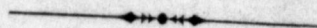

Held in Wellington St. Church, Brantford, June 3rd to June 9th, 1891.

The EIGHTH SESSION of the NIAGARA CONFERENCE of the Methodist Church opened in the Wellington Street Church, Brantford, on Wednesday, June 3rd, 1891, at 2 p.m. The President of the Conference, Rev. JOHN KAY, occupied the chair. Hymn 409 was sung, after which the Secretary of Conference read the first Psalm, and Revs. JAS. VAN WYCK, B.A., and A. E. RUSS, M.A., led in prayer.

The roll was called, when eighty-seven ministers and seven laymen answered to their names.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS.

Your Committee, in submitting its report to the Conference, find that its work has been very greatly simplified and assisted by the new schedules prepared by the last General Conference. The appointment and work of the District Auditors should assure the correctness of the schedules before they reach your Committee, and would recommend the greatest care and thoroughness on their part.

We would call the attention of Superintendents of Circuits to the following resolutions of the General Conference, found on page 319 of the Journal, and would urge that each year they be strictly observed:—

"Chairmen of Districts must insist upon full and complete returns being furnished at the May District Meeting.

"The Secretaries of Annual Conferences must not be allowed to alter the returns of District Secretaries at the Conference."

We would also remind Chairmen and District Secretaries that it is their duty to fill and have certified by the Auditors, the District books, and also the blank schedules that are sent with them.

REPORT OF THE SABBATH-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

After carefully reviewing the statistical returns of the 270 Sabbath-schools within the bounds of this Conference, your Committee beg leave to report as follows:—

1. We have pleasure in noting an increase of \$1,687.83 for local purposes, and \$16.94 for the Sunday-school Aid and Extension Fund, but regret to find a decrease of *\$529.60 in contributions to the Mission Fund. Your Committee recommend that each school be requested to take one collection each quarter for mission purposes.

2. Your Committee have pleasure in noting the increase of fifty-five members of the Church to the teaching staff, and as a result of holy, self-denying toil, 1,218 conversions from among the pupils, and an increase of 1,231 over last year to the membership of the Church.

3. We are pleased to see the interest manifested in Temperance work. We have now 7,115 pledged abstainers, being an increase of 1,348 on the year, but with a constituency of 25,832 pupils. "There remaineth yet much land to be possessed;" therefore let it not be said of us, "Their strength is to sit still."

4. We also view with pleasure the record of added interest in the study of the Catechism amongst the pupils, there being an increase of 357 on the year, who are thus having "expounded to them the way of God more perfectly."

We are pleased to find an increase of 564 volumes in our Sunday-school libraries, whilst, in the circulation of our Sunday-school literature, we find the following increase: *Pleasant Hours* 1,181; *Happy Days* 1,390, and the *Sunday-school Banner* finds favor to the extent of 838 over last year. Our new paper *Onward* circulates 2,969 copies.

Of literature, outside our own periodicals, there is a circulation of 6,145, and increase of 2,068 for the year. Your Committee have noted that one District is responsible for 2,875, or nearly one-half of the whole, and recommend greater loyalty to our own publications.

6. We are glad to report evidence of increasing effort to provide better accommodation and appliances for teaching, notably in the case of St. Catharines, St. Paul Street and Hannah Street, Hamilton.

7. That Rev. Wray R. Smith be Secretary-Treasurer for the coming year.

The Treasurer's report was audited by the Rev. Wray R. Smith and Bro. A. W. Smith, and found correct, and the Rev. J. H. Collins is recommended as Treasurer of the Fund for the coming year.

3. That the Secretary of the Conference for the current year order the necessary supplies for his successor in office.

4. That Rev. J. H. Collins be re-elected the Treasurer.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

Your Committee beg leave to report that the examination of the candidates and probationers of the Niagara Conference was held in the Central Church, Woodstock, on Tuesday and Wednesday, April 21st and 22nd. The President of Conference opened the meeting with devotional exercises. Sixteen young men presented themselves for examination in the subjects of the preliminary course; twelve in the first year, six in the second, one in the third and one in the fourth year's course. Revs. Geo. A. Mitchell, Thos. Colling and J. S. Ross were appointed a committee to report upon whether Harkness' First Greek Book, or Goodwin's Greek Grammar with White's Exercises, should be the Greek text-book used in this Conference.

The Revs. Dr. Burns, R. W. Woodsworth and J. S. Ross were appointed a committee to draft regulations upon which degrees or titles may be recognized by this Board in the Conference records; the report to be presented at the next meeting of the Board.

On the evening of the 22nd, a public meeting was held in the Central Church, the President of the Conference in the chair. Addresses were delivered by Rev. S. Cleaver, B.A., on the subject, "Can the invitation system be satisfactorily worked, and if so, how best?" and by Rev. Wm. Kettlewell, on the subject of "The Connexional Bonds of Methodism, and how best to promote them," after which certificates and "records of standing" were presented to the candidates by the Secretary, and the meeting brought to a close.

At a meeting of the Board, held in the Wellington Street Church, June 3rd, it was resolved that Harkness' First Greek Book be the text-book for examination in Greek, in this Conference.

Whereas, by Discipline, par. 152, sub-section 3, it is enacted that "the Examining Board of each Annual Conference shall determine what titles shall be recognized in the records of the Conference," it was resolved that the following rules and regulations adopted by this Board for the recognition of titles and degrees be reported to Conference, for information and insertion in the Journal:—

1. All members and probationers of this Conference possessing degrees from colleges within the Dominion of Canada shall have their degrees recognized without question in the Conference records, on reporting the fact to the Secretary of the Board.

2. All members and probationers of this Conference possessing titles or degrees from colleges abroad will be expected to forward or furnish the names of such degrees or titles to the Chairman or Secretary of the Board of Examiners.

3. All members and probationers of this Conference possessing such titles or degrees from colleges abroad shall present their parchments or other satisfactory documentary evidence to the Board of Examiners, and also a copy of the latest calendar of the college granting such degrees.

4. Titles from societies or organizations not incorporated, and with no parliamentary authority to confer degrees, shall not be recognized.

5. Degrees from "correspondence colleges," that is, from those which do no teaching and have no local existence as a regular college for resident pupils, shall not be recognized.

6. Bachelors' degrees from colleges abroad in arts, science, law, medicine, philosophy and divinity shall be recognized on proof of having been granted on examination by a teaching college of good reputation.

7. Honorary degrees of Master of Arts from colleges abroad where no previous Bachelor's degree has been earned shall not be recognized, but this rule may be suspended by a two-third's vote of the Board, and the degree recognized by a two-third's vote by ballot, sufficient notice having been given of the time of meeting.

