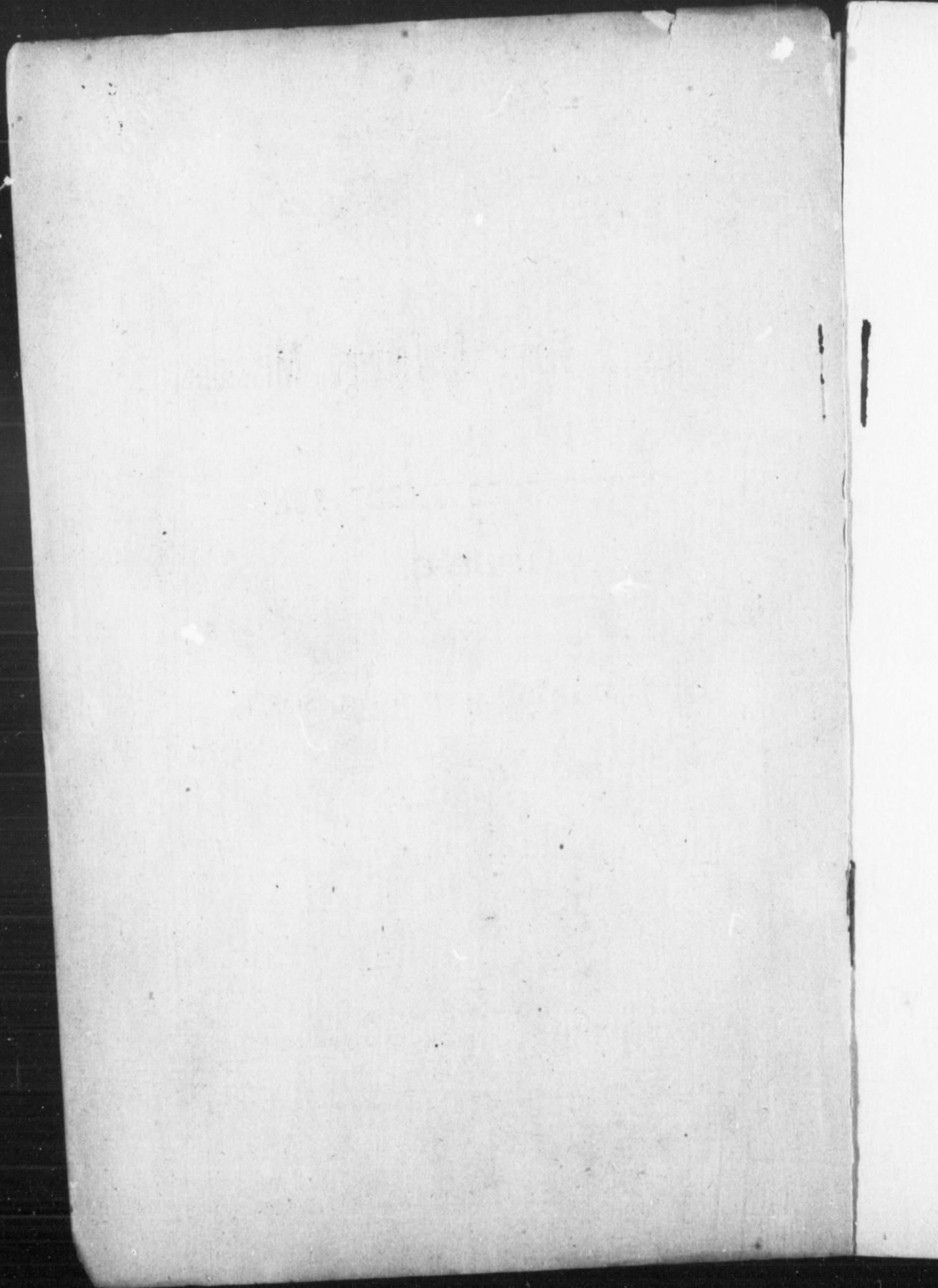

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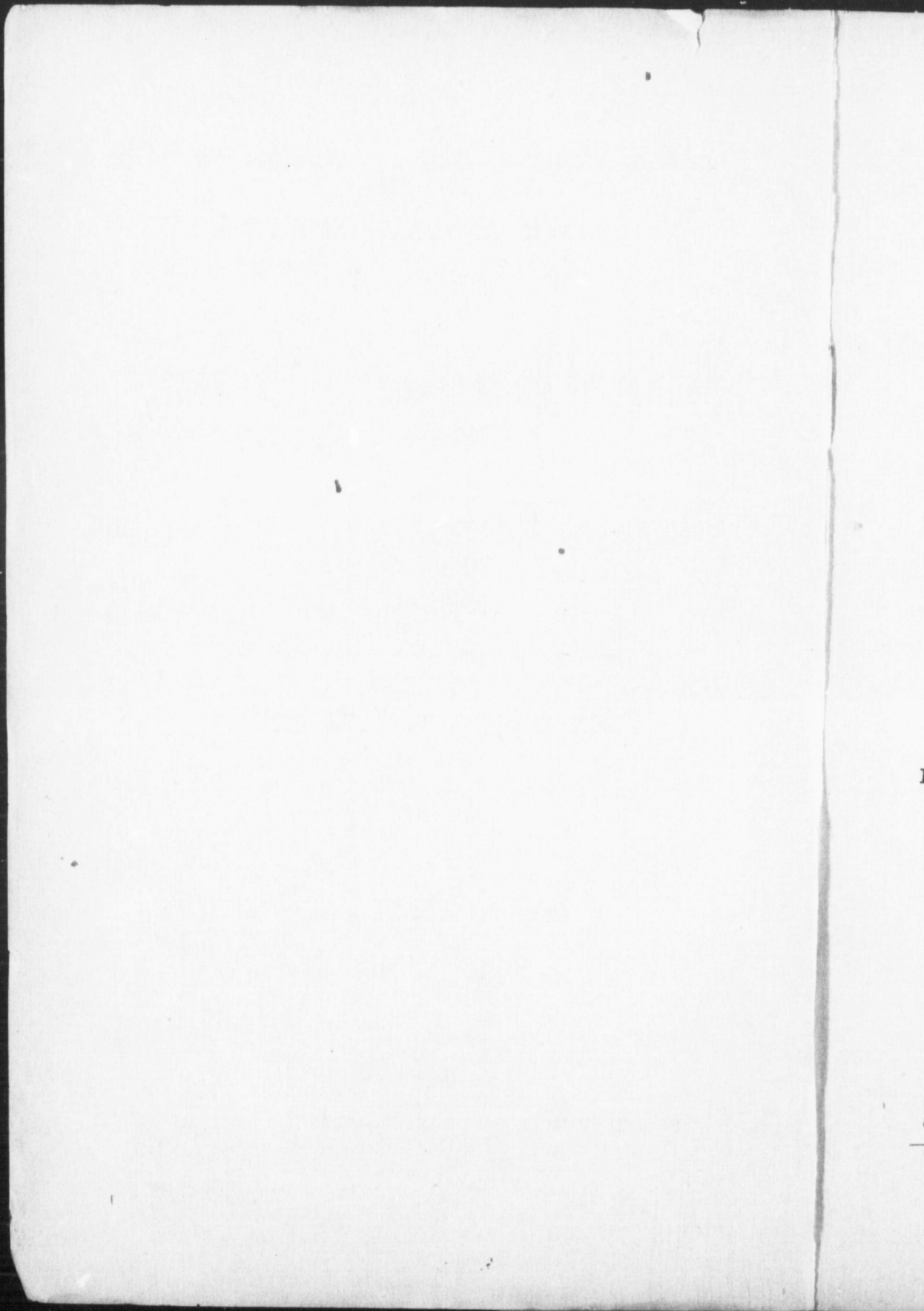

