## Special Information.

### 1. Services.

## 3. Sacraments.

Baptism is dispensed on the first Sabbath of each month. The Lord's Supper is dispensed on the first Sabbaths of February, June, August, and December, in the morning, and on the first Sabbaths of April and October, in the evening. Communicants are requested to bring their communion cards, as this is the only way of recording attendance.

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## 4 Support.

Pews and sittings are free, although as far as possible allotted to the families and persons who attend the church. Any who have not secured sittings are requested to make application for them on any Wednesday evening before or after prayer meeting service, when the seat letting committee will endeavor to meet their requirements.

The congregational expenses are met by voluntary contributions, given for the most part weekly, by envelope. All who have not adopted this system are earnestly requested to do so, applying to the Euvelope Secretary for envelopes. It is suggested that each contributor shall take his or her supply of envelopes home, keep them in a safe place, use them regularly with due regard to the dates printed thereon, seal them securely, and write the amount enclosed in every case on the face. Each contributor who follows these suggestions can ascertain by a simple examination of the envelopes remaining on hand, precisely how his or her account with the Church stands at any time, and they are asked to make such an examination periodically, and supply any omissions which may have occurred by reason of absence or otherwise.

## 5. Mission Schemes.

Muirhead, Whitewood, N. W. T. These objects are commended to the generosity of the members.

The congregation being divided into Districts, with an Elder in charge of each, members are particularly urged to make known to the Elder of their District, any case of sickness or other circumstance requiring attention. Members are particularly requested to give notice of change of address just as soon as it occurs.

# SYNOPSIS OF MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION.

The annual meeting of the congregation was held on the evening of Monday. January 14th

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After devotional exercises had been conducted by the pastor, Mr. R. Donald was requested to act as chairman, and Mr. G. H. Meldrum, as secretary to the meeting.

The report of the Session for the past year was presented by Dr. McTavish, who moved its adoption, seconded by Mr. H. Meldrum. Carried.

The adoption of the annual report of the Managers was moved by Mr. Donald, seconded by Mr. Petry, and carried.

Reports of the results of the work carried on during the year by the various organizations connected with the church, were presented and adopted, and it was decided that these, in addition to the reports of the Session and Managers, should be printed in pamphlet form and distributed among the members of the congregation.

The following gentlemen were elected to act on the Board of Managers during the next two years, viz., Messrs. A. R. Creelman, Donald Bain, Wm. Campbell, A. H. Crawford, R. Haslitt, F. C. I. Jones, G. H. Meldrum, C. B. Petry, and S. B. Windrum.

Votes of thanks to the members of the choir and auditors for valuable services rendered during the year, and to the ladies of the church for providing the entertainment which preceded the meeting, were unanimously passed.

Messrs. John Ferguson and Peter McCulloch were reappointed auditors for the ensuing year.

A motion was made by Mr. B. Jennings, and seconded by Dr. Wishart, proposing the re-introduction of several features into the service of praise, which had been eliminated therefrom for a number of years, but as the large majority of the members had not had an opportunity of considering the matter it was decided to postpone the discussion until some future time.

As the business had not all been transacted when the hour for closing arrived, the meeting was adjourned until Monday vening, 4th February.

### REPORT OF THE SESSION.

We present this report with thanksgivings to God for the many blessings He has bestowed upon us during the year. Though we are still far from the spiritual condition in which we would like to be—where devotion to Christ and holiness of life would be plainly manifest in all our lives—yet we have evidences of fuller consecration in many of our members.

The reports we have received from time to time of the various branches of the church's work have been almost uniformly encouraging. The care of the needy ones has been very efficiently managed by the Ladies' Aid Society, who have devoted much time and thought to the management of this

very important work.

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The Domestic Mission on Elizabeth St., with its devoted band of workers, has had a year of much blessing. The services of Mr. McNichol as missionary, have been very greatly appreciated, and the present effort of the workers to relieve the funds of the church by carrying on the work without the services of a paid missionary, deserves the sympathy and prayers of all our members. Good reports have come from the regions beyond. Mr. and Mrs Russell, our missionaries, in Mhow, Central India, are in fairly good health, and are being blessed in their work. Rev. Mr. Muirhead, cf Whitewood, N. W. T., also sends cheering reports of his work. Mr. Eshoo, who has been a member with us for three years, has reached his home and mission work in Oroomia, Persia, after many hardships. We are glad to have Miss McIntosh, as well as Mr. and Mrs Goforth, back from Honan for a season. Two others, Dr and Miss Glover, have left for that great needy field.