8. Degrees of Doctor of Philosophy from teaching colleges abroad of good reputation, and given on examination, shall be recognized.

9. The honorary degree of Doctor of Laws or of Doctor of Divinity from teaching colleges abroad of good reputation shall be recognized on a two-third's vote by ballot of the Board, sufficient notice having been given of the time of meeting.

It was further moved, that previous to their recognition by this Board, all titles or degrees possessed by members and probationers of this Conference shall come under the operation of the above rules.—Carried.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee have carefully examined the situation of this great reform, and beg to report as follows :—

1. That we note with the highest satisfaction the initial success of the movement for prohibition, petitions to which the people have given such a magnificent response by their signatures, so that it is estimated by the most competent authorities that already petitions bearing about 750,000 names have been presented. The House of Commons and the Senate have been literally overwhelmed with the flood of petitions, an occurrence without precedent in the history of our country. No such expression of popular opinion on a great question of public policy has ever previously been given by petition.

2. That it is manifest that in the House of Commons it is felt that legislative action looking more definitely than ever before to national prohibition must be taken.

3. That we believe that the time is long past for compromise or delay, and that there is something preferable to commission or plebiscite, and for the following reasons :—

In 1874, the Dominion Government appointed, in response to monster petitions for a prohibitory law, a commission to investigate the workings of prohibition elsewhere. Upon the report of the commission being received, the following resolutions were carried :—

In the Senate : "That, in view of these facts and considerations, it appears that the time has now arrived when the attention of the Government should be given to this important question, with a view to the introduction of a bill to prohibit the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating liquors (except for mechanical or medicinal purposes) throughout the Dominion, at the earliest possible date compatible with the public interest."

In the House of Commons : "That, having regard to the beneficial effects arising from prohibitory liquor laws in the States of the American Union, where the same are fully carried out, this House is of the opinion that the most effectual remedy for the evils of intemperance would be to prohibit the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating liquors."

Seven years later, in 1882, an eminent statesman of Canada wrote and declared :—

"Even the professional politician, whose first care is for himself, his second for the party which shelters himself, and his third for the country which exists for his party and himself—even he is beginning to acknowledge that this Temperance question is one which can no longer be ignored, nor dodged, nor burked, but which demands and will have fair play and honest settlement ; and you may set it down as assured that, when professional politicians confess a moral and social issue to be real, the time of its triumph is not afar off."

In 1884, the House of Commons, by 122 to 40, thus resolved: "That this House is of the opinion that the right and most effectual legislative remedy for the evils of intemperance is to be found in the enactment and enforcement of a law prohibiting the manufacture, importation and sale of intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes, and this House is prepared, so soon as public opinion will effectually sustain stringent measures, to promote such legislation, so far as the same is within the competency of the Parliament of Canada."

And now, nearly ten years after that statesman's prophecy that the triumph was not afar off, and seven years after the House of Commons has declared itself prepared for prohibition, if the people are, during which seven years there have been three wide-spread Temperance movements, viz., Scott Act, Prohibition petition, and the Local Option movement, accompanied by a vast increase of Temperance sentiment, and by clear demonstration that public opinion will only be satisfied with the most stringent measures, delay is still asked for.

We declare, on the contrary, that straight prohibition now, without any evasion, is the clear duty of the Government.

4. We hereby put ourselves on record as favoring Mr. Jamieson's resolution, and declare that we regard all the amendments offered thereto as subtle and dangerous attempts to thwart prohibition.

5. In view of the official statement by the Finance Minister, that the question of revenue is that on which the whole result now turns, we hereby declare that we believe the sober and temperance people of this country are willing to abide the issue and to assume the responsibility for any deficit that might be created in the national revenue by a prohibitory law. True fiscal economy demands prohibition, as was fully and incontrovertibly proved and stated in 1882, in tabulated statements by the same eminent statesman, which were summarized in these words by himself:—"In an economical sense, the traffic is utterly devoid of any favorable points, and is, from first to last, wasteful, destructive and impoverishing. The cost of liquors for one year exceeds the whole revenue of the Dominion of Canada. The cost per head has been twice as much as the total cost per head of all our customs' dues since Confederation. The total amount spent in the fifteen years tabulated (1868-1882) aggregates, without counting interest, nearly \$500,000,000. This would have defrayed all our cost of government, built our railways, and left us without a shadow of a national debt. To all this we must add the incalculable cost of citizens slain, labor destroyed, pauperism borne and crime watched, restrained and punished. The wonder is, that with such terrible waste, our country enjoys any prosperity. If this waste could be made to cease, Canada, in ten years, would not know herself, so prosperous and wealthy would she have grown. Surely it is the part of all good citizens to see to it that such a frightful source of waste and destruction is dried up. Prohibition is the only effectual cure."

We commend these as thoroughly sound views on national finance, as related to prohibition.

6. That, in the opinion of your Committee, one of the greatest needs of the Temperance cause to-day is a compact and thorough organization of the friends of prohibition, such as will enable them to unite all their forces in one effort or for one definite aim. Such an organization as would

be recognized as representative by all existing Temperance and Church organizations is to be desired.

We, therefore, recommend the appointment of a standing committee, who shall consult with Temperance organizations and men, with a view to securing such a central organization, and also to furthering our Temperance work in the intervals of Conference.

7. Pending the decision of the Courts on the validity of the Local Option amendment to the license law, we recognize approvingly the eager desire manifested by the large number of municipalities which promptly availed themselves of the Local Option privilege to rid themselves of the drink traffic. We also acknowledge appreciatively the action of the Ontario Government in promptly undertaking and making special provision for appeal from the adverse decision of Justice Galt.

8. Your Committee feel that, against the growing evil of tobacco-using, a strong protest ought to be entered. A practice universally pernicious, it is especially disastrous to the young, in that it excites the passions prematurely and dwarfs the physical and intellectual nature. It is closely akin to liquor-using in much of its influence and not a few of its effects. We earnestly recommend that every member of our Church be urged to be a total abstainer from tobacco, and that ministers, Sunday-school superintendents, and teachers and parents especially employ most diligent efforts to save the young from its use. We further declare that the growing practice in ultra-fashionable circles of what are known as smoking-concerts is to be unqualifiedly condemned, and that no Methodist can at any rate be a leader in such an affair without bringing grave scandal upon the Church.

9. We recommend, in accordance with General Conference action, that one Temperance meeting be held at each appointment during the year, and that a collection be taken thereat to defray the necessary expenses of our Temperance work, and sent to the Rev. D. L. Brethour, General Treasurer.

10. We recommend also that two representatives be appointed to attend the great Temperance convention, to be held in Chicago, in connection with the World's Fair, in 1892.

