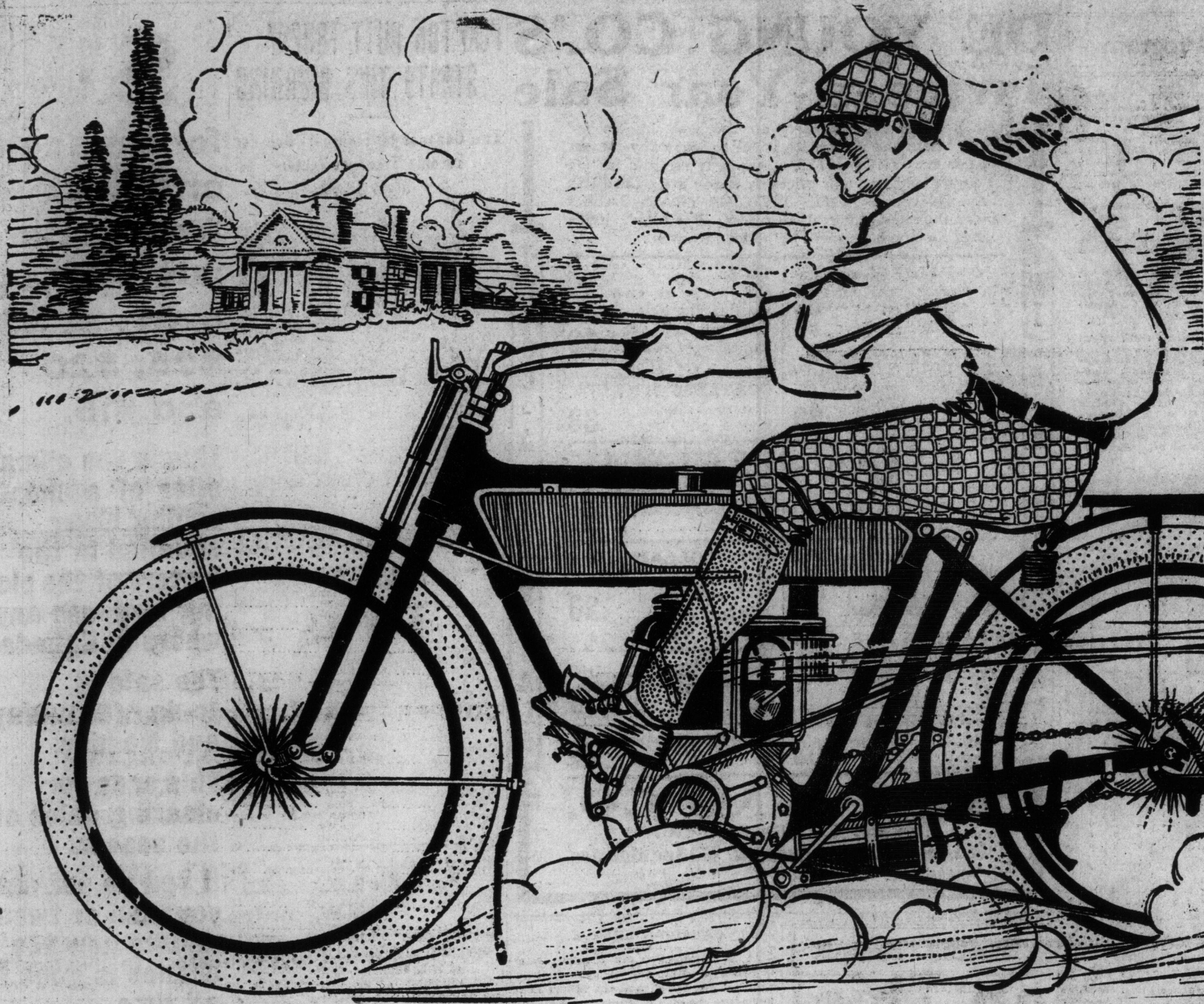

candidates and the taking of the vote was dispensed with unanimously.

The audience to a man rose and cheered, waved hats and hands when Mr. Macdonnell stood up to speak.

"I am quite overwhelmed by the ovation you have given me," he said. "I have received this nomination on two previous occasions—I hope it will not be no, no, no—three times and out."

"No, no, no—no chance!" yelled the crowd. "With all my humble ability and strength I have endeavored to perform my duty in the past." (Applause.)