The Sabbath School has increased so as to necessitate some important changes in arrangements for carrying on the work successfully. The Endeavor Societies, Junior and Senior, are prospering, and the meetings are attended with much blessing. It was thought best to discontinue the Penny Savings' Bank in the mission, as this work is now taken up by

other institutions

The various departments will report at length, and need not be referred to more in detail here. The choir, as usual, has rendered very faithful and valuable service in conducting the praise of the congregation. We regret very much that

the present financial necessities of the congregation compelled us to dispense with the very useful services of Mr. Cringan, who has been the leader of the choir. We would express our gratitude for the manner in which he has kept up the congre-

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gational singing.

The Session which has been enlarged by the addition of four valuable elders will now be able to overtake the work of the congregation more efficiently than heretofore. A joint meeting of Session and Managers is now held every quarter, and we have no doubt these joint meetings will do much toward unifying and strengthening the work of both the elders

and the managers.

We have to record the death of several beloved and valuable members of our congregation On the 15th of February, Miss Eliza Wilson fell asleep in Jesus after a long and painful struggle with disease. She was greatly beloved by all who knew her. Soon afterwards we were suddenly called to mourn the sudden death of Mrs. S. B. Windrum, who was a victim to a mother's devotion to her beloved family. Later in the year Mrs. Hanna and Mrs. Emory were called home at a ripe age, and ere the year closed, the sudden death of Miss Marion C. Jennings and the death of Mr. Neil Currie touched many hearts with deep sorrow. Mr. Currie was a devoted member of Central Church, and in the disposition of his property he has very generously remembered our needs. His simple, unobtrusive Christian life and generous gifts will long beremembered in the city as well as in this congregation. The sorrowing relatives have our deepest sympathy in their afflictions.

During the year 115 new members were received into the fellowship of the church. Of these, 40 were by profession of faith, and 75 by certificate. The removals were 6 by death, 50 by certificate, and 27 by retirement from the roll, making the net gain 32, and the present membership 612. The attendance at communions was as follows: February, 316; April, 326; June, 341; August, 211; October, 324; December, 350.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MANAGERS FOR 1894

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The Managers have much pleasure in presenting to the Congregation the report and statements of account for the past year in the usual form. It will be seen from the figures submitted that the receipts have proved insufficient to the extent of \$189.43 to meet the expenditures, and that this sum with the deficiency at the beginning of the year, leaves an adverse balance at the close, of \$455.22. Several months ago, when it was realized that the congregational expenses were exceeding the income, it was feared that the deficiency would be considerably larger than the amount now reported; the special appeal made in December, although not so liberally responded to as the Managers hoped, realized over \$200; this, with an increase in the weekly offerings towards the end of the year from new members and from the payment of arrears reduced the estimated adverse balance as stated.

During the latter part of the year, it was thought advisable by the Board of Managers to propose retrenchment in the Church expenses, and accordingly, at a joint meeting of the Session and Board, it was decided that the services of a choir master and of a paid missionary for the Elizabeth St. Mission should be discontinued so long as the receipts are insufficient to warrant the outlays. The saving in the expenses for 1895 from these and some minor items is estimated to amount to at least \$500. The hope is also entertained, that from increased weekly offerings all current engagements as well as the balance now carried forward, will be nearly, if not quite, met by the end of 1885.

From an examination of the Floating Debt Account, it will be seen that only \$483 were received during the year, reducing the outstanding liability to \$4,556.95. Of this, a considerable amount promised by subscribers may be relied upon as likely to be paid within a year or two. The Managers have not deemed it advisable to urge the payment of these subscriptions during the past year, which doubtless accounts for the comparatively small sum received. Steps should be taken in the near future, looking to the complete liquidation of this debt; with this in view, it is suggested that special envelopes be prepared and given to such of the members of the congregation as will use them for weekly, monthly,

or other periodical contributions. It is believed that this plan, which has been found serviceable in the past, will yield a considerable amount in small sums, and afford a convenient method for non-subscribers to assist in the reduction of the

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A matter which may properly be mentioned in this report, is the fact that a bequest has been made to the Central Presbyterian Church, by the late Neil Currie, who for many years was a valued member of the congregation, and who died in the month of November last. The amount presently available from this source is \$1,000 which, under the terms of the will, is to be applied on the debt.