BYE-LAWS

OF THE

BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

1st. At all the meetings of the Board or its Committees, before entering upon business, the "appointed prayers" shall be said.

2nd. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be Chairman of the Board, and the Very Rev. the Dean and the Archdeacon of Nova Scotia shall be, *ex officio*, Vice-Chairmen. There shall be also a Secretary, an Assistant Secretary and a Treasurer.

3rd. The Board shall consist of the Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, and the Treasurer of the Board, who shall fill the same offices in the Committees; of all Clergymen licensed by the Bishop of the Diocese, together with twenty Laymen to be chosen by the Diocesan Synod. At each ordinary meeting of the Synod one-half of the whole number of lay members of the Board shall go out of office, but they or any of them shall be eligible for re-election; the new members, having been proposed, seconded and elected by ballot, shall be placed at the bottom of the list. No one shall be elected a member of the Board who is not an annual contributor to its funds of at least one dollar.

4th. The Board shall meet monthly during the year, with the exception of August and September, seven being a quorum for the transaction of business; and a general meeting thereof shall be held annually in July, or at the time of meeting of the Synod, to which matters may be referred from the ordinary meetings of the Board, and such appeals addressed as have hitherto been allowed to the general meeting of members of the D. C. S. A special meeting may be called at any time by the Chairman, or, in his absence, by a Vice-Chairman.

5th. The members of the Church in every part of the Province are invited to co-operate with the Board, by forming Local Committees under the direction of their respective clergymen, either in each Mission or Parish or in more than one Mission or Parish united, as shall be deemed most convenient, and in strict accordance with the designs and Rules of the Board.

6th. The following objects shall more particularly engage the attention of the Board as soon as its means may enable it to afford such attention :

- 1.—Provision for Clergymen.
- 2.—Missionary visits to neglected and destitute places, under the direction of the Bishop.
- 3.—Assistance to the Endowment of Parishes.
- 4.—Assistance to the erection and enlargement of Churches and Chapels belonging to the Church of England in peculiar or extreme cases.
- 5.—Supplies of Books and Tracts published by the Society for promoting Christian Knowledge, and such other Books and Tracts in strict conformity with the principles of the Church of England, as having been first carefully examined and approved by a Committee of Revision to be appointed by the Board, shall then have received the approval of the Board ; and lastly, the written approbation of the Bishop.
- 6.—Assistance to the erection of Parsonage Houses.
- 7.—Assistance to deserving young men desirous of being qualified for the Ministry of the Church, but requiring aid in pursuing their studies at the Collegiate Establishment at Windsor.
- 8.—Aid to Sunday and other Schools in which due attention is paid to instruction in the principles of the Church of England.
- 9.—Encouragement to the instruction and training of respectable Teachers for Sunday and Daily Schools.
- 10.—Upholding by all possible and proper means, the Collegiate Establishment at Windsor.
- 11.—It shall also be one of the objects of the Board to provide for the Widows and Orphans of deceased Clergymen, and for Superannuated and incapacitated Clergymen ; but no part of the funds shall be appropriated to these objects, except such as shall be specifically given and paid for these objects.

To these objects, generally, the contributions will be applied ; while those who desire it may have their individual contribution scrupulously confined to any one or more of these objects.

7th. The accounts of the Board shall be closed on the 31st December in each year, and shall be audited in one month from the time by auditors to be appointed by the Board.

8th. None of the above Bye-Laws shall be altered, except at an Ordinary Meeting of the Synod ; and a full year's notice of a proposal to change any of them must be given previous to the meeting at which the proposed alteration is to be effected.

Prayers

O, God, from Whom all holy desires, all good counsels, and all works of piety and charity do proceed, we beseech Thee to visit with Thy favor our Sovereign Lady, Queen Victoria; and so to rule her heart that she may in all things seek Thy honour and glory. Prosper with Thy blessing our missionary work. Comfort with Thy Grace those benefactors who contribute to its support. Bless the ministry of Thy servants, the clergy; and the endeavours of all who are engaged in promoting the knowledge of true religion. And may Thy Holy Spirit direct all our consultations to the advancement of Thy Glory and the good of Thy Church, through JESUS CHRIST our LORD. *Amen.*

(Board of Home Missions only.)

O LORD JESUS CHRIST, Who at thy first coming didst send Thy messenger to prepare Thy way before Thee, grant that the ministers and stewards of Thy mysteries may likewise so prepare and make ready Thy way by turning the hearts of the disobedient to the wisdom of the just, that at Thy second coming to judge the world, we may be found an acceptable people in Thy sight, Who livest and reignest with the FATHER and the HOLY SPIRIT, ever one GOD, world without end. *Amen.*

(Board of Foreign Missions only.)

Almighty God, who, by thy Son JESUS CHRIST, didst give commandment to the Holy Apostles that they should go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature, grant to us whom Thou hast called into Thy Church a ready will to obey Thy Word, and fill us with a hearty desire to make Thy way known upon earth, Thy saving health among all nations. Look with compassion upon the heathen that have not known Thee, and on the multitudes that are scattered abroad as sheep having no shepherd. O Heavenly FATHER, LORD of the harvest, have respect we beseech Thee, to our prayers, and send forth laborers into Thine harvest.

Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

"It shall also be one of the objects of the Board of Home Missions to provide for the Widows and Orphans of deceased clergymen, but no part of the funds shall be appropriated to this object except such as shall be specifically given and paid into the Synod therefor."

1st. In accordance with the above, the Board of Home Missions will open a special account for this object, to be called the Widows' and Orphans' Fund. This fund shall be formed, and consist of all subscriptions, donations, legacies, and other contributions given and paid to the Synod for this special object, and of all premiums received under these Rules, and of all benefits arising therefrom; and this fund shall be held and applied to and for this particular object, and none other.

2nd. A Standing Committee of seven members shall be appointed, in whom, together with the Secretary of the Board of Home Missions (who shall be paid as Secretary of this Committee,) shall be vested the whole management of this matter, subject to an appeal to the general Society.

3rd. The Diocesan Synod undertakes to pay out of this Widows' and Orphans' Fund the pensions which become due under the following Rules.

4th. Every Clergyman of the Church of England within the Diocese wishing to avail himself of the benefits of this fund shall, within one year from taking Orders, or from his admission into the Diocese, apply to the Secretary for a Certificate of Pension, and shall pay the annual sum or premium therefor as hereafter mentioned.

5th. Any applicant after such period or time shall only be permitted to receive such Certificate at the option of the Committee, and upon such terms as they shall direct.

6th. The following shall be the rate of the yearly sum or premium payable by every Clergyman applying for a Certificate, according to his age at the date of his first application.

7th. Every clergyman upon the Fund is required to make at least one collection annually in its behalf.

8th. If any clergyman marry the second time, he shall pay the annual sum or premium for the age he may be when he marries the second time.

9th. Upon payment of the first sum or premium the applicant shall receive a Certificate, as hereafter mentioned, and the same sum shall be paid by him, up to the time of his death, on the first day of January in each year.

10th. If any person fail to pay the amount of his premium within 40 days after the payment becomes due, all claim to the pension under his Certificate shall be forfeited, and the same shall thereupon become null and void; but if he desires to have his claim to the pension renewed it shall be in the power of this Committee to re-admit him on such terms as they see fit.

11th. Removal of the clergyman from this Diocese, except in the case of any clergyman who shall become a missionary of the Board of Foreign Missions of this Diocese, or who undertakes work in Algoma while a Missionary Diocese, forfeits all claim to the pension. Seventy-five per cent. of the amount of premiums paid by the holder of the Certificate himself shall be returned to him upon the surrender of his Certificate.

12th. If any clergyman shall go beyond the limits of Europe, or of North America 35° North latitude, without the leave of the Committee, he shall forfeit all claim to the pension.

13th. The widow of every clergyman who shall have paid the annual sum or premium (subject to the above exceptions) shall receive a pension of \$100 per annum during widowhood.

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14th. If at any time it is the opinion of the Committee that the state of the funds will safely warrant their so doing, they shall have power to increase the amount of the pensions.

15th. If the widow die or marry again, the child or children of her deceased husband shall receive the pension. But no part of the pension shall be received by those children who have arrived at the age of sixteen years, if males, or eighteen years, if females; while those who are still under those respective ages will receive the full amount of the pension.


16th. If the wife die before the husband, his child or children shall at his death receive the pension, under the above limitation as to ages.

17th. The pension shall be payable half-yearly, on the 1st day of January and the 1st day of July in each year, and shall commence on the first of these days which shall happen after the decease of such person holding a Certificate, and terminate on the first of those days which shall happen after the death of the widow or child, or the happening of any other event by which, under these Rules, such pension, is to cease.

18th. The Clergy of Prince Edward Island shall be entitled to participate in the benefit of this fund on equal terms with the Clergy of this Province.

19th. The Certificate to be granted shall be in the following form, under the seal of the Synod and the signature of the Secretary; and on the back thereof or annexed thereto shall be printed the above Rules.

27th. None of the above Rules or Regulations shall be altered except at a regular meeting of the Synod, after a full year's notice of the proposed change.

 The Widows' and Orphans' Committee do not consider the Fund responsible for the payment of a larger pension than the \$100 named in the Certificate.

Superannuation Fund Rules.

"It shall be one of the objects of the Board of Home Missions to provide for superannuated and incapacitated Clergymen; but no part of the funds shall be appropriated to this object except such as shall be specifically given and paid into the Synod therefor."

1st.—In accordance with the above, the Board of Home Missions will open a special account for this object, to be called "The Superannuation Fund." This Fund shall be formed and consist of all subscriptions, legacies and other contributions given and paid to the Synod for this special object, and of all benefits arising therefrom; and this Fund shall be held and applied to and for this object, and none other.

2nd.—A Standing Committee of Six Laymen shall be appointed, in whom, together with the Bishop of the Diocese as chairman, shall be vested the whole management of this Fund.

3rd.—The Diocesan Synod undertakes to pay from the proceeds of this Fund the pensions which may become due under the following Rules.

4th.—Any Clergyman of the Church of England within this Diocese wishing to participate in the benefits of this Fund shall make application to the Committee, who shall decide each case upon its own merits, and have power to grant such amount of pension (not exceeding \$200) as they think expedient. But should the Committee refuse to grant the pension an appeal may be made by the applicant to the General Meeting of the Board.

5th.—No Clergyman admitted from abroad into this Diocese shall receive any benefit from this Fund unless he shall have served for at least seven consecutive years in this Diocese, or shall have paid into this Fund a sum to be named by the Committee.

6th.—The pension shall be for life, unless circumstances should arise (either from the falling off of the Fund or otherwise) which may make a revision necessary.

7th.—If the pensioner reside out of this Diocese, sufficient proof of his identity should accompany each draft for his pension.

7th.—The pensions shall be paid half yearly in advance, on the first of January and the first of July in each year, and shall commence on the

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first of those days that shall happen after the pension is granted, and terminate on the first of those days that shall happen after the death of the pensioner, or the happening of any other event by which such pension is to cease.

9th.—If any pensioner should be so far relieved from his disability as to be able to resume the discharge of Clerical duty, the pension shall be suspended during his relief from such disability.

10th.—None of the above Rules or Regulations shall be altered except at an ordinary meeting of the Synod, after a full year's notice of the proposed change.

Endowment Rules.

