SEVENTY DAY TRIP OF 8,800 MILES

Itinerary of Prince of Wales From Quebec to Pacific Coast

Train His Headquarters-C.P.R. Train Will Comprise Coaches of New Type Shortly to be Adopted Throughout System

(Montreal Gazette) The Prince of Wales during his forthcoming visit to Canada will live on a train more or less for two months. There hen His Royal Highness will be absent from that train, but because his visit will be principally an educational one, underknowledge of all parts of the dominion, most of his time will be spent in travel-ing, so that for practical purposes a train will be his permanent headquarters.

This special train is now being assembled at the Angus Shops by the Canadian Pacific Railway, to whom has fallen the honor of providing the rolling stock to carry His Royal Highness from the Atlantic ocean to the Pacific and back again. In deference to the implied wish of the king that there should be no undue elaborateness or ostentation during the stock of t

back again. In deference to the implied wish of the king that there should be no undue elaborateness or ostentation during any part of the trip, this rolling stock, with the exception of two cars, will consist of ordinary Canadian Pacific cars. Some of them will be brand new types which will shortly be adopted throughout the system. But outside of a few minor interior changes, they will be without any frills whatever, and after the completion of the journey will be drafted into regular service, so that some time soon somebody is going to travel in what was till then part of a Royal train. The exceptions mentioned consist of two private cars. The "Killarney," belonging to Lord Shaughnessy, and the "Cromarty," belonging to Commander J. K. L. Ross. Each of these has been loaned by its owner. His Royal Highness will personally occupy the "Killarney," All the cars are of steel construction, equipped with all the most recent devices to secure comfortable travel. The train consists of the "Killarney," the "Cromarty," the compartment car "Empire," the dining car "Canada," two sleeping cars, the "Carnarvan" and the "Chester," the tourist car "Chinook," and the two baggage cars.





Dr. Robertson's Efforts To Sell Canadian Products

REVIEW OF WORK DONE

Shipments to France and Italy Have Given Satisfaction - Working for Remova; of Cattle Embargo

Ottawa, Aug. 12.-Dr. James W. ertson has returned from Europe. At the request of the Minister of Agciculture, before the armistice was signed, he went overseas as representative of the department for the purpose of investigating conditions in the United Kingdom and on the continent, with a view to the disposal of Canadian agricultural products and of making arrangements to that end. He visited Paris five times during the progress of the Peace conference

Peace conference.

Dr. Robertson to-day made the following statement in regard to his ac-

Arranging For Exports. "Most of my time overseas was given to the work of arranging for the disposal of the balances of the exportable surpluses of our food-stuffs which were produced in response to the campaign for increaseed production to keep the allies safe during the war and to help win the war. The kinds of comodities dealt with were quite varied, including: Apples, bacon, beef, packing-house offal, poultry, wheat and flour, other grains, dairy products, canned goods, etc.
"Representations were made to the fruit and vegetable section of the British Ministry of Food as to the desirability of admitting Canadian apples in barrels and boxes, and at a price which would be adequate and satisfactory to Canadian apple growers and shippers. Action was taken by the Ministry with results entirely satisfactory to Canada.

"In the case of frozen beef, the Ministry agreed to take a large quantity which had been inspected and marked in the full expectation by the packers that it would be purchased by the Ministry. In carrying through the arrangement which has made in this connection, about 7,000 tons of frozen beef were sold to Italy. That may lead to the opening of a regular trade between Canada and Italy in a class of beef which, being of leaner quality, will be entirely acceptable to Italy, although not of a sort which commands the highest price in the markets of the United Kingdom.



George Vernot of the Montreal BACK AGAIN TO N. C. O.

Montreal, Aug. 12—By winning the bridge-to-bridge swim, the feature of the annual championships of the Ste. Rose Swimming Club, on Saturday afternoon, George Vernot, representing the Montreal Swimming Club, earned the title of long-distance outdoor swimming champions, and at the same time established a new Canadian record for the distance of a mile and a quarter.

The feat accomplished by Vernot in winning this event for the third successive year, according to swimming authorities, has never been equalled in Canadian waters. Vernot, previous to winning the bridge-to-bridge event, won the 440 yards open Canadian championship and repeated in the longer event.

The race was one of the most spectacular ever witnessed in Canadian waters. Vernot was the first to take the water when the word to start was given, and he hurried into a lead that he maintained to the finish.
