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LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY,

As adopted at a General Meeting of the Society, held in the City of Toronto, on the 3rd day of August. 1855, and amended at General Meetings held on the 13th day of April. 1880, 18th day of November, \$857, and 30th day of May, 1895.

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I. This Society shall be denominated the "UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY," having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society—that is, the circulation of the Bible without note or comment.

II. This Society shall endeavor to unite all Bible Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operation, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III. This Society shall maintain, in the City of Toronto, a general depot of Bibles and Testaments, from which all Societies in connection with it shall be supplied with the Scriptures at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV. The business of the Society shall be carried on by a Board of Directors, to consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretaries, and a Representative from each Branch, as provided in Article V., together with twenty clerical and twenty lay members, so selected as to give the Board always, as before, a representative character as regards the principal religious bodies interested in the work of the Society, five of whom shall form a quorum. The three clerical and three lay members who shall have attended the least number of meetings of the Board shall not be eligible for re-election, except in cases where the non attendance has arisen from illness or absence from the city, in which cases the Board may nominate such member or members for re-election.

V. Each Branch Society shall be entitled to a representative on the General Board. The President of the Branch shall be ex officio such representative, or any other resident member whom the Committee may appoint as a substitute, who shall be a member of such branch.

VI. At any meeting of the Directors the President, or in his absence the Vice-President first upon the list then present, and in absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside.

VII. Each person paying annually one dollar shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying fifty dollars at any one time, either to this Society or to any of the Societies in connection therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society, or who may have rendered important services, shall, at the discretion of the Directors, be declared Life Members.

VIII. Each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a certificate of membership, under the corporate seal of the Society, duly signed by the President and Secretaries.

IX. The Board of Directors for the time being shall have the appointment of the Permanent Secretary, Agents, Depositary, Colporteurs, Book-keeper and

Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances; and shall have the superintendence and management of all the property, real and personal, of the corporation, as well as the management and control of its general affairs and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Incorporation.

X. The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of ousiness on the third Tuesday of each month, at the hour at 7.30 p.m. Special meetings may be called by the Secretaries at any time, at the request of the President or of any three Directors.

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XI. The Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be held on the second Wednesday in the month of May in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors, for the time being, may deem best for the interests of the Society, when the Officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen; a report of the operations of the Society during the foregoing year shall be presented, together with the Treasurer's and Depositary's accounts duly audited. Special general meetings may be called at any time by the Board.

XII. In case of the death or removal of any Director or Officer during the year, the Board shall at the next ensuing meeting thereof fill such vacancy.

XIII. No alteration of these By-laws shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the proposed alterations has been given to the Board.

RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS RELATIVE TO GRANTS TO SUNTAY SCHOOLS, SEPTEMBER, 1878.

That in all applications for grants of Bibles to Sunday-Schools the applicant be requested to furnish the Secretaries with an account of the state of the school; the number of scholars and teachers; the amount of funds at the disposal of the managers, who are its officers; and why it is necessary to make such application; all of which should in every case be certified by a minister of the Gospel, or some person of known respectability. And further, this Board recommends that the Secretaries make grants in future only to destitute settlements, reporting the same to the next General Meeting of the Board of Directors.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RELATIVE TO "GRANTS TO SUNDAY-SCHOOLS," ADOPTED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS, 18TH [UNE, 1888.

That the forms of application for grants, already in use, as authorized by the Board in October, 1867, and September, 1878, regarding Sunday-Schools, be continued, although it is right to state that the superintendents of schools have not availed themselves of the privileges offered in the form of September, 1878, to any extent.

In the opinion of your Committee, mission churches and schools under denominational auspices are not in general to be considered fit objects for the gratuities of this Society but missions among Indians, Jews, Prench Canadians, Chinese, Italians, etc., though under denominational auspices, are not to be taken as coming under this general rule.

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RULES

RECOMMENDED TO BRANCH SOCIETIES

(Revised May 17th, 1887.)

- I That a Society be formed in connection with the Upper Canada Bible Society, and through it with the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment.
- 11. That the Society be denominated "THE BRANCH BIBLE
- III. That all persons subscribing one dollar annually shall be members of the Branch Society; and those subscribing twenty dollars at one time shall be life members of the same.
- 1V. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a Committee consisting of not less than other members; five to constitute a quorum.
- V. That all Ministers of the Gospel who are subscribers to the Society shall be members of the Committee
- VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly or oftener; time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.
- VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operation into districts, and appoint visitors for each district to solicit subscriptions and donations, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the Word of God.
- VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Branch Society shall, after deducting incidental expenses, be remitted yearly to the Upper Canada Bible Society, or through it to the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the purpose of translating the Word of God into the various languages; and for supplying the whole world, through the Parent Institution, with the pure Word of God.
- IX. That a depository for the sale of the Holy Scriptures be opened in a suitable central locality, and that the books be placed in a conspicuous position, the necessary supply being obtained from the Upper Canada Bible Society on sale. Remittances on purchase account to be made from proceeds of sales only.
- XI. That on the formation of a new Committee, the President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, and such three-fourths of the other members of the Committee as have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.

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ABSTRACT

OF THE

FIFTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY, 1896-97

WITH RETROSPECT OF ITS WORK SINCE ITS ORGANIZATION.

In view of the fact that in a few weeks we expect to celebrate the Diamond Jubilee of Her Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria, the present is an interesting and important period in the history of Great Britain and her Colonies.

The Word of God has ever been reverenced by our good and noble Queen; not only has she guided her own personal life by its principles, but has exalted the Book Divine to the highest place in the councils of the nation. In looking back therefore, over Her beneficent reign, in which the Bible has been the foundation of England's greatness, it seems fitting that we should commemorate this Jubilee year by a summary of the Upper Canada Bible Society's work from the beginning.

Upon the opening of the Victorian era, on the memorable day of her accession, June 22nd, 1837, this Society was nine years old, having been formed in the year 1828, under the name of the York Auxiliary Bible Society. Its first year's operations resulted in opening of thirteen Branch Societies, and an income of \$722.

In 1834 the name of the Society was changed to the "City of Toronto Auxiliary Bible Society." The number of branches had then increased to thirty, and the income to \$1,358.

In 1841, the name was again changed to the "Upper Canada Bible Society," being considered more appropriate to the work, which was gradually increasing and extending, having in that year eighty-eight branches, and an income of \$3,673.

It may be interesting to note the progress of the Society.

In 1870 a few Branches withdrew and formed another Auxiliary, named the "Western Ontario Bible Society," which still exists, with headquarters at London.

As time rolled on, this Society increased in strength and usefulness, its Branches and Depositories now number 584, which are established throughout the Provinces of Ontario, Manitoba, the North-West Territories and British Columbia, thus covering the distance from the City of Kingston to the Pacific Coast and the Island of Vancouver, except the portion occupied by the Western Ontario Bible Society in the neighborhood of London

The work of the Bible Society is limited to one object, as it issues and circulates only the *One Book*, and makes no profit on its sales; indeed, many of the editions are sold below cost, and the prices are the same all over our field.

The total issues of Bibles, Testaments and Portions by this Society since its beginning to the present time, amounts to 1,720,797 volumes.

The Upper Canada Bible Society is the largest and most helpful Auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society, which is really the greatest Missionary Society in the world, and, in accordance with our Charter and Constitution, the aim and object is to assist our parent society in the extremely important work of translating the Scriptures into every language and dialect spoken by our fellow-men; and to issue and circulate the Word of God, thus produced in all languages, throughout the wide world.

From the beginning, this Society has continued on its beneficent course, doing such work as circumstances and opportunities presented themselves for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom; by the dissemination of the Scriptures through sales at our different depositories; by Colporteurs circulating the Word through the length and breadth of our extensive field, especially in the remote portions of our country, among lumbermen, fishermen, miners, ranchers, railway labourers, etc., etc., and placing Bibles in hotels, on board of steamboats and vessels, also trainmen's vans for the use of travellers and employees. Also by making grants of Scriptures to Missions, hospitals, prisons, etc., as well as families or individuals found destitute, and unable to purchase.

During the existence of the Society, many earnest Christian workers in Toronto and elsewhere in connection with our Branch Societies, have held office and taken active part in the general work. Space will not permit us to mention the names of gentlemen, many of whom have passed from labour to reward, and whose memories are revered.

It may be remarked that since the formation of the Society, there have only been three Presidents, viz., Hon. J. H. Dunn, from 1828 to 1845; Hon. Robert Baldwin, from 1845 to 1859, and the Hon. Geo. W. Allan from 1859 to the present time

The office of treasurer has been filled by four gentlemen, viz., Peter Paterson, Esq., 1828 to 1840; Peter Freeland, Esq., 1840 to 1856; Hon. Wm. McMaster, 1856 to 1887, and the present Treasurer John K. Macdonald, Esq., who has held the office since 1887.

We must also make special reference to Ignatius Cockshutt, Esq., who is the oldest officer on record, having served fifty-seven years in connection with the

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Brantford Branch, which is and has been the most helpful,—the Banner Branch,—of this Society for many years past.

A list of the names of gentlemen who have given their kind services to this Society for periods of twenty-five years, and over, will be found on the eighth page of our Annual Report for years past.

The Board of Directors is composed of an equal number of clergymen and laymen—twenty of each besides the officers—representing all evangelical denominations. The election takes place annually. The regular meetings of the Board are held on the third Tuesday evening in each month, and are well attended by the members.

The Depository—which was re-built in 1886, by donations and subscriptions from the Christian people of Toronto, and some of our Branches—stands on a lot of land given by the late lesse Ketchum, Esq., at a perpetual, nominal ground-rent per annum, which money is applied, by direction of the deceased benefactor, for the purpose of purchasing Bibles and books to be distributed among the pupils attending the Public Schools. The ground-rent of the adjoining lot is given for a similar purpose, for the pupils attending the different evangelical Sabbath Schools in the City of Toronto. Both of those gifts are distributed periodically, and are known as the "Jesse Ketchum Trust-Gifts."

The Depository building is conjointly owned and occupied by the Upper Canada Bible Society, and the Upper Canada Religious Tract and Book Society, but the business of each society is entirely separate and distinct.

In closing this retrospect of our work, it may be interesting for us to glance for a moment at the operations of the British and Foreign Bible Society, to which we are auxiliary. The parent society was organized in 1804. At that time Bibles were scarce and expensive, even in Great Britain. On the continent the dearth of Bibles was greater still. Half the population of Sweden and Holland were without the Scriptures, and in Iceland there was but one Bible to each thousand of the population. The Word of God had been issued in only two vernaculars in India, and the translators had but recently begun their labors in Africa and in the South Seas. God put it into the hearts of the few Christian gentlemen who comprised the first committee, to seek to provide the Scriptures, not only for Great Britain and Wales, but for the World. Thus the British and Foreign Bible Society was formed simply "to promote the circulation of the Scriptures, without note or comment, in all languages and in all lands." This it accomplishes in two ways,-ist, by endeavoring to produce the Scriptures in the common language of the people of the various nations and tribes of the World, which necessitates much learned study, labor, time and expense; 2nd, By circulating the books thus produced, as freely as possible among the people for whom they are intended. The great task of giving the Word of God to all peoples and tongues is only well-begun, but in its steady advance there is much to encourage the men of patient faith and ripe scholarship, who are engaged in this noble service. To-day, more than 100 languages and dialects are honoured with complete versions of the Bible. On the Continent of Europe, the complete Bible is issued in 40 languages; in Asia, 41; in Africa, 13; in Australasia and Oceania, 10; in America, 3. Portions of the Word have been issued in many additional languages, and it is estimated that there are now more than a thousand $m \epsilon n$

and women engaged in the translation of the Scriptures and the revision of translations already made.

