Foster, but the latter retired from the partnership in 1875. He founded in 1871 the Bodega Wine Company of Canada, with branches at Montreal and Ottawa. On the reorganization of the Royal Grenadiers, in 1880, under Lieut.-Col. Grasett, he became senior major of the regiment and assisted largely in its development. While bearing this rank, Major Dawson served all through the Northwest Rebellion and was wounded in the leg while charging with the Grenadiers at Batoche.

But there were difficulties pointed out in conection with this suggestion, and all favored the Government adopting a can of standard measurement, to contain 8 gallons.