There are now on the contribution list the names of 232 members and adherents, giving weekly the sum of \$96.05 a against 210 giving \$92.64 reported a year ago. The amoun contributed are as follows:-

We desire to acknowledge our gratitude to these brothers and sisters, for their kind assistance.

We are glad to welcome from the Newsboys' Home two classes, gathered together by two "Home Missionary Teachers," Mr. Alex. Creelman and Miss MacCallum.

We have again to thank Mr. A. R. Creelman for a handsome donation to provide prizes for the primary class.

As recommended by the Temperance Committee of the General Assembly this subject was brought before the school, the result being that 34 boys and 44 girls have signed the pledge.

Our school room accommodation being somewhat limited,

we contemplate making some changes, which will, we are sure, add to the efficiency of all the departments of the school.

We again ask for the prayers and co-operation of the parents in helping their children in the preparation of the lesson.

We are not weary in this delightful service for Christ, but go forward to another years work with renewed hope, trusting in the promise, "Lo, I am with you alway."

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### RULES FOR PROMOTION.

Pupils are promoted from the primary department to the junior intermediate, on being able to read in the first part of the second book in day school, and to repeat the Ten Commandments, the 23rd Psalm and the Beatitudes.

From the junior intermediate to the senior intermediate, on attaining the age of sixteen, and on being able to repeat the whole of the Shorter Catechism and give an outline of Bible History and the Life of Christ.

The course of instruction defined for the senior intermemediate classes is the International Series of Lessons, together with the fundamental doctrines of the Presbyterian Church.

From the senior intermediate to the Bible Class, pupils are promoted on attaining the age of eighteen. They are transferred by certificate and formally introduced to the Bible Class teacher.

Promotions are made on the first Sabbath in January.

## REPORT OF BIBLE CLASSES.

In looking over the year that has just closed we feel that there is much cause for thankfulness to our Heavenly Father in permitting us to meet from Sabbath to Sabbath to continue the systematic study of the Bible, and we trust His goodness in this respect may still be vouchsafed to us all during the coming year.

The success of the class has been marked in many ways, and, although the attendance is not quite up to that of last year, yet the results have been very satisfactory.

During the year four of our members have left to teach in the Sabbath School, ten have left the city, and nine for various

other reasons.

Notwithstanding the slight decrease in the attendance, the amount of money contributed by the class is well up to that of last year; the entire amount is donated for missionary purposes alone.

The line of study at present being taken up is the life of Christ, and we would like to see many more share in the benefits of study on this most interesting of all Bible topics.

•It is to be hoped during the coming year that each member will take his share in the responsibility of the class and do all possible to uphold the hands of our teachers by prayer, coupled with action.

Africa. The reports received from our Elizabeth Street mission have been unusually interesting and encouraging. They lately there had a lecture with views by Mr. Goforth on China, when Mrs. Goforth and Miss McIntosh sang in Chinese, to the great delight of a large audience.

We are glad to have Miss McIntosh with us after her heroic self-denying labors in Honan, caring for the sick and

telling them of Jesus, "the mighty to save."

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We are glad to report that the missionary collections and subscriptions will this year meet all our obligations and beg to thank the many contributors for their liberality and trust that during this coming year the number of givers and the amounts may both be increased, and that the Spirit of God may lead us to make still greater response to the earnest appeals of His faithful workers who are constantly telling us of the awful need of the vast heathen world.

# REPORT OF REV. NORMAN H. RUSSELL.

CANADIAN MISSION, MHOW, C. I., Dec. 24, 1894.

The year 1894 is drawing to a close, and I am reminded that before the New Year is many weeks old the good people of Central will be looking for the annual report from their

I would that we could meet face to face, and that with my lips I could speak to you. It would not be so much to tell you what we have done as what remains to be done. I would like to tell you of the grand opportunities that lie before the Church in Central India, of the great multitudes who know not God, of many fields white even now to harvest, but without laborers to garner in the sheaves. In the past year's ex-

perience nothing impresses me so strongly, no, not even the baptisms, as the great crowds we have been permitted to preach to, crowds that did not seem to grow tired even after one and two hours preaching, but were ready for more. I cannot say that these people are crying out for the Gospel, but there are hundreds, thousands ready to listen and to learn. I look back on the past year with no feelings of elation. I am thankful to Him for what He has permitted us to do; but I am sad over the little that has been done; sad over many mistakes and

neglected opportunities.