Without doubt, the circulation of the Bible is greater at present than ever before in the world's history. Looking back fifty years, we find that in 1846, the aggregate circulation by all Bible Societies, so far as known, was about twenty-nine million copies. In the following twenty years, fifty-six millions were circulated; in the next ten years, fifty-six millions; in the following ten years, fifty-three millions; and in the last decade, sixty-three millions (63,000,000). From this we see that the Bible is not an antiquated book, but that there is a steady growing demand for its inspired pages. At the present time there are hundreds of Colporteurs and Bible women employed in the circulation of the Word of God, or portions of it, as issued from the printing presses of the British and Foreign Society in various parts of the world.

Indirectly the Bible Society accomplishes other important objects. It strengthen and promotes the spirit of Christian unity. It is an indispensable aid to missions It honors Christ as the Great Teacher and brings the soul into direct converse with its God. Thus the British and Foreign Bible Society with its auxiliaries—and the Upper Canada Bible Society counts it a privilege to be numbered among the latter—are "doing a great work" which will extend until the Gospel story shall have been read or told in the darkest places of the world, and the "earth shall be full of the knowledge of the Lord, as the waters cover the sea"

OUR WORK (1896-97).

The work of the Upper Canada Bible Society has been carried on during the past year in the usual manner, and your Directors feel grateful to our Heavenly Father for the measure of success with which He has rewarded the efforts put forth. The success of the work in Manitoba and the North-West Territories is particularly encouraging.

Since the last anniversary, we regret to have to record the removal of three of our Directors by death, viz.: Rev. James J. Hill, Rev. John Mutch, and Mr. James Brown, a Vice-President, all of whom were earnest, active members, and their

valuable services are missed at our Board and Committee meetings.

The continued depression of business and stringency of the money market, together with the special appeals to the Christian public for aid to the persecuted Armenians, the Indian famine fund, and other commendable objects, have all combined to reduce the amount of our free contributions, which are somewhat less than the previous year, as are also the sales of Scriptures; however, those shortages have been fully made up by legacies, and our total income for the past year amounts to \$32,572.77, which is nearly \$500.00 in advance of the previous year. Thus your Directors have been enabled to extend the helping-hand to our worthy parent, the British and Foreign Bible Society, also to our sister, the Quebec Bible Society, as in former years, and duly acknowledged in the following letters:

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BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

ABSTRACT OF THE REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1896-7.

A week before the Annual Meeting the shadow of death fell upon the Bible House. The Society's Literary Superintendent, the Rev. George Wilson, suddenly expired on the 28th April, in the presence of members of the committee and the staff. No warning had prepared them for this loss; the proofs of this Report were in his hands for revision; the sub-committee for his own department was to meet on the morrow, and almost his last thoughts and words were of the business to be transacted. To all who read these annual abstracts his saintly and gentle character, his wide scholarship and literary taste, have been manifest; and he is better revealed in the review of the year which forms the main body of this one, and came from his own hand, than by any words of others.

The reports which are submitted year by year may often seem to consist of details and changes of slight significance. The fluctuations of income and circulation, the gain or loss in workers, the story of translation and revision, the persistence of hostility, and the measure of spiritual achievement are familiar and recurrent features in the Society's annals, Now and again a year of retrospect comes. inviting broader comparisons and making us conscious of marvellous growth. When we realise that in the past sixty years the number of the Society's versions has increased from 135 to 335 and its circulation sevenfold, and that it has ceased to be a crime in almost every land to love and spread the Holy Word, we know that a harvest is come. "So is the kingdom of God, as if a man should cast seed into the ground, and should sleep and rise night and day, and the seed should spring and grow up, he knoweth not how."

And yet the past year is not without its fruits and flowers of promise. The Society has thriven amid opposition and calumny in Roman Catholic and Mohammedan lands, holding in both a unique position. The Roman now reads more than ever the record of what the Lord said and the apostles wrote, and the Moslem often respects the sacred page even when he reviles the preacher. Both East and West Africa receive the Bible with avidity. South Africa announces a record for circulation and contributions in the year of the jubilee of its Auxiliary, Dutch and English co-operating in a work dear to both. The China agency has increased its work during the year at least by half, and South America holds out its hand for help in a forward missionary movement for which it has waited long.

I .- FINANCE.

At one time during the year it seemed as if expenditure might exceed receipts, so large had been the falling off in legacies during the first nine months. In the last month that fear was removed, and the income proved more than sufficient to meet the cost of recent developments.

The New Income of 1896-7 was £128,504 9s. 11d., or £2,131 18s. more than that of 1895 96. There has been a welcome increase of £3,470 os. 11d. in free contributions. A part of this, however, is in legacies; the rest is in special donations.

Receipts from Sales amount to £87,654 4s. 5d., as against £87,590 2s. 1d last year. They include an increase of nearly £1,000 on sales in the Society's Foreign Agencies.

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The sum of the two, or the General Fund, that is, the total receipts for the year apart from Special Funds, amounts to £216,158 14s. 4d., giving an increase

of £2,196 os. 4d. over the total of last year.

Payments for Scriptures, Depôts, and Colportage show under each head a considerable increase. Payments from the General Fund have come to £203,681 13s. 1d., as against £197,756 19s. od. The increase of £5,924 14s. 1d. is a welcome sign of greater activity abroad.

The receipts for Special Funds have been £834 155. 7d., and the payments £1,011 125. 1d. The excess of payments has been met by the balance in hand on this account from last year.

II.—Issues.

The following issues have now to be reported: from the Depôt in London, for the year ending March 31st, 1897, 1,780,993; from Depôts abroad, for 1895-96, 1,995,140; making an aggregate of 3,776,133 copies in Bibles, Testaments and Portions. The total issues of the Society from its commencement in 1804 now amount to 151,142.802 copies. The decrease of 194,306 copies in the new issues is to be explained by the fact that the returns from all the Foreign Agencies and Auxiliaries are not completed in time to allow of their embodiment in the report issued for the year of work. The present returns contain the figures for the Foreign Depôts for 1895-96, the year prior to that now described in the report. When the figures for the year just expired are completed they will confirm the encouraging reports which many of the Agents have submitted.

III.—TRANSLATION AND REVISION.

The work of translation and revision has been pressed on incessantly during the year; but full details are not yet to hand, and must be sought for in the Annual Report. It will be found, however, that the mass of editorial work done surpasses that of any previous year. The Bible for Uganda has been completed, and is now in the hands of the people. With this version are associated the names of Mackay, and Ashe, and Gordon, and Pilkington, and other scholars of Europe and Africa, whose names will live in the coming days.

The New Testament in Kien-Ning, on the publication of which the late Rev. R. W. Stewart had set his heart, and with regard to which he wrote one of his last letters, has been carried through the press under the care of Miss B. Newcombe, of the Church of England Zenana Missionary Society. Miss Newcombe has returned to China with this message of peace in permanent form to avenge the martyrdom of her loving sisters, and that of the strong but gentle missionary on whom they all leant.

The Bible in Tukudh is in process of completion, under the care of the Ven. Archdeacon McDonald, for 2,000 Indians occupying 100,000 square miles of a desolate region on the confines of the Arctic Circle; and the Rev. E. J. Peck, of Cumberland Sound, is carrying through the press an edition of the four Gospels in a new form for the Eskimo, scattered over 2,000 miles of frozen coast.

The great languages of India and China are undergoing revision at the hands of men of exceptional qualifications, and the publication of the New Testament for the degraded Ainu of Japan is approaching completion under the care of the Rev. J. Batchelor, the translator.

In the distant Isles new translations are progressing, and the Rev. F. Langham, who has spent thirty-seven years in Fiji, is devoting his closing years, and his mature and ripe scholarship, to the perfecting of the Fiji Bible.

The work expands and deepens in all lands, and we can say with thankfulness (boasting is excluded) that the Committee have thus far taken up with glad alacrity

every item of translation and revision work that has been brought before them with sufficient evidence as to its excellence and missionary usefulness.

IV.—STAFF.

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There have been fewer changes in the foreign staff than there were last year. The Rev. Dr. Nicolson, who intends shortly to retire from the Russian Agency, has received a colleague in the Rev. W. Kean. In China new Sub-Agents have been appointed to occupy several of the inland provinces, particularly those along the northern frontier, where there are many of the nomadic Mongols. An Agent for West Africa and a Sub-Agent for Mombasa have occupied parts for which the Society used to rely entirely on the voluntary help of Missionaries. Mr. Jetto has been succeeded in the Argentine by the Rev. Paul Lantaret, who, by his education in Florence, Berlin and Edinburgh, and his pastoral experience in Italy and Uruguay, has high qualifications for his polyglot field. Persia and Australia are at present without direct representation, the Rev. H. T. Robjohns, of Sydney, retiring after thirteen years' energetic service. Several of the Agents have paid visits to this country, and by conference with the Committee and the Secretaries have greatly facilitated the progress of the work.

Many must feel a keen sense of personal loss through the retirement, after twenty-five years of official service, of the Rev. W. Major Paull. Mr. Paull joined the staff in 1871 as District Secretary, and in December 1884 he was called to succeed the Rev. C. E. B Reed, as a Secretary of the Society. In both positions Mr. Paull labored with heart and soul for the Society; and when advancing years obliged him to ask the Committee to relieve him of office, he carried away with him the esteem and affection of all who had been associated with him. He was succeeded by the Rev. James Gordon Watt, M.A. Another loss will occasion widespread regret, which the Society is soon to suffer, by the retirement of the Rev. T. Aston Binns, its Honorary Home Secretary for over nine years.

V .- OBITUARY AND NEW HONORARY APPOINTMENTS.

The Society has lost six of its Vice-Presidents—the late Archbishop of Canterbury; the late Bishop of St. David's; the Earl of Darnley; the Rev. Carr J. Glyn; the Rev. E. Herber Evans, D.D., and the Rev. H. R. Reynolds, D.D.—and two of its Honorary Life Governors—Major Richard Fawkes and W. H. Penrose, Esq.—and three of its Lady Life Governors—Miss Walker, of Chester; Mrs. Young, of Charlottetown, P.E.I.; and Mrs. R. Innes Nisbett, of Gravesend. J. G. Sillem, Esq., of Amsterdam, an Honorary Foreign Member has also died.

VI.—REVIEW OF THE YEAR.

A review is necessarily a retrospect; and the eye exploring the events and the work of the year is naturally turned backward to the point at which its progress began. In an ordinary annual survey this retrospective glance need not be carried further. But in one very pleasant and very important respect the year 1896-7 is an exceptional one. With its close comes to an end not merely a single twelvemonth, but a period—a secular term of years—to which the eyes of many great populations are being directed, and with which the thoughts of a mighty empire are being engaged. There is being surveyed and celebrated, not the latest year of the Queen's genial reign, but the completed term of sixty years since Her Majesty ascended Science is estimating the immense spaces over which her restless feet during that period have passed: Art is assembling the beautiful creations of her genius: Literature, her brilliant treasures: Commerce is counting her profit in a market which has become as wide as the world: Political History is marking the sweep of boundaries which compare so wonderfully with the limits of the earlier realm. And with examples so suggestive, and with the story of an enterprise no less inspiring, as its object is higher than any of these, it cannot but be instructive to extend the review beyond the limits of the Bible Society's latest year and compare, if only in some of its outlines, and as the survey proceeds, the position of its

affairs when the Queen's reign began.