The following Rules for the guidance of the Endowment Committee were adopted May 17, 1850 :—

1st. The investment of Endowments may be made in lands, houses, stock in banks or other companies, money invested in mortgages or other securities, to be approved of by the Endowment Committee, and to be conveyed and held for the benefit of the Incumbent or resident Missionary for the time being of any Parish or Mission for which they are designed, the said Incumbent or resident Missionary to receive the yearly proceeds only of the interests or rents arising from such Endowment.

2nd. The conveyance of trust of such Endowment may be made either to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel or to the Church Corporation of the Parish or to the Diocesan Synod.

3rd. When real property is purchased and conveyed for Endowment it shall be free from any debt or incumbrance.

4th. The annual proceeds arising from such Endowment shall be withheld from any Incumbent or resident Missionary of any Parish or Mission who may be suspended by the Bishop of the Diocese from performing public services in the churches in his Parish or Mission during the continuance of such suspension.

5th. The Endowment Committee shall hold any sum contributed toward the endowment of any Parish or Mission in trust for such Parish or Mission, and obtain such a rate of interest for the money as may be practicable, consistent with safety, until an opportunity shall arise of investing it for the permanent endowment of such Parish or Mission; and if, in the judgment of the Endowment Committee, such opportunity

or proposition for endowment shall come within the true intent and scope of the foregoing regulations, they shall authorize the said sums to be paid to the Parish or Mission so applying for it.

6th. If any difficulty shall arise as to whether any opportunity or proposition for endowment be agreeable to the foregoing rules, or if any other point relative thereto should be disputed or doubted, the question shall be referred to the General Meeting of the Board, at their meeting then ensuing.

7th. All applications from any Parish or Mission to the Endowment Committee for aid shall be signed by the Rector and Church Wardens of such Parish, or by the resident Missionary, accompanied by a resolution of the Local Committee of the Board of Home Missions in its favor in such Mission; and shall state the nature, situation, value and annual profits of the investment desired to be made, the names of those in whose behalf it is to be made, the office where it should be registered, the sums that are contributed for its purchase, and all other particulars which may enable the Endowment Committee to form a correct judgment; all such applications to be made to the Secretary of Board of Home Missions, who is, *ex officio*, Secretary of the Endowment Committee.

The Endowment Committee, in a Report May 11th, 1863, made the following recommendations:—

“That while no restriction is made as to the sum which a Parish may withdraw from its ‘*Reserved Fourths*’ and invest as heretofore, yet that \$1000 be the minimum to which they should amount before they can be placed in trust with the Board, and the interest be payable to the Incumbent.”

“With reference to the control of the Board over the *Reserved Fourths* the Committee state that they have no wish to interfere in any way with the rights of the Parishes to manage their own property. They would merely, for the better security of this Fund for the support of the Clergy, recommend—That a rule be adopted which would require that, when an investment made by any Parish from its *Reserved Fourths* may be paid off, the money be returned to this Board to be held under the same rules and on the same terms as before, until such time as the Parish may be able to procure another satisfactory investment.”

The first recommendation was adopted; the second is still under consideration.

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RULES AND REGULATIONS.

CLAUSE 1.—Where there is no special condition, all grants shall be made for three years from the first of the month preceding or following the date; yet the Board may, for what it considers good and sufficient reasons, discontinue a grant after six months' notice. In every case the grants shall cease at the expiration of the three years, unless renewed at least six months before their termination.

CLAUSE 2.—All Parishes or Missions receiving aid from the Board shall, by their Wardens or other representatives, pay into the funds of the Board, through the Secretary, at least one month before the 31st March, 30th June, 30th September, and 30th December in each year, such amount as may by mutual consent be arranged between themselves and the Board; provided always, that the Board, if in any case it is satisfied that half-yearly payments would be more for the interests of all parties concerned than quarterly, may frame their agreement with the Parish accordingly.

CLAUSE 3.—At the beginning of every quarter—to wit, on 1st April 1st July, 1st October, 1st January—the Secretary shall accept the order of the Missionary for the preceding quarter's salary as agreed upon jointly by the two contracting parties. But where half-yearly payments have been allowed, the Secretary, at the expiration of the six months, if the amount due from the people has not been paid up, shall only accept the order for the amount of the Society's grant for that period.

CLAUSE 4.—When a Parish or Mission fails to make its regular remittances when due, the Secretary shall at once make enquiries by letter, or, if thought necessary, shall visit in person, or a deputation may be sent, to enquire into the cause of such default, and report to the Board. Should the amount due from the Parish not be paid within three months from the date at which it becomes due under the agreement with the Board the grant shall cease, and it shall be the duty of the Treasurer to make no further payments; nor shall the grant be renewed until the arrears due at the time of the cessation be paid up.

CLAUSE 5.—The aim of the Board is, and it should be that of the Missions themselves, to make the Missions as quickly as possible self-sustaining, in order that the funds of the Boards may be applied to the opening of new Missions and to the extension of the work throughout the Diocese.

CLAUSE 6.—In furtherance of the objects of the Board it requires that each of its Missionaries shall take care that every eligible person within their respective Missions be solicited to contribute to the General Fund of the Board, and that quarterly returns of the amount of such contributions shall be made by the Missionary to the Secretary in Halifax.

CLAUSE 7.—The Board, for reasons which it shall deem good, may allow a Parish or Mission to pay a certain specified amount of their Incumbent's salary in kind, at *Cash* prices, and his receipt for the sum in the form of a bill of items, shall be counted by the Wardens or Representatives towards making up the amount to be paid by the Parish or Mission; and may also allow the receipt of the clergyman for money given at the offertory to be received from the Wardens as part of the conditional payment required by the Board from the people.

Churches.

Every application for aid in the erection of a church must contain the following information :—

- 1.—The precise situation, especially with reference to the nearest Church, and to the amount of population within five miles of the Church.
- 2.—The title of the ground on which the building is to be erected.
- 3.—The size of the building, the numbers it can accommodate and probable amount of the congregation that will usually attend it.
- 4.—The proposed cost of the building, the progress it has made towards completion, and the amount of contributions on the spot in money or labor.
- 5.—The frequency and regularity of the proposed services in the Church.
- 6.—That all the sittings are to be free and unappropriated.

It is the wish of the Board of Home Missions that no clergyman should when building a Church, rely upon aid from the Board without first ascertaining whether it is in the power of the Board to grant any assistance.

All grants to Churches are made on the following terms, namely; That the first moiety be called for within one year, and the second within

two years, from the date of the grant. The first moiety may be obtained when the exterior is finished, and the second when the interior is finished. Grants to Parsonages are made on similar conditions.


The Endowment Committee receive and hold any money given in trust for Church purposes, and pay over the annual interest arising from the same when invested towards the furtherance of the special object for which it was given.