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Our schools have grown steadily; not so much in numbers as in ability and discipline. Our large school entered its fine new building at the beginning of this month, and already a change for the better is to be noted in its discipline. The teaching staff has been increased and improved, though I am sorry to say we still have to depend on non-Christians for some of None of our teachers, however, are out of sympathy with us, all professing more or less faith in Christ. The head master is an earnest man, lately elected an elder of the congregation, and his influence for good is to be felt throughout not only the school but also the congregation, and even the whole city. I can give no statistics of baptisms in the school, for the boys are under age and not able to receive baptism; but we have been cheered by many signs of interest. One boy, a Brahmin, earnestly desired baptism, and showed many signs of being awakened. Nearly all of the boys come voluntarily to Sunday school on Sabbath morning. All are carefully instructed in the Bible, and many have a very thorough knowledge, especially of the Gospels. The branch schools are entirely in the hands of Christians, and are well attended both Sundays and week days.

Our Sunday school work has kept full pace with our supply of teachers. Several of our Christians not in the employ of the mission, voluntarily carry on Sunday school work. We have 8 schools, 20 teachers, and about 550 scholars who are taught in four different languages: Hindi, Urdu, Marattii and English. I have a teachers' Bible-class on Saturday morning. Our schools have been better organized this year. The large school is under the superintendency of Mr. Drew, with Mr.

Anketell, the head master, for assistant.

Our congregation has had a year of blessing. Outwardly it

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has grown in numbers, there being now 53 on the roll. The organization of the congregation, the formation of a Session and Deacon's Court have been a great impetus to the life of the Church. Services are well attended; prayer-meetings as well as Sunday services. In all this work my brother and I work hand in hand with the Session, the Elders sharing the burden of the care of the people. We have had several additions on profession of faith, to the roll of communicants, one being a young convert from Roman Catholicism. We have also had a number of baptisms from non-Christians, of whom I will speak later. The congregation has met socially on several occasions, especially when we have been visited by our brethren from the out stations.

The work in the *Out Stations* has gone on steadily, the villages about Manpur and Barwai have all been carefully taught the way, and among them not a few have shown much interest. The Christians in both places, however, have been persecuted, and this has deterred some from coming forward. In spite of opposition, however, two more heads of families have been baptised in Barwai, and lately one of these had the pleasure of bringing his wife forward for baptism. They have all been of the same class, and now their influence is spreading, for one of their people away on the other side of Mhow has come forward for baptism.

Among the other *Baptisms* none were more interesting than that of a Brahmin and his wife and child. He had to leave his home and people to come to us, but he worked as a coolie while he studied the Word. I have since employed him as a driver for my bullock cart in the district, one of the humblest of occupations. Meanwhile he learns the Word in my daily class, and on several occasions he has said a few words to the crowds. I have seen that he has a grasp of the Truth. A Ghoud and a shepherd were two others of those that joined us. The former we baptised in Manpur. There are several enquirers asking baptism.

Evangelistic work, that is to say the preaching of the Word in the bazars, mobullas and villages, has gone on steadily. In the evenings we use the magic lantern a great deal, and many a congregation is gathered by means of its attractive pictures. January and part of February we spent in the district, and I was able to visit a large part of the great unoccupied

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field west of Mhow. We preached in many large towns and villages, spending a considerable time in Dhar. The latter place, a city of about 25,000 is a most needy field for missionary labor, and the friendliness of the Maharaja seems to make the present a very seasonable time for beginning work there. Wherever we went, both above and below the Ghats, we found a ready hearing. In a place called Maheshwar we found several professing a desire to become Christians, but the distance and smallness of our forces has forbidden our following up the work. I have also spent the month of December in the district. Our work has been specially marked by a providential opening among the Bheels or hill tribes, of whom many live in the Mhow district. They usually flee at the sight of Europeans, but we were introduced by one of their own people and were able to visit nine or ten villages, spending several days among them and doing grand work. We have also visited several large towns to the north-west of Mhow, in one of which especially we were made very welcome. hope to spend the coming two months in the district.