The report of the Bible Society, which was issued just about the time when the young Monarch was crowned, was the 33rd in the series which began in 1805. Already the Society had completed a term of years equal to that of an average generation. And there is perhaps nothing more striking-nothing more justly remarkable when one examines these earlier records-than the evident maturity of the Society's aims, and even, to a certain degree, of its accomplishments. It was already, and most evidently, inspired by conceptions much vaster than any which are merely imperial: it was stretching out its benevolent influences to the limitsand it had already touched the limits—of the world. One surprised to find that almost every important country mentioned the current Report is mentioned also in the earlier one. Did the beautiful young Queen, in any leisure hour-" free from the cares that cumber state "-in those now distant years, ever glance at the pages of the Bible Society's new Report. Did she notice-and with her prompt Christian sympathies if she had noticed, it could not be but with pleasure-that the unpretentious book surveyed a field included in its operations—a kind of Christian empire—far wider than her own. From the little Moravian settlement of Nain in Labrador-whence an Esquimaux Isaiah was being sent for publication—to Van Dieman's Land, to which a supply of Scriptures for the convicts was despatched: from Brazil in South America, and from Sierra Leone in Africa to China and the Asiatic Archipelago to which an Agent had just been appointed: from farthest North to South, from East to West, there was no field for Christian work to which the Society was not looking, and wonderfully few with which it had not some more or less close connection. In those days it was an eminently British organization, for there were some 2,300 Auxiliaries at home, but it was fast becoming, and in a way worthy of the name, foreign, for there were nine Agents, and more than 230 Auxiliaries and Associations abroad.

But if comparable to the later Reports as to mere extent and outline of operations, that of 1837 is in other respects as strikingly different. Like the settler in some new country, it had surveyed its possessions, but in many directions it had done little more. It had touched, and here and there it had occupied, the coast line of continents: but the vast inland regions—the unexplored hinterlands—were

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yet for many years to remain unpossessed. In these early records the Colporteurthat patient, indispensable worker-has hardly done more than made his appearance. The Biblewoman had not yet found entrance for her gentle ministries to the still dark-how long afterwards were they to remain dark and secluded !-Zenanas of the East. The Society's editions were offered for sale to subscribers and Auxiliary Societies only. The cheapest English New Testament cost elevenpence, and, with the exception of the Psalms, Portions were unknown.

Let us pass over the interval of sixty years since then: let us turn to the narrative of to-day, and let us begin with the great State which ancestrally is so closely associated with the Queen and with her noble Consort—let us begin with the Empire of Germany. No account could be more graphic or more succinct than Mr. Morrison's own. It may only be added in a sentence of introduction that the Report of 1837 registers supplies for the use of the German Societies of between forty and fifty thousand copies, and that Dr. Pinkerton refers, somewhat later, with evident pain to the spread among the educated classes of scepticism and infidelity. "When I was in Geneva last spring," writes Mr. Morrison, "I walked across the French frontier to Ferney and saw the beautiful old house in which Voltaire once lived. There was a forsaken and desolate air about the place: and I could not help thinking that the neglected aspect of the philosopher's house corresponded in many respects to the neglected position of his philosophy. But the thought which occupied my mind most as I walked through the quiet woods around the house was the prophecy Voltaire once uttered about the Bible. In a hundred years, he said, the Bible would be an unknown book. It would be found only in the collection of antiquaries, or as a witness to the folly of former generations. One hundred years have passed and the Bible is better known and better loved than ever. The fifty translations of Voltaire's time have swelled to over three hundred; and the great Book he ridiculed has a circulation of six million copies in

"When Strauss wrote his Leben Jesu," Mr. Morrison proceeds, "he was preceded and followed by a crowd of German writers, whose destructive criticisms of the text of Scripture caused many a heart ache among devout Christians all over the world. Many anxious eyes were turned to these remorseless German students. The Much-Afraids-even those in the pulpit-feared that the Book could not resist the tremendous onslaught. But what is the result? We find that the Bible the 'Conscience of the German People,' as a well-known writer has called it—is deeper in the affections or Germany than ever, and that never before has so great a circulation of the Scriptures taken place as during last year. In German Bible circulation 1896 is the Record year. Nothing has yet been able to destroy the love for God's Word in the heart, of the people, who first made it a mighty and a living power in the world's development. In 1881—fifteen years ago—the total circulation of Scriptures in Germany was 461.619 copies, or ten copies for every thousand of population; in 1889 it was 603,988, or thirteen copies per thousand; in 1896 it rose to 730,328, which makes fourteen copies to the thousand. This is an advance of 37,479 copies on the figures of 1895, and the total is the largest ever

known in Germany.

Mr. Morrison proceeds to point out that the special work of the British and Foreign Society shares in this great advance: in 1895 it was 245,085; in 1896 it increased by over 17,000 copies, and rose to a total 262,846 This includes the highest purely colportage (70,763) ever known since 1885, when the colporteurs were withdraw from exclusively Lutheran districts. The review of their work is one of great interest, and it is everywhere more or less encouraging. It leads us from Posen and East Prussia westward and southward, across the populous Rhine valley to

Alsace and Lorraine, and the vivid picture of German popular feeling and manners is at the same time one of the beneficent and deepening influence of a popular Bible.

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The space devoted in the Report of 1837 to France, Spain, Portugal. Belgium, and Italy-the group of countries which may be somewhat loosely grouped together as practically Celtic in race and Catholic-Roman Catholic-in religion-is very considerable, and in the Report of 1897 they occupy a section correspondingly large. Their very permanence in the Society's narrative is itself significant. Unlike Holland, Norway, Sweden, and Denmark—which have practically disappeared from the Report because they are successfully furnishing matter for Reports of their own-there is for these Catholic countries no immediate prospect of an awakening conscience of the value of the Bible-no indications of national efforts to circulate it among their own people. In other respects there is indeed during the last sixty years a curiously monotonous sameness in the accounts which are given of these countries. One might transfer pages taken from the earlier narratives and insert them in the story of to-day. The sleepless warfare of the priest against the popular gospel is described in the Report of 1837 in terms which may be repeated still. As if he had been the embodiment of some inextinguishable dread of discovery, of some evil conscience, the minister who was set apart for the service of the gospel was found everywhere pursuing the footsteps of the sixty years ago distributor of the Scriptures; the same sad record, illustrated by a thousand examples, repeats itself continually during all the intervening period, and in the accounts of 1896-7—fresh from the pens of M. Monod, of Mr. Walker, of Signor Meille, of Mr. Kirkpatrick-the same old sorrowful testimony appears once more If it is changed at all it is more universal, more bitter, more carefully organized. "It is not difficult," writes M. Monod of France, "to characterize in a single sentence the year which is just ending-it is one in which the watchward seems, at least in some circles, to have been 'Down with Protestants.' . . At every spot," he adds, "where a colporteur succeeds in selling a few volumes there rises up at once an enemy seeking to destroy them. And how intense is the conflict the colporteurs' reports bear witness." It is curious and no less instructive, turning for a moment to the French colonies of Algeria and Madagascar, to find the same thing. "I have been actively engaged," says an Algerian colporteur, "from morning to evening, and in every place I have found the priest in my way menacing with excommunication those who should buy my books." In Madagascar the Jesuit campaign is more serious, because more intelligent and relentless than the fierce upheavals of the old heathenism. Even in Manchuria, under the shelter of French influence, the same fatal hostility has recently become marked in its activity. In Spain Mr. Walker is finding to his sorrow that all his work "must be begun and carried on in the face of the sleepless enmity of the priests to a popular Bible." Of his beloved Italy Signor Meille regretfully writes that "the hostility of the Roman Catholic clergy of all ranks to our work is growing more widespread and more systematic every year." Testimonies like these sometimes from the agents sometimes from the patient colporteur, recur continually. Yet the curious and most welcome fact remains that in every one of these countries the Society's circulation has during last year increased and its work surprisingly advanced. In 1895, the Italian returns were 145,000; in 1896, in the face of a hundred difficulties they stand at 168,000, and this includes an advance of 7 000 copies in colportage alone. "We have increased," Signor Meille joyfully writes, "all along the line." The Depôt of Rome has risen from 37,000 to 43,000, doubling the issue of New Testaments; Naples from 35,000 to 45,000; Florence from 20,000 to 30,000. The Italian Agency was founded in 1860, and since then, Signor Meille calculates, the Italian people at home and abroad have received through the Society more than 3 000,000 of copies. The Spanish circulation 2 has risen

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from 75,000 to 79,000, adding to the eleven months' returns the average for one The circulation in France, which in 1895 was 142,000. has advanced to 149,000, and "the odious campaign against our work and name," to use M. Monod's words, "has had no other effect than to stimulate the zeal of our colporteurs." But perhaps the most interesting item of the year, as regards the group of countries, is given in the Report from Belgium. About a year since a gentleman from England, a visitor to the Belgian Spa, became interested in the people and in the Society's work. He was anxious to help in the circulation of Scriptures, and accepting Mr. Kirkpatrick's advice, he set about his work in the colporteur's way. Courteous, accomplished, patient, and, above all, devoted, he had wonderful success. The people soon began to appreciate his zeal and to respect his grace and gentle persuasiveness. Supply after supply was sent until the returns showed that he had circulated, almost entirely by sale, nearly 11,000 volumes within four months. The Belgian returns, 2 though otherwise progressive, rose from 21,000 to 32,000 copies. Are there not some other English gentlemen who may bethink themselves of our great mining and industrial populations, and devote the gifts of their education and the outgoings of their good-will to similar work at home?

In the Report of 1837, which is furnishing so instructive a comparison with that of 1897, there is no explicit mention of Austria-Hungary. It is one of the omissions which are all the more striking because they are so curiously few. It was since the beginning of the reign that the great Dual Monarchy became one of the Agencies of the Society. And that series of chapters-so full of varied incident, so full of gentle feeling, so full also of records and illustrations of the highest usefulness-was begun in the first instance by Mr. Edward Millard, and continued afterwards and to the present year by his devoted son. That an addition was made to the Society's influences when Austria Hungary became an Agency-that an ample lacuna was filled up in the earlier index-Mr. Henry Millard's latest chapter may conclusively show. It is like all his others, alternately touched with tears and with smiles; it is by turns shadowed with regrets over too prevalent indifference, and then, as the narrator turns over some pleasanter pages in his colporteurs' journals, it becomes vocal with expressions of thankfulness. Over that chapter it is impossible to linger, though there are few in the story of the year more attractive to a devout mind; but as Mr. Millard announces a circulation 3 advanced from 158,000 to 301,000-an increase not the less valuable because it includes the free distribution at the great Millenial Festival at Buda Pesth: as he describes that Festival and the imperial reception of the Society's deputation with a memorial Bible as a gift from the Society to the Emperor King as he details the work in Hungary, in Moravia, in Bohemia, in Transylvania, in Trieste, and finally sums up the narrative by saying that "We have perhaps never yet met with so many striking proofs that the Gospel is the power of God," we feel how deep as well as how beneficent is the work which he chronicles. "How very beautiful the Gospels are!" said a travelling tradesman in Carniola to the colporteur from whom he had bought a Slovenian New Testament some years before. He had found a treasure: he became an earnest distributor of the little casketbooks himself, and the simple words and incident may be quoted, for it might, in varying forms, be multiplied indefinitely.

