



Moncton, Oct. 10—At the supreme court sitting in Richibucto today, Judge Barry presiding, the grand jury found a true bill against Ernest Mc-Eachern, charged with the murder of Gordon McLean at Mill Creek, Kent county on May 1 last. Increase in England Over Pre-wa Average Only Half That of 1920.

Cost of living in England, according to the latest monthly bulletin of the Ministry of Lahor, showed the smallest percentage advance over the pre-war average that has been reported in any month since 1917. As compared with July 1914, the average percentage increase in food, rent, clothing, fuel and light combined, was last month 79 per cent., as compared with 81 per cent. the month before, with 99 per cent. at the close of 1921, with 169 per cent. in December, 1920.





when the time comes that any of the institutions desire to send, a party of children to Canada, word is sent to the department. A representative is then sent to the institution, and a survey made of the institution, and a survey made of the intending immigrants. As a rule all are found satisfactory, but occasionally one may be set aside for a year. Then follows an examination by the medical advisor of the department. After that the Board of Trade physician makes an examination. Finally, when the children reach the vessel there is further examination by the ship's surgeon, who stands under heavy financial penalty if he allows a mental defective to proceed. Then on lending there is the usual physical examination. St. Paul, Minn., Oct. 11—Free clinics for animals whose owners cannot afford to pay for their care was urged by Dr. F. L. Ober of Duluth, Minn., county veterinarian, in an address before the convention of the American Humane Association held here.

"I should be glad," said Dr. Ober, "to devote several hours weekly to charitable cases if a place for a clinic were furnished. We have this kind now, though under the head of 'bad pay.' Who can blame the boy who brings in his sick or injured dog even if he knows he can never pay? He would not lie for his dog. The fault lies with us for not furnishing some means for his dog's care when he is unable to pay.

"The veterenarian who has the fundamental principles of humaneness should be a leader in his community for education of his clients along these lines. He should teach them that cruelty does not pay. I believe it should be the duty of the S. P. C. A. to take over the work of collecting unlicensed dogs and possibly cats. Many dog pounds I have seen have not been examples of cleanliness or humaneness. I thoroughly believe that the income for licenses and sale of animals would support a small animal hospital, as is done in New York City. PROTECTIVE DEVICE.

c. Each lead-in wire shall be provided with an approved protective device properly connected and located (inside or outside the building) as near as practicable to the point where the wire enters the building. The protector shall not be placed in the immediate vicinity of easily ignitable stuff, or where exposed to inflammable gases or dust or flyings if combustible materials.

The protective device shall be an approved lightning arrester which will operate at a potential of five hundred (500) volts or less.

The use of an antenna grounding switch is desirable, but does not obviate the necessity for the approved protective device required in this section. The antenna grounding switch if installed shall, in its closed position, form a shunt around the protective device.

d. The ground wire may be bare or insulated and shall be of copper or approved copper-clad steel. If of copper the ground wire shall be not smaller than No. 14 B. & S. gauge and if of approved copper-clad steel shall be not smaller than No. 17 B. & S. gauge. The ground wire shall be run in as straight a line as possible to a good permanent ground. Preference shall be given to water piping. Gas piping shall not be used for grounding protective devices. Other permissible grounds are grounded steel frames of buildings or other grounded metallic work in the building and artificial grounds such as driven pipes, plates, cones, etc.

The ground wire shall be protected against mechanical injury. An approved ground clamp shall be used wherever the ground wire is connected to pipes or piping. PROTECTIVE GROUND WIRE.

WIRES INSIDE BUILDINGS. e. Wires inside buildings shall be securely fastened in a workmanlike manner and shall not come nearer than two (2) inches to any electric light of power wire unless separated therefrom by some continuous and firmly fixed non-conductor making a permanent separation. This non-conductor shall be in addition to any regular insulation on the wire.







F. D. Rev. Father Meader, who has been a member of the faculty of St. Thomas' College, Chatham, for the last two years, was connected with St. Michael's College, Toronto, which is federated with the University of Toronto, for several years, and spoke with a clear idea of the advantages which he felt would come to the maritime universities if they availed themselves of the opportunity which the scheme, as outlined by the Carnegie Foundation for their amalgamation, would present, just as St. Michael's had profited by federating with Toronto. 



Delcasse Denies Proposing Franco - German Alliance Against Britain - Always Sought Entente.

(Special Cable to the New York Times and Montreal Gazette)

Paris, Oct. 7 — In an interview Theophile Delcasse, former French Foreign Minister, replies to the charge against him in the ex-Kaiser's memoirs that he planned an alliance between France and Germany for the purpose of fighting England. He says William lied. "The Kaiser's memoirs contain so much error that it is difficult to distinguish the truth from the falsity they contain," he says. "For example, William II. declares seriously that he was notified France wished to join Germany and Russia in order to fall upon England. This was at the time of the Boer War. That France, who had succeeded a short time before in arranging a particularly difficult situation between her and England, and whose real policy was directed toward a Franco-English entente, would have proposed such an evil thing to the Berlin cabinet—that's too dirty! I would use another term except that I'm referring to the man who during a long time represented a great country, and I would disgrace myself in using words fitly to describle his statements. "The truth is that William always expected France to practice a policy based on fear. In 1914, the day when the German Emperor declared war on Russia, his first move was to mass most of his army in front of us. He believed that would scare us. If today he talks so much of Franco-English policy and the Entente, it is because he had seen, but too late for him, that this policy had for its object to assure the independent States which he wished to make dependent on Germany.