Besides the monthly *Bible Class* for workers, we were able to hold a Bible school in Ruttam for a month for the catechists of all the stations. The classes proved very helpful, and were very welcome to the men. I am glad to say that the Mhow men stood well to the front in the examinations, none coming below 50 per cent. in any examination. Some of the new converts we have had in Mhow for a while studying the Word. I also hold a daily class when in the district, which all the Christians with us attend. We hope to be able to continue the Bible school next year for at least three or four months. I can see a steady increase in our Christians, both in their knowledge of the Word and in their spiritual life. And they display a deeper interest in one another and in the heathen round about.

But I must close. Let it be, however, with the earnest prayer that these words may find their way to some hearts who shall be stirred up to do something more to help increase the missionary force in Central India. "The harvest truly is plenteous but the laborers are few."

# REPORT OF THE LADIES' AID SOCIETY.

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We have much pleasure in presenting our fourteenth annual report. From year to year (owing to the nature of things) our reports must necessarily be much alike. During 1894 sixteen meetings were held, with an average attendance of ten.

It is with regret that we again notice the small attendance, showing an apparent lack of interest on the part of the ladies of the congregation. Fuel, food, clothing, and sometimes medicines, have been distributed, and in some cases work has been found for those requiring it Many articles of clothing have been made and sent down to the Elizabeth Street Mission, where they are sold for a very small sum, often below the cost of the material. The plan of putting a small charge on the cast-off clothing, has worked admirably, the articles being eagerly seized upon by the poor women at the Mothers' meetings. One aged member of the congregation is maintained at the Aged Women's Home, and another at the Old Folks' Home.

We cannot close without thanking our many friends who have given us their kind support in so many ways, by their hearty response to appeals for extra collections, by gifts of money, material for work, and cast-off clothing as well as many kindly and encouraging words of sympathy.

We enter cheerfully upon another year, firm in the conviction that those who have supported us in the past will not fail us in the future.

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# REPORT OF THE AUXILIARY OF THE WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSION SOCIETY.

In presenting the Fourteenth Annual Report of the Auxiliary to the congregation, we do so with the feeling that in many ways we are advancing in our work, and becoming more and more interested in this great and noble effort of sending the Saviour's message to benighted lands.

During the past year we have had the privilege of listening to addresses from several lady missionaries, who are at home either on furlough or sick leave, and their words have been heard with interest and profit. These ladies are: Mrs. Spencer Walton, South Africa; (Miss) Dr. Oliver, Indore; Miss Ewart, Bengalore, C. M. S.; Mrs. Fraser Campbell, Ruttam; Miss Glover, South China.

We regret exceedingly that, on account of removal to the western part of the city, our esteemed Vice-President, Mrs. George Robinson, has been obliged to sever her connection with our Church and Society. Also we grieve to mention that several of our members have had long and serious illness and trials in their homes, and two of our number have been called to their well earned rest. We refer to Miss Eliza Wilson and Miss Marion Jennings.

During the year we held 11 meetings, with an average

attendance of 27. In October the usual Thank-offering meeting was observed, when the sum of \$80.47 was realized. In August a box of good clothing and the sum of \$22.50 were sent to the North-West; this is a decided advance on former

donations to the same special call.

We have at present on the roll 80 members, 40 of whom belong to the General Society, 5 to the Auxiliary, 23 are on the Life Membership list, two having been recently added, namely, Miss Annie Cameron, our worthy teacher at Prince Albert, in the North-West, who became one through the kindness of one of our members; and Miss McEwen through the kindness of her brother-in-law, Mr. Sherin, in loving memory of his wife, who was lately called to her home. We have also 12 Scattered Helpers, who, though not often present at the regular meetings, aid in a very material way through their

We have during the year gathered \$264.05, which is a decided increase over previous years. 94 members take the

# REPORT OF THE YOUNG PEOPLES' SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR.

In this respect we have been more fortunate than in former years, as the number of changes has been much less, consequently the study of the music for the service of praise has proceeded steadily throughout the year. In compliance with the request of our pastor and the music committee, we have lately procured a selection of simple hymn-anthems, specially adapted to the evangelical character of the evening services. We hope that they may prove useful in supplementing the efforts of our pastor in increasing the interest in the services of the church. While the anthems sung by the choir alone have been carefully prepared, the efforts of the choir have been specially directed towards the continued improvement of the congregational singing. The effect of a united congregation entering heartily into the service of praise is a devotional force which should be earnestly cultivated by all who have the interest of the church at heart.