Sixty years ago there was very little to say in the Bible Society's Report about the Empire of Russia. One or two paragraphs allude to Riga—to St. Peters-

burg, where the Society had "a few friends"-to Dorpat, where an edition of the Esthonian Psalms had been printed-and they include a reference to the recent suppression of the Russian Bible Society. Writing a few months ago Dr. Nicolson reminds us that one seventh of the Society's total income is spent in Russia, and that more than a seventh of its total circulation is in the great Slovenian Empire. No separate report of the year is perhaps more uniformly pleasant in its details—so full of substantial proof of progress—so free from instances of opposition, as that of Dr. Nicolson. The circulation of 1895 was high, it had risen from earlier returns to 503,000; in 1896 it stands at 531,000. To this may be added the Siberian circulation, which for 1896 was 35 000. Both narratives-that of Dr. Nicolson referring to European Russia and Central Asia, and that of Mr. Davidson referring to Siberia, are full of varied interest. The distances are immense: the scenery shifts and passes like a panorama: the glimpses of life and manners are often strange, often romantic, always full of human attractiveness. We visit, in these unpretentious pages, many famous places, and make acquaintance with not a few unfamiliar people-the miners of the Ural, who bought fewer Scriptures last year for the unusual but pleasant reason that they were almost completely supplied; the navvies, rude but kindly, who are building the great Siberian Railway; the Tartars in their old-world wandering tents; the squat Tunguses; the encampments of forlorn exiles from the west; the bands of emigrants who, in search of new homes, are pouring into Siberia in bands of ten and fifteen thousand every month. In a record so varied it is difficult to select the most significant facts; but there can hardly be anything more full of deep significance than the movement towards education, which everywhere in Russia has set in. Up till now the Russian peasant, when he could read at all, read only the grim folk-lore tales of his race—and in these Slovenian literature is specially rich-and the venerated and treasured Scriptures. But with the advance of education, and with the longing for books which comes with it, there is sure to be a great change. Already the Church is beginning to provide popular hagiologies -lives and miracles of the Saints, almost as marvellous as the old legends themselves. The popular novel is sure to follow, and already one finds the cheap and too often mischievous serials of the cities. It is a great matter that the gifted Slovenian people have already learned to honor and read the Bible, and that it is becoming to so large an extent the possession and the treasure of the people. It is a great question how long, in the face of the great seduction of a new popular literature, the Great Book will hold its place.

From Russia it is an easy transition to the various branches of the Muhammadan races, who in Turkey, in Egypt, and in the neighboring countries have their nomadic or their settled homes. How far, as the years pass, and the diffusion of Scriptures goes quietly forward, is the stern hate of the Muslim being softened towards Christianity? how far are they giving evidence of milder counsels—of a more open and liberal mind? The question is often asked, and it is almost as often definitely, and often favorably, answered. But to be definite is not unfrequently to be premature, and forecasts too sanguine, are sure to be disappointing. But it is certain that the accounts of the past year—as of many which have preceded it—contain much that is distinctly pleasant. The circulation in Turkey a could not be expected to maintain its level, but it is only slightly less, and it has proved to be best just in the most exclusively Muhammedan province of the Empire, the modern Kastamuni, which represents the New Testament province of Paphlagonia. Even in Constantinople Mr. Hodgson points out that a thousand copies have during the year been bought by Turks, and read, often in secret, and that never to his knowledge have the

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colporteurs been molested in that exclusive city. Mr. Weakley, speaking of Egypt, is often more emphatic; he says that men's minds are full of the sense of approaching change, and that many influences are visibly breaking down the prejudice which has so long locked and barred the Muhammedan's mind. In Cairo and in Alexandria the diffusion of Scriptures has been greater than ever before, and the general year, with its circulation of 24,000 'copies, Mr. Weakly thinks is of 'real if not remarkable success' It is curious to be reminded that much the best work of the Agency is done in the little Extra Egyptian polyglot town of Port Said, watching as it does like a sentinel the stately procession through the canal of 3,400 ships, 2,100 of them flying the British flag, and all of them more or less open to the visits of the colporteurs. With this group of Levantine countries may be noticed the kingdom of Greece, from which the accounts are remarkably pleasant. There is a pronounced improvement in the tone of the popular mind towards the colporteurs, an advance in the higher education of the clergy, and an increased number of evangelical preachers. In the brief report from Greece the names of Volo and of Larissa occur; in the little seaport lying on the slopes of Pelion the Agent was engaged in inspecting a Depot; in the other, almost in the shadow of the old classic Olympus, he was interviewing the local governor in favor of his colporteurs. Since that time measures have been taken to distribute Gospels among the Greek soldiers, as was done some months before for the Armenian refugees.

We have already passed far beyond the limits of the Report of 1837: the Crimean War was then far distant and to that war it was, for all its failures and mistakes, that the opening of the Muslim lands was largely due. And the earlier limits are still more entirely passed when the mind turns to Africa. 2 Sixty years ago a few friendly letters from the Cape Colony showed that the settlers were not forgetful of their need of the Bible, and accounts from Dr. Philip and Dr. Moffatt were beginning to interest Christian people at home But to all practical intent the immense Continent was unknown. Even in our own day it is only partially opened, but what light has risen on its own mysteries, what revealings have been made of its treasures since then! And as each year opens some new prospect, so it seems to quicken the pace of development. It is but a brief period and in recent memory since Uganda was unknown; to-day that gifted people are not only opening all their ardent mind to the Bible, but they promise to become Evangelists of East Central Africa. At Mombasa a new Depôt has been established and for the opposite tropical regions of the west, an Agent has been appointed to develop the Society's work in those fields where the Church, the Wesleyan, and the Basle Missions have won so pleasant a heritage from the grim old paganism of earlier days. But there is probably no report which so vividly illustrates the advances of the last generation as that from the South African Auxiliary. The narrative surveys the last fifty years, and finds that the last is the most progressive and most successful of them all. From slight and obscure beginnings this great Auxiliary has advanced till it can report 200 Branches, reaching as far north as Mashonaland, a circulation of nearly 42,000 copies, a vigorous colportage work, an income of £4,000 and a free contribution to London of £1,000. No figures like these were ever possible before.

From the East—from Japan, from the new Agency, Korea, from Malaysia, and, it may be added, from India, the narrative of the year is of grave, moderate tone; but the Society's new Agent in China, with a growing band of fellow workers, has helped to bring about a remarkable development. It is a curious commentary on the victorious history of apan to learn that the young, impulsive nation, discovering the responsibility and the burdens of its new position, has become so absorbed in things political and material that there seems little concern, even among the

Christian community itself, for spiritual interests and affairs. But the Scripture Union is there planning and carrying out admirable schemes; and the general circulation by sale, 1 close on 100,000 copies, is hardly less than that of the war year. In the conquered China, on the other hand, every account testifies to spiritual interest great enough to be notable; some of the accounts are in the highest degree interesting, and under Mr. Bondfield's guidance the circulation 2 has risen from 236,000 to 366,000 copies. In the Malaysian Agency the European staff of sub-Agents has been weakened by sickness, and in consequence of this and of the full supplies already made in a field where the number of readers is limited, the circulation 3 of 55,000 is slightly lower than that of 1895. But never were the sales of complete books so high before, and Mr. Haffenden is, as usual, resolute, hopeful and

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In India+ the year's circulation is over 450,000 copies; there is much translation and revision work being carried on; and the six Auxiliaries report work more or less successful, and an outlook more or less reassuring. to the painful interest of these returns that some of these have felt the touch of prevalent Famine and Plague; the dark background of these dark calamities throws the whole picture into vivid distinctness. But the event of the year which may yet prove the most distinctive and important is the Conference of Auxiliary Secretaries held in Madras. At this deliberative consultation all matters of interest were exhaustively discussed-the details of production, of circulation. of translation and revision; of the intercourse of Auxiliaries, of the wisest methods of advance From collective wisdom and experiences so fully shared, it must be hoped that correspondingly good results may issue, and that the reports of future years may form pleasant commentaries on the importance and the excellent influences of the Conference of 1896.

To America no reference has been made, and no mere reference can be adequate to the Agencies at work there. The United States and many nations elsewhere, are represented by the American Bible Society; but beyond the limits of its work there are the great Auxiliaries of Canada, the West Indian Agency, and further south the Agencies of Brazil and The Argentine. In all these central and southern fields the conditions of Bible work repeat themselves, and not infrequently its discouragments. In Spanish and French settlements the ubiquitous priest reappears, and he is perhaps only more bitter than his European brother. The negroes of the old plantations, usually too jovial and careless to be capable of grave impressions, and drifting frequently into demoralised indifference : the coolies from India, shy and unresponsive: the European families of early settlers, touched too often by the seductive languor of the tropics into a passive unconcern: the local pastor absorbed in the anxious cares and duties of his charge—all these appear in the pages of reports, and complete the picture of that still West Indian life. But with all this, there are active Auxiliaries bent on doing what they can; the Colporteur is at work; the silent little Gospel speaks to the heart; and in spite of all that makes progress difficult, there is no report more vital or more genial than that of Mr. Heath. the past year he has visited Canada; the Society's friends received him with characteristic hospitality, and he bears enthusiastic testimony to the affectionate loyalty to the Queen, which inspires the great Dominion, and binds its heart to the heart of the Old Land.

The returns of the previous year were 476,982. There are three Auxilaries in Ceylon—Colombo, Jaffna and Kandy—the returns from these for the year number 34,988 copies (previous year, 30,288.)

An outline so rapid and so faint as this can only indicate in a way, correspondingly imperfect, the extent of the advance which has been made and of the work which has been done since the first report of the Queen's reign was issued. The progress has been indeed great. The work has been of monumental importance. Perhaps among all the achievements of the Victorian age, if tested in the balance of Eternal Truth, nothing has been done of greater worth or weight than what has been accomplished by the Bible Society in the service of the Word of God. And it is a peculiarly beautiful aspect of the whole survey of comparison that whatever can be reckoned as accomplished is of the nature of a gift to others-that the progress of sixty years has consisted of giving rather than receiving. The politician naturally estimates the extent of territory which has been won; the expansion of trade; the increase of national wealth. It is quite otherwise with the work which aims only at imparting, and which thinks itself rich only in what it bestows. To complete a new version in some rude speech is a matter for sincere congratulation. It is the elevation of a language, it is possibly the beginning of a literature: it is the gift to an uncivilized people of the treasure of a sanctified mind. But the work enriches those who have carried it through only by the divine pleasure of imparting-of sharing with others what has been the chiefest gift to ourselves

The years which, as they filled in their silent courses the period of the Queen's reign, brought their gifts of sorrows and of peace to millions of households in her Empire—brought also those divine gifts to her Royal Household. Children came —Princes who have risen to honor—gracious Princesses; and at length a noble age, full of grave and tender memories has surely turned every sense of change—even of bitter bereavement—to sweetness at the last. It happened about four years ago that one of the sons of that guarded Home, expressing his sympathy with everything that works for good, presided in Portsmouth at a meeting of the Bible Society. The Duke of Connaught used at that time words which may be recalled now, and which are worthy of continual remembrance:—"I regard the Bible think its ideas, apart from its lofty wishes, are thoroughly national, because I been the pride, and I hope it will ever continue to be so, of our people that as soon as a country is discovered, as soon as the very smallest forms of government are erected, immediately follow the missionaries and those who bring with them the Bible." That is surely a pride which above reproach; it is an am-

bition which is worthy of a great people and of a reign crowned with so many honors—so many laurelled victories of peace. And the record of the Bible Society, during her Majesty's reign alone, is a witness to what an inspiring degree that aim

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REPORTS OF AGENTS.

