The annual meeting of the Julia Greenshields Home, which was founded forty years ago, was held yesterday afternoon, Rev. A. L. Fleming, presiding. The Rev. James Murray, D.D., conducted the opening exercises, and the report for the year was read by Mrs. H. S. Strathy, recording secre-

The report regretted the death of Mrs. R. B. Henderson, who for up-ward of ten years had acted as honorary secretary. It also referred to the loss by death of a devoted friend, Dr. J. Milton Cotton. Two new physicians had joined the staff, Drs. Herbert G. Wilson and Dr. Malcom Cameron. The unfailing care and kindness of the

matron, Mrs. Woodside, was recorded The statement was made that it will be necessary to raise something like fifteen hundred dollars in additiona subscriptions, if the requirements of the inspector from the department of the provincial secretary are to be

Receipts for the year were \$8301.42, and expenditure the same. The government grant \$768.69, civic grant \$200. In his address, the chairman referred to the founder of the home, Miss Julia Greenshields, and to the support it had received from Dr. Goldwin Smith. The institution was founded as a home for women of re-finement, in reduced circumstances. and has accommodation for about thirty. Attention was drawn to the fact that among four deaths which had occurred during the year, the average age was 85 years and four months. The speaker thanked the medical staff, and all who had served the institution in any way, and drew attention to the need for an increase in revenue, owing to the increased cost of living. Mrs. A. L. 



REPORT ISSUED BY HOUSING COMMITTEE

Essential Features of Dwellings Include Detachment, Sunlight and Sanitation.

The Ontario housing committee issued its preliminary recommendations on types of inexpensive houses yesterday. In the foreword the committee dealt with the amount set aside by the provincial and federal government sand with the necessity if determining the type of house which would eventually become a standard.

The essentials are summarized as follows: Sufficient land to give each family privacy and plenty' of air, watertight floors, walls and roof, one or more rooms for cooking, eating and general day use. Bedroom for parents' use. Bedroom for male children. Bedroom for female children. Provision for coilet with sanitary water closet and sewer connection. Running water fit for drink ng. Kitchen sink with waste connection to sewer. Un-interrupted daylight and ventilation

mistake in the past, has been provision of too many rooms, which are frequently too small. It is accordingly suggested that four to six noom houses are best suited to needs of the average workman.

A space of at least twelve feet is commended to be preserved between houses or groups. The rear of the house should be at least 50 feet from the rear of the lot, which would leave space for gardens, and play room for the children. Open fences are re-commended, while outhouses are deemed undesirable.

Big Rooms. The rooms are graduated in size from the living room with an extent of 144 square feet, and a width of 11 feet, to the kitchen, 80 square feet, and 8 feet wide. Ceilings are to be 8 feet high, and sloping conditions to be accepted only under certain restricted conditions. The plumbing is detailed and is to be of the highest