In referring to the dissolution of parliament Mr. Macdonnell said that the Liberal party had dodged redistribution because that would have given greater representation in many places.

"So they called off redistribution," he said. "Let us go to the country."

Referring to Sir Wilfrid Laurier's tactics in deciding upon the dissolution, he said that he had "skipped out of the back door."

"All of his speech at Simcoo was a defence—an effort to justify his actions."

"We find the whole country approving of the action of the Conservative party. I never saw the time when the party was more homogeneous—there is not a schism in the ranks."

Speaking of the government of Ontario, he said that a "better government" was never blessed with "Applause." All creeds, all colors, all nationalities have united on the platform of the Conservative party.

"Every department of that government is steeped in patronage. Of all the hundreds of millions of dollars they have spent, almost every dollar of it, outside of fixed expenditures, has been spent for party purposes, to keep them in power. The expending of public money is a trust but their idea has been to catch a vote here, a vote there, or half a dozen somewhere else."

but has not caused trouble in the south of England. On only a few of the Irish railways have the men gone out. The situation in Scotland is uncertain.

The price of food, as far as London is concerned, either in the hotels, restaurants or in the stores, shows but little change, and a resumption of work to-morrow by the dockers, in unloading 50 ships that are waiting to discharge their cargoes, will tend to bring the food situation here to about normal.

The great central station at Marylebone, in the northwest section of the city, closed to-night at 8 o'clock, and the military are bivouacked there to-night.

Some of the strike troubles there have struck are restored to their positions under government guarantees.

Mr. Churchill, the home secretary, to-night asked T. P. O'Connor and Col. Gerald Kiffin-Taylor, members of parliament for Liverpool, to recommend what measures the government should take to settle the strike troubles there and restore good relations between the different classes.

Mr. Churchill also requested that they consult with the lord mayor of Liverpool and report to him concerning the food supply and the general conditions of his city.

O'Connor and Col. Kiffin-Taylor started immediately for Liverpool.

Call for Special Constables. In addition to his appeal to the members of the National Reserves, the Lord Mayor of London to-night requested that all citizens who are willing to serve as special constables in case of need shall assemble at the Guild Hall to-morrow and enroll their names.

Reports from Wales say that some 20,000 or 30,000 additional colliers will be idle to-morrow.

Thousands of holiday makers are stranded at the seaside and country resorts who have money and unable to obtain transportation home.

The Liverpool-street Station, where some 80,000 commuters arrive and depart daily, was the most congested point of London probably to-day.

This evening the platforms were packed with thousands awaiting a chance to get to their suburban homes. A large majority will not reach their homes before morning.

Major Roche, having been ordered from Ireland to join his regiment at Aldershot, on arriving at Plymouth found the train stalled by strikers. He promptly mobilized a party of soldiers who were returning by boat from a furlough, borrowed rifles from the local territorial, drove off the strikers at the point of the bayonet and got his train thru.

IMPORTANT ARREST

Police Apprehend Albert Lawrence Who Had Much Stolen Property.

In the person of Albert Lawrence, who resides in West Queen-street, Detective Archibald believes that he has a bad thing. He arrested him yesterday upon a charge of theft of a watch which he had sold to a Victoria-street second-hand dealer.

The watch was formerly the property of Charles Green, 25 Rhodes-street, and was taken when he returned to see his wife which would be of great aid in undoing locks and the like. He had two watches on a pair of opera glasses, cuff links, a clock, knives and forks, and a stick pin were found in his rooms.

He had been previously caught in two vacant houses, which were newly finished. In the first of these he had said that he was looking over the house, as his uncle wanted to purchase one. His uncle gave another list by the man who found him. His trunk was sent away last week, and returned this week with his leaving the city, and the police suspect that it was filled with stolen property when sent away.

"DALHOUSIE" HERE. A loud and long salute was given the new palace steamer Dalhousie City as she sailed from the eastern channel yesterday afternoon on her initial trip.

The Dalhousie will ply between Toronto and Port Dalhousie in place of the Lakeside, which for many years made the trip from early spring until the bay was frozen over.

The new steamer is one of the most commodious vessels on the lake, and has capacity for carrying three hundred tons of package freight. Her license calls for 1200 passengers, and there is a seat for every one. The Dalhousie is not only a commodious boat, but a remarkably comfortable one. Her main cabin is 120 feet long, and the seats are after the style of those found in trains. She is a steel vessel, and 30 feet over all. Her draught is eight feet forward and nine feet six inches aft.