11. We endorse the joint memorial from the London Temperance Union and the Commercial Travellers' Circle, and express the utmost disapproval of the treating custom as unnecessary to business and very seductive to evil influences.

12. We recommend that a District Temperance Convention be held in each District during the year, and that collections be taken thereat on behalf of the Niagara Conference Temperance Fund; also, that Rev. J. W. Cooley be Conference Treasurer, and the Financial Secretary the District Treasurer, and that the administration of this fund be in the hands of the Standing Committee.

13. Your Committee recommend that the following be delegates:—

(1) To the World's Temperance Convention, Rev. D. L. Brethour, M.A., and Jos. Gibson, Esq.

(2) To the Dominion Alliance, Revs. R. Hobbs, J. W. Cooley, W. H. Young, and Jas. Lund, Esq.

(3) That the following be the Standing Committee on Temperance Organization and Work:—Revs. D. L. Brethour, M.A., W. Kettlewell,

3. The Norwich District recommends that the Rev. Eph. L. Clement be granted a superannuated relation, and your Committee recommend the Conference to grant the same.
4. Your Committee concur in the minute of the Woodstock District, touching the case of Rev. Eardly H. Koyle, B.A., and recommend his restoration to the active work.
5. Your Committee recommend, in the case of Rev. A. A. Bowers, B.A., that his relation as a superannuated minister be continued.
6. Your Committee further recommend that W. R. Blackie be placed on the list of reserves, with a view to his being transferred to the Manitoba Conference, and that the Missionary Committee be requested to meet the expense of such transfer.
7. Rev. B. B. Keefer. Your Committee recommend that his relation to the Conference be the same as during the past year; that he be left without an appointment with a view to engaging in evangelistic work.
8. Your Committee has considered the minute of the Norwich District, respecting the relation of the Rev. James Webb, and recommend his restoration to the active work.
9. The Simcoe District Meeting recommends that Rev. David Kearns be restored to the active work; your Committee have carefully considered this case and recommend it to the consideration of the Stationing Committee, with a view to a suitable appointment; but if such cannot be found, recommend that the superannuated relation of Bro. David Kearns be continued.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee beg to report as follows:—

As usual, in all the churches during the year, a large amount of faithful work has been done for the building up of our beloved Zion.

While some of the Gospel seed sown may have fallen on stony ground or among thorns, yet to the glory of God much Gospel truth has taken root in honest hearts.

We find there is an increase of 567 members, and all the funds of the Church have been well sustained.

Finding ourselves in possession of very little material from the District Meetings, we recommend :—

1. That henceforth when the question of the State of the Work comes before the District gatherings, some information be furnished and passed on to this Conference Committee for its direction.

2. We urge that more than ever, if possible, our pulpits give no uncertain sound concerning the great verities of our holy religion, that the doctrines of responsibility and obligation to God and man may lead all our membership to yet purer lives, and nobler deeds for God and His cause.

3. While we rejoice that Church moneys are being more and more generally raised by voluntary offering, and that, so far as the salary is concerned, the annual tea-meeting is practically a thing of the past, yet we hope that special care will be taken to maintain the social life of our people under the direction of the Church.

4. We are glad to know that while evangelistic agencies have been useful in quickening the spiritual life of our people, yet by the grace of God the constant and faithful pastoral work, still proves its efficiency and sufficiency to carry truth to the heart and conscience, leading men from spiritual darkness into God's marvellous light.

REPORT OF CHURCH PROPERTY AND PARSONAGE COMMITTEE.

Hamilton District.—Emerald Street, Hamilton, asks permission to sell their present church property, consisting of two lots on the south-west corner of Emerald and Wilson Streets, with the church and parsonage thereon erected, with a view of applying the money realized (after payment of mortgage on the same) towards the erection of the John Wesley Centennial Memorial Church in the east end of Hamilton.—Recommended.

York Circuit.—Stoney Creek Road appointment asks permission to sell the Zion Church, proceeds to be applied on church property improvement.—Recommended.

Brantford District.—Sheffield Circuit asks permission to sell the old church and lot, proceeds to be applied towards the erection of a new church.—Recommended.

Woodstock District.—Sweaborg Circuit asks permission to sell the old church property at Beachville, proceeds to be applied towards the erection of a new church.

Eastwood Circuit.—In the case of the Innerkip church, it was recommended that the Conference divide half the debt among the various Districts, to be laid before the Financial District Meeting, and to be distributed to the various Circuits, and this amount be paid over as soon as the Innerkip Circuit has secured the other half.

Woodstock Central Church.—The Parsonage Trust Board asks permission to sell the present parsonage property, price of same not to be less than \$2,500. Proceeds to be invested at interest, in trust for parsonage purposes. It was recommended that in view of the memorial sent to this Committee by the Quarterly Official Board of the Woodstock Circuit,

Moved in amendment, by Dr. Field, and seconded by John Smith, That the item of report of the Church Property Committee in reference to the sale of parsonage property in Woodstock, be not concurred in, but that permission be granted the trustees of the parsonage to sell the same in terms of the resolution of the said trustees.

Eastwood Circuit.—Trustee Board asks permission to sell south-half of lot two, parsonage property at Innerkip, the price to be \$100, proceeds to be applied towards the payment of debt on church property.—Recommended.

They also ask permission to sell quarter acre on north-east corner of parsonage property at Innerkip, the price to be \$80. Proceeds to be applied towards liquidating church debt.—Recommended.

Simcoe District.—Hagersville Circuit asks permission to sell the Balls-ville church lot.—Recommended.

Walsingham.—Centre Circuit asks permission to sell lot 15 of South Street.—Recommended.

Milton District.—Freeman Circuit. The Trustees of the Valley Church ask permission to sell their property, proceeds to be applied towards the erection of a new parsonage.—Recommended.

Lowville Circuit. The Trustees of the Zimmerman parsonage ask permission to sell the same, the proceeds to be applied as follows:—7-17ths to be on the debt of the new church at Zimmerman; 7-17ths to Appleby Appointment, to be applied towards the building of a new parsonage on Freeman Circuit; 3-17ths to the Mountain Appointment, to be applied as the Trustees may decide.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

Though no memorials have been referred to your Committee on the subject of Sabbath Observance, yet we beg leave to report that we have somewhat carefully considered the question, and believe that on the whole we have great cause for thankfulness that the sacredness of the Lord's Day is relatively so generally recognized in our land, and for this we would humbly record our gratitude to Almighty God.