All donations of Ten Pounds and upwards are funded, and the interest only applied to the general purposes of the Board.

The Board will not make its usual grant toward the payment of an Assistant Missionary appointed to a separate cure unless the people there consent to pay *toward the Endowment Fund of their Parish or Mission* all the proceeds of whatever glebe lands may be in that Parish.

All subscription lists received before the 31st December in each year will appear in the next forthcoming Report, while those received after that date shall be omitted.

If the reservations and special donations are not mentioned at the time when the contributions are sent in from the Local Committees, the whole amount will be considered as devoted to the general interests of the Board.

 The attention of the Local Committees, is particularly requested to the above regulations.

All applications for aid from this Board are proposed at one meeting of the Board and considered at the next.

No person shall be qualified to vote at any general meeting of the Board, nor to be elected a member, who has not been a subscriber for three months preceding the day of meeting.

At the General Meeting in 1869, the following resolution was adopted :

The Church property in any Parish which is actually occupied by the Incumbent of the said Parish shall be valued by competent valuers upon his taking charge, and be considered at the same value for salary during his incumbency ; and the valuers shall be appointed as follows, viz. : one by the Parish, one by the Board of Home Missions, and another by those two.

AN ACT to vest in the Diocesan Synod of Nova Scotia the Funds held by the D. C. S.

Whereas, At a meeting of the D. C. S. held in the month of July, 1876, it was resolved, &c., &c.

And whereas, At the General Session of Diocesan Synod of Nova Scotia, held in the same month, the said resolution was adopted by the Synod :

And whereas, It is considered expedient, in order to carry such resolution into effect, that an Act be passed to vest in the said Diocesan Synod of Nova Scotia all and other property held in trust by or for the said D. C. S.

Be it therefore enacted by the Governor, Council, and Assembly as follows :

1. All property, real and personal, held by or in trust for the D. C. S., or other funds respectively connected therewith, are hereby declared to have become vested in the Diocesan Synod of N. S. in trust, to be held and managed for the several purposes for which they have heretofore been held and managed by the D. C. S. as fully and effectually as the same were previously vested in or held in trust for said D. C. S.
2. The said Synod shall be bound to fulfil all engagements made by the said Society previous to such transfer, and to observe all the conditions under which the several funds may have been held in trust by the said Society.
3. In all cases where moneys of D. C. S. have been loaned on mortgage in this Province for the benefit of any trust funds in connection with said Society and in all like cases it shall and may be lawful, in case of the payments of the amounts due on such mortgages, for the said Synod to discharge such mortgages by writing under their seal, and thereby the mortgagees, their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, shall be fully discharged from all further liability on account of such mortgages.
4. The receipt of the treasurer of the Synod shall be a sufficient discharge to the Treasurer of the said Society for all monies and securities transferred by him.

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2. The annual deduction of £100 stg. which the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel intend to make from the amount of their present grant, (which has been transferred by them to a sub-committee of the Diocesan Church Society,) shall be made good out of the proceeds of this Fund, so that the said grant shall be kept up and maintained in its full integrity, at the sum which may be required, for the purpose of paying all the Rectors and Missionaries who shall be on the list of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, on the day when this Fund shall go into operation, the full amount of the salaries to which they may on that day be entitled from the said Society.

3. Whenever and as often as any of the Rectors or Missionaries on the said list on the day above named shall die, or from any cause shall cease to be entitled to receive the salaries to which they were at that time entitled, out of the said grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, then the said grant is no longer to be kept up at its former amount, by contribution from this Fund as will suffice for the payment to those Rectors and Missionaries still living, and entitled to receive the same salaries from this Fund. And every new Rector or Missionary, appointed in their places, shall be paid out of the annual proceeds of this Fund a yearly sum, according to the class and scale arranged for that purpose, and herein contained.

4. In like manner, whenever and as often as any of the present Rectors or Missionaries, now on the Government list and paid by it, shall die, or cease to be entitled to be so paid, then every new Rector or Missionary appointed in his place to any parish or mission shall be paid out of the annual proceeds of this Fund, according to the same class and scale; and whereas there are some parishes and missions of which the incumbents are not paid either by the Government or by the S. P. G., the said incumbents and their successors shall be on an equality, in respect to their claims upon this Fund, with the successors of the Clergymen now upon the lists of the Government or of the S. P. G.,—it being understood that "parishes" shall have always the first claim upon this Fund, except on all questions under Clause No. 8, which shall still be decided by seniority of appointment, as there provided.

5. If from any unforeseen cause, the present grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, subject to the present reduction of one hundred pounds (£100) stg. a year, should fail, or if the present provision by Government for certain Missionaries should not be continued (neither of which contingencies it is fully believed will occur, and are only hereby provided for "ex abundanti cautela") then in such case, the annual proceeds of this fund shall, according to their means, be appropriated towards the payment of the old Rectors and Missionaries, whether on the Government list or on that of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and of the other Rectors and Missionaries claiming under this Prospectus, rateably by an equal per centage deduction from the old

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salaries and new allowances, under Clauses Nos. 3 and 4, as the state of the Fund may require and will permit.

6. If the annual proceeds of this Fund after providing for the payment of fifty-one claimants according to Clauses Nos. 3 and 4, should exceed the amount required for fully carrying out the proposed scheme, then, in the first place, the surplus shall be devoted to the payment of additional Clergymen, under the same classification and at the same rates, and preserving as nearly as may be the same proportionate numbers in each class as are herein prescribed. But if at any time the income of this Fund shall exceed what is necessary for the fifty-one payments now provided for, and such additional payment as may hereafter be agreed on, and there shall be no need nor opportunity of adding to the number of Clergymen to be paid out of this Fund by any further sub-divisions of parishes, then such surplus shall be applied to increase the allowance to each Clergyman, "pro rata."

7. The subjoined scale is that referred to in Clauses 3 and 4. It provides for fifty-one Clergymen, and is based upon carefully prepared calculations, so that reliance may be placed upon the capabilities of the Fund to supply the payments proposed for the respective classes.

The Clergymen are to be divided into three classes :

CLASS 1 will contain twenty-one Clergymen, who must have officiated in this Province more than fifteen years, who are to receive £75 Currency per annum.

CLASS 2 will contain fifteen Clergymen, who must have officiated in this Province more than five years, who are to receive each £50 Currency per annum.

CLASS 3 will contain fifteen Clergymen, who are to receive each £30 Currency per annum.