On her trial trip she made seventeen miles an hour, and on her way from Collingwood to Port Dalhousie she made twenty miles an hour, running at 100 revolutions per minute, which was just two-thirds her limit speed.

The telephone service also is being overworked. Numbers of sporadic strikes are occurring throughout the country as a result of the railway movement.

The barbers of Bristol quit work to-day and the work girls from Bermondsey, a parish of London, struck and came to London and paraded the streets with banners bearing the words "we are fighting for fair play."

The pinch of want is making itself felt in many of the great cities, while scores of thousands of persons are stranded throughout the kingdom, unable to rejoin their families.

BIRMINGHAM, England, Aug. 18.—Again to-night there was a sharp conflict when several wagons loaded with meat were being driven from the depot to the wholesale market under an escort of police and soldiers.

The mob attacked the cavalcade and was driven aside and dispersed, but not until there had been a free use of truncheons by the police.

SWANSEA, Wales, Aug. 18.—Railway traffic here is at a standstill. The four stations are closed and the police are guarding them. Many factories are shutting down owing to a lack of fuel.

EDUCATING THE ENGLISH

Bourassa and Monk Hold Meeting at Lachine. MONTREAL, Aug. 18.—The policy of educating English-speaking electors in the aims, ideals and tenets of Nationalism, was inaugurated to-night at Lachine by Messrs. Bourassa and Monk before a gathering of some 600 English-speaking people.

Although the rain fell intermittently through the meeting the crowd remained and evinced a good deal of enthusiasm. There was good applause and occasional exclamations of dissent, but on the whole the Nationalist leaders got a good reception, as might have been expected in Jacques Cartier division, which Mr. Monk has so long represented.

Mr. Monk gave a very clear and concise statement of his case, laying much stress on the fact that the Nationalists were not in favor of leaving the country unprotected, nor desirous of dodging taxes such as the navy would necessitate. He emphasized the fact that the main idea of himself and his colleagues was to secure for the people the right to speak on such important projects as reciprocity and the navy bill.

The government had no right to go ahead in such cases without securing a mandate from the electorate.

Ontario Crop Bulletin

The following statement regarding the condition of crops in the province, based upon returns of correspondents issued by the Ontario Department of Agriculture:

Fall Wheat. According to the May bulletin this crop suffered more or less from winter-killing in many counties, and a considerable area of fall wheat had to be ploughed up...

Spring Wheat. This crop, like all the grains, suffered from the drought and unusual heat of the season...

Barley. This crop will also be below the average in yield. The straw is described as being rather lighter in weight than usual...

Oats. Oats have fared the worst of the grain crops, although some good yields are reported...

Rye. Where grown for grain this crop has been of fair yield and quality, although short in straw...

Peas. The unusually high temperature prevailing at different periods of the growing season told severely upon the crop...

Beans. There has been too much heat and too little rain for beans in the first stage of growth...

Hay and Clover. Clover did not winter well, and in many quarters the excessive heat and drought of May and June did much to draw back the crop...

Potatoes. A light yield of small potatoes will be the general rule as the season has been too late and hot for best results...

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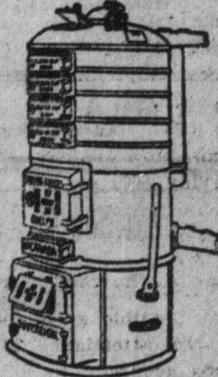

QUORUM WAS LACKING THIRTEEN MEN ABSENT

City Council Unable to Do Business—Disappointed Several Deputations.

"There are several deputations here," said Mayor Geary after the roll was called yesterday at the abortive council meeting.

C. A. Dunlop headed a deputation from North Rosedale, which wanted a line there straight from the Glen-road bridge to Summerhill-avenue around the macreose grounds and back. They did not want the loop. Mr. Dunlop said his side of the business was closed, just half an hour after the time set for the meeting.

The absentees were therefore Controller Ward and Aldermen Chisholm, Hilton, Paclan, O'Neill, Heyd, McBride, McMurtrie, Sweeney, Graham, McCarthy, Anderson and Baird.

The important business to be considered was the North Toronto annexation and the Humber boulevard agreement.

