibition—one of those feats of daring which caused the spectator not only to hold his breath, but is rather suggestive of hair "standing on end."

The exhibitor was Mr. John Denier, a pupil of the famous Mona Blandin, and one of the most skilful and daring performers in the country. He fully established his reputation on this score yesterday afternoon.—[Daily Atlas and Bee.]

**DENIER ON THE ROPE AGAIN.**—Yesterday Mr. Denier gave his fifth exhibition on the rope at Nahant, in presence of about four thousand persons. He performed various feats on the rope, and walked forward and backward amid the cheers of the spectators.—[Boston Herald.]

It is indeed surprising how he can make out to lodge upon the bar when he drops. The spectators generally expected that he would fall into the water, but Mr. Denier had no such intention, and went through the exercises successfully. At the conclusion of the performance on the bar, he resumed his position on the rope, and walked backwards the balance of the distance; and when he reached the bank, he was received with shouts of applause.—[Evening Transcript.]
