
Government in Difficulty Because of Capital Punishment Edict

Petrograd, Sept. 14 .- The question of the probable fate of General Korniloff is exciting public opinion. Indications are that the government must face serious difficulties over the matter.

Having re-established capital punishment at the front, however, the government, if it spares the rebel commander. must face the reproach that it executed common soldiers for less serious offences and it would be virtually impossible to impose the death penalty in the future. There are indications that the govern-