The meeting was held in court room number 1. The council chamber is now in the hands of the workmen, who are preparing to re-decorate it. They have put up part of the scaffolding already.

Another meeting of the council may be called for Friday next. It will be held at Tuesday's meeting of the board of control.

There is considerable business ahead of the council so it is probable that a meeting will be called soon.

It was to the disgust of the twelve members of the council present on time to have constituted a meeting that the thirteenth name necessary to form a quorum was found to be lacking when the count was made.

From two o'clock, the time the meeting was called for, did not look as if enough would be present. But they drifted slowly in, hope was kept alive and the roll called was withheld until almost the last minute.

It was started a few seconds before 2.30. The rule is that if there is not a quorum half an hour after the time for which the meeting is scheduled, no meeting can be held.

Ald. McBride was in the building at the time the roll was called. He had been in the council chamber some time before, but as the minutes became tedious and the rate of the meeting hung in the balance, he slowly faded away. Soon after the clerk had folded up his record, Ald. McBride floated into the room.

But it was too late, and many faces, dark with frowns, glared at him. So he is now in disgrace with the rest of the council. His explanation for being absent was that he went down to the exhibition office to pay for some horse entries.

J. J. Was Surprised. About two minutes after the death of the meeting, Controller Ward acceded in. He was over half an hour late and too late to save the meeting, he tried to appear surprised.

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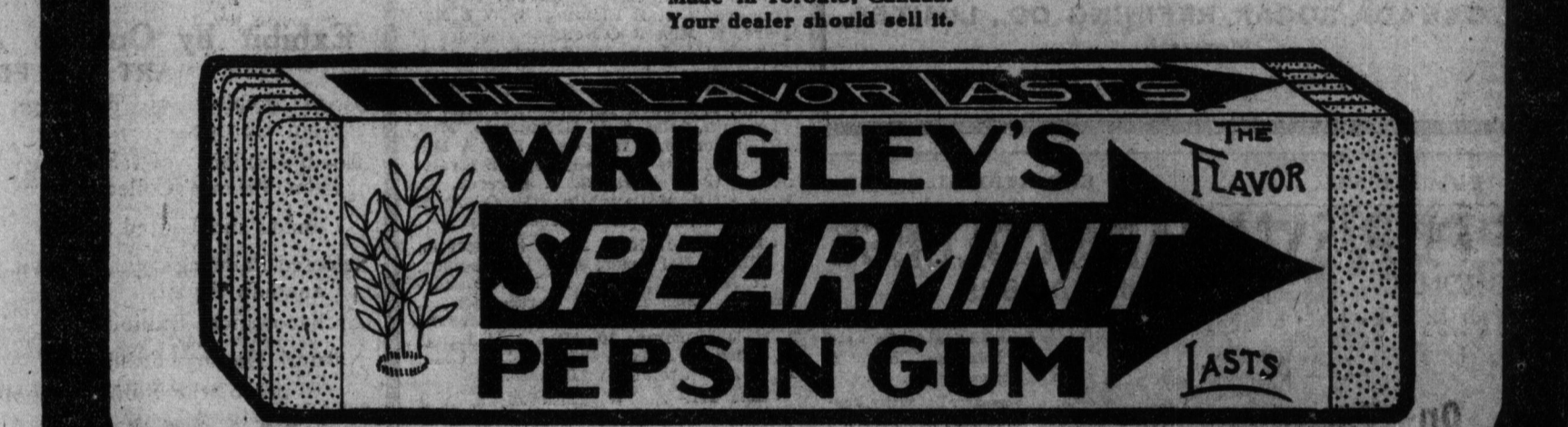

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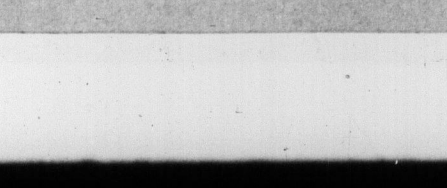

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Mining Markets Close Strong at Week-End--Porcupines Busy

Porcupines Exceedingly Active But Price Changes Are Small

Advances Made in Some Shares—Hollinger and Rea Decline Slightly—Preston East Dome Has Busy Day—Cobalt Bull.

World Office, Friday, August 18.—The mining market opened strong this morning, particularly in the medium priced issues and good advances were made right from the first. Small declines occurred later on, but the day's business was resultant in a slightly higher position for the Porcupines. There was practically no short selling for the reason that the shorts have not entirely covered themselves yet, and are devoting all their energies to protect themselves while prices are comparatively low.