9. All removals from one class to another must depend not only upon the standing of the individuals, but also on vacancies in the upper classes. If at any time there shall be more Clergymen holding appointments within the Province than the number for whom provision is made in clause 7, or by the Committee under the conditions of clause 6, then admission to class 3 must also depend upon vacancies in that class,—the seniority of original appointment in this Province deciding the question. The standing of any Clergyman who, after leaving this Diocese, except on account of ill health, shall return to it again, shall be reckoned from his appointment to a parish or mission on his return, and any previous service shall not be reckoned. If any clergyman officiating in this Province shall cease to hold any parochial or missionary appointment, but shall not leave the Diocese, and after an interval shall again be appointed to any parish or mission, he shall take his place upon the lists in the position in which he stood when he ceased to officiate, as soon as a vacancy shall occur in the class to which he belonged.

9. Every Clergyman applying for his salary under this scheme must furnish proof that provision has been made by those to whom he ministers for the payment to him of at least one hundred pounds (£100) currency for the past year, or at least fifty pounds (£50) currency for the past half year.

NOTE.—This amount may be made up from local endowments, from the subscriptions of his congregations, from pew rents, or from any other source (except from this Fund), and may include the fair estimated yearly value of the Glebe or Parsonage, if any. This estimate shall be settled by the Committee, and every care shall be taken to arrive at a just and equitable conclusion.

10. The application of the Clergymen shall be made annually or semi-annually to the Secretary of the Church Endowment Committee. It shall state the number of years' service in this Province of the party applying, and contain a solemn declaration, either by himself or by the Churchwardens, or by three members of the Vestry, that the amount guaranteed by the parish has been actually and "bona fide" subscribed. Upon this application, with such statement and declaration, the Treasurer of the Fund shall be authorized by the Chairman to pay to the applicant the amount to which he is entitled by his length of service.

11. On the expiration of eighteen months from the commencement of his incumbency or mission, and at the end of each half year thereafter, the application of the Clergyman shall be accompanied by a certificate that the whole of the subscription for the year preceeding the last six months has been "bona fide" paid. And if such certificate be not furnished, he shall nevertheless be paid the amount then due from this Fund, but he shall not be entitled to any further payment so long as he shall remain in the same cure until he be again enabled to, and do certify that the payments due under the agreement with his people are not more than six months in arrear.

12. It is proposed that the sum of forty thousand pounds (£40,000) currency shall be raised, but if this amount be not realized, then the payment of each class of Missionaries will be reduced "pro rata"; and his scheme is not to go into operation until at least twenty thousand pounds (£20,000) shall have been subscribed and paid into the hands of the Treasurer. It is hoped, however, not only that the sum of £40,000 will be subscribed, but that by judicious management it will so accumulate as to secure a provision for the increase of parishes, missions and missionaries in this Province.

13. As this Fund is raised with a view to the support of the Ministry in places where a sufficient provision for the clergyman cannot be procured without assistance, it is to be understood that no Clergyman receiving an income of two hundred and fifty pounds (£250) currency and upwards

per annum, from any of the sources mentioned in the note to clause 9, shall be entitled to any payment from this Fund,

14. No Missionary receiving any portion of this stipend from any Society in England, at the time when this Fund goes into operation, shall receive any payment from this Fund, except such as is secured to him under clauses 2, 3, 4 and 5, so long as he continues to receive the payment from such Society in England

The foregoing Prospectus was accepted and adopted at the Annual General Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society, at Halifax, on the 12th day of October, 1860; and the following gentleman were appointed the Committee to carry the Church Endowment Fund into effect:—Hon. M. B. Almon, Hon. Mr. Justice Bliss, A. M. Uniacke, Esq., D. C. L., Hugh Hartshorne, Esq., D. C. L., A. M. Cochran, Esq., M. P. P., C. B. Bowman, Esq., C. H. Harris, Esq., Q.C., W. C. NINTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

The Board of Home Missions, in again presenting its yearly Report to the Synod, would humbly express its sincere thankfulness to Almighty God for His merciful protection and guidance during the past year, and for the success which has attended the labours of the Clergy in their various Parishes. It is ever to be remembered that the Board of Home Missions, nay that the Church herself, is but a means to an end; that end being the glory of GOD and the salvation of men. In proportion as that object is attained, whatever may be the condition of temporal affairs, the Church may rejoice; and render thanks to Him who alone giveth the increase. The Board believes that indications are not wanting of improvement in our Parishes, and that in the great wave of Spiritual Life which has been manifestly passing over the Church of God, this Diocese has been a sharer.

But while this has been the case, it has been shewn rather in individual instances than in the general result. The amount of contributions to the Board for general purposes falls short of the subscriptions for 1884 by about \$500, which in conjunction with the withdrawal of £450 sterling by the S. P. G., has compelled the Board, in making the new grants in October last for the next 3 years, to fall back upon the Reserve Fund rather than decrease the salaries of the Clergy, already too small, or close any of the present Missions. The Board has done this in the hope that a return of greater prosperity to the county at large will issue in more generous additions to the parish contributions. It cannot be denied that the whole commercial world has been experiencing for several years past an unusually prolonged period of business depression, and that for our fishing harvest the market has been curtailed. That this will to a large extent account for the lowering of the amounts at the Board's disposal, is their conviction. But they trust that better times are at hand.

The Board would strongly urge once more upon the Clergy the

absolute necessity of a personal canvass of every member of the Church. That this is done in some instances in the rural districts is shewn by the long lists of names of contributors. Yet there are parishes in which it is very clear that this is not done; and it has been the subject of remark by those who give liberally in the towns that in some cases the Country parishes do very little for the general funds of the Church. This reproach should be removed.

It is also subject of regret that the collections for the B. H. M. are often left late into the next year. This will surely result sooner or later in the loss of one year's whole subscriptions. The latest time at which the subscriptions should be handed in is Dec. 31st. Few parishes comply with this rule. The Board must again urge the adoption of some very strong measures to secure the collection being made at the right time. This year the Reports for 1885 will be ready for distribution at the time of the meeting of Synod; and it is earnestly hoped that the collections from all the Parishes will be made at the proper period.

Several missions have been unavoidably vacant for some time past, and even the unusual number of Candidates for Holy Orders on Trinity Sunday is insufficient for the supply of all vacancies.

The Statistical returns, of which an abstract is appended, shew the Clergy to have been faithful in the performance of their pastoral work, some of them having travelled more than 3000 miles during the year. They also prove that the obligations of the people towards their Clergy have been, in spite of hard times, promptly met.