At the same time we cannot conceal from ourselves the fact that there exists among us widespread ignorance regarding the nature and measure of the obligations to keep this day holy, as well as an extensive disregard of such obligations. This may be seen in the neglect of the sanctuary and quest for pleasure by many of our people on the Sabbath, and by the too general activity of railroads, saloons, and pleasure expeditions of various kinds, much of which we are convinced is inexcusable and sinful. In support of these statements, Rev. W. F. Crafts, in his thoughtful work, entitled "The Sabbath for Man," says that "even in Scotland and Canada the prow at least of the continental Sunday has touched the shores in the Sunday trains, Sunday mails, and Sunday excursions."

To correct this unhealthy tendency, and preserve as far as possible the

integrity and due observance of the Sabbath, and to improve the moral tone of the community, we would respectfully recommend :—

1. That in pursuance of the recommendation of the General Conference of 1890, *Journal*, p. 299, a time be fixed upon by this Conference, when each minister within our boundary shall be required to preach a sermon on the subject to his congregation or congregations, as the case may be, in which the divine origin and perpetual obligation of the Christian Sabbath as a day of rest and devotion shall be expounded and enforced. And your Committee would respectfully suggest the month of October as the most suitable time.

2. We would also recommend the more extensive circulation of appropriate literature on this subject, in such form as to be at once convenient and effective, yet inexpensive ; and to this end we would respectfully urge upon our publishing authorities the expediency of furnishing tracts, booklets, and other brief publications bearing upon this question, for circulation through our Sunday-schools and Young People's Associations.

3. We would also suggest to the editors of our connexional periodicals the desirability of making more frequent references to the great importance and solemn obligation of Sabbath observance, and of waging a constant warfare against the running of railroad trains, steamboats, street cars, and all other public business and pleasure conveyances.

4. We would likewise earnestly call upon our people everywhere to discountenance Sabbath social visiting, the reading of secular and sensational literature, trifling and worldly conversation, travelling either for business or pleasure, neglect of God's house, and all other habits and practices calculated to dissipate spiritual thoughts and feelings, and prevent the cultivation of that which is good.

5. Your Committee also, while warmly commending the efforts of the management of some of our public resorts for their earnest efforts to preserve the quiet and sanctity of the Lord's Day in connection with their religious services, are nevertheless of opinion there is still a considerable need for improvement, and we would take this opportunity of pledging the directors of such institutions our cordial sympathy and co-operation in all future efforts in this direction.

6. And finally we would record the conviction that the necessity for impressing the importance of Sabbath sanctity and Sabbath rest upon the minds of the youth of our land in Sunday-schools, Epworth Leagues, Christian homes and Christian pulpits, can hardly be overestimated, hence we would urge upon our ministry the propriety and desirability of directing the attention of Sunday-school teachers, Christian parents, and others, to this subject from their pulpits with greater frequency than in the past, and also that this report be read to all our congregations at an early day.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

The Treasurer's Annual Report and Statement for the year ending July 31st, 1890, as passed by the Board.

The estimates for the year just closed were made on the most economical scale, and were barely sufficient to meet the current expenses of the year. The various Circuits in the Connexion raised \$49,461.92, or \$1,254.48 more than last year; and the ministerial subscriptions were also a little in advance. There were, however, small deficiencies in the amounts expected from both these sources of income.

There was a falling off in the Interest Account, arising from our inability to get several comparatively large sums of interest which, though due and considered perfectly reliable, we could not realize before the close of the year; and also, because in one of our large investments a reduction of one per cent. had to be made.

I am happy to say that the Book Room has increased the annual grant to the Fund up to \$6,300, an advance of \$300.

Notwithstanding the increased expenditure incurred by the removal to our new premises, the expenses of the Fund have been reduced some \$68.

The additional amount required to pay claimants was \$2,398.69, and all have been paid in full and all expenses met; but the circumstances above referred to have left the Annual Account deficient \$1,010.56. Of this amount, however, more than \$800 are in the hands of reliable parties, who are expected to pay up in a very short time.

After writing off the amounts recommended by the Board, and without embracing the munificent legacy of William Gooderham, Esq., not yet received, the investments of the Fund now amount to \$176,503.76.

In accordance with the instructions of the Board, a competent committee of laymen have examined all the securities held on behalf of the Fund, and reported to the Board that they found the securities in a very satisfactory condition.

REPORT OF THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

The Committee met in Class-room No. 2, and organized, by appointing E. A. Stafford, D.D., Chairman, and J. S. Williamson, Secretary. The memorials referred were duly considered, and your Committee report as follows :—

1. The memorial of J. S. Ross, M.A., in reference to notifying the laymen elected to the Annual Conference who are not present at the District Meeting. Believing it to be already the duty of the Secretary of the District, we recommend that no action be taken.

2. The memorial from the St. Catharines District, in reference to notifying the ministers on the District in case of the death of a superannuated minister. We recommend that no action be taken.

3. The memorial from the Prisoners' Aid Association in reference to Prison Reform. We recommend that the Conference express its sympathy with the objects of the Prisoners' Aid Association, and desire especially to emphasize the propriety of making criminal sentences, as far as possible, reformatory in their character, and therefore cannot but approve of the indeterminate sentence system, combined with conditional liberation on parole in all proper cases. And we do heartily commend the recommendations of the Ontario Prison Commission to the favorable consideration of both the Ontario Legislature and the Dominion Parliament ; and we recommend the appointment of Rev. E. A. Stafford, D.D., and Wm.

McLeary, Esq., M.P.P., as a committee to co-operate in securing such legislation as will bring the contemplated reforms into effect.

REPORT OF THE EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee is pleased to report the phenomenal growth of this new department in our Church enterprise, there being over three hundred Epworth Leagues in the entire Church, fifty of which are in the Niagara Conference, with a membership of 1,800.

From the reports that came to us from the various charges where Leagues have been organized, the wisdom of this movement is already apparent in the marshalling and directing the forces of the young people of our churches and congregations, in the social, intellectual and spiritual departments of church work.

Especially has it revealed to us the fact, that in all our churches are powerful evangelizing forces, if only called out and employed, as blessed and permanent results have been achieved under the management and direction of some of our Leagues.

We would, therefore, earnestly commend this department of our church work to all the charges in the Conference, with the urgent request that as early as possible Leagues may be formed on every Circuit and Mission in the Conference, and where Young People's Societies are already in existence, they may, wherever practicable, be federated into this League movement, as recommended by the committee on this subject appointed by the late General Conference.

And we further recommend that District Conventions be held in each District, the time and place of the first convention to be fixed by the Chairman of the District, after which the convention may select the time and place.

(3) That this obligation had remained binding upon the Church through the various dispensations; that Christ directly endorsed it, and that

Paul essentially preached it. (4) That all our people ought to give at least ten per cent. of their income to God, and that pastors be instructed to urge the people to the performance of this duty, and literature on the subject be freely distributed.