REV. JOHN BECKET.

Thamesford.—Visited Oct. 19th, 1896; found all the officers at their post and doing their work well. Meeting held in Presbyterian Church, and, notwithstanding the rain, was well attended. Rev. Mr. Moyer, Methodist, ably presided, and excellent addresses were given by the Rev. G. H. Smith, pastor, and Rev. J. A. Bloodsworth, Episcopalian. The depository of this good old branch was destroyed by fire last summer, and steps are being taken to have a new one started as soon as convenient.

Kintore, on the 20th, gave a hearty welcome to your agent. The meeting was in the Methodist Church, and was not as well attended as in former years, but the interest manifested by those present was all that could be desired. Rev. S. Knott, pastor, presided, and the Rev. J. M. Munro gave an able address. The agent's speech was well appreciated. Collectors were appointed, and the indications were that a thorough canvass would be made.

Lakeside has very efficient and warm-hearted officers, especially the Secretary, Mr. J. W. Sutherland. The meeting was well attended, and was a success in every respect. The chair was ably filled by Mr. Gleason, the President. Short and pointed remarks were made by Dr. Murray, and Messrs. Mills and J. Brown.

Harrington is a live branch. It was an inspiration to be present. Attendance large, some having come seven or eight miles. Officers' reports were up to the mark; singing by the choir was excellent and soul stirring. Revs. A. G. McLachlin, pastor, and J. D. Fergusson, of Brooksdale, gave addresses. The Congregational and Methodist ministers were unavoidably absent.

Embro has a way of its own in appointing officers and collecting money. A business meeting is held at the beginning of each year, when the officers are elected and collectors in each congregation are appointed. Orangeville .- This meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and was well The Presbyterian and Methodist ministers were present and gave attended. excellent addresses. The church choir added in no small degree to the interest, This is a living branch, and as usual we look for good things. Mr. Thos. Stevenson takes a live interest in the sale of books, and carries a good stock

Shelbourne. - It was late in January before this meeting was held. On account of the many meetings held in connection with the different churches in the town, the local committee deemed it best not to hold it until after the holidays. had a good meeting in the Presbyterian Church. Dr. Stone gave a good address, which added much to the interest of the meeting, and it was arranged to take up collections in the different churches on a Sabbath in the near future.

REV. A. C. MILES, B.A.

Beeton.-It was a pleasure to your agent to begin his tour at a branch so well managed as that at Beeton. Everything was ready, even the collectors having been seen and secured by the careful secretary, Mr. Thos. Lannan; they, together with old officers, were elected without any delay. This allowed plenty of time for addresses. Collecting faithfully done last year, as in past, and contributions rose despite "hard times." A good meeting held in Presbyterian Church, with Methodist and Presbyterian ministers present and assisting.

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Thornton.—Here collecting was delayed, and in some cases not done (as is often the consequence). Hence contributions smaller. The Society has good friends here, though, and will doubtless redeem its promise of faithful work. Men were appointed to drive around the collectors, and the ministers promised to see that the *Ivy* district was canvassed (where a branch formerly existed). The Rev. W. G. Dreyer (Anglican) as president, and Rev. G. B. Greig (Presbyterian), gave helpful addresses on the Bible, your agent dwelling on the Society's work last year. Old officers re-elected.

Bradford.—The meeting here was the meeting of the tour. Two hundred or more were present, and everything of a business nature arranged. Three local clergymen and three laymen were prepared to speak to three resolutions anent the Bible and the Society. This they did effectively; Rev. John Locke and Mr. T. W. Evans, barrister, representing the Methodist Church, Rev. F. Smith and Mr. Allan McLain, High School teacher, the Presbyterian, and Rev. E. Chilcott and Mr. John Elliott, bank manager, the Church of England. It was late when your agent rose, but he was given quiet attention to the close of a half hour's address on the work in Japan, Uganda, and other countries. Bradford was again this year an inspiration to your agent. Collections large last year, as expected from good meetings, and efficient Executive, with Mr. S. Martin as able secretary. All officers re-elected.

Bondhead.—Meeting in Presbyterian Church, whose new pastor, Rev. J. T. Hall, gave an effective and practical address, telling of his own experience of the aid rendered by the Bible Society in a far off British Columbia mission. The audience here was small, but listened attentively to your agent for nearly forty-five minutes, as he told of the history and work of the British and Foreign Bible Society. Mr. Wm. Hill, president, was re-elected, and the Presbyterian pastor chosen secretary-treasurer. Depository changed to better quarters, with some marking down of old stock, and sales are looked for this year.

Tottenham. -- Meeting here very encouraging. The president, Rev. F. C. Keam, took a warm interest in thework of the branch, having also to act as secretary during the year. He was having special meetings at the time, and gave up Friday evening to the Bible Society, the place of meeting being his own church (Methodist). A large congregation was present from all churches, good addresses were made by the president, and Rev. P. Nicol, the new Presbyterian minister. The meeting was alive all through, and collection large.

Rosemont.—Meeting again held in Orange Hall, as most central place. A fair attendance. All the ministers of the locality present and spoke helpful words, as did also Mr. Robert Murphy, Reeve, The president, Rev. J. A. Long. presided. The collecting was not all done last year, so returns small; but this old branch may still be expected to give a good account of itself. Depository continues to have sales every year, though so near another depository, that of Alliston, which is the markettown. The new Presbyterian minister, Rev. A. Wilson, was chosen president.

Alliston.—Meeting in Anglican Church; the president, Rev. J. R. S. Burnett, in the chair. The pastor, Rev. W. E. Carroll. was also present, and he and the president gave valuable aid in speaking. No collecting was done last year, making a loss of about \$50 to this work of Bible circulation, but more faithful attention is looked for this year. The old officers were re-elected, except for customary rotation of the presidency to Rev. Rural Dean Carroll.

Cookstown.—Rain decreased attendance, which nevertheless was good. St. John's Church was the place of meeting this year. The choir provided very acceptable music. The new incumbent, Rev. J. M. McLennan, presided by request, in the unavoidable absence of the president, Mr. George Duff. The former, as also the Rev. G. B. Greig (Presbyterian), made practical addresses in advocacy of

Bible study and circulation. Your agent again told of the Society's operations. The old officers, including the earnest and faithful secretary, Mr. W. J. Findlay, were re-elected. Votes of thanks were given to the chairman, the agent, and the officers. The depository is in good hands, and sales fair.

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Elm Grove.—Here as last year, a very encouraging meeting; large attendance, best of attention, and a hearty spirit. Held in Methodist Church. The collecting had been all done last year, with marked increase in contributions. The president, Rev. F. L. Brown, having "itinerated," by the custom of his church, his successor. Rev. D. D. Franks, was asked to take the chair, which he ably filled. Other ministers unavoidably absent. The chairman having a bad cold, the speaking was left to the agent, who, encouraged by the close attention of the audience, addressed them for nearly an hour on the history and work and benefit of the Bible Society, enlarging upon its missionary aspect. The painstaking secretary, Mr. J. E. Addis, was reelected, with Rev. W. J. Hewitt (Presbyterian), as president. No depository here, as territory near Alliston and Cookstown.

Everett.—This young branch had again a good meeting this year. Dr. Kingston, president, gave an address, showing study of the Society's report and earnest in advocacy of the good work. He was followed by the Rev. F. J. Lynch (Church had not been all done, but more faithful work was promised for next year. Depository sales good; the officers were re-elected. At this branch your agent finished a two-weeks' tour, in most places encouraging; the hospitality freely extended to him was without fault.

REV. J. H. MOORHOUSE.

Norwich Oct. 6th, 1896.—Meeting in Baptist Church. Opened with hymn, "All hail the power of Jesus' name," reading part of Psalm 119, and prayer. Three of the resident ministers were present. The Executive Committee brought in a well-prepared report, nominating officers and collectors, which was adopted. On account of the night being dark and wet the attendance was small, but those present showed an active interest in the Society's work. Your agent spoke on (1) "The Origin, Object and Characteristics of the Bible Society"; (2) "The Value of the Bible"; and (3) "Some Features and Incidents of the Work," including main statistics for past year. This branch is well organized, and can be relied upon, I think, to do ing the meeting, handed me fifty cents, requesting the money to be put with the collection at the Otterville meeting.

Otterville.—Attendance here, though small, much better than at meeting of night before. No resident ministers present. All work of branch thoroughly entered into; reports received; officers and collectors appointed. Stock in depository required replenishing, and providing case for books.

Bookton.—A very attentive audience here. Was sorry to find that only a portion of the field was canvassed last year, but hope for more thorough work. Bookton has hitherto been a sub-branch of Otterville, but is now organized independently. The Society is favored with a warm friend at Otterville and Bookton in Mr. R. Paxton, who not only kindly invited me to his house, but also drove me out to the Bookton meeting and back.

St. Williams.—Owing to inefficient train service I was obliged to drive twenty-five miles across country in order to reach St. Williams in time for the meeting. Was kindly invited to the house of Mr. Nevett president of the branch, where he and his estimable lady entertained the officers of the branch and the resident ministers to tea. Meeting in Methodist Church. Four ministers of the gospel present. Collectors were appointed to canvass country adjoining village. Depository here might be improved. Spoke personally to two of the ministers in the neighborhood to kindly use their influence to further the good work.

Port Rowan.—Meeting in the Anglican Church. Fair attendance, excellent spirit, business carried through in a satisfactory manner. To increase the contri-

bution of this branch—below the mark last year—we secured collectors to canvass country adjoining village. A very deep interest was manifested in the address. Two resident ministers, besides president of branch, were present and expressed their approval of the Society's work. A pleasing incident of the meeting was the promise at its close of a donation of \$4.00 by the Christian Endeavor Society of Port Royal, near Port Rowan. The depository of this branch is well kept, accounts accurate, a neat case with glass doors provided for the books.

On Sunday preached three times—Jireh, St. Williams and Port Rowan—advocating the Society's claims at each service. There is no branch at the first named point, but the minister in charge said that he would try to appoint collectors

to canvass for the Society.

Vittoria.—Arrived here in time to visit school and give out notice of meeting. This ancient village numbers about 450 population. We had a good meeting in the Anglican Church. Rev. Thomas Shields efficiently presided. The address was listened to attentively, and great interest was expressed in the account of the Society's work. We hope for increased returns from this branch. The depository is fairly well kept. It would be well, I think, if the agent would hold a Sunday service here next year.

Port Dover.—It was a pleasure to visit this branch. The meeting was held in the Methodist Church; attendance good, spirit excellent. Two ministers were present. The officers here are systematic and thorough in their work. They were re-appointed, and in accepting office they said that they considered it "an honor" to be thus connected with the Bible Society—a sentiment one cannot but wish was more general among the branches. The depository is in fair order, sales during the year \$12.82. The choir rendered excellent service at this meeting.

Delhi.—Energetic and persevering work will be required to bring this branch up to that position which it could fairly be expected to occupy, for a smart town like Delhi, with fine country all around it to draw from, ought to do well. Through an oversight arising out of change in officers, no contribution was made last year. However, the omission was not intentional, and there is promise of work this year, some \$10.00 being already collected. Visited school and gave out notice of meeting. Officers and collectors appointed for the town, and arrangements made to provide collectors for surrounding country. Depository in good order. Before leaving next morning called on the Baptist minister and asked him to help on the work, which he promised to do.