The Committee on W. & O. Fund have pleasure in reporting that the benefits of the Fund are becoming gradually appreciated among the Clergy of the Diocese. This year, four Clergymen have been added to the list, and the offertories have been taken in the various parishes with exemplary punctuality. There are still some Parishes not contributing, but they are few.

The widows of deceased Clergy upon the Fund sixteen in number have this year received \$85 for half year ending Dec. 31st, 1885, \$100 for half year ending June 30th, 1886. These payments are made in advance.

Lowry obtained leave of absence for 9 months, to go beyond the limits allowed by the rules; the time has expired, he therefore retires from the Fund. The Committee have decided to allow clergymen who did not take advantage of the Fund on receiving Holy Orders, or on entering the Diocese, to come on the Fund by paying back premiums in instalments.

The Board in making their Annual Report, beg to call attention to the fact that the Treasurer's statement for the year 1885 will shew that although the sums subscribed and collected will be slightly less than last year, yet that more Parishes have contributed. If all the sums collected for Domestic and Foreign Missions were transmitted through the Treasurer instead of some of them being sent direct to the Treasurer of the Central Board, it would make the lists from Nova Scotia shew to better advantage.

There is under the present system of appropriations the disadvantage that in the general Treasurer's accounts there appears a discrepancy between sums actually received and accounted for by the Secretary of this Diocese, and sums acknowledged by the General Treasurer. This arises from the fact that current expenses have to be deducted by our own Treasurer before the sums are remitted to the Central Board. In view of this the Board of Domestic and Foreign Missions would venture to suggest that unless sums are specially desired to be appropriated to special objects by the donors, the Clergy should send them forward for General Purposes of Domestic and Foreign Missions, and allow the appropriations to be made by the Central Board, on which our own Diocese is represented by the Bishop and four delegates.

Returns from Parishes & Extracts from Letters.

ALBION MINES.—Total \$121.78. Increase \$50.24.

This parish is to be congratulated on its large increase this year, especially as it has contributed a considerable sum to Foreign and Domestic Missions.

AMHERST.—Total \$109.35. Increase \$11.71,

Amherst increased its contributions last year \$24.64. This parish receives no aid whatever from money given by any Society, or from the Church Endowment Fund. It is in the fullest sense of the word "self-supporting," there being not even a Glebe or any parish Endowment. During the past year it raised for *Parochial* purposes about \$2350. Amherst has always given liberally too to *outside* objects, and it seems, is determined not to fall behind its former good record.

ANNAPOLIS.—Total \$95.28. Increase \$16.70.

ANTIGONISHE.—Total \$58.05. Increase \$3.43.

ARICHAT.—No returns.

AYLESFORD.—Total \$33.25. Decrease \$6.97.

BADDECK.—Total \$38.22. Increase \$2.96.

BRIDGETOWN.—Total \$44.68. Decrease \$4.32.

I regret to say that the amount is a trifle less than we sent in last year but the times are unusually hard in this part of the world this winter, in fact it seems impossible to collect money for any purpose; the building of our new Church has of course taxed the resources of this poor parish to the utmost.

BRIDGEWATER. Total \$31.45.

Last year we were led to take a hopeful view of matters—this year quite the opposite. All our gold mines are closed, after too great expense, and no profits in any one case. Ship building has been totally suspended, and the lumber mills are closing. One very large mill employing 100 has been finally closed, and several smaller ones. Many have been obliged to leave, and the fishermen having made nothing, the good harvest, and not bad fishing, found such poor markets that money-matters look bad. Yet a new Church has been built at the Bank of Conquerall, and during the Bishop's visit 43 were confirmed. The people are learning to support their minister, and in future each quarter is to be paid for on regular days, and we hope in full.

The services of the year have been very well attended, and the churches have been repaired and improved. Money has been collected to reseat the Church in Bridgewater.

CHESTER.—Total \$57.54. Decrease \$7.80.

DIGBY.—Total \$117.02. Increase \$38.23.

Mr. Ambrose says:—"Digby and Digby Neck Mission, this year, comes within \$39.92 of a Halifax City Parish and Mission last year, whilst the burden of paying off the debt of our new Church is, for our circumstances quite as heavy, to say the least, as those of our city brethren."

FALMOUTH.—Total \$26.25.

This mission now includes Hantsport, Windsor Forks, and New Ross Road. The work is being prosecuted with vigour by Rev. John Harrison,

who has just taken up his residence at Falmouth, and the amount is an earnest of what may be expected in the future.

GLACE BAY.—Total \$36.06. Increase \$4.91.

GRANVILLE.—Total \$50.82. Decrease 38c.

HALIFAX.—BISHOP'S CHAPEL.—Total \$415.15. Increase \$16.56.

GARRISON CHAPEL.—(Friend 50c).

ST. LUKE'S.—Total \$778.33. Increase \$42.46.

This total includes Collection from St. Luke's S. School of \$26.00.

This parish, in addition to large contributions to Foreign and Domestic Missions, has given the following sums to Diocesan Objects: C. W. Mission Association, \$21.17. Falkland, \$100.00. Acadia Mines, \$24.35. Making a grand total to Diocesan purposes of \$923.85.

ST. GEORGE'S.—Total \$110.00. Decrease \$9.00.

This Parish has a heavy burden of debt, which it is trying very hard to extinguish. This year it has expended about \$500 upon parochial objects, besides its contributions to the Missions Funds. But it hopes soon to be able to materially increase its contributions to Home Missions.

ST. MARK'S and ST. JOHN'S.—Total \$151.54. Increase \$11.54.

HUBBARD'S COVE.—Total \$93.25. Increase \$8.75.

LAHAVE.—ST. MATTHEWS.—Total \$35.35.

This is the first contribution from this Parish since it was set off from Lunenburg. We trust that the amount will speedily be increased under the supervision of its energetic missionary.

LIVERPOOL.—Total \$306.22. Increase \$12.09

This parish also sends a good sum for Domestic and Foreign Missions.

LIVERPOOL ROAD.—Total \$43.50. Increase \$3.25.

Mr. DeBlois says:—"I now forward you the sum of \$43.50 from my poor and scattered Mission. Year by year my people have evinced their growing attachment to your Society by increased contributions to its funds. Never yet has that discouraging word "Decrease" been marked against us, but it has ever been our aim to add a little more to each incoming year and so far, by the blessing of God on willing hearts, we have succeeded in so doing. The amount sent represents a great deal of self-sacrifice and self-denial. Surely such acts as these (and in this mission they are not rare) must use as sweet incense before the throne of Him, Who has commended for our example the "Poor Widow's Mites"—who of her penury cast into the Treasury of her Lord, 'all her living, even all that she had.'"