2nd. In view of this deliverance of our Church, as well as the great and growing importance of the subject, we urge upon all pastors and official members to give the matter of systematic giving their serious and continuous study and attention, and that, by divine help, they instruct the people both by precept and example in this great and important law of God.

3rd. We would again call the attention of ministers and people to the undignified and inappropriate character of all methods of raising money for God other than by direct giving. It is to be devoutly hoped that the love and loyalty of our people to Jesus Christ will be fully equal to all His financial requirements for carrying on His Church in the earth, and will not need to be supplemented by commercial methods of raising money. We trust that systematic giving will before long render unnecessary the present method of pew renting, which is an innovation of the nineteenth century. It would not comport with the dignity of the Niagara Conference that one of its ecclesiastical documents should even mention such things as tea-meetings, strawberry festivals, bread-and-butter socials, pumpkin-pie socials, neck-tie parties, rainbow socials and other similar methods of financing the Church of Jesus Christ, were these not real evils against which our people need to be warned.

4th. We recognize that in an aggressive and missionary Church like ours, with the multiplicity of our Christian enterprises, that there will be a constant, and we trust, an ever-increasing number of financial claims to present to the people. In order that all special claims be met in full, and that the time of public service be not occupied unduly by taking up the various collections, we would suggest, wherever it is practicable, a consolidation of the majority of the regular funds of the Church into one fund. Thus the pastor's salary, the running expenses of the Church, and most of the connexional collections, together with a sinking fund to pay off any church debt, could be made into one general fund. Special envelopes ought to be prepared for the purpose by the Church, and on every Lord's day, each subscriber would place his envelope on the collection plate as one of the acts of worship of the sanctuary.

5th. That it be a direction of the Conference to each pastor to read this report in his congregation, and that at some time during the year a sermon or sermons be preached on the subject of systematic Christian beneficence.

INTERIM REPORT OF THE UNION CHURCH RELIEF FUND.

In presenting the report of work done since the last General Conference, the Treasurer begs to say that the Committee appointed met soon after the rising of the General Conference, and after careful consideration

of each case, decided to carry out the recommendations of the General Conference, and made the appropriations accordingly.

Many members of the Committee expressed great regret that no effort was to be made to raise any sum to reduce the obligations of the Fund through the meetings to be held in March, to celebrate the one hundredth year of Methodism in Canada.

Your Treasurer also regrets to report that remittances have come in unusually slow, not so much from lack of loyalty to the Fund, as from neglect to take up and forward the collections on time. This necessitates the borrowing of money at high rates in order to keep faith with claimants.

It is of the greatest importance that the ministers look after the interests of this Fund; promptly take up the collections as required by the Discipline—in October—and forward at once to the Treasurer. There are not, probably, one hundred Circuits in the whole Dominion where this cannot be done.

The amount paid in to the Treasurer, and to the Rev. James Gray, who has acted in his absence, was \$604.54, to the 15th May, 1891.

The foregoing is respectfully and loyally submitted, with the hope that the future may be brighter and the collections larger.

REPORT OF ALBERT COLLEGE.

To the Members of the Niagara Conference of the Methodist Church:—

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—The present College year has been one of great prosperity in connection with Albert College. Over 200 students have been enrolled. This is an increase of twenty per cent. on the attendance of last year, which was, up to that time, the largest in the history of the College. This increase is not in any one special department, but represents every department of the College work.

There are thirty-one candidates in preparation for Junior Matriculation, and nine for Senior Matriculation, making in all forty candidates. This is by far the largest number of matriculants prepared by any College in Canada, and is the largest number ever prepared at Albert.

Twenty-nine persons wrote on the Conference Preliminary Examination held at the College in April last, a majority of whom will remain at the College to prepare for Matriculation. These candidates represent almost every Conference in the Methodist Church, from Montreal in the east to British Columbia in the west.

The College still continues to have more than ordinary success in the Departmental Examinations for Teachers' Certificates. Six candidates wrote at the Junior Leaving Examination in July last, and of this number, five were successful.

The College has a well equipped Laboratory and a splendid Museum, and is in every way able to compete successfully in this class of work with the very best High Schools and Collegiate Institutes.

The Commercial Department was never more prosperous than it is at present. That the work is thorough and practical in its character, may be seen from the fact that many of the graduates of this department are to-day filling responsible and lucrative positions as accountants. It is hoped that the Methodist people will see the advisability of sending their children where they can secure a thorough and practical business education, and at the same time be surrounded with moral and religious safeguards.

The College affords facilities for thorough instruction in Elocution at a very moderate cost. This department has been for several years in charge of Prof. Shepard, a graduate of the Frobisher School of Oratory, New York.

It is a source of great satisfaction to the Professor that the prize in Elocution, awarded by the Literary Society of Victoria, has been won for three successive years by ex-pupils of Albert.

The departments of Music and Fine Arts are thoroughly efficient, and have shared in the increase in attendance. The number of lady boarders is considerably in advance of last year, in fact, every room in the College has been occupied. This is owing in some degree to the presence of a Lady Principal of rare culture and of marked ability.

So far as attendance and the general success of the work are concerned, the past year leaves little to be desired. The great need is money. The canvass for subscriptions towards payment of the debt on the College has been prosecuted with some good degree of success. About half of the amount necessary has been realized in subscriptions. The Board of Management would gratefully acknowledge the liberality shown by both ministers and laymen in their subscriptions towards payment of the debt. There is now an imperative need for enlarged accommodation. During the year fully thirty young men have had to find board in private houses, because of lack of room in the College building. It is feared that unless this want is met, the progress of the College will be retarded, and possibly its future success imperilled. However, the experience of the past year gives full assurance that in due time, by the liberality of the people, this want will be supplied.

The College building was never so comfortable as at present. Many of the rooms have been refurnished, and the steam-heating apparatus makes it possible to keep them at a uniform temperature of 65° or 70° on the coldest day of the year.

The health record has been good. Some of the students have been afflicted with one or more of the numerous ailments following in the trail of la grippe, but none have suffered any serious illness. Possibly no College in Ontario is better located, from a sanitary point of view, than Albert College.

The Missionary Societies, as also the Young Men's Christian Association and Young Women's Christian Association, have been actively engaged in religious work. It is the great fortune of the College to have a noble band of Christian young men and young women whose influence for good permeates the entire life of the school. So far as the present outlook would indicate, there is a very bright future for the institution.

A great measure of the present success is due to the practical sympathy of the ministers of the Church, in bringing the facilities of the College to the notice of the general public.

It is sincerely hoped the work done in the class-rooms of Albert may continue to be of such a character that both ministers and laymen of the Methodist Church may, with every assurance, send their sons and daughters to this institution.