Waterford.—This branch, as given in report, contributed only \$3.95 last year, but I was informed some money had been collected (about \$10.00) which probably had not been forwarded in time. The secretary presented a full and accurate report. The president was absent on business, but arrived before the meeting closed; the chair meanwhile having been efficiently filled by Rev. F. Leigh. A hearty interest in the work of the Bible Society was shown, and the various addresses received good attention. The collection was \$4.07, which added to amount subscribed gave total of about \$65.00, and it was thought that the collectors on canvassing could increase this by still further subscriptions.

Armow, Nov. 24th.—Our meeting was held in the Methodist Church, and it was one of the largest and most enthusiastic your agent has ever attended. Mr. F. Robertson, the veteran president, was in the chair. The Rev. Dr. McKay (Presbyterian) conducted the devotional exercises. Here also a union choir did good service. A large number of lady collectors were appointed and they cheerfully consented to canvass a wide district of country within the next few weeks. The contributions of Armow are likely to be much in advance of those of previous years.

Underwood Nov. 25.—Rained all day, night dark. Attendance very good considering the circumstances. The president. Mr. Hunter, trudged through mud, and depositary. Mr. H. The fifty-seventh Anniversary was held in Association Hall, Thursday evening, May 27th,

Apologies for absence were received from the Revs. Dr. Thomas, Dr. Parsons, Dr. Potts, G. A. Kuhring and Dr. Dewart.

After singing the hymn, "Jesus Shall Reign Where'er the Sun," Rev. Dr. Gregg read the 19th Psalm, and led in prayer.

THE PRESIDENT, Hon. Senator Allan, said: My Christian Friends-I bid you all very hearty welcome to this fifty-seventh Anniversary meeting of the Upper Canada Bible Society. I cannot refrain from expressing my regret that the attendance is not larger of friends of the Bible cause, but I refuse to believe that it is indicative of any want of interest in the Society or its work on the part of our friends in Toronto. I believe it so happens to-night that many of those who are generally with us have been obliged to keep other engagements of considerable importance, and I trust, therefore, that we shall not in any way feel discouraged that we have not a larger gathering here to night. The Annual Report, which you will presently be asked to adopt, contains much very interesting information as to the work of this auxiliary in our own country through the labors of our agents and colporteurs, and it contains many extracts from the report of the British and Foreign Bible Society, lately submitted to their annual meeting, which will be found to give very interesting information as to the progress of their world-wide work in the translation and circulation of the Holy Scriptures. While I do not in the slightest degree undervalue the work of our own Society in carrying the Word of God, through their colporteurs and agents, to those who are destitute of it in our own country-and you will find in the report a very interesting summary of the work that has been done by this Society since its first incorporation in 1828 as the York Auxiliary Bible Society-at the same time I would especially emphasize the high privilege which we enjoy of aiding, by our free contributions to the British and

the world, in their various languages and dialects, the blessed tidings of salvation-It has often been remarked that this is the age of missions and of missionary work, and we may well thank God for it, and we know that now the preachers of the Gospel, with their message of peace, are pushing their way further and further into the dark places of the earth; but I would ask you to consider for a moment

many, in France, in Italy, in Spain, in Belgium, each year sees a larger circulation

of the Word of God through the labors of the agents and colporteurs of the Bible

Society; and in no country, strange to say, has the increase been so surprisingly

great as in the great Empire of Russia. This year's report of the parent Society

shows that the circulation for last year in European Russia, Turkestan, and the

Caucasus and Siberia, was 566,343 copies in 54 different languages. The same

thing will be seen if we turn to Muhummedan countries. In Egypt and in Turkey

the same wonderful progress is being made in Bible circulation, and we may rejoice

now that India possesses no less than six Bible auxiliaries of its own, and on the

Dark Continent, in Uganda, and as far north as Mashonaland, vigorous colportage

how missionary efforts would be straitened and circumscribed were it not for the magnificent work of the British and Foreign Society in their translations of the Scriptures into the languages of the various peoples to whom those missionaries are being sent; and I would ask you also to remember and to bear in mind that it is only through the self-denial of the agents and the colporteurs of the Bible Society that the story of the Saviour's life can be carried to many souls to whom the missionary has not access, or cannot reach for many a year to come. The report of the parent Society will be found to be full of the most interesting details of the labors of those devoted men, those colporteurs of the Society, in every part of the world. I would like it to be remembered, on such an occasion as our anniversary meeting, how far reaching the work of the Bible Society is, so that when you are appealed to for contributions for its support, you may feel that in giving to it you are helping on the coming of that Kingdom, the advent of which we daily pray for. arvie, Just now men's minds are full of the Jubilee year to commemorate the long and glorious reign of our beloved Queen, and her subjects look back with pride and sons, satisfaction to the wonderful strides that have been made in science, in literature, in art and in commerce, and in the extension of the Empire during the sixty years of her Gregg reign; but I should like to read to you the language of the report of the British and Foreign Bible Society to which I have alluded. At the beginning of Her Majesty's reign "it had touched, and here and there it had occupied, the coast line of continents; but the vast inland regions—the unexplored hinterlands, were yet for many years to remain unpossessed. In these early records the colporteur-that patient, indispensable worker-had hardly done more than make his appearance. The Bible-woman had not yet found entrance for her gentle ministries to the still dark -how long afterwards were they to remain dark and secluded !-Zenanas of the East." Compare this with the extent of the Society's work now. There is scarcely a country in Europe where the colporteurs are not diligently at work with their pack of Bibles and Testaments, carrying the Word of God to those who are as to destitute of it, in many places incurring bitter hostility from the priesthood, but gladly welcomed in the great majority of cases by people whom they visit. In Ger-

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as the ze the sh and is making known in their own language the glad tidings of the Gospel to those who have been so long sitting in spiritual darkness and the shadow of death. And all this glorious work has been accomplished, and this wonderful progress made, within these 60 years of the reign of that gracious sovereign, who, at the very beginning of it, on a well known public occasion, declared that the Bible was the true foundation on which rested the greatness and prosperity of her kingdom, and who, through the whole of her long reign, has shown to her subjects an honorable example of the influences of the teaching of that holy book in all her actions as Queen, as wife, and as mother. I am quite sure that no more earnest prayer will be offered on her Jubilee day for our beloved sovereign than by the members of the Bible Society, while they may have to add to that also a prayer for the speedy coming of that more glorious jubilee, when the Bible shall have been sent and the Gospel preached to all creatures, and the kingdoms of the world shall become the kingdoms of our Lord and of his Christ. I shall, without further delay, call upon Mr. Hoyles and the Rev. Dr. Barrass to move and second the first resolution.

N. W. Hoyles, Esq., Q.C., moved, seconded by Rev. Dr. Barrass, the following resolution: "That the report as printed and now distributed be adopted, and that the following gentlemen be Officers and Directors for the ensuing year (1897-98)." For list of Officers and Directors, see page 3. The resolution was carried unanimously.

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After singing the hymn "How Precious is the Book Divine,"

THE PRESIDENT introduced the Rev. Dr. Sullivan.

HIS LORDSHIP BISHOP SULLIVAN said: Mr. President and Christian friends-When I heard, in communication with the Secretary of your Society, that the Society had for some time past, partially at least, abolished the custom of preparing resolutions and handing them to their respective speakers on their arrival on the platform, I heartily congratulated myself, simply from the fact that the absence of a formal resolution gives more freedom and liberty to one's feelings on such a subject as this. Of course, always on receiving such a resolution we understood by common consent that it was a kind of platform peg on which to hang one's hat, and if a speaker, even on a Bible Society platform, ventured to do what we preachers are said very often to do, that is, to preach from our text, and a great way from it too, still there was no great or serious responsibility incurred. However, sir, this very liberty that has been given by the abolition of formal resolutions brings its own difficulty with it, because liberty has its perils as well as restrictions, and the very liberty is so great that, on taking up a subject like this, one scarcely knows where to begin or what to choose from the many and multitudinous aspects of the subject that naturally present themselves to one's mind. One is fairly lost in the grandeur and variety of the themes suggested by the simple word, the Bible, the Book. This evening it seems to me that I cannot do better than say something simply about the Bible or the Book itself, because I believe there is a great deal of vagueness and misapprehension in men's minds in regard to its position and its character and the claims which it has as the Book, the character that belongs to it which makes it the Book, namely, the nature of the inspiration that is in it.

Bishop Sullivan went on to speak of the various theories of inspiration,

arguing against what he called the "verbal dictation" theory, and then proceeded as follows:

Now, it does not do for a speaker on a platform to speak merely negatively and say, "This is not so, and the other is not so." You will naturally ask me what theory I hold with regard to the inspiration of this Bible, in the circulation of which we are interested in this Bible Society. Well, it is very briefly stated. My theory of the inspiration of the Word of God is exactly correspondent with my theory of the operation of the influences of the Holy Ghost in the soul of an individual man. Now, one of the laws, so far as we can comprehend them, of God's method of operation is this, that He deals not against man's will, but rather with it. He bestows his gift on man and He leaves it to man to use that gift as He thinks proper. He does not place the recipient of that gift under any limitation or restriction whatsoever. The grace comes into the human soul subject to its own conditions, and God works harmoniously with them. Exactly in the same way I hold that the influence of the Holy Spirit, when it descended on those men inspired by Him to write the Word of God, that influence filled their souls, it suffused every channel of their being, it occupied and directed them, and controlled and restrained them, but it never once attempted to control and restrain them so far as to rob them of their own individual liberty. The substance of the Revelation was made known; the thought, or the idea was given to them; it was injected, so to speak, into their minds by the Holy Ghost; it was delivered through them, but it received more or less of a coloring while passing through their mind. An idea was given to them, but they were allowed a certain degree of liberty in fashioning that idea and conveying it to their own fellow men; and out of that controlling influence so bestowed on them has come the wonderful harmony that everywhere pervades the Word of God. The men differed; they had their own temperaments, their own degree of intellectual power, their own natural gifts, and so forth; but over and above all these, and in and out through all these, there ran this prevading, permeating, inter-penetrating spiritual power which fitted them as perfectly as God desired they should be fitted for the grand function to which they were called, of communicating to man a message clear and unmistakable from His maker. It is with regard to the writers of the Bible and those inspired men as it is with regard to one of our own admirable bands of music. Take the Queen's Own or the Grenadiers, to which we have recently listened, their great variety of brazen instruments, each called by its own special name, each having its own special note, but there is one influence that passes through them all, and that is the human breath. They all blend together under the influence of that breath, and out of the different notes there comes a perfect melody or harmony. So it is exactly in the Word of God. These men differed widely each from the other intellectually, morally, socially and in other ways, but as the result of one and the same Divine breath passing through the several channels of their respective minds there has come to us that precious and invaluable gift, which because it excels all other books is called distinctly the Book of Books, or the Bible. Now, in speaking of the harmony that pervaded the Word of God, let me call attention briefly to the remarkableness of its unity. A wonderful unity pervades it from beginning to end. The writers show that they have the