LOCKEPORT.—Total \$55.49.

LUNENBURG.—Total \$338.25.

Mr. Caswall writes:—"It would give us all great pleasure were we able to send a large amount to the Board instead of this nominal sum. But we must do our utmost to fulfil our pledge of \$400 a year to the newly founded Parish of LaHave. Of this we have by repeated efforts of various kinds made up \$325 during the past twelve months, and hope soon to make up the balance. This amount is permitted by resolution of the Board to appear

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in its Report to our credit; thus putting us among the principal contributors to Home Missions in the Diocese. Besides this we have built a new Church at the Blue Rocks Mission for which \$640.46 has been given by *parishioners*, during 1885; (offerings from outside, and offerings previous to and since 1885, not being of course included). We had no choice as to building it or not; for as soon as the Rev. G. D. Harris, the late Curate, had started this enterprise, (two years since), the Presbyterians began to plan to build there too, and were able to complete their Church during the vacancy in the Rectorship. If we were to retain our people in the Church, (and three-quarters of the people are Churchmen, it was essential that a Church should be built without delay. It has just been opened for Divine Service (Jan. 21st, 1886), and will rank as one of the prettiest and most convenient little Churches in the Diocese. Might we not then claim to have given \$978.71 this year to Home Missions?"

MAHONE BAY.—Total \$45.73. Increase \$15.50.

The Secretary regrets the accidental omission in the digest of last year of the amount collected in the Mission of Mahone Bay, and gladly inserts the following letter from the Rector, Rev. Rural-Dean Snyder:

"Considering that without any extraneous aid we pay the whole amount \$600.00 of the Curates salary, purchased, paid for and made ready for consecration last autumn, (at Martin River) a large and suitable piece of ground as a place of burial for the dead, also in addition, raised in cash and subscriptions, (to be paid when called for,) something like \$650.00, with which to commence the erection of a new Church, at the same place, in the early spring, and further expended during the summer and autumn, the sum of \$2579.37 on a large and costly new Church edifice, to take the place of the old Parish Church I think it will be granted that our contributions last year to extra-parochial objects are not altogether discreditable to us as a Parish, containing, it is true, many Church members, but, as a rule, by no means blessed with a superabundance of this world's goods.

MAITLAND.—Total \$80. Decrease \$7.28.

MANCHESTER.—Total \$4.90. Increase 50c.

NEWPORT.—Total \$44.61. Increase \$7.40.

NEW ROSS.—Total \$40.90. Increase \$4.20.

Mr. Groser says: "This Mission is quite peculiar in its circumstances and situation. Being far inland, with no Railway, sea-going or other means of communication with the outside world and its markets, the people have rough long roads to travel, chiefly by the slow jog of ox-teaming, occupying from two to three days going South or North, to dispose of such scanty products as they can raise. It has been a very dull trying season for most of them. With their ordinary personal expenses but half-met, how are they to do much towards salary, offertory, B. H. M. subscriptions, the college &c. The wonder to me is that they manage to do so much, to do it so cheerfully and effectually. It evinces the right disposition. The spirit truly is willing, but the *purse* is weak, weaker than people living in the City have any means of knowing. Besides since I came here over fifty good subscribing and paying Church members have been obliged to go elsewhere to seek work and means of support."

PARRSBORO'.—Total \$44.23. Decrease \$11.66.

PETITE RIVIERE.—Total \$28.34. Decrease \$4.31.

We subjoin the following from Mr. Spencer: "Our list is not so large as men have earned nothing upon which to keep their families during the last year. The reason in many cases is too well known. Many of our fisher-

winter, consequently they could not give. Every eligible person has been asked, while many of those above mentioned have not. The people on the Islands have had many expenses with their new church and this, together with the poor fishing season has prevented them from contributing. I hope next year for better things."

RAWDON.—Total \$51.27. Increase \$11.24.

Mr. Ancient writes:—"I am somewhat later than usual in getting it in, but am thankful to say we have made a considerable advance upon last year.

RIVER JOHN.—Total \$5.15

This amount was handed to the Secretary by Mr. James Gossip, to whom it had been forwarded by a parishioner.

SALMON RIVER.—Total \$62.84. Increase \$29.36.

SACKVILLE.—Total \$52.17. Increase \$14.93.

SHELBURNE.—Total \$81.17. Decrease \$14.19.

SEAFORTH.—Total \$33.43. Increase \$5.34.

SHIP HARBOUR.—Total \$62.69. Decrease \$5.86.

ST. MARGARËT'S BAY.—Total \$45.88. Increase \$15.79.

Mr. Brown writes:—"This has been the result of a *personal* canvas. You know, perhaps, that there has been an exodus for some years past from this Parish. Numbers of strong steady and industrious men have earned only from \$20 to \$50 during the past year. Some days, after paying from 10 to 20 visits, I have returned home with less than \$1.00 in pocket for B. H. M. I hope next year we may do better.

TANGIER.—Total \$75.83. Decrease \$16.51.

TRURO.—Total \$149.85. Increase \$4.33.

I am happy to be able to report that we have this year, as last, increased the amount of our subscriptions to the B. H. Missions. I was afraid at first that as we had given more largely, than we had ever previously given to extra-parochial and extra-diocesan objects, our B. H. M. subscriptions would be smaller, but I am very thankful to be able to report as I have. This year's amount, however, will only appear larger when the \$18.00 which last year should have gone to Domestic Missions are deducted from last year's total.

WEYMOUTH.—Total \$171.22. Increase \$19.87.

"Don't you think that if a list (as in former years), appeared in the Annual Report, of the names of those parishes together with the amount each contributes to the Superannuation Fund, were regularly published, it would be more satisfactory than only having the total amount contributed printed. A few years ago I pointed out the omission which the late Secretary, (Rev. J. D. H. Browne) had made in this matter, and he promised that it would be henceforth rectified, which it was not. As the representative of a Mission that never fails to contribute to the Superannuation Fund, I ask that the name and amount sent by Weymouth shall appear in the next Report. It is surely due to those who give their money that it should be so."

Weymouth has contributed \$9.76 to the Clergy Superannuation Fund.

WINDSOR.—Total \$104.27. Decrease \$47.35.

This parish raises the whole of the salaries of the Rector and Curate without any extraneous aid.