OBITUARIES.

WILLIAM HENRY LAIRD.

Rev. William Henry Laird was born in Ancaster, on the 11th of March, 1836, and on the 11th of January, 1891, "ceased at once to work and live." He was converted when about eighteen years of age, in the old MacNab Street Church, Hamilton, during a series of revival services conducted by the Rev. James Caughey, the late Dr. Carroll being pastor. With his conversion came an emphatic call to the ministry, to which he promptly responded, and was licensed an exhorter and then a local preacher. He entered the ministry at the age of 19 years, having been received on trial at the Conference held in London in 1855. A portion of his probation was spent at Victoria College. He was ordained at the Hamilton Conference in 1859.

He was married to Miss Burk, of Cobourg, in 1860, who, for a term of almost thirty-one years, shared the responsibilities and cares of what was a successful ministry. She, now with three sons and one daughter, survives him. He was a man of sterling qualities, with a warm, kind nature, and of a most genial disposition. His gentlemanly deportment was but emblematic of his gentle and affectionate piety; and his fine, personal appearance but the index of the manly spirit within. He was a man of deep spirituality, whose consistent piety commended and endeared him to all among whom he labored. As a pastor he was diligent and almost without a peer, a faithful shepherd of the flock—this gave him strength and success on all his charges. In the pulpit he proved himself an efficient workman, rightly dividing the word of truth, his sermons being lucid and clear expositions of Holy Scripture. He had a fine, musical voice; his language was chaste, well-chosen, and often eloquent. The results of his ministry were eminently successful—believers were edified and established, and hundreds of souls added to the Church on his various charges. He possessed special qualifications for evangelistic work, and notable revivals took place at Woodstock, Oshawa, and Elm Street, Toronto, during his pastorate. His zeal for souls was as earnest at the conclusion of his ministry as it had been in the beginning. He was a true Methodist, loyal to all her institutions and thoroughly acquainted with her doctrines and usages. He enjoyed the confidence and esteem of his brethren, as is evidenced by his election to the chair of the Whitby, Cobourg, Woodstock, Toronto and Hamilton Districts. He was also elected a member of the last four General Conferences, in which capacity he wisely and faithfully served the Church. His stations included many of the more important churches—Oshawa, Port Hope, Whitby, Woodstock, Toronto and Hamilton being among his appointments.

Brother Laird's death was sudden and unexpected. He seems to have had some premonition that death might quickly overtake him, but his family and brethren hoped that he would live to honor the Church for many years to come. His last illness was very brief, but painful; however he was in readiness for the end, and on Sabbath, January 11th, 1891, he fell asleep. The suddenness of his end precluded the possibility of a death-bed testimony, but his consecrated life fully revealed his meetness for the heavenly kingdom.

We shall miss him in our annual gatherings, for his manly and genial presence will be with us no more. "He is not, for God took him."

WILLIAM MORTON.

Rev. William Morton, who died at his late residence in the city of Hamilton, on March 23rd, 1891, was born in county Antrim, Ireland, on 7th January, 1817. When he was four years of age his parents came to this country and took up their residence in the Province of Quebec. While a youth of seventeen years he sought and found acceptance with God, under the ministry of Rev. Ezra Healy, at Goulborne. Eight years afterwards he responded to the call of God and the Church, and entered the active work of the ministry, his first appointment being St. Andrew's, under the Chairman. He completed his probation in 1846, and was ordained and received into full connexion with the Conference.

The following year he was married to Miss Margaret Rutherford, of Kemptville. Mrs. Morton, with two sons and four daughters, now mourn the loss of an affectionate husband and father. He may be regarded as one of the pioneers of the Methodist Church in this country. His first Circuits were large, and the distances from place to place very great. He pursued the work of God with great diligence, and planted the standards of the Church in many new settlements and hitherto unvisited places. He was successful in all his Circuits, and not only built up the material interests by the erection of churches and parsonages, but gathered many into the fold of the Divine Shepherd. A revival of religion took place in every Circuit he travelled, notably at Clarendon, when he was a probationer, where no less than twenty of the ministers of Canadian Methodism found the Pearl of Great Price, among whom we note Revs. D. C. and Henry McDowell, James and Andrew Armstrong, Robert Hobbs, W. M. Pattyson and J. Kilgour. Thus his work goes on, and others are keeping in motion the currents of influence which he originated. He was for three years the Chairman of the Pontiac—now Pembroke—District. He labored uninterruptedly for a period of forty-three years, and was stationed on eighteen different Circuits, in all of which he did successful work.

He was a good preacher, and instructed the people in the things of God, but it was as an exhorter that he excelled, and his powerful pleadings with men to be reconciled to God were almost irresistible. He was superannuated in 1885, his last Circuit being London South, since which time he has resided in Hamilton. But he was by no means inactive, he was every ready to respond to any call, and preached in all the churches of the city and vicinity. His last sermons were preached at Jarvis, one of his former Circuits, where he was greatly beloved. Soon after his return he was taken ill, and despite all that medical skill could do, he rapidly sank, and during the night of March 23rd he left the bosom of his family and entered upon his inheritance above. His illness was brief and painful but his confidence was unshaken, and divine grace sustained him. His remains were interred in the city cemetery, Hamilton, a large number attending the funeral services, which were held in the Centenary Church, conducted by Rev. Dr. Sutherland, Chairman of the District. Appropriate addresses were delivered by Rev. J. S. Ross, M.A., Rev. John Wakefield and Rev. John Kay, President of the Conference. Another of the fathers of our Church has been gathered to his reward, and we are admonished to "work, for the night cometh." May the mantle of this aged, honored, and now sainted minister of the Gospel, fall upon the younger men of the ministry, that they may honor God as did the men of the times to which William Morton belonged.

CHARLES LAVELL, M.A.

Charles Lavell was born in the town of Niagara, in the month of August, 1822, and died at Niagara Falls South, on Wednesday, April 29th, 1891, in the sixty-ninth year of his age. Early in life he was left an orphan. When but a boy he removed to Kingston, where his early education was obtained and where he learned his trade as a printer.

At the age of sixteen he went to Toronto where he obtained a situation as salesman in the Methodist Book Room, continuing in the employ of that establishment till he entered the ministry. While in Toronto he improved the opportunity of attending classes at Upper Canada College. He thus obtained a measure of classical training which he improved by diligence in private study and attendance at the University in after years, when he was stationed in Toronto.

Under the joint ministry of Rev. Egerton Ryerson and Rev. Matthew Lang he was led to a knowledge of the truth as it is in Jesus. In 1840, when but eighteen years of age, he was licensed as a local preacher by the Quarterly Board of the Adelaide Street Church. His call to the Christian ministry was clear and satisfactory. The convictions of his boyhood were a prophecy of the high vocation to which his life was afterwards devoted.