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same spirit, tone and temper running through the Book from cover to cover. Some of you have seen in New York harbor that magnificent statue of Liberty which was sent over from France, a gift from the European Republic to her sister Republic beyond the seas. That statue, as you know, is huge in its dimensions and perfect in its proportions. It necessarily was so, because it was wrought out from one plan under the guidance of one superintendent and presiding genius. Suppose, however, that the conditions of its being sent had been different-that it had different nationalities; that come not from one nationality but from various European powers had contributed to make the gift; England for example providing the garland, France the head, Russia the body, Norway one arm, Sweden the other arm. Northern Italy one foot, Southern Italy the other foot, and that the different architects or artists, as we might term them, in those different nationalities had prepared their contributions separately each from the other, entirely independent, without communication each from the other with regard to either dimension or proportion or countenance or anything else; and suppose when they had all been brought together into the New York harbor it had been found despite this fact that they did fit in exactly each with the other. What would men have said? Why, men would have said it was a miracle-absolutely a miracle—that this should have been wrought by different men who had absolutely no correspondence each with the other. That, my friends, is exactly and literally what has happened with regard to the Word of God. No less than sixty-six books written by forty writers occupying every conceivable social station, from the king upon the throne down to the shepherd on the hillside or the fisherman by the lake of Galilee-these forty books covering a long period, as long as fifteen hundred years, written on different themes, necessarily fragmentary in their nature, covering absolutely a period of forty centuries in the history of which they treat, and yet when they are brought together we find that the facts connected with the earlier stages of the history of our race appear in the latest pages of the Word of God exactly as they did in the first. How do we account for that except on the supposition of this one superintending power, namely, the inspiring influence of the Holy Ghost? And then this unity becomes still more remarkable when we think of the unity in doctrine that pervades the Word of God. We have history on one side, doctrine on the other. Now, the unity in point of doctrine in different parts of Scripture is just as remarkable as the unity in history. When historians deal with facts of course they are not at liberty to alter the facts very much, or to fashion them by their own liking, but when we come to the points of doctrine theologians generally fashion them and can fashion them as they like; in fact I might say, Mr. President, I suppose we do fashion them very much according to our own liking. I have read of one good Christian man who in a Christian gathering, when a certain point of doctrine was promulgated, said angrily "I cannot believe it, I cannot accept it," and repeated this again and again; he was very much excited. He was pressed time and again to tell why. He could not. He said, "Why, I don't know; but I feel something here that says 'I won't, I won't, I won't!'" and so it is exactly; we fashion the doctrines on matters of opinion very much after our own liking. Now, notwithstanding this fact, when we come to the Word of God we find that

every one of the fundamental doctrines that are taught there appear in the last pages just as in the first. The being of a God, the perfection and spirituality of His nature, the creation of man by his Maker and yet in a little while his corruption and fall through man's sin, the necessity of an atonement, and yet the utter inefficacy of that atonement without the hand of faith to grasp it and make it one's own, the renewal of the heart by the Holy Ghost, and the certainty for every renewed heart of an everlasting and unquenchable immortality-all these appear in all these different writers just identically in the same form. There is no departure, no divergence whatever. Can we call that an accidental coincidence? Surely not. A coincidence such as that would be more miraculous far than the miracle of the common inspiration of the writers. I might speak again, Mr. Chairman, of the wonderful results that have been wrought by the circulation of the Bible in society. Allusion has been already made to that, but the subject is one that is absolutely inexhaustible-the results that have been wrought in society wherever it has gone. Now, when we go back to pre-Christian times, or to pagan or heathen nations in our own day, we see what the condition of things is there; but let the Word of God be once introduced, and in very little time what results follow; the results are always one and the same. The standard of public opinion begins to show signs of elevation; woman again takes her rightful place as man's friend and companion and ceases to be his drudge or his toy, or his plaything. Public ignorance melts altogether away before the genial influence of public systems of education. Thought becomes absolutely free. Conscience demands that her rights shall be respected. Man's civil and political rights are preserved to them by a bond that is absolutely indissoluble and inalienable; and all this is the necessary result of the circulation of the Word of God. Lands that two thousand years ago, and less than that, were socially and morally a perfect Sahara, a barren wilderness, such as Madagascar, are to-day, simply from God's blessing on the circulation of the Bible, blooming and blossoming as a rose, as a garden filled with roses. I do not mean to say that there was no civilization whatsoever before the Christian era. Of course there was. Greece and Rome had made certain steps in the path of progress. Why, go to Athens to-day, which has been the centre of so much discussion during this unhappy war, or stand on the banks of the Tiber in Rome, and you will see magnificent trophies of ancient genius there in the art of sculpture which are absolutely the despair of the nineteenth century, which our sculptors of to-day may copy but can never hope to rival. Look at its wonderful law givers, its painters, its legislators, its statesmen. So had Greece. And yet though they possessed them in such large abundance, neither the Greek nor the Roman Empires were civilized. The masses of the people were uneducated; nay, not merely were they uneducated, but they were brutalized by the uniform prevalence of the most degrading impurity. Go to the ruins of Pompeii to-day, and you will see frescoes on the walls of Pompeii dating back nearly two thousand years, as fresh almost in their colors as if they were inscribed yesterday, which are suggestive only of the foulest impurity. Examine what are known as the graffiti, the inscriptions scraped on the fresh plaster of the cities of ancient times, which have been covered up here and there, and they reflect the very same impure condition of the moral life of

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ancient time. Let the Word of God penetrate, and all this changes. Why not before? Because paganism or heathenism, as we may term it alternatively, had no teaching or doctrine tending to elevate and purify the masses. Their loftiest teachings were at best dim graspings after truth. Men were feebly groping after the light, and only feebly and ineffectually, because the Sun of Righteousness had not yet risen on them with healing in His wings. The Word of God, came and lo! as the result of its circulation these foul impurities fled and disappeared just as the snow melts away before the genial shining of the sun. Mr. Chairman, there is only one other point that I will refer to before I take my seat, and that is something in the Bible that lies deeper than its uniformity, deeper far than the secret of the wonderful results that have flowed from its circulation. To be a message from God to sinful man that message must be able to say that it satisfies the most urgent wants of man's nature: that it does not merely silence the cry that the heart is continually uttering, but that it satisfies them and stills them perfectly; and the Word of God does that as no other book has ever done. What are the deepest wants of human nature? They are two-fold -sin and sorrow; sorrow crying for comfort, sin clamoring for forgiveness; and the Word of God, the message contained in it, provides for both, and human nature has responded to the Word of God, therefore, wherever it has gone all conditions of men, from the highest to the lowest, have willingly bowed down before it sooner or later and done it homage, rich and poor, learned and ignorant alike. Now, William Shakespeare-our own William Shakespeare-is not commonly supposed to have been a very devout man or a religiously disposed man. I suppose people reach that estimation of Shakespeare from the fact that his writings would not exactly indicate it, but they forget altogether to take into account the age in which he wrote; and let me assure you, as you can be assured still better if you will look at Knight's Life of Shakespeare, that Shakespeare was a much better man and a more religious man than you will at all suppose by reading some of his plays. How do I know it? Knight gives us in his history a paragraph from the last will and testament of Shakespeare, and how does it run? "I humbly commit my soul to my Heavenly Father, assuredly hoping and believing that I shall be made a partaker of eternal life through the merits of Jesus Christ my Saviour." Was the poet's trust a myth or a delusion? Some would tell us—and very wise men, alas it was. Take another case. An eminent American, a man of lofty intellectual power, conversing with a friend on religious subjects, said to that friend one day, "The truth of the Gospel of Jesus Christ becomes to me day by day more and more of a profound verity. It enters more and more deeply into my inner conscience." And a short time afterwards, when he was giving instruction to the sculptor whom he had enjoined to prepare a piece of marble that was to mark his last resting place, he instructed him to carve on it these words, "Lord, I believe, help Thou my unbelief"-a creed and a prayer in one. Take the case of the Chinese student sitting in the study with good missionary Bishop Boone wrestling with the intricacies of the English tongue, trying to convert it into Chinese. He was sitting at the desk with a New Testament before him, and he suddenly arose from his seat with the book in his hand open at the story of the Crucifixion, and cried out with all the excitement of a man who felt he had made a wonderful discovery that concerned

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himself very intimately, "Whoever made this Book made me: whoever made me made this Book!" The Book and the heart of the man responded each to the other, gave the same testimony. Take the case of a poor Hottentot dying in his Kraal of a loathsome disease. What testimony did he bear to the missionary who came to tell him the old, old story of the Cross? "Sir," he said, "the story of the Cross is my Bible, my hymn-book, my prayer-book. When I cannot sing over it I weep over it, and when I cannot weep over it I sing over it." Take the language of a poor Eskimo Indian in our own country, responding to his missionary telling him the same old, old story, and what were his experience and testimony? "Sir, when you come in to read to me that story of the Cross my heart is cold and hard like a block of ice, but when you have gone away it is all melted into water." So true is it, my Christian friends, that the spirit in the human breast sooner or later answers to the spirit in the Book, because the spirit in the Book speaks of pardon and grief, of joy and sorrow, of guilt and peace, of immortality and heaven. The spirit answers back to the Book just as a little child wandering in the forest on the wildest, tempestuous night would answer to the distant familiar voice that calls it home. Surely, if so, the conclusion is forced upon us that they were both divinely inbreathed; that so surely as the soul within the breast is a creation of God so surely is all Scripture given by inspiration of God. (Applause.)

The choir sang an anthem, "He shall come down like Showers," under the leadership of Mr. H. M. Fletcher,

J. J. MacLaren, Esq., Q.C., was the next speaker. He said: Mr. Chairman, Christian friends,-I esteem it a very high honor that I am privileged to take a part in this which I see to be the 57th annual meeting of this Upper Canada Bible Society; and I consider it a great privilege, not only on account of the very important work that has been done by this Society, one which I believe is now the largest of the auxiliaries of the parent Society, the British and Foreign Bible Society, and one that has under its control and jurisdiction a very large part of the territory and population of this Dominion, but also having within its bounds considerably more than half the Protestant population of the Dominion, which may be considered our constituency proper. I learn from the report, and the history of the Society that is there given, something more than I was aware of-the very important work that has been done by this Society during the years of its existence. Like most of you, I have been perhaps more familiar with the work of the parent Society, and when one considers the magnitude of that, one cannot but be impressed with the enormous work that has been done directly by that Society, and still more with the work in which it has been enabled by the good providence of God to do in an indirect way. When I have seen by the report, which I have taken up since coming into the room, that the issues of the whole Bible, or important portions of it, by the parent Society now exceed one hundred and fifty millions of copies, one cannot from the mere mention of those figures form any idea of the magnitude of that work; and it is of very great interest to observe from the report of the parent Society that the interest in that work is manifested especially by the free contributions that are given to it by its subscribers in the old land as well as those in foreign and colonial parts that contribute to it, that the income from free contributions during the last year was considerably in excess of the previous year,

