

MURDERER AND LIAR, TOO. FIVE ALLEGED HOLMES ARE ALIVE.

Chicago Detectives Claim That the Confession from the Philadelphia Prisoner is the Work of Lies—They Point out the Weaknesses of the Victim's Story.

Chicago, April 13.—Inspector Fitzpatrick this morning will have his officers dig up the basement of 1151 Milwaukee-avenue for the purpose of identifying the body of H. H. Holmes did really bury there Emily Van Tassel, whom he claims to have murdered.

Chicago detectives treat the alleged confession of H. H. Holmes with contempt. They have had since last July indubitable proof that he murdered Julia L. Connor in his castle on Sixty-third-street.

Holmes lies about Gertrude E. Connor. She died in Kussatonia, Iowa, July 13, 1891, of cancer of the heart. Her death occurred seven weeks after she had left Chicago.

Confession Causes Laughter. The story created no sensation in police circles, for the truth is that it was secured by Chief Badenoch last year, and the lies were so patently obvious that he laughed at them.

Robert Latimer, who is the brother of the late H. H. Holmes, is now in the city. He is a man of high character and is a member of the police force.

DOINGS ABOUT THE HARBOR. News Gathered Along the Water Front—Waiting for the Canals to Open.

A heavy fog overhung the lake yesterday morning, and the warning notes of the fog-horn on the island were heard for the first time this season.

There are as yet only a few boats moving on the lake. The Lakeside makes her daily trips, and yesterday carried a good many passengers between Port Dalhousie and Toronto.

The propeller Niagara of the Mathews line, Captain James Morgan, cleared last night for Oswego with 16,000 bushels of barley. She will bring a return cargo of coal.

There were many Island passengers yesterday. To-day the ferry steamers Arlington and Island Queen will be brought down from Oakville and will be placed in commission on the Island route as soon as the traffic warrants an increased service.

Island Park is being placed in condition by a large staff of laborers. Merchants' liners are awaiting the opening of the Lachine Canal, which is not expected for three weeks.

It has been ascertained that there is no truth in the report that the Lakeside and Empress were to run to St. Catharines in conjunction. They will be operated independently.

The work of refitting the Chicora is well under way, and the boat will soon be ready for her first trip. It is expected that the Chicora, and, possibly, also the Chippewa and Corona, will be able to make the Lewiston landing this season, as the water in the Niagara is considerably higher than last season, though it has not risen to the same height as in Toronto Bay.

Soundings have been taken in the Western channel, and from present appearances but a little dredging will be required at that point. The gauge now shows the water in the harbor to be two and a half inches below zero.

There is now no insurrection against boats of the A2 class in the grain trade. For the coming season a sliding scale between boats of the different classes will be maintained.

NEW BOARD OF CONTROL.

IT WILL, SAYS THE MAYOR, HAVE DIRTY WORK TO DO.

Members Will Draw \$1000 a Year—No Deputies—Officers Ordered for Queen-Street Subway Meeting—To Consider the New Rules of Council—End of the Court House Suit.

All the members of the City Council save Ald. Davies were present at the meeting yesterday. There was the usual number of petitions, among them being those for a portion of High Park to be set apart for playing golf.

Ald. Spence gave notice that he will move for the insertion of a clause in all city contracts prohibiting the employment of any man for more than nine hours per day on the work.

There is a great deal of preliminary skirmishing over the election to the Board of Control. The first open skirmish in Council was over the proposal originally made by The World that a chairman of a special committee should not continue to hold his chairmanship if elected to the board.

Ald. Dunn moved the appointment of the Mayor, A.D. Sheppard, R. H. Graham and the mover to interview the Dominion Government for the purpose of endeavoring to secure the expenditure in Toronto of a material portion of the \$300,000 which it is proposed to spend in developing the dead water.

The motion carried, notwithstanding the objection by Ald. Bousfield that the Council would only wait until the 24th the whole Government would be "dead meat."

Was it Sour Grapes? Ald. Hallam wanted to get the rules suspended in order to introduce a motion limiting the salaries of the members of the Board of Control to \$700, instead of \$1000, as allowed by the act.

The Mayor justified the payment of \$700 to the members of the board in addition to the \$300 they receive as aldermen, on the ground that the members would earn their money by doing the work of the board.

There was quite a discussion over the proposal of Ald. Preston that the public having business at Osgoode Hall have the privilege of entering the Hall by way of Osgoode-street, now closed for military purposes.

The Finance Committee resolved to report to the board that Solicitor McMurich be instructed to employ his own counsel in the appeal case of Rogers v. the School Board.

The Queen-street subway report was adopted without discussion, and tenders will be invited for the work, and the sub-committee will, in the meantime, try to settle the land damages.

The council adjourned at 7:30 p.m. His Worship expressing his intention of calling another meeting on Thursday or Friday to consider the new rules of council.