Yielding to the urgency of those days, he entered the itinerant ranks a youth of twenty, and rendered service in the active work for thirty-nine years. He was ordained in 1846, and the same year was united in marriage to the only daughter of S. Morrill, Esq., of London, Ont. In less than two years he was left a widower, and remained unmarried to the close of his life.

Rev. Lavell's record in our ministry is without a stain. He was a pure and exemplary character from the first. Always extremely conscientious and honorable, he possessed the fullest confidence of his brethren in the ministry, to whom he was intensely loyal. He was assigned the most prominent pulpits in our work, for which he was eminently fitted, both by gifts and graces. St. Catharines, London, Brantford, Port Hope, Montreal, Kingston, Toronto, Hamilton, Belleville, Cobourg, Galt, Stratford and Seaforth were amongst the towns and cities favored with his faithful ministrations. From the year 1867 to the close of his ministry he occupied official relation to the Conference as Chairman of a District. He was Secretary of the Wesleyan Conference in 1868 and 1869, the first two years of the late Dr. Punshon's presidency in this country, and he was a delegate to the first General Conference in Toronto in 1874. He was superannuated in 1881, and had he lived a few weeks longer, would have completed his forty-ninth year in the ministry.

If any man deserves to be recognized as a worthy descendant of the Holy Club at Oxford, to whom the word "Methodist," was originally applied by way of derision, surely our deceased brother was that man. He was a Methodist preacher in the strictest and most practical sense of that word. He never did anything irregularly or at random. For punctuality, system and thoroughness he was proverbial.

Lateness and carelessness in filling his engagements were not in his creed.

In giving he was a conscientious tither, and did all he could to persuade others to follow his example in this respect. He had a supreme contempt for narrowness and littleness in supporting the cause of Christ. He looked upon enlarged liberality in the Church as the beginning of a blessed revival. The Missionary Department of church work was that which, above all others, engaged his thought and attention, and it was his custom to steadily advance in his contributions to the Missionary Society, that he might be in harmony with the progress of events.

As a preacher of the Gospel, Brother Lavell was a clear, forcible exponent of the truth. He never indulged in flights of oratory or flourishes of rhetoric. But in chaste and scholarly language, with terse, weighty sentences, and in the demonstration and power of the Spirit, he declared unto the people the unsearchable riches of Christ.

As a superannuated minister, his life and labors were a benediction to the community in which he lived. He had become so identified with the ministers of the Church at Niagara Falls South, during the ten years of his residence in that place, that the people had almost come to regard him as a permanent part of the Church there. One pastor after another completed his term of incumbency, but brother Lavell remained to welcome such new itinerant as he came upon the field, and to cheer and encourage him with his earnest prayers and most efficient co operation. Now that he has gone, the pastor and the Church feel that a pillar in Zion has been removed. But they rejoice to know that the savor of his life lives on, and so being dead, he yet speaketh.

For some months previous to his death he was evidently ripening for heaven. His testimony, often given in the public services, was that of a man living in sweet fellowship with God, and was characterized by a growing richness and unction. During his last illness his expressions of confidence in Christ as a personal Saviour

were of the most satisfactory character. On learning from his physicians that he could not recover, he calmly referred to his life of trust and confidence in Christ, and then spoke of his complete resignation to the will of God, and his readiness for the closing scene. Having walked with Christ on earth, he was fully prepared for the heavenly summons when it came. Thanks be to God, who hath given him the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ.

C. W. M. GILBERT.

Rev. C. W. M. Gilbert was born January 9th, 1813, in the township of Charlotteville, Norfolk county, was converted to God in his eighteenth year, and began at once to work for the Master in a public capacity. In the year 1838, under the chairmanship of the late Rev. John Ryerson, brother Gilbert entered the work of the Christian ministry. For twenty one years he preached the Gospel with encouraging success, and then, on account of failing health, was compelled to take a superannuated relation. During those twenty-one years the following are some of the Circuits on which he labored: Norwich, Mono, Galt, St. Thomas, St. Mary's and Delhi.

After his superannuation, brother Gilbert resided in Delhi and preached locally, as health and opportunity permitted, for a number of years, but for several years before his decease physical frailty kept him confined to his home. His mental faculties remained clear and strong to the last. About an hour before he passed away, he conversed most encouragingly about the grandeur of a Christian life and the triumphs of the Christian's death. He had not long to suffer severely. He knew the end was close at hand, and waited for it with perfect resignation, and on Friday, December 19th, 1890, he sweetly fell asleep in Jesus, at the ripe age of nearly seventy eight years. On the following Sunday a large congregation of sympathizing friends gathered at the funeral, notwithstanding the fact that a heavy rain was falling, and the remains were laid away in the Delhi cemetery, awaiting the resurrection of the righteous.

THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE NIAGARA CONFERENCE TO THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CHARGE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,—Again, through the good providence of our God, assembled in our Annual Conference, we send you cordial and brotherly greetings. “Mercy unto you, and peace and love be multiplied.” We assure you that in all our deliberations and plans we cherish for your welfare the tenderest solicitude. “Ye are in our hearts to die and live with you.” We, as your pastors, are one with you in Christian experience and hope, and moved by the same holy purpose of work for our one Master; and believing that the unity of spirit of the Church—one of its greatest forces for good—is best furthered by manifest harmony between pastors and people, we affectionately remind you that “we are members one of another.” In your interest, as well as our own, it is our duty to “take heed to ourselves,” and so leave no room for “error in religion or viciousness in life,” in the ministry. “As a nurse cherisheth her children” would we “watch for your souls as those who must give account.” Our highest satisfaction is found in successful effort to promote your spiritual welfare by “feeding the Church of God which He has purchased with His own blood.” “Pray for us that the Word of the Lord may have free course,” and that in us and you such fruits may be witnessed “that the ministry be not blamed.”

Since it is increasingly possible to have the form of godliness without the power thereof, we expect you to deeply and sincerely concern yourselves for the possession of the highest spirituality. “Christ in you, the hope of glory,” far transcends all other qualifications for Church membership. In these days, when popular tendency seems to some degree to count as mere conventionalism, the cherished ideas of many of the most prudent and devout, thereby frequently fostering laxity of religious opinion and practice, we urge you to possess a clear experience of converting grace, to cultivate through personal communion with Jesus Christ a devotional mind, to maintain an unclouded fellowship with God, and above all, by clear conformity to His will, to manifest that perfect love which is the crown and adornment of Christian character, “the measure of the stature of the fulness” of a man in Christ Jesus.