and as I believe of any former year. That is certainly encouraging, and would tend to convince us that, not withstanding the many copies of the Scriptures that are now issued by other Societies as well as many of those who publish them with those aids which we all so much use, there is still a large field to be occupied by the Bible Society in the publication of the Word of God without note or comment. So much for the direct work of the Society, but I think this indirect work in connection with all the Churches and the Missionary and Evangelical Societies is even of greater magnitude and importance; for every Missionary Society, every Society that undertakes to do anything for the spiritual amelioration of mankind, is largely indebted to this Bible Society, that has done so much to supply a large part of the world with copies of the Scriptures. When we compare the countries of the present time, especially those in which these copies of the Scriptures have circulated for the greater part, and consider the great progress that has been made during that time, when we compare these countries with other countries in which the Word of God has not circulated so freely, I think we must come to the conclusion that for a large part at least the difference in the progress in numbers, in material prosperity and in moral welfare can be traced to this probably more than to any other individual cause. And closely associated with this is our Society. The British and Foreign Bible Society is chiefly an English Society. It is not so altogether, and yet the greater part of the Scriptures-more than half the copies of the Scriptures that have been circulated by that Society-have, I understand, been in the English language. The other three hundred and odd languages and dialects have had a large number of copies, but the English language has absorbed, I understand, more than one half the total issues of the copies of the Word of God; and I ask myself whether the wonderful progress of the English-speaking people since the organization of this Society is at all to be attributed to the work of the British and Foreign Bible Society and to the free circulation of the Word of God. Now, a few comparisons in figures may not be out of place. In the year 1804, when the British and Foreign Bible Society was organized, there were, according to the best estimates-for there were no exact copies of the census taken on that line at that time—about eighteen millions of English-speaking people in the world; certainly the number did not reach twenty millions. Ninety-three years have passed—less than a century—and what do we find? At the present day there are, taking a conservative estimate, at least one hundred and twenty millions of English-speaking people, without speaking of some twelve or fifteen millions in India and elsewhere whose mother tongue is not English, but who make use of English as a commercial language. When we think of this great increase we must ask ourselves, to what is that due? Compare it with other countries in which the same conditions do not wholly exist. The language which during that time has probably made the next largest increase is the German-the language of Luther, the language largely of the great Reformers. The German language has increased probably more than two and a half fold or times during the same period. When we look at other great countries that at the beginning of the century seemed, so far as one could prophecy, to have even a better prospect before them than these two languages, we find that the majority of those have remained almost stationary. France for a considerable time made some increase. Of late years the nation has uld been practically at a stand-still, and the number of those speaking the language has probably decreased. So with Spain, which two or three hundred years ago seemed are to have a very much grander prospect than had England, and the Spanish language ose than the English tongue. Now, I ask myself to what is that due? No doubt blood ible goes for something, but yet the Saxon-or the English blood if you prefer it, for it uch vith is not purely Saxon-existed before the beginning of the present century, and even ater from the time of the Reformation down to the year 1804 the English people and the English tongue had not made marked progress as compared with some of those that other tongues and those other nations which I have indicated. And when I have gely sought for reasons, no doubt as I say blood does tell, and the colonizing instinct of the the English has told in large part: and yet, I think, in the good providence of God, sent that this is more due to the free circulation of the Word of God than to any other for cause that can be indicated; and I believe that the English character during that that time has been built more upon the Word of God than that of any d of or a I believe that this large number of copies of the nation. Word of God in the English tongue which have been circulated by the erity British and Foreign Bible Society, as well as the large numbers which have been ther circulated through other instrumentalities, have gone to form the character of those itish who have been speaking that tongue in a manner which does not prevail to the same her, extent in any other land; and I do not think we can find any other cause which will the been adequately account for the great prosperity that has attended this nation, that has attended that tongue, during these years. Now, we live in times when many of our lects best people are apprehensive about the future. Especially do they seem to feel an d, I God; apprehension about the Word of God. These various influences that would tend to depreciate the Word of God and to belittle it seem to have gathered their force eople the within recent years. I am old enough to remember-and I suppose there are per-God. sons here who can remember-additional grounds to those which have occurred within my own memory, as to attacks upon the Word of God which made many of 1804. its sturdiest defenders fear that it was not the impregnable rock that one of our ding greatest statesmen has named it. I remember in my student and college days when that many people thought that the science of geology was going to overthrow the Word orld; of God. They thought the new science, as it was at that time, was in conflict with have the story of the creation as given to us in the Book of Genesis; and yet I think that are, the ripest scholars to-day have come to this conclusion: that although the first is of is in chapter of Genesis was not written primarily as a scientific record, yet the foremost geologists of the world to-day have come to the conclusion that the first chapter of se of Genesis is a correct record of the story of the creation as revealed to us in the other must record—that which is found in the crust of the earth itself. And not very long after h the e has that, I remember, just about my own college days, that good people were very much disturbed by a work that had come from a very high ecclesiastical dignitary, one ther, who was esteemed at the time, one of the highest authorities as a mathematician, and eased yet a great many good people thought that he, if he had not disturbed the whole of When the Scripture, had at least disturbed the authenticity and the correctness of the far as e two Pentateuch; and yet people did not have to live very many years before they were able to learn, and learn with a great deal of exactitude, that it was Moses who was narv. right and that it was Bishop Colenso who was wrong; and I think that the n has

good Bishop would have been a little surprised if he had lived to some twelve or fifteen years ago when he could have gone to Egypt and looked upon the face of the very Pharaoh of the Exodus who is now to be found in one of its museums there. And still later other theories have come to disturb some of us in our faith. Some people have seemed to think that the doctrine of evolution, that has found favor with many scientists-and which I think I may say, without being suspected of any heterodoxy, contains some elements of truth that will find a permanent place in science, although it is largely a theory—some seem to think that the doctrine of evolution was likely to disturb the theory of the creation as given to us in the Word of God; and yet I think it will be found that the highest authorities in science at the present time are coming to the conclusion that whatever of truth there may be in that science, that that also is in strict and literal accord with the record that is given to us in the first chapter of Genesis, and that how much may have been due to direct acts of creation and how much may have been due to forces that were set in motion by the great Creator and under divine laws had carried themselves out-that that is something which science may speculate about, which science may perhaps be able to settle and determine in a way which has not vet been settled or determined; but I think we may all remain satisfied of this, that it is not likely to disturb the force of the value of the living Word. And then in still more recent years something has come to disturb our faith by what has been called Higher Criticism. Now, Mr. Chairman, I am not here this evening to decry anything in the form of learning, or anything that would take or even assume to take the name of something higher than that to which we have been before accustomed; and yet I think that already during the comparatively few years that have passed, very much has come to the surface and come to light to destroy our belief in some of those theories that have been put forward, and to strengthen our confidence in the Word of God; and when I have thought of some of the remarkable discoveries of recent years, when I have thought of what has been done by some explorers in Bible lands, I feel disposed to place the spade of the antiquarian against the pen of the student who would sit in his own room and write down theories which he had evolved from his own inner consciousness. Within the last very few years some of us have seen, with very much satisfaction, the record of some of those wonderful discoveries in Eastern lands, which have gone so far to overthrow some of the theories of these so-called higher critics. When I have thought of the discoveries that were made, for instance, at Tel-el-Amarna, those wonderful records that have come from those stones that have retained those imprints from those early times, when some of the higher critics would attempt to persuade us that there was no literature and no learning, and that some of those earlier books, the books that we were accustomed to consider earlier, could not have been of the age that we formerly thought they were, that the first five books could not belong to the age of Moses, because there was no learning at that time that could have produced such a literature, and we must look for a very much later time for some of the subsequent books of the Bible-when we have come to such discoveries as there have been at Tel-el-Amarna and other places, I have felt like this, that this was really perhaps a rebuke from our Lord regarding the fearfulness of some of His

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disciples who were backward in proclaiming their confidence in His Word, and were really a literal fulfilment of His prophecy. On that first Palm Sunday, when they were asking him to rebuke His disciples for ascribing to Him the glory which they were then ascribing to Him, the Lord said: "If these should hold their peace the stones would cry out immediately." I think, perhaps, because God's people and God's disciples were holding their peace too much regarding higher criticism, and regarding the skepticism that was put forward, that then, perhaps, at that very opportune time those stones have cried out and testified to the literal truth of the Word of God, and to the correctness of the record as we find it there. (Applause.) Now, Mr. Chairman, I must say that I am very little troubled, perhaps because as a practical man I am too much engrossed by the practical affairs of this life to give, perhaps, such time to some of these fine theories that seem to disturb some of the scholars who give more time, and who ought to be a great deal more competent to pass upon such a subject as this than I am. But I must say, that looking at it from a practical point of view, and looking at it from a historical point of view, and thinking how these difficulties that have come up in my own time, and in former times, have seemed one after the other to pass away, leaving the Word of God more firmly and more strongly entrenched than ever, I, for one, have little fear, and can pin my faith to the good old Book more firmly and strongly than I ever was able to do in any past time. (Applause.) And I am a believer in this, that the Book is today influencing the thought and activities of this world as it never did before. (Hear, hear.) I believe that book is being studied as it never was before. The fact of the circulation of these millions and tens of millions of copies would lead us to believe that these books are doing something, and are being read and studied. They would not be bought, and they would not be circulated if there was not a demand for them; and I believe they are leavening these nations, leavening especially Protestant nations, leavening especially the English-speaking nations, as they never did at any previous time; and I believe at the bottom and at the foundation there does exist in the people of those countries a confidence in the Word of God, and also the knowledge of it. I know that there are some good people who will differ from me, who think the former times were better than these. Well, now, it is generally said that when one takes up that parable and speaks of the good old times, that they are getting old themselves. Well, that is one of the signs of age that I do not envy, and I hope will not overtake me for some time yet. When I hear those good people speak about the good old times and decrying the present ones with regard to most of the things which I know, I feel like using the enquiry and saying: "Say not thou that the former times were better than these, for thou does not enquire wisely concerning these things." Now, as to the circulation of the Word of God, I believe that it is more generally circulated, and that the Bible is more generally studied, and is having a very much larger influence upon the thought and activity of the world than it did at any previous time, and there is one single circumstance—and, as a Sunday-school worker, I will simply refer to that one single circumstance—that I think is doing more than perhaps most of us, without reflection, would imagine, to increase the study in this respect of the Word of God; I refer to the single agency of the International Lesson System that is now used by such a large portion of the Sunday-schools of the world. I suppose that according to the

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best record that is being used at the present time among English-speaking people, at least by considerably more than one-half the Sunday-school scholars of the world. It is a fact that during the twenty odd years that this system has been in use, and especially during the last few years, it has brought to bear upon those special lessons, and thus upon the Word of God, a riper scholarship and a greater attention than had been secured in previous times, or would probably have been produced under any other condition; so that we had the finest scholarship, certainly in the Englishspeaking world, and not only in the English-speaking world, but also in Germany, we have had the ripest and the finest scholarship in those countries brought to bear upon the elucidation of that Word of God which this International Lesson Committee puts out, like this Bible Society, without note or comment-for the International Lesson Committee itself only puts out portions of Scripture, takes no part in their exposition, but leaves that exposition to the various churches and the various organizations in which they may teach their distinctive dogmas. So that in that respect there is being brought to the hand of thousands, if not of millions, of Sunday school teachers to day the result of this scholarship at a barely nominal cost, and in very many cases given to them gratuitously. Now, I believe that through that one instrument there is being done more to mould the rising generation and that he generation that is now found in our Sunday-schools, when they come to manhood and womanhood, will have more intelligent knowledge of the Word of God, and that in the comparatively near future, than we had even in the good old times, of which we may sometimes be tempted to speak. Mr. Chairman, I believe that those of us who may live to see the hundredth anniversary of the British and Foreign Bible Society, which will take place some seven years hence, will live to see a record that will be scarcely paralleled in this world's history, and even during these few remaining years I am sanguine enough to believe there will yet be done through these seven remaining years of the history of that Society, more for the circulation of the Word of God and the increasing of its influence throughout the world than was done at least during the first fifty years of its history. I think that is not being too sanguine; I think that is not being too hopeful; I think we can look forward with confidence under the blessing and direction of God to a grand future for the parent Society, and also for this Society, in which we are so specially interested, in which I hope we will be still more interested in the future. (Applause.)

Warring Kennedy, Esq., moved the next resolution as follows: "That the hearty thanks of this meeting be presented to Mr. H. M. Fletcher, organist, and his choir, for their valuable services." Mr. W. J. Robertson seconded the resolution, which was carried unanimously.

The congregation sang the doxology, and His Lordship Bishop Sullivan pronounced the benediction.

The meeting closed at 10 o'clock.

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
