Transportation Commission, held in the Ryrie building yesterday afternoon, P. W. 

"The local Hydro commission have discussed the situation, and if the gov-ernment does not acquiesce it may be advisable for the city to take over the distribution system and the York radials. But the negotiations are on the same basis as other purchases by the provincial commission. The com-mission will buy the companies for the Hydro municipalities, and we will put in hopes that before two weeks are of the city council instead of having over an offer can be made that will include the radial. ### **URGE OPENING UP** SHIPBUILDING YARD

Joint Committee Will Prepare Plan for Presentation to Government.

The board of control yesterday decided to use its influence to induce the government to reopen the Dominion shipbuilding plant in Toronto, which was closed some months ago, and is now in the hands of a receiver. Families Assisted Show Increase -Treasurer Reports Big Bank Overdraft.

Over four hundred and fifty families have received help this year from the House of Industry on Elm street, stated the Rev. T. 


