The Like Levels.

The Minister of Marine presented to Parliament to-day the report of Mr. O'Hanley, C.E., upon the probable effect of the Chicago drainage canal on lake levels. The document is a voluminous one, consisting of 90 type-written pages, and containing in detail the hydraulic formulae by which the surface effect of the discharge is determined, and the probable effect of the artificial retention worked out. The following deduction is made from one series of formulae: That, estimating the discharge of the drainage canal at 15,000 cubic feet per second, it would take \$2.5-6 days for the canal to lower the level of Lake Michigan one inch, or 290 days to lower it 3 1-2 inches. Mr. O'Hanley suggests that a gauging party be sent this spring to observe the mean discharge at St. Clair River.



In doing so he referred to its complex and intricate character. The Land Act of 1881, he added, had initiated an agrarian revolution, transforming the system of land tenura. During the past 15 years there had been a reduction of agricultural values that nobody in 1881 expected. This had added to the difficulty of the issues involved in a settlement of the land question. The keystone of the Unionist policy since 1881 had been to establish a peasant proprietary in Ireland and a single instead of dual ownership of land.
