Cowardly Assault With Bat - Arbitrator Hit on the

St. Louis, Mo., July 20—Putting into action the thought which is often recklessly expresed at baseball games, a spectator at a game in Fenton, St. Louis county, killed the umpire.

The umpire, Charles Bouzek, 33 years old, a Deputy Sheriff of Jefferson county, havir a wife and four children, was struck on the head with a bat weilded by the dissatisfied spectator, and fell unconscious. He was taken to Lutheran Hospital, St. Louis, and died there.

Charles Wooley, 18, of Valley Park, was held, charged with the assault. The prosecuting attorney's office said he would be formally charged with first degree murder. The game was between the Fenton and Valley Park teams, and in the fifth inning the score was 5 to 0 in Fenton's favor. Valley Park was at bat, and Bouzek, who was umpiring the bases, was standing near first.

A Valley Park baserunner took a long lead off first base, and when the ball was thrown to first and the Valley Park man tried to regain the base, Bouzek declared him out. The Valley Park players and some spectators who favored the visiting team raised an uproar.

As the noise was subsiding, a youth, said by spectators to have been Woolesy, arose from the place where he had been sitting, beyond centrefield, and walked toward the umpire at first base. A bat lay in the path of the youth. He picked it up, and held it behind him as he walked toward Bouzek. An instant later the youth struck Bouzek over the right ear with the bat. Bouzek fell, and his assailant dropped the bat and ran.





London, July 1.—(By mail.)—A meet-Ing of the Victoria League was held at the Guildhall yesterday afternoon. The lord mayor presided over a large gathering, and among those supporting him were the Dowager Lady Jersey (president of the Victoria League), Lord Balfour, Sir Joseph Cook (High Commissioner for Australia), and Mr. W. Ormsby-Gore, M. P.

The lord mayor said it was just twenty-one years since the Victoria League was formed. It was founded on the death of Queen Victoria—in her memory and in her name. Its object was the promotion of closer union between British subjects living in different parts of the world.

Lord Balfour proposed the following resolution: "That in the opinion of this meeting the practical and non-party work of the Victoria League for the Empire deserves the heartiest support of all British people."
