THEATRE LICENSE FEES ARE TO BE INCREASED

Moving Picture Institutions to Pay \$100 a Year—Curious Mistake in Regard to Prescribed Area.

HAMILTON, Oct. 15.—(Special.)—Richard Press, contractor, in-charge of the Hamilton theatre, dropped this evening at his home, 142 North Ferguson-avenue. He was 68 years of age and leaves a widow, one son and three daughters.

The markets committee this evening decided to raise the license fee for moving picture shows from about \$20 a year, according to the existing law, to \$100 a year. This will also cover the Association Hall. The license fee for the Grand, Savoy and Benoit theatres is increased to \$100. It was discovered that, according to the minutes, council had adopted a report, abolishing the location of small theatres and moving picture shows in the area bounded by Caroline, Hunter, Wellington and Barton-streets. Mayor McLaren was much surprised, and decided that there must have been some mistake, as it had been the intention of the council to defeat the report. It was probably he read at the next meeting. Ald. Robson was about the only member to oppose the increase of the license of the moving picture shows. He said they were the poor man's theatre. SELL GILLIES LIMIT

Tenders Invited for Another Block of Twelve Hundred Acres.

Another sale of lands in the Gillies limit is to be made by the department of lands, forests and mines. A strip of land containing 1200 acres, lying immediately south of the portion already sold, will be offered for sale in 20 acre parcels. Tenders will be received until Nov. 15. The conditions are similar to those of the previous sales. A royalty of 10 per cent. will be imposed on all ore taken from the limit.

When this sale has been completed in all about 2100 acres of the Gillies limit will have been disposed of, leaving a balance of about 62,000 acres.

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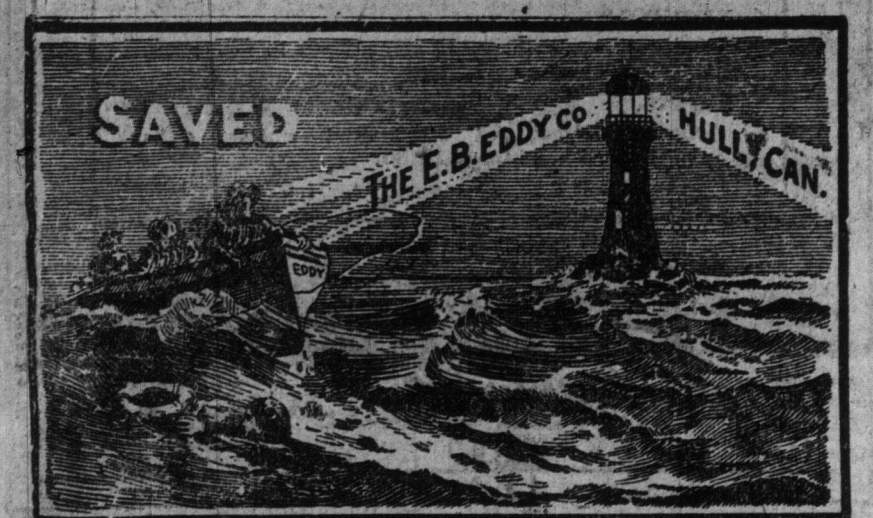

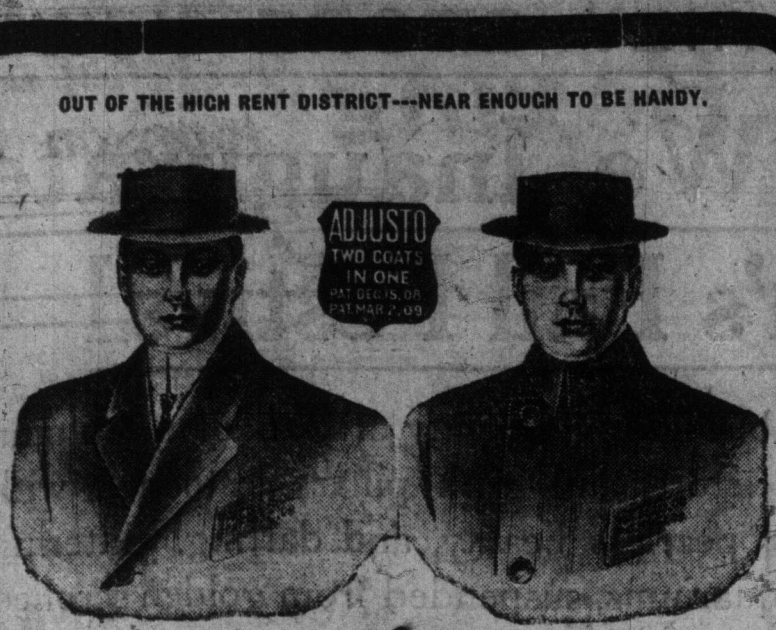

MR. HANNA.

