Belgians and British Capture Two Towns

English Forces Aid King Albert's Men in Hard Fight—French Report of Yesterday's Fighting

Amsterdam, Feb. 9—The Belgian towns of Passachendaele and Langemarck have been captured by the allies, according to a despatch received here from Sluis, early today. It says that the Belgian troops took these places with the assistance of a large force of British troops after a hard fight with the Germans.

Langemarck is north and Passchendaele is northeast of Ypres. Their occupation would imperil the German army whose centre rests, on Roulers.

London, Feb. 9—The Daily Mail's correspondent in Petrograd telegraphs:—
"The Russians have tought the Germans to a standstill but their force, which crossed the Bzura has a difficult task before it. The German second line defences in this quarter are of immense strength. The Kaiser's arrival in Poland suggests that the Germans intend to make a final attempt to capture Warsaw in his honor."

The Times' correspondent in Petrograd says:—

"It is thought in authoritative circles that the fresh lull on the Bzura may be due to the withdrawal of a part of the German troops from the Bzura and the Rawka in order to reinforce the armies in eastern Prussia and the Carpathians. The retirement of Russian sections in Bukowina is not regarded here as an indication of failure, but rather as a manoeuvre directed by a desire to occupy a more advantageous position—for instance to fall back to the plains in order to facilitate the deployment of the Russians. During the operations in the mountain regions it often happens that positions adapted for artillery are unsuitable for the assumption of an active movement." WOMEN FIGHT IN GERMAN TRENCHES.

Petrograd, Feb. 9—The engagements are growing in intensity at the two extremities of the eastern battlefront in East Prussia as well as in the Carpathians, according to information reaching Petrograd today. The same news sets forth that on Warsaw front the battle has subsided.

The lighting line from the province of Plock in Russian Poland, as far north as Tilsit, in East Prussia, is virtually continuous. The Germans today apparently are taking the offensive from Gumbinnen and the Mazurian Lakes, as far south as Lipno, in Poland, on the right bank of the Vistula.

A despatch reaching here from Warsaw, says that among the prisoners taken by the Russians in the fighting at the junction of the Bzura River, were some German women. According to this message some of these women were found with rifles in their hands, in the first line of trenches.

GERMAN LOSSES 27,000.

Petrograd, Feb. 9—German losses in the battle of Borjimow are estimated at 27,000 men. Of these at least 15,000 were killed. The Germans attempted to cut their way through the Russian lines to approach Warsaw.

The correspondent reports a full in the fighting, with the Russians holding to the positions they won at Kamion by a flank attack and the Germana maintaining their front west of Borjimow.





PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that a bill will be presented for enarment at the next session of the Legislature intituled "An Act in further amendament of "The Saint John City Assessment Act 1909" and to amend the laws relating to civic franchise."

The object of the bill is:—

I to exempt all incomes from personal labor and occupation up to and including \$1000 per annum; also to exempt \$800 of each such income above \$1000, and not exceeding \$2000.

2 to impose a poll tax of \$2.00 and no more upon all persons whose incomes are totally exempt from taxation.

8 to exempt all household furniture from taxation where the value does not exceed \$500.

4 to provide that the last day in which the Common Council shall have power to determine and direct wast assessments shall be levied in the City of Saint John shall be the 30th instead of the 15th day of January in each year.

5 to provide that the poll tax of \$2.00 shall give the same right to vote at civic elections which the \$500 poll tax now does.



Mr. Weichel, who moved the address, told the house that he was of German origin, and that all German-Canadians are proud of their race and of German progress in science, art, music, literature and philosophy. "But," said he, "they are not proud of the violation of the neutrality of Belgium, of the burning of Louvain or the destruction of Rheims Cathedral." Mr. Weichel declared that Prussian militare the sake of the strain of the sake Weichel declared finat Prussian militarism must be crushed, and the German-Canadians would do their duty shoulder to shoulder with their fellow citizens. The address was seconded by Mr. Achim, who spoke in French, and heartily endorsed Canada's participation in this war. The speeches of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Robert Borden and Dr. Michael Clark were intensely patriotic. It was made perfectly clear, so far as parliament can give expression to the sentiments of the people, that Canada is prepared to make whatever sacrifice may be necessary in the prosecution of this war to the bitter end. 

Thrilling experiences are related by Corporal Bain of the 2nd Scots Guards, who has returned with a shrapnel wound in his right leg and a bayonet wound in his neck, which he received at Ypres.

Bain says the shelling their trench got before the Prussian Guards made their final effort was something damnable. It was then he got hit on the leg. A chum took out a bit of metal, cleaned the wound with a bandage, and then bound it up. The whole operation was completed in three or four minutes.

There was need for haste. Hoarse shouts about three hundred yards ahead told them "the Kaiser's last hope" were coming on again, and coming fast. They were met by a storm of bullets, but so numerous and determined were they that it was only at the trench itself the wave was broken. They roared and shot and stabbed in reply. In and out of the trench the bloody work went on. Men fell fast, and in the darkness it was difficult—in fact, almost impossible—to distinguish friend from foe.

Bain expected death, and wondered if it would be as painless as his leg, which did not hurt at all. It was then he found himself out of the trench and face to face with two of the enemy. Even