We are devoutly thankful that the records of the year show that there have been received on trial during the year, 2,574 persons, resulting in an increase of membership, after making up for large losses by removals, of 567. Our Connexional Funds show a total increase of about \$1,100, of which \$390 is in the Missionary Fund.

Since our last Annual Conference the General Conference has met, and in unequivocal manner expressed the settled opinion of the

Church on the several matters that for the few years past have caused much agitation and unrest. In view of the relief thus brought from disturbing controversy, we desire to indicate that the time is opportune for special and earnest efforts of evangelistic character for the extension of the Redeemer's kingdom, after the pattern of apostolic times, "Then had the Churches rest, and were edified and walking in the fear of God and the comfort of the Holy Ghost, were multiplied."

In this centennial year of John Wesley's death, and also of the introduction of Methodism into this Province, it becomes us to cherish the deepest gratitude for all the way in which God has led us. Our national, as well as our religious life, are greatly indebted for their ample development to the signal triumphs of the Gospel as represented by Methodism. We would counsel you, therefore, to study our history, to ponder its thrilling story of heroic achievement, of personal sacrifice and of vivid experiences, to ascertain by what principles and practices the Methodism about us has been developed first, and then cemented into that organization, in whose unity, power and continued progress we all now rejoice. We ought not to forget the men or the methods, the great principles or the spirit of our past. Rather let us emulate its excellences. Let it be ours to seek peculiarly those endowments from on high which made our fathers in the ministry and membership the heralds of a world-wide revival. Let us follow the same distinctive ideals of experience and practice, exercising amid our growing material advancement special vigilance, lest our progress should degenerate into a conformity to the world in its pomps and pleasures. Particularly would we admonish you against all forms of card-playing, such as progressive euchre, against dancing, and against that recently devised abomination, the smoking concert. Amid increasing culture and luxury, be not corrupted from the simplicity of the Gospel, but rather maintain a devout and humble faith in God's Word, an unswerving fidelity to our peculiar means of grace, and to class-meeting pre-eminently, a tireless zeal for soul-saving, and a holy and consistent life, such as may "commend us to every man's conscience in the sight of God." We would commend especially to you, as very helpful in this direction, the perusal of the Centennial volume, issued under direction of our General Conference. Every Methodist household should be in possession of this invaluable book.

We remind you that our Methodism has always been a connexion. Connexionalism has made our forces a solid phalanx, has rallied the strong with ample resources to the help of the weak, and has made the desire or self-interest of the individual subordinate to the welfare of the whole organization. Let us especially, then, guard sacredly the integrity of the itinerancy and freedom in the administration of it, since it is the very citadel of our connexional unity. If thus true to our spiritual heritage, our system of ordinances and traditional means of grace, and our great vital principles of church economy, we believe we "shall increase as we have increased."

We commend, with more than usual earnestness, the operations of our Missionary Society to your generous and loyal support. In the providence of God, prompted by the great commission of the Church, a new foreign mission is this year to be inaugurated in the great western

province of China, called Sz-Chuen, with headquarters at Chentoo. Rev. Dr. V. C. Hart, a Methodist missionary of nearly twenty-five years' experience in that land, and familiar with its language and customs, will be the superintendent, and will be accompanied by three fellow-laborers. Several of these brethren have been present at our Conference, and have greatly enlisted our sympathies towards themselves and their work. In view of this important enlargement of the claims on our Missionary Society, we bespeak earnest effort, looking to larger liberality, and especially that you will pray most earnestly for the divine blessing to rest upon the new undertaking and upon the consecrated missionaries who in September will depart for China, that they may go "in the fulness of the blessing of the Gospel of Christ."

¶ Recognizing the final settlement by the Conference of 1890 of the vexed University Federation question, and the actual beginning of the work of erecting the new college buildings in Queen's Park, Toronto, we urge your prompt and hearty co-operation with the educational authorities in the matter of the subscribing and payment of Federation funds, in order that the new institution may enter upon its career with ample means to insure its status and success. We also commend to your hearty support our Educational Society, designed to aid in providing the Church with a properly equipped ministry, and trust that no one of you will be wanting in the foresight which recognizes the necessity of such a work.

The young people of our congregations are our peculiar care. Give to our Sunday-school work your deepest sympathy and most diligent work. No field yields more richly or demands closer attention. We ask you to foster the Epworth League organization on all our Circuits as an agency suited to help our young people into the largest activity and usefulness in the Church.

In connection with the great Temperance movement, we acknowledge gratefully your prompt and generous support of the Prohibition petitions presented to Parliament this session. Our Conference has put itself on record during this session as favoring straight Prohibition, immediately, without evasion, and declares that it regards all amendments to the resolution declaring for that as subtle and dangerous attempts to thwart Prohibition. We hope that in no respect will you relax the pertinacity of your demand for this national boon, and that none of you will waver for one moment in your allegiance to Prohibition through fear of serious revenue difficulty. The waste through drink is greater annually than the whole national revenue, while the possible loss of income from liquors is only about one-fifth of that amount.

We also earnestly recommend every member of our Church to totally abstain from the use of tobacco, and strongly urge, on the part of parents and Sunday-school workers, the most diligent effort to save the young from its use.

We would counsel you to support our own periodicals and publications. The *Christian Guardian*, *Methodist Magazine*, and our Sunday-school papers are not only the true exponents of our Church's life and polity, but are as well unsurpassed. Every home should be supplied with the *Guardian*, and every Sunday-school with our Sunday-school papers.

During our Conference there have been upon us very tender and fragrant memories of four beloved brethren in the ministry, who, during the year, have fallen by death. Three of these have been for some years upon the list of superannuates. They were Revs. William Morton, Charles Lavell, M.A., and C. W. M. Gilbert. One, however, greatly honored, beloved and successful, in the fulness of active pastoral work and official responsibility, has also fallen—Rev. W. H. Laird, at the time of his death, Chairman of Hamilton District. "These all died in the faith," which in their lives they had signally adorned. We are greatly comforted in the unhesitating testimony that "their names are as ointment poured forth," and in the assurance that, as to them "to live was Christ," so "to die was gain." Their deaths admonish us all most forcibly to work while it is called to-day.

And now, brethren, we go forth to the work of another year. All untrodden are its pathways, and unknown its coming perplexities. "Ye have not passed this way heretofore." May our great Divine Leader guide us. Forgetting all except our solemn covenant vows of perfect self-abnegation for Christ's sake, and the "fields white to harvest," which call for earnest toil, let the whole Church, ministry and laity resolve that "Christ shall be all and in all" in their work, remembering the apostolic exhortation and assurance, "Let us not be weary in well-doing; in due season we shall reap, if we faint not."