The loss of our choir leader for the past eight years, Mr. A. T. Cringan, is a subject for great regret. His relations with the members have always been harmonious, and he never spared himself in the cause of church or choir, being ever anxious to assist the members of the choir, whenever it lay in his power.

## REPORT OF ELIZABETH STREET MISSION WORKERS' ASSOCIATION.

(EMBRACING ALL ITS BRANCHES.)

Those interested in the spiritual prosperity of our Mission have marked with joy the indications of awakened interest apparent in all our services. The best of all is that the Lord has been putting the seal of His approval on the work. He has permitted us to do a little reaping, and within the past year some souls have come out into the light.

### SABBATH SCHOOL.

The officers and teachers of the Elizabeth Street Mission Sabbath School have great pleasure in presenting their four-

teenth annual report to the congregation.

In the kind providence of God we have been brought to the close of another year of service for our Lord and Master. When we look back over the year's work, we are conscious of failings and short-comings, and we have to say that we have been unprofitable servants. Our earnest prayer and heart's desire is for an outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon us as teachers and scholars, and that the new year upon which we are entering may prove to be the best year of work for the Master we have ever had in the history of our School.

About the 1st of May, Mr. Sampson, with two other teachers and their scholars (including a class of young men who are still with us), came to us from the Edward Street Mission, and although Mr. Sampson and his class have left us to go to the Union Mission, we think it but fair to say, that while with us he was a great help to our school by his kind

words and good advice.

We have had, as a Mission, our usual summer outing to Victoria Park, on the 5th of July, when a very enjoyable day was spent by old and young. The usual Christmas entertainment was held on Friday, the 28th December, at which we had a good magic lantern exhibition, consisting of a number of views of mission work in Honan, China, etc., all of which were fully explained by the Rev. Jonathan Goforth, Missionary from China. For this exhibition of views we are very much indebted to our kind friend Mr. C. B. Petry. We also wish to return our sincere thanks to all the friends who have helped us with donations of money and provisions, and books for prizes. The state of the roll book shows that we have advanced in numbers compared with last year. Number of scholars on the roll, 180; number of officers and teachers, 24; average attendance of scholars, 94; average attendance of teachers, 22; total average attendance, 116.

While we have not realized the in-gathering of any souls for Christ, we know that a favorable impression has been made

on several of our scholars.

About 100 volumes have been added to the library during e year.

The collections taken in the school amount to \$56.74, being an average of \$1.09 per Sabbath.

Every Thursday evening, from seven to eight o'clock, a class for workers is held for the purpose of instructing the workers on "How to deal personally with inquirers."

#### COTTAGE MEETINGS.

The Cottage Meetings held at Mrs. Wilson's, 153 Centre Avenue, are, we are sorry to say, not so well attendance as they might be, but though few in point of numbers, still the interest and attention maintained throughout is encouraging.

We should very much like to hold another Cottage meeting in the neighborhood of Elizabeth Street. We know there are many open doors if there were any who would volunteer to conduct the meeting. This is an excellent opportunity for those who wish to engage in practical work.

#### MOTHERS' MEETING.

In presenting the fourteenth annual report of our Mothers' meeting the workers are thankful to our Heavenly Father, for all the blessings he has given us in the past year.

Every Friday afternoon we study God's Word, and in prayer and praise we receive God's blessing, and many answers to prayer. We are glad to see such attention and seriousness in the faces of the women, showing the power of the Holy Spirit present with us.

We have our testimony meeting once a month, and the women love to tell how real the Lord Jesus is to them, a Counsellor and Friend, especially in times of trouble and distress.

We wish we could put in print all our hearts feel in thankfulness to the Ladies' Aid Society, for all their kindness to us in our weekly teas, our warm quilts, our well-made warm garments, for the cast-off clothing given us, giving warmth and comfort to many a mother and her children, and helping the children to attend the Sunday School. The aged women are very grateful for the coal sent them.

We had our annual Good Friday afternoon social when our dear Pastor, and Rev. Mr. Patterson spoke to us, telling

us how to live better lives.
