FAMOUS GEMS OF PROSE

FREEDOM OF WORSHIP
By Archbishop O'Connell

From a speech at the banquet of the A. and H. A. company—268th anniversary—in Faneuil hall, Boston, June 4, 1906.

THE church! Why to talk to you of the church would mean to speak to you of that influence which sanctifies patriotism, of which Judge Lowell has so nobly spoken to you, for beyond the love of home and fatherland is always the love of God and the love of God is religion. Yes, the love of God and the love of our neighbor, for that was what Christ commanded his followers to do, to love first their Creator, and then their fellow man, and to love their fellow man because he was a fellow creature of the same God.

It is true, gentlemen, that I represent a church of which not all of you are members. I represent a church which is indeed an ancient and honorable military company. It has two thousand years behind it, and that is ancient enough. And it is honorable, because it stands for noble principle and teaches man honesty and honor and the way to live a righteous life. You all know, for you all know history, what the church has done for man in all the ages of its existence and in all the countries all over the world; what it has done in the old world in conserving government, in enforcing its authority in interpreting the law of God upon citizens (the respect for law and authority). And in this new land where freedom came with the first pilgrims to this shore, for the cross which Columbus planted was the cross which represented that church, it is working day and night in a way that few of you can realize.

For venture to say that even you little know what the Catholic church is doing in the byways, in the dark streets, among the poor and the down-trodden and the outcast. I think the church of God knows, with God himself, that if government officers are in danger, it is from those who are lawless, from those who do not wish to exercise the right of man to be free under the law, but who would as it were, wrest from the law license.

This which the Catholic church is doing in your midst in this country, in these United States, in this commonwealth, and in this city, it is true that the Catholic church in the beginning was a little bit of a trouble. It was a trouble on both sides if there had been more charity, more love of each man of his fellow man, as well as the love of God, many of these things would have been taken place. And that is one reason why I am here with you tonight, in order to appeal to your manhood, love of justice and your love of fellow man, to ask you to consider nothing but the good of the people, to be patient and steady, and to give to each man his right—the right which the law of this country guarantees—to worship God according to his own conscience.

HON. MR. ROBINSON BARES HAZEN GOVERNMENT RECORD

Leader of Opposition in Searching Speech Shows up Spending of Big Revenue With Little to Show for it—Albert Southern Rails Charge—Wasting of the Public Money

FREDERICTON, N. B., March 3.—Following the reading of the speech from the throne in the legislature this afternoon, the address in reply was moved by T. A. HART, M.P.P., and seconded by D. P. MacLACHLAN, M.P.P. Nothing special marked the speech.

Hon. Mr. W. Robinson, leader of the opposition, was moderate but critical and convincing. Mr. Robinson spoke for nearly an hour and in his review of the acts of the administration, touched upon many matters of importance. He did not spare the government in his reference to the administration of departmental affairs and while many of his remarks bordered upon the humorous, they were none the less effective.

Present Hazen, though he spoke for some time, was very general in his statements, and while critical of the ordinary. Even his references to the Valley railway were of the usual unimpassioned character, and he was a policy rather than waited upon what the federal government might do. He will continue his speech tomorrow, and Mr. Copp will probably follow.

Hon. Mr. Robinson said that he did not intend to object to the address to his honor, nor did he intend to make any criticism of the speech from the throne. He was sure that members on both sides were pleased with the admirable manner in which both the mover and the seconder of the address had discharged their duties. He noticed that the first part of the speech was given up to a discussion of agricultural matters, which was most fitting just now when farmers and agriculturists were in convention in this city. He had seen in the published reports of the proceedings at the farmers' meetings that some criticisms had been made of the government, and also that there was only one farmer in the legislature.

In spite of all that the government had boasted of doing, it was not progressing in this province as it should be. There were great opportunities in New Brunswick for the agriculturist, and he agreed with the speakers at the F. & D. convention that it would be a good thing if there were more farmers in the houses.

Regarding the potato trade, the government takes great credit to itself for encouraging the farmers of certain portions of the province to export potatoes to the United States, but he believed that reciprocity with the United States would be a good thing for the farmers of New Brunswick.

He was greatly pleased with the showing the province was making in apple production and the former government was to be credited for that. It was they who had started the agitation for fruit culture and the present administration is only following in their footsteps and reaping the reward. It was a source of pleasure and pride to himself and others that New Brunswick was producing apples that could hold their place with the best in the markets of the world.