While the market was exceptionally active, some observers state that Porcupines are not on a sound basis yet, and that before there can be any noticeable advance, a drastic shaking is necessary. However, the general tone is good, and most brokers are decidedly bullish. Preston East Dome provided considerable excitement all day long, and during the day 110,000 shares changed hands. No reason is given for this exceptional activity, but the buying is sound and coming chiefly from the public, and augurs well for that stock. The price went up from 50 at the opening to 51 1/2 on the unusual demand, but naturally fell back a fraction as there seemed to be plenty of holders glad of even a small profit.

Dome Extension was stronger, closing at 65, the high for the day. Rea was still weak, the best it could do being 8 1/2, and closing at 8 3/8, a distinct loss for the day. Heavy liquidation in Hollinger kept that stock down, the price closing at 11 1/2, and the market for the majority of the trading. It closed off at 11 3/8. Strange to say, the fact generally seems to follow that the leader in its declines, possibly because brokers believe its setback is only temporary and that this can be easily accounted for.

Coronation cut loose again. This stock opened considerably below the previous close, but went up to 18 at the end of the day. Cobalt Lake was fairly busy with little change. The silver shares are still trading, and there is enough enquiry to keep them generally firm. It is hard to make a prediction upon the market for the coming week, but the summer season is not thru with yet, but the consensus of opinion is that the mining market closed very strong and well able to hold its firmness until the opening of Monday.

LARDER COMING ALONG.—Mr. James Tighe, who is largely interested in Larder Lake, recently returned from the camp and brought down numerous samples from some of the claims. These samples were shown to The World and they were all heavily mineralized and plentifully impregnated with free gold and sulphides. Mr. Tighe says that there is more gold now being taken in Larder than at any time of the camp's history and he expects this camp to attract equally as much interest as the other rich larder camps in a very short time.

THE LATEST NEWS FROM PORCUPINE

Sensational Story Regarding Wonderfully Rich Find on North Dome Received.

Altho definite news from Porcupine has been lacking during the past week, the work of development on the various properties goes on apace and in some instances at least, the results are highly satisfactory. This fact is evidenced by the following telegrams received last night by that progressive brokerage house, Charles A. WILKIE INQUEST ADJOURNED.—Uncertainty Among Witnesses to Be Inquired into Next Wednesday.

"So uncertain was the evidence given by witnesses at the inquest yesterday afternoon on the body of Mrs. Ellen Wilkie, that the enquiry was adjourned until Wednesday, Aug. 24, to enable the crown to get the facts straightened out. Mrs. Wilkie died at 254 Claremont-street on Monday night, and it is alleged that her death was caused by her husband, who is facing a charge of murder. Wilkie and Frank Perry, who is included in the charge of murder were present in the court room. Mrs. Mary Jane Bryant, who lives on the first floor of the house in Claremont-street, was the first witness. She told of seeing Mr. and Mrs. Wilkie fighting. Mrs. Wilkie was on the floor in the passage and Wilkie was beating her with his fist, on the side of the head, while Mrs. Wilkie was grasping her husband's leg. Wilkie succeeded in separating them and then Mrs. Wilkie fell. In continuing, the witness was unable to give a clear account of what happened, and as she complained that she was "all unstrung," the coroner excused her for the time being. Cecelia Bryant, daughter of the previous witness, described several fights which occurred during the fight between the Wilkies, but as in repetition, she gave contradictory accounts of the incidents, the coroner decided to adjourn the case.

