Spence was from Peterboro and Thornton from Toronto. We arrived at the house safely. 



ABOLITION OF THE WARDS.
Section 4 of the Municipal Amendment
Act of 1900 gives cities an alternative

"In any city having a population of more than 15,000 the Council may by bylaw provide that the aldermen shall be elected by a general vote of the municipal electors, and either by general vote or in two electoral divisions, where the population exceeds 40,000, one half of the number to be elected by each division; but such bylaw shall not come into force unless and until it has been first submitted to a vote of the electors.

The persons entitled to vote upon such bylaw shall be those who are entitled to vote at municipal elections, and if the submission of such bylaw be desired by petition of at least 400 of such electors it shall be submitted at the then next annual municipal election."

A petition signed by over 500 electors was presented to the Mayor yesterday asking for the submission of a bylaw dividing the city into two electoral divisions, in accordance with the above section of the act. It will be noticed that it is obligatory upon the Council to submit the bylaw, as requested, at the forthcoming election, and it will be further observed that the vote of the electors will finally decide the matter. The finality of the proposed pieblacite or referendum is one of its distinguishing and recommendable features. The question has recommendable features. The question has been taken out of the hands of the aldermen and left to the people. The vote on this matter, therefore, will have more significance than recent votes which have een taken on the payment of aldermanic salaries and on the abolition of exempions. In these two latter cases the vote of the electors was not final. Altho the of discontinuing payment to the aldermen, the latter intervened and disregarded the nanic salary vote, so they would, if they had the power, refuse to abolish the ward