Valley Railway
He felt that he could endorse the policy laid down by the government with respect to the St. John Valley Railway and he thought the government justified in guaranteeing bonds of the railway up to \$25,000 a mile, but that was as far as he would go, as it was incurring a provincial liability of \$2,000,000. He thought the province should move very carefully in this matter and not involve the credit of the province too readily. He wanted to see the road built and operated as a part of the Transcontinental system. He had every sympathy with the residents of the part of the province this railway was intended to serve.

As regards immigration, he hoped that the efforts being put forth by the government to bring in desirable immigrants would be successful. He felt that the time was coming the maritime provinces would get their fair share of immigration, because we had a better province, better agricultural land and more comfortable homes.

Everybody must sympathize with Campbellton in the clammy that had overwhelmed that thriving town last summer and no one will find fault with the government for trying to ameliorate the sufferings of the stricken people, and any reasonable measure that the government may propose for assistance to the fire sufferers will meet with his approval.



Second Reading for Veto Bill

London, March 2.—Four days of the most uninteresting debate ever given to a measure involving a great constitutional reform came to a conclusion tonight, when French Asquith applied closure and the second reading of the veto bill was passed by a majority of 120, the vote being 208 to 214. Prior to this the house divided on Austin Chamberlain's amendment, with a majority of 21 against it.

The figures on the veto bill were greeted with prolonged cheers, after which the bill on the premier's motion was sent to the committee of the whole house. This stage is likely to be deferred for some time to enable the government to dispose of financial business. The opposition leaders are drafting an elaborate series of amendments.

RECIPROGITY AS AFFECTING GARLETON COUNTY

F. B. Carvell, M. P., Speaks In Parliament on the Tariff Agreement—Great Benefits To Follow

Ottawa, March 2.—The reciprocity debate was continued in the house today, when W. M. German, of Welland, Liberal, condemned the agreement and advocated protection. He was followed by F. B. Carvell, member of Carleton county, N. B., in a ringing speech in favor of the agreement. Mr. German said he had no fear of annexation, but he declared that nobody wanted freer trade with the United States. He advocated freer trade within the empire. Carvell referred to the fact that the opposition speakers were all getting away from the resolution and introducing extraneous issues. He took up the items on the free list and declared that none of these would cause any Canadian interest to suffer. In regard to manufactured goods, there were only three items in which the new duty would be lower than the British preference rate, and two items of which the duty would be equal. He could not see how any harm could be done under the proposed agreement.

Col. Gaston Says no Ground for Suspecting Miss Leonard in Connection With Patient's Death. Boston, March 3.—Col. William A. Gaston, a relative by marriage of the late Miss Mary Leonard, said today that there is no ground for suspecting that Miss Amelia Leonard, the nurse who is under arrest in connection with the death of a young boy, has anything to do with the death of the patient. Col. Gaston said that he was a medical examiner, had been in attendance upon the child, and was certain that it was true that Miss Leonard upon one occasion had told relatives of Miss Leonard that they were not to enter the room, but that the incident was not considered anything unusual, as that her relatives, and did not regard that Miss Leonard wanted to be alone with her patient for any improper reason.

ONTARIO TO BORROW MONEY HEAVILY

Five Millions and a Half for Hydro-Electric and Railway Extension. Toronto, Ont., March 3.—In the legislature yesterday Hon. Mr. Matheson, provincial treasurer, introduced a bill providing for a loan of \$5,500,000, of which \$2,000,000 will be spent on the Hydro-Electric system and \$3,500,000 on the Temiskaming & Northern Railway. Three millions will go to extend the Hydro Electric line to Windsor, and half a million to the extension of the line to other towns. The three million dollars for the Temiskaming & Northern Ontario is expected to result in the purchase of the Hydro Electric line. The porcupine extension will cost \$600,000, and a \$35,000 extension will be built from North Bay to Callendar, so that the Grand Trunk can operate its trains to North Bay without running over the C. P. R. tracks.

New York, March 3.—Dependent because asthma had cut short his artistic career as a clarinet soloist, Gustav Kreutzer, a graduate of the royal conservatory of music at Leipzig and a former member of the royal band in Berlin, killed himself in his home here.