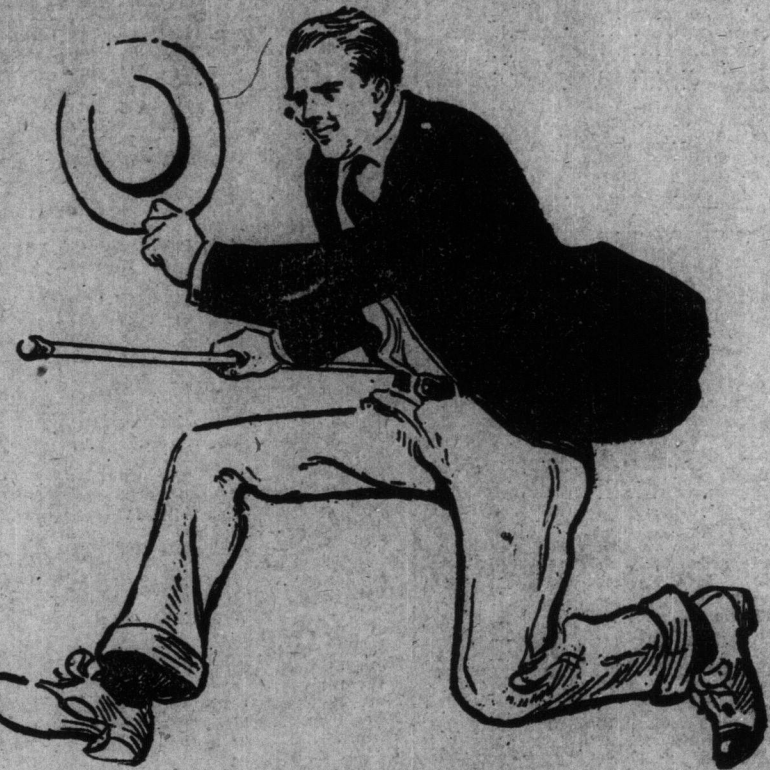

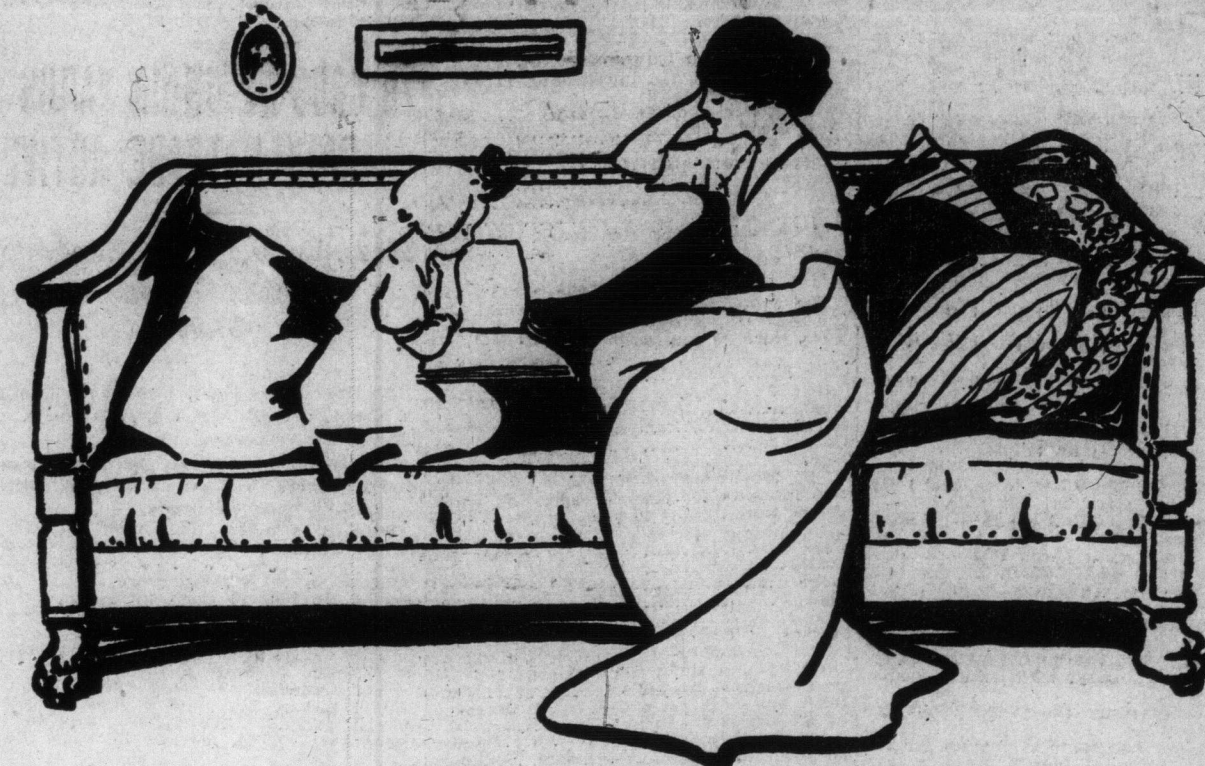
