

ABOLITION OF THE WARDS.

Section 4 of the Municipal Amendment Act of 1900 gives title an alternative method of electing the aldermen. The section reads as follows:

"In any city having a population of more than 10,000 the Council may by bylaw provide that the aldermen shall be elected by a general vote of the electors, or by a general vote or in two electoral divisions, where the population of each division is not less than 10,000, one half of the number to be elected by each division; but such bylaw shall not come into force until it has been first submitted to a vote of the electors, and the bylaw shall be subject to a vote of the electors at a municipal election, and if the number of electors in each division is not less than 400, such election shall be held at the same time as the municipal election."

A petition signed by over 500 electors was presented to the City Council on Dec. 4, 1900, in which it was requested that the City be divided into two electoral divisions, in accordance with the above section of the Act. It was noted that the petition was signed by 500 electors, and that the petitioners requested, at the forthcoming election, and it will be further decided that the vote of the electors will finally decide the matter. The majority of the proposed electors returned in one of its distinguishing and commendable features. The question has been taken out of the hands of the aldermen and left to the people. The vote in this matter, therefore, will have more significance than recent votes which have been taken on the payment of aldermanic salaries and on the abolition of wards.

In these two latter cases the vote of the electors was not final. Although the electors declared overwhelmingly in favor of discontinuing payment to the aldermen, the latter interested and interested themselves in the matter, and in the case of the abolition of wards, the people of Toronto voted in favor of abolishing them, but the members of the Legislative Assembly refused to sanction the popular verdict. No such body can intervene to prevent the will of the people being carried out in regard to the proposed new method of electing the aldermen. If the latter had the power to accept or reject the popular verdict it would be many long years before the system of electing the aldermen by wards would be abolished. As the proposed method of electing the aldermen is the result of the mandate of the people on the aldermanic salary vote, so they would, if they had the power, refuse to abolish the ward system. It is a pity the referendum is not made use of more frequently, especially in municipal matters. The submission of all important questions directly to the people ought to be encouraged, and the electors, once ascertained, ought to become law.

As to the proposal, which will, in the nature of things, be referred to the people next January, we think it will meet with popular approval. The election of our aldermen by the people at large, instead of by wards, will be the result of bringing into the Council a better class of representatives. The new system will make it impossible for a man who is known only as a ward politician to secure election. The ward system is a relic of a bygone era, and the low-grade Council which has afflicted the city for years back. In addition to securing a better class of representatives, the new system will give us a better men and place them under improved conditions for carrying on the affairs of the city.

CASES IN THE COURTS.

General Sessions Opened Yesterday—Appeals Against Convictions Under the Early Closing By-law.

At noon yesterday Judge McDougall opened the December sitting of the General Sessions. The swearing in of 33 foreigners occupied the attention of the court for some little time, and then His Honor addressed the grand jury. Three of the 13 Jurymen on the panel were missing: Ed Chapman, Peter McIntyre and Herbert E. Magson. Of these, the first is a postmaster and is, therefore, exempt; the second is dead, shot by his son; and the third has left the province. His Honor deemed it advisable to add two more names to the panel to guard against obstruction if any juror being unable to get a quorum. Aid. J. B. Moore and Warden Rogers, who were present, were called on by the warden, Wallace Cruikshank, carriage maker, of Weston, was chosen foreman.
