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





The following article, from the cur rent number, "What a girl does with breadcrumb," is a new idea in arts breadcrumb," is a new idea in arts and crafts for home workers. Its accompanying illustrations show amazing results. The article follows:

That unusual and beautiful effects in decorations and objects of art may be obtained by the use of simple materials is an established fact, and now we hear of one of the latest achievements in the art of modeling flowers. It has been discovered in Paris in an ments in the art of modeling flowers. It has been discovered in Paris in an exhibition of flowers and insects modeled from breadcrumb—a unique idea, truly. It was originated and carried out to a marked degree of success by Miss Susanne Meyer, a young Frenchwoman, whose devotion to the work has brought it particularly to the height of perfection. Her latest triumph is the recognition of her work by the French Government, which has just decided to place it in one of the national galleries.

The method of working breadcrumb requires the sculptor's usual skill and patience. Anyone taking it up as a hobby or as serious work must not be discouraged by a few failures in the

of modeling may be started, with the natural object at hand for a guide; whether it be an orchid, a rose, a spray of honeysuckle, or some favorite flower, the sculptor must first copy the stalk satisfactorily as to form, leaving the final coloring until the end of the modeling operations, when she may turn her attention to the leaves and flowers. In making these, an ordinary rolling-pin will be found very useful. The breadcrumb should be rolled out until it is of the requisite thickness. From this the leaves or petals may be roughly cut out with a pen-knife, one by one, and finished with the aid of the fingers—that is, by patting, workby one, and finished with the aid of the fingers—that is, by patting, working, pressing and rubbing the bread-crumb. Thus by slow degrees the flower is built. Undue haste is fatal, for in the early stages of the work there is danger of a complete collapse. Breadcrumb will harden generally in two or three days, and then the final coloring, the shaping and the finishing can be given. A touch of color here and there, put on with a brush, and in exactly the same way as tho painting a picture, will give a realistic touch to the subject. For instance, the glossiness that is found on the stalk of a natural rose can be imparted by a gennatural rose can be imparted by a gentle rubbing with the fingers, or by a slight coating of pure gum arabic. Sometimes the breadcrumb, after it has been kneaded into balls, will not be of the right consistency, with the result the right consistency, with the result that the flowers will crack after only a few days' existence. There will be no danger of this if the balls are of the right consistency. Either stale or fresh breadcrumb may be used, and the work should be done in a room of moderate temperature; sudden changes from hot to cold, and vice versa, should be avoided.



SMALLER LUMBER CUT.

Because of the conditions prevailing at present the big lumber firms operating in the Georgian Bay and Ottawa Valley districts will curtail their cut in the bushes to a very appreciable extent during the present winter.

The demand for lumber is not at all good at present and has not been for some time. Following close upon the financial troubles of the fall of last year came the curtailment in building operations, leaving all the big dealers with a big stock on hand in their yards. The mills closed down early and a good supply of logs is still to be sawn up. The dealers do not anticipate anything abnormal in next season's demand, and taink that by cutting up the logs and selling off the stocks now in the yards they can get along without much cutting in the bush the coming winter, the the gangs will take out a little, possibly on a conservative estimate, about one-half of last year's

light cut.

The following winter, 1908-09, will see the gangs in the bushes as usual, to replenish the supply of logs at the mills. The loss in wages to the bushmen will be a considerable hardship, as last year, during the seven months the men were in the camp, September to April the 20 big companies put the men were in the camp, September to April, the 20 big companies put something close to \$5,000,000 into the bush. This year there may be half that figure paid out. The other losses to be considered are the loss to the merchants who supply the provisions for the camp, and the loss in revenue to the government for lumber taken out, which is considerable. 

World Office, Tuesday Evening, July 2 Holiday season is becoming the biggest factor in the local markets for ining stocks. Both brokers and clients in the main are away and are clients in the main are away and are willing to be oblivious to temporary quotations during their absence. Little trading developed on the exchange to-day. At the Toronto stock exchange curb there was not a transaction. A few brokers traded in and out of the active shares at the Standard Exchange and some purchases of the active shares were made for future delivery. The general impression at the close of the exchanges to-day was that prices on the whole are low, but that active speculation and advances will not occur until a few weeks hence.

I spoke with one of the most eminent mining engineers in the camp and he stated that Cobalt had practically in sight to-day about \$50,000,000.

I feel very enthusiastic over the prospects in Cobalt, and I hear very good reports from the Larder Lake district. It appears to me that we are on the eve of great mining expansion in Ontario, and the wealth produced in these mining districts will naturally flow into Toronto. I look for great prosperity in this community for the next ten years."