Delcasse said that when Foreign Minister he never concealed the fact that the basis of his policy was a Franco-English entente. He said that following the incident of Fashoda up until 1904, it had been no secret to the German government that France was

Antiochus was One of Those who Directed Slaughter of Children in Bethlehem -Found in the Oldest City.

Philadelphia, Oct. 11-The burial place of Herod's first cousin, Antiochus, has been found by explorers of the Museum of the University of Pennsylvani at Beth Shan, in Palestine, according to announcement made at the museum by Dr. George Byron Gordon, the director.

Antiochus, in all probability, was one of the men charged by Herod with directing the slaughter of the children of Bethlehem, as narrated by St. Matthew, in the vain effort to kill the Christ Child who had been described to Herod by the wise men as the "King of the Jews."

No discovery made by archaeologists since a start was made a century ago on the exploration of buried cities in the Near East has aroused so much interest among followers of Christanity. It is the nearest approach so far made to the finding of contemporary records of Christ and of the events leading up to the founding of the Christian religion.

Information of the discovery came to the museum from Dr. Clarence Stanley Fisher, director of excavations at Beth Shan, who has just concluded the second half year of operations there. In a letter to Dr. Gordon some time ago he announced that a hard stone sarcophagus was found in one of the Roman tombs at the site. On it was an inscription in Greek. at Beth Shan, in Palestine, according t

"The letters were quite clear," Dr. Fisher wrote, "but the date at the beginning and the name at the end puzzled us. We have in the camp no works of reference, and so could not look up any of the details. On Monday we had a visit from Pere Vincent and two of his colleagues and, of course, showed them the sarcophagus. They also could not get the meaning, but supposed, as we had done, that the last name was

sion of the great battle story told in First Samuel.

Archaeologists consider the Philistine coffiins of even greater importance than the sarcophagus of Antiochus or the stole of King Sety I. of Egypt, the latter found in the first years of work at Beth Shan. The coffins were made of clay and differ from any heretofore found. Each bore the likeness of a human face modeled into the clay at the head of the coffin.

Levels of six cities have been found so far at the Beth Shan, and it is known there are more below. The site is said to have been occupied for a longer continuous period than any other place of human habitation. It was also the most fought over spot in the world, since it commands the gateway between Mesopotamia and Egypt and was necessary to the conquest of Palestine. Crusaders fortified the hill, and General Allenby took it from the Turks in the World War.

# VENOM FOR CURE

Poison Extracted from 38 Bronx Zoo Mocassins and Copperheads to Obtain Serum - Whiskey Myth Exploded.

New York, Oct. 11.—Poison was extracted from thirty-three snakes at the Bronx Zoological Gardens this week because the demand for snake scrum has been greatly stimulated, following extensive laboratory experiments which are said to prove that the whiskey treatment aggravates snake bites instead of curing them.

Raymond L.—Ditmars, Curator of Reptiles, caused twenty-four copperheads and nine water moccasins to give up their poison, which will be developed into serum by Dr. Afranio Amaral of the Department of Snake Antitoxins in the Brazilian Institute of Serum Therapy. The experiments, supposed to prove that whiskey helps to kill snake-bite victims instead of curing them, were carried on at this institution in Brazil under the direction of Dr. Amaral, who is now engaged in research work at the Harvard Medical School. These experiments were described by Dr. Gilbert Vander Smissen, a specialist in the treatment of snake bite, who assisted yesterday in the delicate work of poison collecting in the glass room of the Reptile House at the zoo.

"The procedure in the Brazilian experiments," said Dr. Vander Smissen, "was to take a series of mammals and dose them with whiskey. Then poisonous snakes were caused to bite them. A similar series of mammals was kept sober and they, too, were bitten by snakes. The intoxicated animals all died five or six hours before the sober animals.

"The fact of the matter seems to be that whiskey or any other alcoholic liquor, instead of counteracting the poison, merely acts to speed up the circulation, to spread the poison more quickly throughout the body and to the instance of the poison more quickly throughout the body and to the instance of the matter seems to be led again and again for serum, but after a certain period the immunity to this extrent, it is able to furnish serum in large quantities. A quart or more of blood is extracted. From this, the clear serum is drawn off. 



WOMAN BREAKS MAN'S
RECORD FOR FIRST TIME
IN SWIM HISTORY.

Hamilton, Bermuda, Oct. 11—In the swimming meet held at St. George recently, in which American and Bermuda women swimmers participated, the 150-yard free-style event was won by Gertrude Ederle of the Women's Swimming Association of New York in one minute 45 seconds. This time breaks the former world's record of one minute 40 4-5 seconds, held by Charlotte Boyle Clune of New York, and was held by Hilda James of England. In the 440-yard back stroke race Sybil Bauer, Chicago, won from Ethel McGray, New York, establishing world's records at the 300, 400 and 440-yard marks, the figures being respectively 4.19 3-5, 5.50 and 6.24 4-5.