The World is glad to notice that Hon. W. J. Hanna, a Conservative member in this city on Thursday night, decided that the Whitney government, of which he is a member, was more determined and more united than ever on the realization of the public power policy. Mr. Hanna is an able lawyer, and has in him the makings of a high class public man. If Mr. Hanna is anxious to attain so worthy an ambition he can best come to it by growing into what is the scarcest article in public life to-day, and that is a public rights lawyer. The country is full of lawyers, and some of them are good ones, but most of them are in the service of the corporations; the regrettable thing is that so few lawyers to-day espouse the side of the people, and are champions of public rights. A wonderful change is taking place in the United States in this same direction, and public lawyers, as against private interest lawyers, are becoming much more numerous, and are playing a prominent part in the government of the country. It was this kind of public lawyer that President Roosevelt surrounded himself with, both in his cabinet and in other public offices, and the same is true of his successor, Mr. Taft.

Ontario to-day is greatly in need of half a dozen members of the legal profession who will champion the cause of public rights, and who are not afraid of their fellows who are in the service of corporation aggrandizement. This also is the kind of lawyer that Toronto as a city is very much in need of.

CANADIAN SHIPBUILDING.

All possible support should be given in aid of the establishment of the Dominion as one of the leading shipbuilding centres of the world. It was during the days of the old wooden walls that Canada from its wealth of timber could easily have maintained and improved its position. The advent of iron and steel vessels greatly changed the situation because at that time the country had not the means or the opportunity to take advantage of its vast natural resources of coal and ore. But things are different now and by pursuing a wise and prudent policy of encouragement Canada will again build up a notable and advantageous industry and create a great commercial fleet. The determination to build and maintain an independent navy under federal control provides the necessary stimulus to British shipbuilders to establish themselves in Canada. That is right enough, but a navy is of less importance industrially than the development of commercial fleets, both on the Atlantic and the Pacific. A splendid start has been made by the C.P.R. with its British built liners, but it is time to take the next big step and to secure Canadian owned boats which are constructed in Canada. It is reported that Messrs. Harland & Wolff have resolved to erect yards at Montreal and St. John, and this may be taken as an indication that they look for more than orders to turn out warships.

Montreal, to the World's mind, is the place best adapted to become the chief shipbuilding centre of the Dominion. The St. Lawrence is and must always remain the great waterway to the Atlantic, and from its maritime importance should be fully equipped with the yards and shops required by great maritime ports. The drawback attaching to its inland situation and its consequent closure by ice in the winter months necessitates similar provision in an open port, and Messrs. Harland & Wolff are understood to have selected St. John for that purpose. The World looks forward to seeing before very long a daily service between Canada and the mother country with Canadian ships prominent in it.

INCIDENCE OF ASSESSMENTS. A petition is being circulated and is being largely signed, it stated, in 200 Ontario municipalities, asking that municipalities be permitted to tax improvement values at a lower rate than land values; business assessments, incomes and salaries to be classed with improvement values; and the difference in the rates, in every case, to be determined by the municipality.

It is obvious at once that the last clause could not be passed by a legislature which refuses, as in Ontario, to permit the bonusing of any industry. Any discrimination allowed to municipalities in the incidence of taxation could easily be manipulated for that purpose.

If the discrimination asked for was made general by the legislature, the effect would only be temporary. In a short time the taxes subtracted from the business and added to the land would be included in the rent, and the tenants would be no better off. Where the business man owns both land and building he is indifferent about the division, and anxious only about the tax total.

ness in expensive Yonge-street property. The remedy is to move to cheaper streets, and allow merchants who are ready and willing to do so, to take their places. If no others were bidding, values would not go up, and landlords would not ask such high prices. The suggestion that Yonge-street merchants should be bonused by rating them at a lower assessment, is one that does not appeal to the citizens away from Yonge-street, who would have to pay the bonus. It may seem to be a bitter hardship to leave Yonge-street, but numbers of merchants have left it in the last few years and are thriving on other thoroughfares.

The question whether the business assessment is levied in a proper ratio to the land values is a separate one altogether, and should not be confused with the question of land values. All the objections raised to the working of the Assessment Act are carefully considered by the government. So far the government has seen no need for revision, but has promised to take up all the problems raised at a later date. The rates were fixed arbitrarily at what were considered to be fair figures. It can be shown that they should be lowered, well and good. The fact is that the business tax adjusted upon the land values works automatically as the single tax itself would do, and single taxers, of all men, have no need to complain about the operation of the principle they advocate. The tendency of the single tax, say its adherents, will be to prevent congestion. The Ontario Assessment Act, as a single tax measure, operates against the congestion of Yonge-street by adding high taxes to high values.
